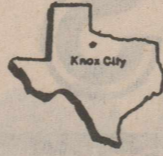

A Little Straight Talk

At last Friday night's football game at Crowell, I sat on the Crowell side of the field to cover Greyhound action. While appreciative to the Crowell officials for allowing me a spot in the pressbox, I am sorry to say that while there I saw and heard what I consider the worst example of bad sportsmanship that I have witnessed in many years of covering High School Football for both radio and newspaper media. Seated close to me was a coach from Crowell who was calling information down to the field by a headphone intercom system. When Billy Large was injured in the second quarter, this same Wildcat Coach cheered, hollered and shouted with obvious enthusiasm. His comments over the intercom and heard by everyone within shouting distance around him were "Way to go, hurt them, hit them, give them their milk." To hear an adult, especially a coach cheering because a player was hurt is disgusting and totally out of line for high school football.

Greyhounds On A Roll

Dominate Action Against Crowell

In the battle of the Hounds against the Cats, the Knox City Greyhounds took their show on the road last Friday night when they traveled to Crowell to take on the Wildcats. It was a worthwhile trip for Knox City as they added to their total of wins for their district and season records with a sound thrashing of the Wildcats 26-7.

Knox City started the action at Wildcat stadium by kicking off to Crowell. Bob Burkham stopped the runback and put the Wildcats back on their own 30. Tackles by Harvey Rocha, Robbie Whitford and Billy Large slowed the Wildcats to just one first down before Fred Ledesma recovered a Crowell fumble to give the Greyhounds possession on their own 40 yard line.

Once again the Hound offense showed their muscle as they marched the ball downfield with big yardage plays by Roy Roberson, Alex Ledesma and Billy Large. A drive of 60 yards and three first downs ended when Knox City scored on a pass from Large to Alex Flores. The extra point kick by Ledesma was good as Knox City went ahead 7-0 with 6:23 left in the first quarter.

Tackles by Augie Rodriguez and Fred Ledesma stopped the kickoff runback on the 35, but a facemask penalty gave Crowell another five yards. Bob Burkham stopped the next play and Harvey Rocha followed with a strong tackle on the following run. A Crowell pass receiver outran Andy McCrary for a 30 yard pass play and a Wildcat first down. Billy Large, Fred Ledesma, Harvey Rocha and Bob Burkham combined to stop the drive and the Wildcats punted to Knox City on fourth down.

On the second play of the next drive for Knox City, quarterback Billy Large took off up the right side of the field for

a 47 yard run and another Greyhound first down. Two plays later Knox City ran for another first down and moved down to the Crowell 28 yard line. The Wildcat defense took a tougher stand and Knox City found itself facing a fourth and four yard play. Billy Large took off on a quarterback keeper around the left side and ran 25 yards for a touchdown but the play was brought back on a holding penalty against the Greyhounds. With the added penalty yardage, Knox City faced a fourth and 14. A pass from Large to Alex Flores right up the middle again scored a Knox City touchdown. Ledesma then made the score 14-0 with a good extra point kick.

Billy Large and Boyce Tankersley teamed up to stop the first Wildcat run of the next series just as the buzzer sounded to end the first quarter of play. Robbie Whitford, Fred Ledesma and Bob Burkham nailed the Wildcat runner on the next play while Fred Ledesma, Harvey Rocha and Monte Owen broke up the next run attempt. Boyce and Billy again teamed up on the next play to stop Crowell, but an off-sides penalty against the Hounds gave Crowell a badly needed five yard gain. Crowell got their first down on the next play, but further yardage came to a halt when the ball carrier was hit hard once again by Large and Tankersley. Two plays later Crowell gained 16 yards on a run around the right side and it looked like the runner was going in for a touchdown but Boyce Tankersley made a one man open field tackle that stopped the play. Two plays later, Crowell fumbled but recovered their own fumble in the end zone for their first touchdown of the game. The extra

