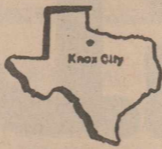

## County Vietnam Veterans Attend Saturday Reunion In Rhineland

Coming together as a group for the first time since the Viet Nam conflict ended, Viet Nam veterans from Knox County gathered for a reunion last Saturday afternoon at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Rhineland.

Sixteen veterans of the Viet Nam war showed up at various times throughout the afternoon and evening to meet with one another during the reunion. Although not an official organization, the Knox County Viet Nam Veterans Association was recently formed and includes those who resided in the county when they went into the service and left for Viet Nam and also those who served in the war and have since established residence within the county. While reunion organizer Jim Carden of Munday was enthusiastic about the turnout, not all of the county's Viet Nam vets were able to attend. Over forty letters of invitation were sent out, but several who formerly resided in the county have moved away and were unable to make it back for the event.

Of the sixteen that showed up, branches of military service represented included the U.S. Army, U.S. Air Force, and U.S. Marines. A listing of jobs performed in Viet Nam included infantry, demolitions, pilot, flight crew observer, communications, truck driving, computer specialist, armor crewmen, helicopter door gunners, mechanics, military police and advisors. Ranks included both enlisted and officer, with many years of honorable military service present at the gathering.

While most of the veterans agreed that the treatment they received upon returning to the United States could have been better, no one appeared to have retained bitter feelings and all seemed to be glad that it was over and behind them. Most of the conversations during the evening had a light hearted tone and many humorous stories were exchanged. Some of the more memorable conversations included stained glass windows and Military Police, a white Pontiac GTO convertible supposedly seen cruising the streets in Vietnam and lizards that

used rather foul language. As you might imagine, you would have had to been in Viet Nam to understand some of these tales. (Actually, a few of us who were there are still having a hard time believing the one about the white GTO convertible!!!)

of Munday-66/67, Jack Dunham of Munday-67/68/69, Mike Wulf of Munday 69/70, Frank Dutton Munday-70/71, Charles Pankhurst of Munday-69/70, Ray Hudson of Goree-70/71, Randy Gore of Vera-64/65, and Dave Thompson of Knox City-68/69/70.

While this first reunion was attended by just the Viet Nam veterans themselves, tentative future plans include a dinner gathering before Christmas that will include families. After various discussions among those present, it was agreed to keep the reunions informal and independent of any other veterans or Viet Nam veterans organizations.

## Chamber Banquet Tonight

The annual Chamber of Commerce banquet will be held Thursday night, April 13, beginning at 7:00 o'clock in the Knox City School Cafeteria.

Chamber secretary/manager Doris Crownover explained that the banquet had been scheduled earlier, but due to a number of conflicts, it was necessary to postpone it.

Speaker for this year's banquet is Dr. Thomas K. Kim, president of McMurry College in Abilene. His continuous service as president of McMurry since June 1, 1970, makes him one of the longest tenured presidents in the nation.

