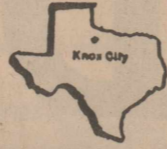

Nursing Home Assistance Bill Passes In Texas House

A bill to aid thousands of Texans in need of nursing home services was passed by the House Tuesday according to Representative David Counts (D-Knox City), who co-sponsored the measure with Representative Betty Denton (D-Waco).

House Bill 318 raises the state income cap on Medicaid eligibility from the present \$715 per month to the

federal maximum of \$1104 per month.

An amendment to the bill applying the same increase to home-based community care services was also approved.

It is estimated that the increase will allow an extra five thousand elderly and disabled Texans meet the eligibility requirements for nursing home services.

Abilene - The board of directors of West Texas Utilities Company re-elected all officers at its regularly scheduled meeting today.

Meador, vice president-engineering; and Donald A. Welch, vice president-customer services. Also re-elected were Lawrence B. Connors, secretary and director of accounting and finance; David B. Carpenter, controller; George W. Woodfin, treasurer and assistant secretary; Ann Hawkins, assistant secretary; and Sharon King, assistant treasurer.

The board also voted to elect Terry D. Dennis vice president-engineering and a member of the board effective June 1, 1989. Dennis will replace Meador upon his retirement in June.

Dennis at present is director of engineering. A native of Abilene, he graduated from Abilene High School in 1965. He attended the University of Texas in Austin and graduated with a bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering in 1970. While in college he also worked half time as a research assistant for the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. TAERF conducts research in nuclear fusion.

His first employment with WTU was as a student engineer during the summer while attending college. Upon graduation he was hired full-time as

substation maintenance engineer. He progressed through several positions in the company's substation and transmission departments before his promotion to manager of engineering and design in 1977. He was named assistant chief engineer in 1985 and director of engineering this past January in anticipation of his succeeding Meador.

Dennis has attended numerous training and development courses including Harvard University's Professional Management Develop-

ment school. A registered professional engineer, he has been a member and president of the Abilene chapter of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers, member and past section chairman of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers, and a member of the state board of directors of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers. He is also president of the North Abilene Rotary Club.

Terry and his wife Shirley attend the Pioneer Drive Baptist Church. They have two children, Brady and Amy.

Meador, a native West Texan, graduated from Bronte High School in 1942. From November of that year until September 1945 he served with the Marine Corps in the Pacific. His commendations include the Bronze Star and Purple Heart.

Upon his discharge from the service he attended Texas A&M University where he earned a bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering. He began work for WTU in Abilene in 1949. He progressed through numerous engineering positions in the distribution, substation and transmission areas before being named director of engineering in 1977. The following year he was elected vice president and director of engineering.

Meador is a registered professional engineer and a member of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers. He also has been a member of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers, served on the board of the Expo Center of Taylor Co., and is a member of the Key City Kiwanis Club.

Randal and his wife Kathy are members of St. Paul Methodist Church. They have two daughters and three grandchildren.

West Texas Utilities is an electric utility serving customers in 52 counties stretching from the Red River to the Rio Grande River.