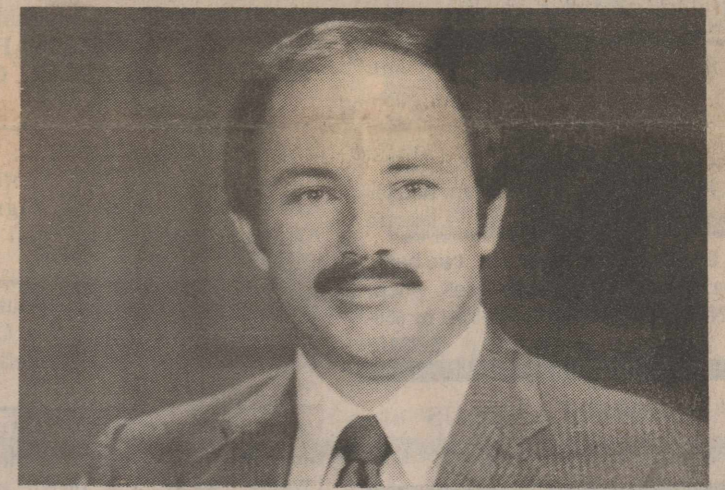
1988 O'Brien Homecoming Huge Success

FmHA ACTIVATES FARM LOANS FOR SOCIALLY DISADVANTAGED PERSONS

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) is preparing to activate a loan program designed to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, acquire land for farming. J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director, said today.

Under the new program FmHA will try to find persons in those categories who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency would also be prepared to sell or lease to them a farm held in its inventory if any are available in that county, Futch said.

FmHA can also provide other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

The new program was included in the agricultural credit act signed earlier this year, Futch said, and funds have been reserved for farm purchases based on the population of socially disadvantaged persons.

The population of such persons range from as low as 1 percent in some New England and midwestern states to highs of 68 percent in Hawaii, 57 percent in New Mexico, and somewhat lower percentages in southeastern states. Population groups involved are Hispanics, Native Americans, Blacks, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

Persons who think they might be eligible and who are farming or who would like to become farmers are urged to contact the Farmers Home Administration county office serving their area, Futch said. 10-13 1tc

point was good to put the score at 14-7 in favor of the Greyhounds with 8:54 left in the half.

The kickoff return by Roy Roberson brought the ball out to the 35 yard line to start the next series for Knox City. The Greyhound drive picked up another first down with a good run up the middle by Danny Grindstaff on third down. A pass from Large to Flores and a 50 yard run by Flores gave Knox City their next touchdown but the extra point kick by Ledesma was blocked to leave the scoreboard showing 20 to 7 in favor of Knox City with 7:19 left in the first half.

Jim Ford, Mike Manuel, Fred Ledesma, Alex Flores, Billy Large, Boyce Tankersley, Harvey Rocha and Andy McCrary combined defensive skills with good tackles and pass coverage as they pushed Crowell back into a third and 16 situation. 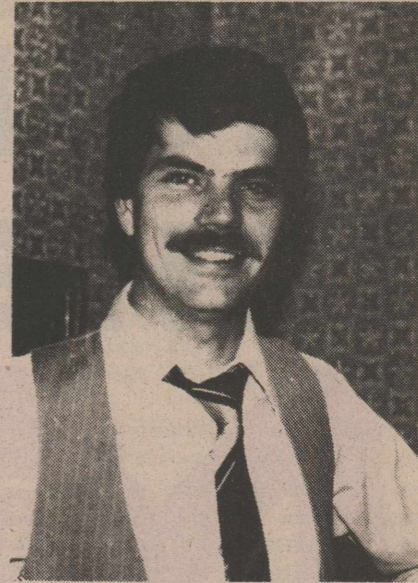
Delta Kappa Gamma Meets October 2