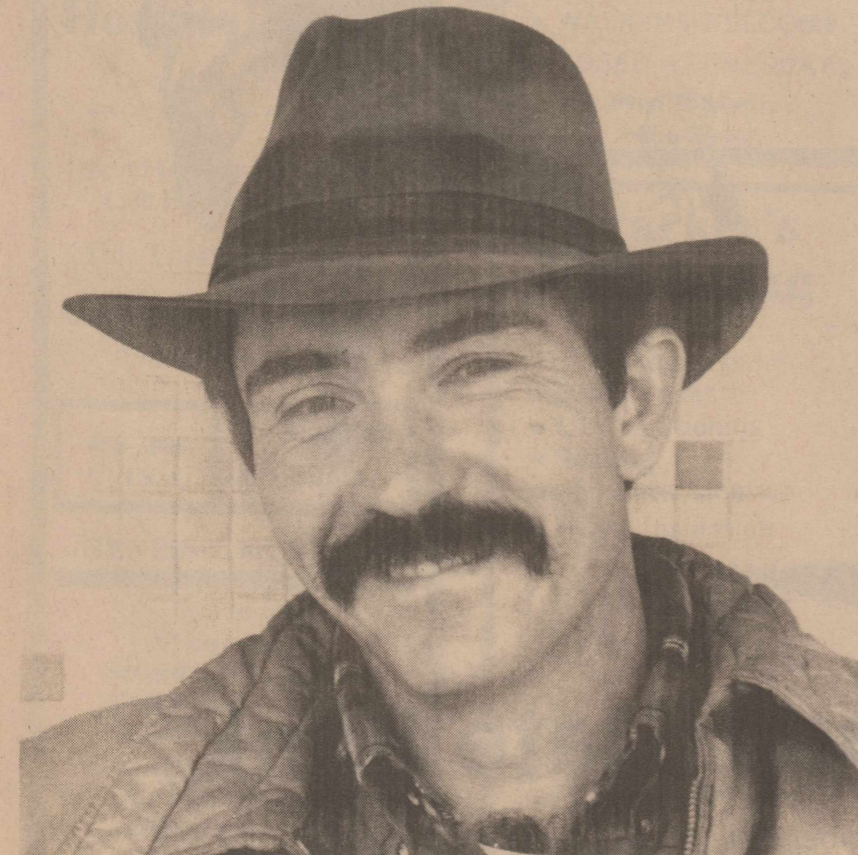

tation/class by Meinzer and Certified Photographic Counselor Larry C. Sanders. The group will spend the night in Knox City, reconvene at 5:30 a.m. Saturday for breakfast and group orientation and travel to the shooting location outside Benjamin for a full day of Texas wildlife field photography. This location will offer excellent access to a wide range of wildlife indigenous to west Texas.

Topics to be covered are Texas wildlife photography techniques, equipment selection, film selection, exposure technique, exposure problems and dealing with the environment.

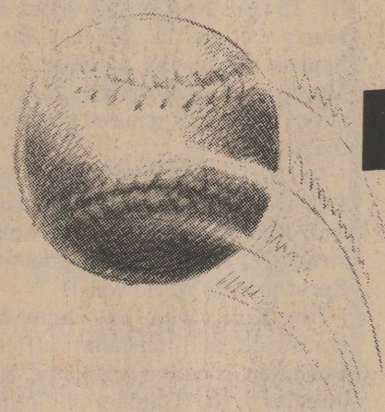

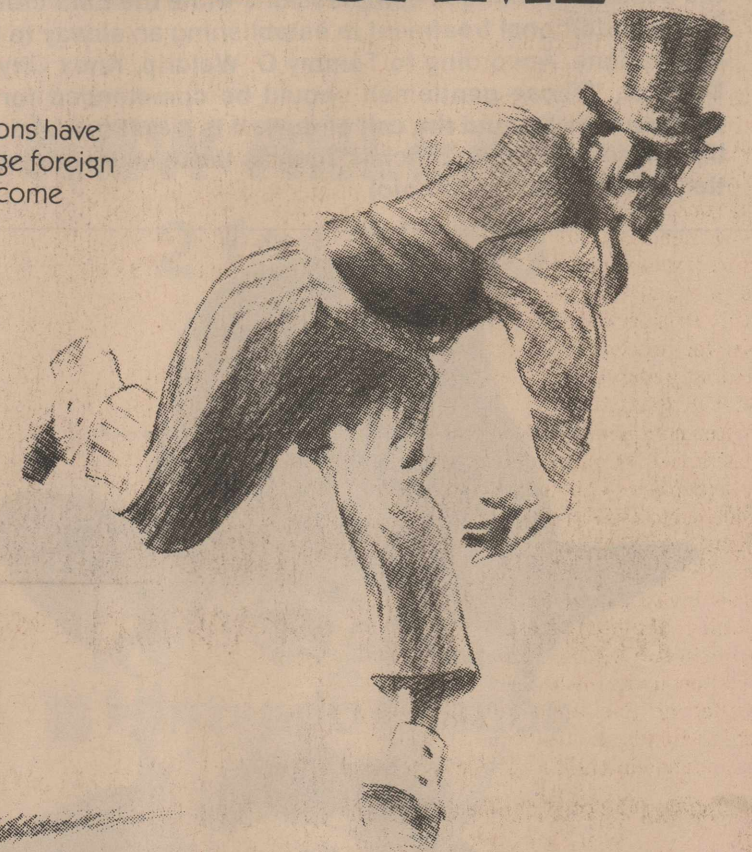

The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway Company ("Santa Fe") gives notice that on or about April 28, 1989 it intends to file with the Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D.C. 20423, an application for a certificate permitting the abandonment of a line of railroad known as the Orient of Texas Line, New Mexico Division, extending from Mile Post 480.19 at the Oklahoma-Texas state line near Ranchland to Mile Post 635.63 near Orient Junction (Sweetwater), a distance of 155.44 miles, all in Wilbarger, Hardeman, Foard, Knox, Haskell, Stonewall, Jones and Fisher Counties, Texas. The line for which the abandonment application will be filed includes the following stations:

The reasons for the proposed abandonment are that the line operates at a deficit, that prospects for increased revenues are poor and that the line's shippers have adequate transportation alternatives.