4-H Community Club To Meet Monday

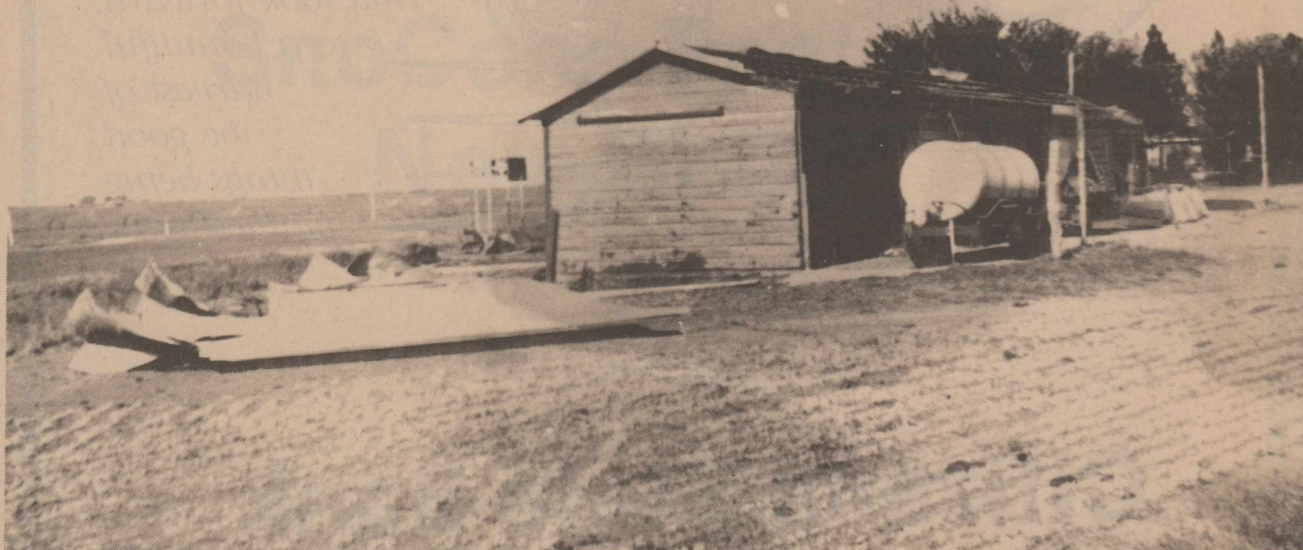

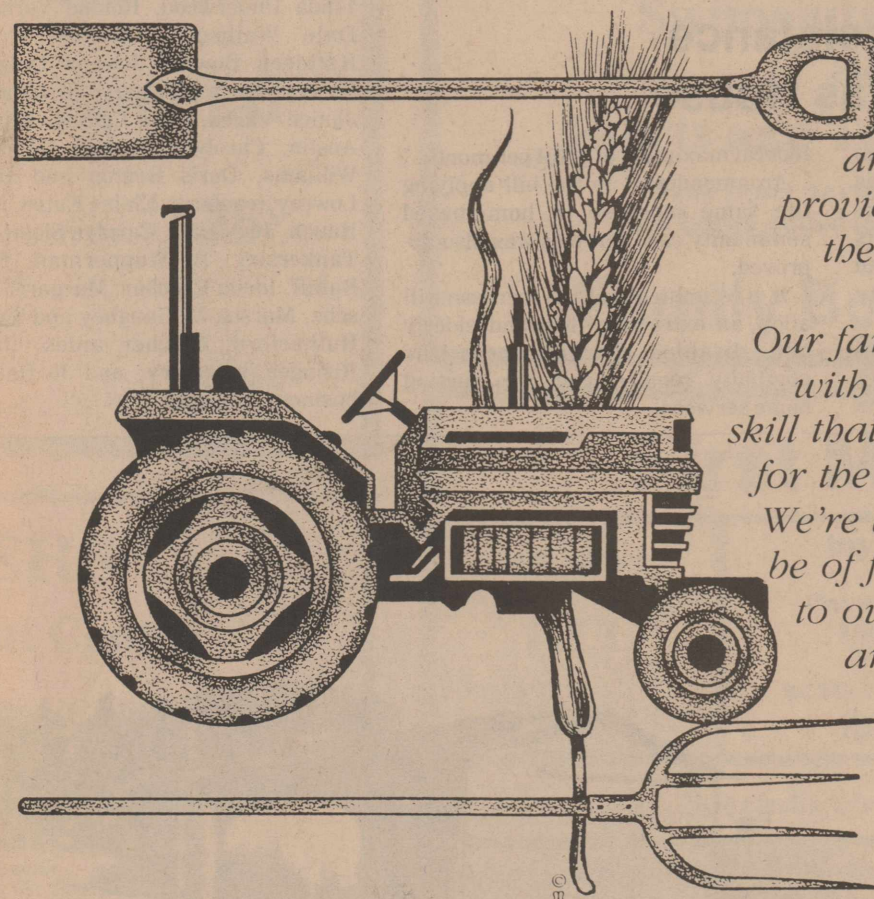

NOTICE OF INTENT TO ABANDON OR TO DISCONTINUE SERVICE

The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway Company ("Santa Fe") gives notice that on or about April 28, 1989 it intends to file with the Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D.C. 20423, an application for a certificate permitting the abandonment of a line of railroad known as the Orient of Texas Line, New Mexico Division, extending from Mile Post 480.19 at the Oklahoma-Texas state line near Ranchland to Mile Post 635.63 near Orient Junction (Sweetwater), a distance of 155.44 miles, all in Wilbarger, Hardeman, Foard, Knox, Haskell, Stonewall, Jones and Fisher Counties, Texas. The line for which the abandonment application will be filed includes the following stations:

The reasons for the proposed abandonment are that the line operates at a deficit, that prospects for increased revenues are poor and that the line's shippers have adequate transportation alternatives.

This line of railroad has appeared on the system diagram map in category 1 since June 30, 1988.

The interest of railroad employees will be protected by the conditions prescribed by the Interstate Commerce Commission in Oregon Short Line R. Co. Abandonment, 360 I.C.C. 91 (1979).

Any interested person, after the application is filed on April 28, 1989, is entitled to file with the Interstate Commerce Commission written comments concerning the proposed abandonment or protests to it.

Protests must contain the following:

- (1) Protestant's name, address and business.
- (2) A statement describing protestant's interest in the proceeding including:
 - (i) A description of protestant's use of the line;
 - (ii) If protestant does not use the line, information concerning the group or public interest it represents; and
 - (iii) If protestant's interest is limited to the retention of service over a portion of the line, a description of the portion of the line subject to protestant's interest (with milepost designations if available).
- (3) Specific reasons why protestant opposes the application including information regarding protestant's reliance on the involved service (this information must be supported by affidavits of persons with personal knowledge of the fact(s)).

- (4) Any rebuttal of material submitted by applicant.
- (5) If an oral hearing is desired, a request for and reasons why an oral hearing is necessary.

In addition, a commenting party or protestant may provide a statement of position and a summary of evidence regarding:

- (i) Intent to offer financial assistance;
- (ii) Environmental impact;
- (iii) Impact on rural and community development;
- (iv) Suitability of the properties for other public purposes;
- (v) Recommended provisions for protection of the interests of employees; and

(vi) Prospective use of the right-of-way for interim trail use and rail banking under 16 U.S.C. §1247(d) and 49 C.F.R. §1152.29.

Written comments and protests will be considered by the Commission in determining whether an investigation is needed to assist in determining what disposition to make of the application. The Commission will automatically direct investigation if a protest is filed which demonstrates: (1) The protestant filed a feeder line application under 49 U.S.C. §10910; (2) the feeder line application involves any portion of the rail line involved in the abandonment or discontinuance application; (3) the feeder line application was filed prior to the date the abandonment or discontinuance application was filed; and (4) the feeder line application is pending before the Commission. If an investigation is conducted, the commenting party or protestant may participate in the

proceeding as its interests may appear.

Those parties filing protests to the proposed abandonment should be prepared to participate actively in either oral hearing or through the submission of additional material in the form of verified statements. Parties seeking information concerning the filing of protests should refer to 49 C.F.R. §1152.25.

Social Security News

If you hire someone to help you with spring cleaning, it is likely you will need to pay Social Security taxes for the work.

Any time you pay a household worker \$50 or more in a three month calendar quarter, the work is covered by social security. According to tax laws, you have the responsibilities of an employer/employee relationship.

This means, among other things, that you need to ask to see the worker's social security card. Copy the worker's name and social security number as it is shown on the card. You will need the worker's home address, too, so you can send the W-2 form at the end of the year. If work stops before the end of the year, you can give the worker the W-2 form personally at the end of the employment period.

You need to deduct FICA taxes (7.51 percent in 1989) from the employees' wages and pay an equal amount as the employer's share of FICA taxes. The taxes must be submitted to the Internal Revenue Service within a month after a quarter ends on IRS Form 942 (Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees).

If you have questions about any of the IRS tax forms, contact the Internal Revenue Service for assistance. Questions about social security coverage should be directed to the social security office. Ask for Factsheet Number 11, "Household Workers." The toll-free telephone number is 1-800-2345-SSA or 1-800-234-5772.