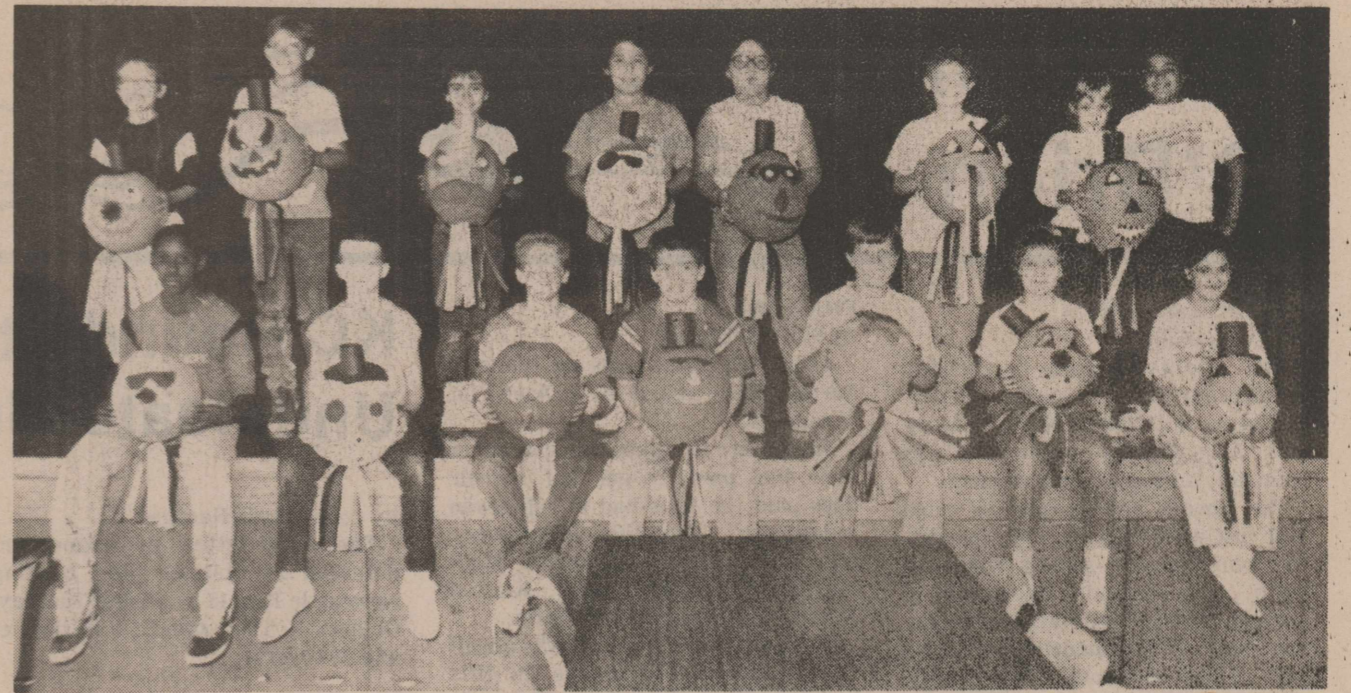

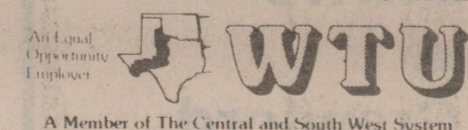



Previously, the auxiliary spent a total of \$70,090.96 for various hospital needs in addition to making contributions of \$75.00 to the Just Say No Club; \$185.90 to the Brazos Valley Care Home for powder for patients; \$600.00 to the Knox County Child Welfare; \$10,500.00 toward the purchase of a new ambulance; \$1,641.52 to the Knox City Fire Department; \$1,000 to the Munday Ambulance Fund; and \$1,000 to the Munday Fire Department.

The auxiliary has raised these needed funds through memorials and purchases at the downtown Thrift Shop.

Auxiliary members were on hand Sunday to greet and welcome guests, serve refreshments from a beautifully decorated table, and help with tours.

Honorees Dr. and Mrs. Springer and Dr. Neufeld visited with guests and administrator Dick Stout proudly showed off the hospital.

The hospital reopened on Sept. 1, 1987, after being closed for 11½ months. The facility became the second rural hospital in the nation to reopen, and according to Stout, the hospital is now offering help to other failed rural hospitals on how to 'revive and survive.'