This line of railroad has appeared on the system diagram map in category 1 since June 30, 1988.

The interest of railroad employees will be protected by the conditions prescribed by the Interstate Commerce Commission in Oregon Short Line R. Co. Abandonment, 360 I.C.C. 91 (1979).

Any interested person, after the application is filed on April 28, 1989, is entitled to file with the Interstate Commerce Commission written comments concerning the proposed abandonment or protests to it.

Protests must contain the following:

- (1) Protestant's name, address and business.
- (2) A statement describing protestant's interest in the proceeding including:
  - (i) A description of protestant's use of the line;
  - (ii) If protestant does not use the line, information concerning the group or public interest it represents; and
  - (iii) If protestant's interest is limited to the retention of service over a portion of the line, a description of the portion of the line subject to protestant's interest (with milepost designations if available).
- (3) Specific reasons why protestant opposes the application including information regarding protestant's reliance on the involved service (this information must be supported by affidavits of persons with personal knowledge of the fact(s)).
- (4) Any rebuttal of material submitted by applicant.
- (5) If an oral hearing is desired, a request for and reasons why an oral hearing is necessary.

In addition, a commenting party or protestant may provide a statement of position and a summary of evidence regarding:

- (i) Intent to offer financial assistance;
- (ii) Environmental impact;
- (iii) Impact on rural and community development;
- (iv) Suitability of the properties for other public purposes;
- (v) Recommended provisions for protection of the interests of employees; and
- (vi) Prospective use of the right-of-way for interim trail use and rail banking under 16 U.S.C. §1247(d) and 49 C.F.R. §1152.29.

Written comments and protests will be considered by the Commission in determining whether an investigation is needed to assist in determining what disposition to make of the application. The Commission will automatically direct investigation if a protest is filed which demonstrates: (1) The protestant filed a feeder line application under 49 U.S.C. §10910; (2) the feeder line application involves any portion of the rail line involved in the abandonment or discontinuance

application; (3) the feeder line application was filed prior to the date the abandonment or discontinuance application was filed; and (4) the feeder line application is pending before the Commission. If an investigation is conducted, the commenting party or protestant may participate in the proceeding as its interests may appear.

Those parties filing protests to the proposed abandonment should be prepared to participate actively in either oral hearing or through the submission of additional material in the form of verified statements. Parties seeking information concerning the filing of protests should refer to 49 C.F.R. §1152.25.

Written comments and protests should indicate the proceeding designation No. AB-52 (Sub-No. 62) and should be filed with the Secretary, Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D.C. 20423 no later than May 30, 1989. Interested persons may file a written comment or protest with the Commission to become a party to this abandonment proceeding. A copy of each written comment or protest shall be served upon the representative of the applicant, Michael W. Blaszak, 80 East Jackson Boulevard, Chicago, Illinois 60604 (tel. no. (312) 786-6889). The original and two copies of all comments or protests shall be filed with the Commission with a certificate of service.

If no protests are received within 30 days after the application is filed, the Commission will grant the abandonment request and issue a certificate which permits the abandonment to occur within 75 days after the application is filed.

The line sought to be abandoned will be available for subsidy or sale for continued rail use, if the Commission decides to permit the abandonment, in accordance with applicable laws and regulations (49 U.S.C. §10905 and 49 C.F.R. §1152.27). Applicant will promptly provide upon request to each interested party an estimate of the subsidy and minimum purchase price required to keep the line in operation. The carrier's representative to whom inquiries may be made concerning sale or subsidy terms is Michael W. Blaszak at the address shown above.

Persons seeking further information concerning abandonment procedures may contact the Interstate Commerce Commission's Rail Section, Office of Proceedings or the Office of Transportation Analysis, Rail Services Planning Office, or refer to the full abandonment and discontinuance regulations at 49 C.F.R. §1152.