Brazos Electric Continues For Rate Reduction

Brazos Electric filed a motion with the Public Utility Commission March 30 to request continuation of the cooperative's temporary rate reduction.

The temporary rate reduction, effective during the months December 1988 through March 1989, meant consumers saw an average reduction of about \$7.00 per each 1000 kilowatt hours used. If approved, the continued reduction will be at a level of about \$5.60 per 1000 kilowatts hours. It will allow the cooperative to maintain reduced rates pending a permanent rate reduction later this year.

"Our mission is to provide reliable power at the lowest possible cost," said Richard E. McCaskill, executive vice president and general manager of Brazos Electric. "We constantly monitor our needs to maintain our financial strength," he said. "But when there is an opportunity to pass on savings to our consumers, we do it, happily."

Brazos Electric had planned to ask the PUC for a permanent rate reduction by April 1, but it will now conduct additional studies of potential rate structures before doing so. The Cooperative plans to file a request for a permanent rate reduction of about \$23 million by June 1.

Since January 1983, Brazos Electric

has reduced the average cost of its wholesale electric power by more than 18 percent.

Headquartered in Waco, Brazos Electric provides wholesale power to 20 member distribution cooperatives, seven municipal customers and Texas A&M University. These wholesale customers serve 240,000 consumers in 66 counties of Texas.

Approximately eight years ago, the Knox City-O'Brien CISD Board of Trustees developed a long-range plan and set of goals to update, modernize, and add to our school district's educational and athletic facilities. The most recent step toward the completion of that plan was the completion of the all-weather track.

The first project was the addition of the vocational ag building. The main building of the elementary campus was renovated. Other renovations and construction have included: W.R. "Bill" Baker Auditorium; Knox City campus cafeteria; bus barn; remodeling of the elementary wing buildings; O'Brien campus renovated; new Knox City band hall. Knox City high school building renovated; and currently nearing completion of the band hall/dressing room addition on the O'Brien campus.

The Knox City-O'Brien CISD remains debt-free with facilities that you as a community can be proud of. Your school system is in excellent shape, both financially and facility wise.

When the fencing is completed the track will be available for your use. We ask that you walk or jog in the outside three lanes and wear rubber sole shoes. A pedestrian gate will be left open to the public and we ask that you report immediately anyone abusing the all-weather surface (skateboards, bikes, etc. are not allowed).

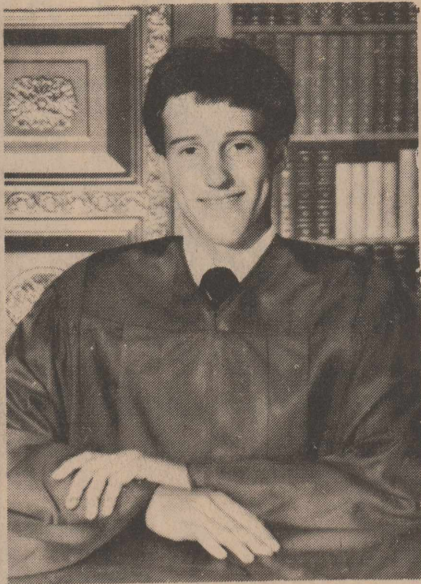

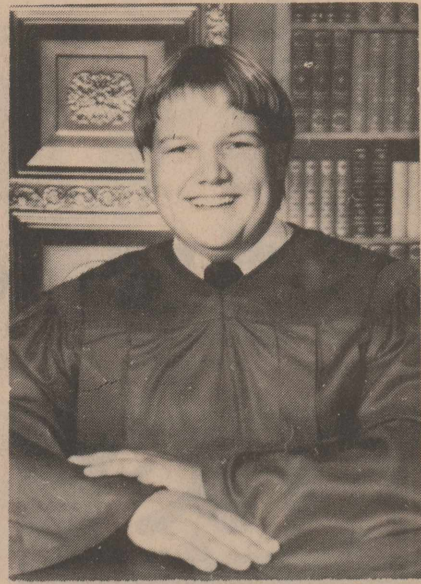
JEFFREY ABERNATHY