A copy of the application will be available for public inspection on or after April 28, 1989 at Santa Fe's Transportation Services Office, 12330 East Northwest Highway, Dallas, Texas 75228 (open continuously). The carrier shall furnish a copy of the application to any interested person proposing to file a protest or comment, upon request.

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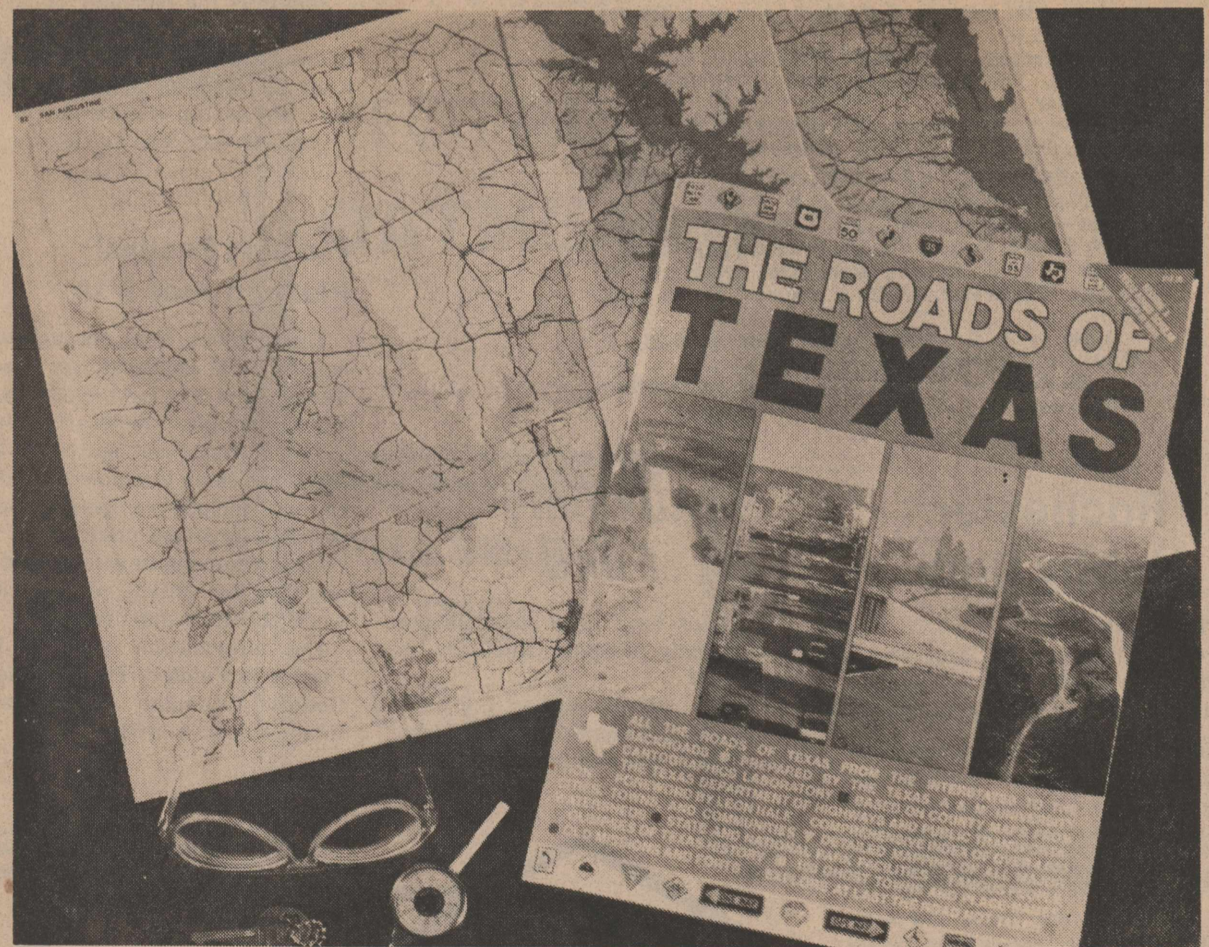

## Mondell Mills Named Crosbyton's 'Man Of Year'

(Editor's Note: Knox City native Mondell Mills was recently named Crosbyton's 'Man of the Year'. The following was presented at the banquet by last year's recipient T.W. Stockton. Mills is married to the former Mary Helen Logan.)

Crosbyton's 1989 Man of the Year became a productive member of our community in 1978 when he moved here to manage one of the most profitable agri-businesses in this state.

This man was born on Sept. 18, 1925, in Knox City, Texas. He grew up in Knox City, graduated from high school there in 1942. He joined the Air Force and served our country from 1943 through 1947.

He and his lovely wife of 45 years are the parents of two daughters and can boast of two grandchildren. Our honoree's formal education, as well as his lifelong career moves, have been focused on cooperatives. He attended the Gin Bookkeeping School sponsored by the Texas Federation of Cooperatives in 1948, 1949, 1950, and 1951.

Although most of his energies have been devoted to profits for his stockholders and the efficiency and morale of his employees, he is supportive of worthwhile community activities. He has taken a leadership role in the First United Methodist Church serving as a trustee both here and in Lockney.

He is also highly valued by his peers in his professional organizations. He is a director of the Texas Agricultural Cooperative Council and chairman of the Texas Bank for Cooperatives Stockholders Advisory Committee. And, in the Texas Cooperative Ginners Association, he served as a director in 1980, vice-president in 1981, and president in 1982. He is a member of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association. He has served as director for the Plains Cotton Cooperative Association, Plains Cotton Oil Mill, and the Plain-

view Cooperative Compress.

He was named Texas Cooperative Ginner of the Year in 1959. And was presented the Distinguished Service Award in 1984 by the Texas Federation of Cooperatives.

When our Man of the Year was discharged by the Air Force in 1947, he worked as office manager for the O'Brien Coop Gin until 1954.

He farmed a section of land at Petersburg in 1955.

He worked for the Edmonson Gin of Coops as office manager in 1956.

In 1957, he moved to Lockney, Texas, to manage a new cooperative, the Lockney Cooperative Gin. During his tenure as general manager, the Lockney Cooperative grew from a small cooperative with one cotton gin with total assets of \$160,000 to an organization with four cotton gins and an elevator with 5,500,000 bushel

capacity, a dry fertilizer blending plant, and a 30,000 head feedyard, all with total assets of \$12,575,000.

Word spread of his management skills, and he was hired to supervise the construction and then manage a 30,000-head feedyard for Littlefield Feeders from 1973-77.

In 1978, our Man of the Year accepted yet another challenge and became general manager of Associated Cotton Growers.

Under his management, a record 53,415 bales of cotton were ginned from the 1987 crop. The period of 1978 through the present time has been very successful in terms of gin operations, burr pellet sales, and grain elevator services.

Our Man of the Year has had a profound economic impact on the farmers and businesses of this area. Of the \$2,334,799 annual operating budget in 1987, \$1,238,462 was expended locally on labor, Ladies and Gentlemen, may I present 1989 man of the year, Mondell Mills.

The club donated \$56 to the Depot restoration fund.

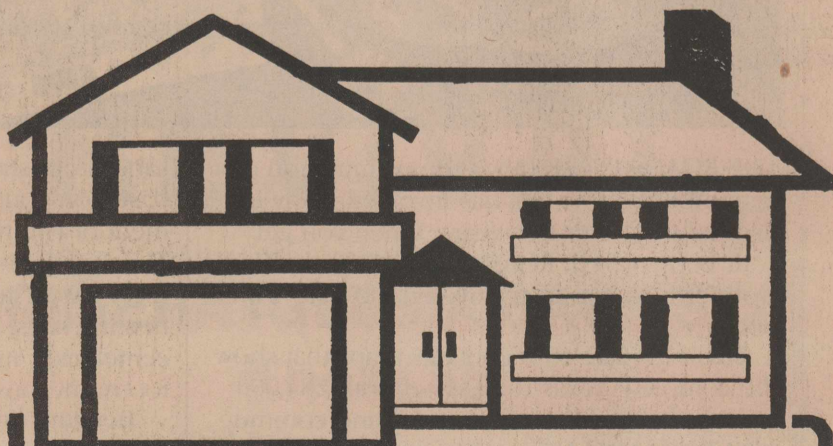

### Social Security News

Farmers and farm workers should be sure to note the rules that cover farm wages for social security purposes. The rules determine how workers earn social security protection for themselves and their families.

Farm workers get credit for work for an employer who spends \$2,500 or more a year for agricultural labor, regardless of the amount of wages earned or how many days they worked.

A recent exception to this rule provides that if a person works as a seasonal hand harvest laborer commuting to work daily from home, and is paid on a piece rate basis, the work is only covered if cash wages amount to at least \$150, regardless of the amount of total farm wages the employer pays.

In all other cases, if an employer spends less than \$2,500 a year on agricultural labor, the worker is still covered if paid at least \$150 in wages during the year.

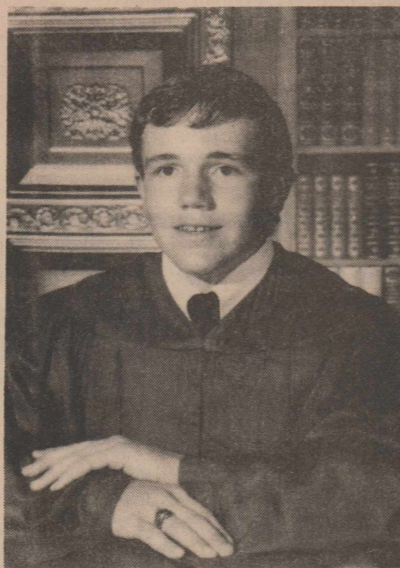
The reporting of farm wages is important to the financial security of farm workers. The coverage can mean benefits to a worker and his family when a worker retires, dies, or becomes disabled. Although the benefits are intended to be a base and not total income, for many low income workers social security becomes the main source of income in retirement, or if they become disabled, or to their families should they die.

The farmer is responsible for keeping a record of wages paid, deducting the taxes owed, reporting the wages to the Social Security Administration the taxes that are due. Failure to do so can result in a penalty.

When the farmer hires farm crew workers, the crew leader may be the "employer". This is true if there is a written agreement, or the crew leader pays the workers. If the farmer pays the workers, whoever has the final right to control the workers on the job is the employer.

Farm workers who wish to check to make sure their earnings have been reported may contact any social security office. The office will send them a Form 7004 with which they can request a "Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement." The statement will indicate the earnings credited to their record and the benefits payable at retirement, or if they become disabled, or to their family should they die.

The Knox City Fire Department met for their regular two meetings in March. The department now has a different rescue van which is already in operation.

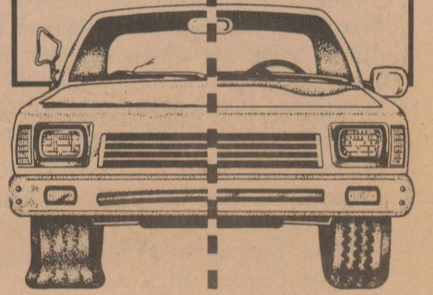

## Counts Appointed To Committee On Elections

AUSTIN - Speaker Gib Lewis last week moved Rep. David Counts (D-Knox City) from the House Committee on Human Services to the House Committee on Elections. The appointment was made to fill a vacancy created by the departure of Rep. David Patronella.

Counts' knowledge of the Elections Code and years of experience with the elections process will make him a valuable asset to the committee. "Election related issues that are im-

portant to the state are important to the 78th House District as well. The 1990 elections will have a great impact on all of us, and I welcome the opportunity to serve on this committee," said Counts.

"I'm sorry to be leaving the Human Services Committee. It's been a valuable experience, one that has better equipped me to look after the needs of those I represent," Counts added. Newly elected Rep. Kenneth VanderVoort was appointed to fill the vacancy on the Human Services Committee.

## Texas Senate Approves Prison-Building Money

AUSTIN - The Texas Senate on Thursday approved the appropriation of \$142,147,300 for the building of two new maximum security prison facilities.

"This is the first step in securing much needed prison space and an enhanced opportunity for us to deal with this longstanding problem," said Senator Steven A. Carriker, D-Roby, who voted in favor of the measure.

Carriker said the prison appropriations measure, HB 1477, could not have been delayed much longer.

"Everytime the Texas Department of Corrections is forced to close its doors because of overcrowding, our county jails become more congested and the counties are forced to spend more money to take care of the state's prisoners," he said. "Hopefully, we're now on track to stop this vicious cycle."

More than \$138 million of the funds approved by the Senate are earmarked

for "the payment of expenses incurred in acquiring, constructing or equipping two new maximum security units and one psychiatric facility for the Texas Department of Corrections."
