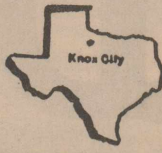

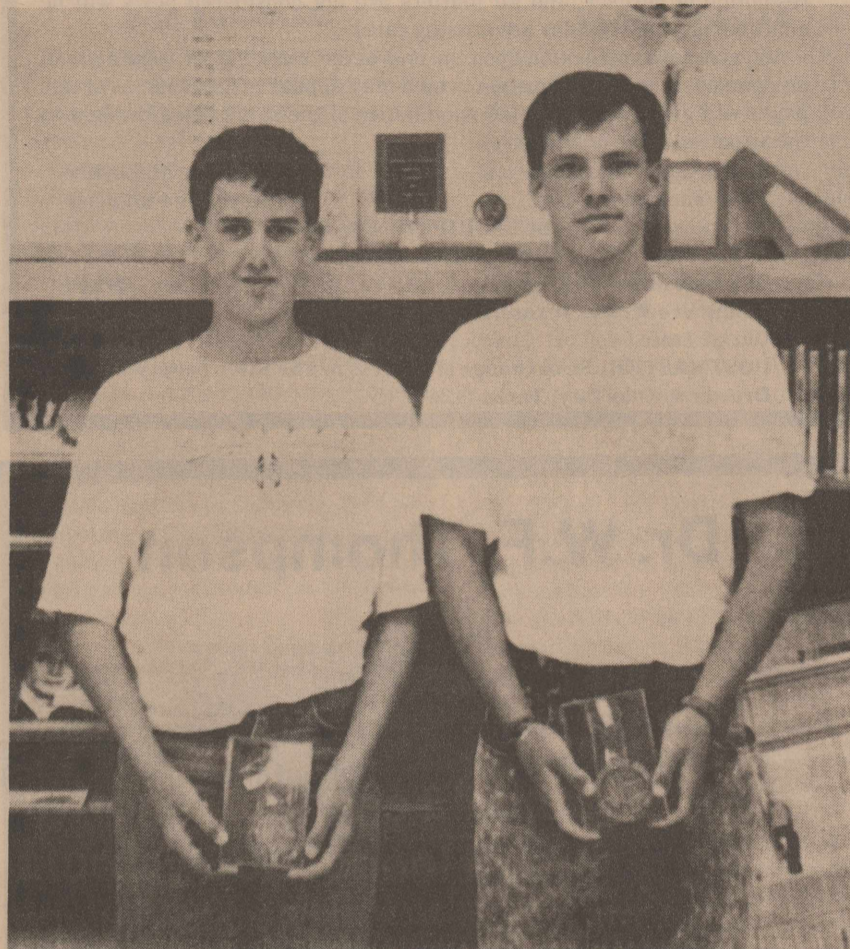

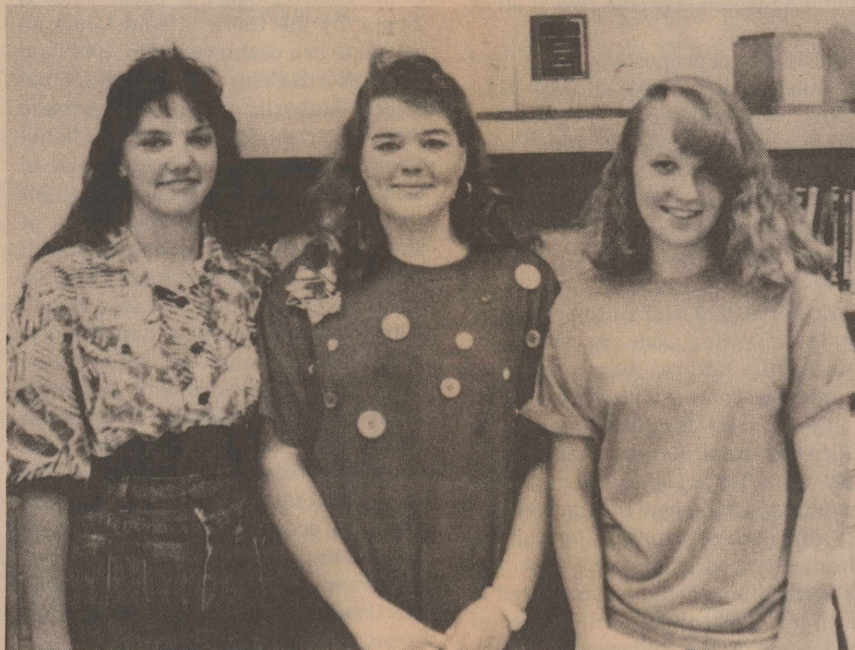
Straight Talk

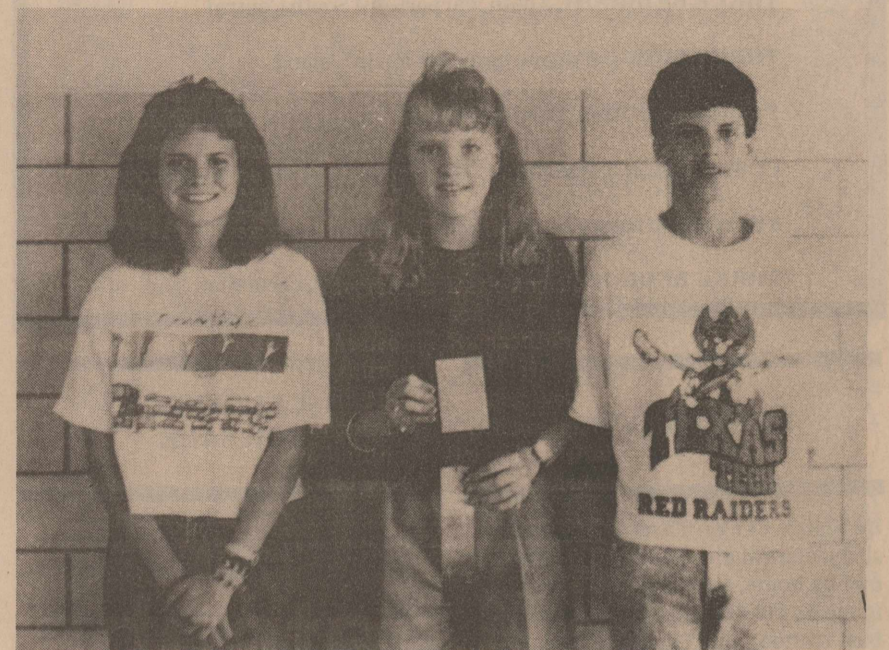

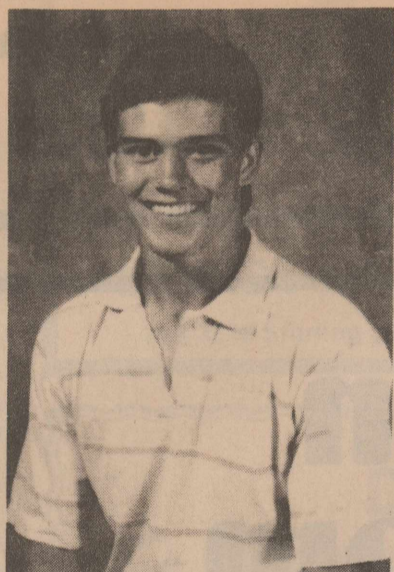

Newton, Stephens Elected Saturday For School Board

Mike Newton and Butch Stephens were elected Saturday as trustees for the Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School Board.

Newton received 215 votes, Stephens 161, Brian Williams 134, Arthur Boice 99, and Anthony Logsdon 54.

The school board race was the only contest in the joint election held Saturday at the Knox County Aging Center where 256 persons cast their ballots.

In the City of Knox City election,

Mayor Derrell Marion received 210 votes, Councilmembers Barbara Barnard had 176 and Marq Brockett 169 for the two year terms while Rob Harrison received 194 for the one year term.

Greg Clonts was re-elected to the board of the Knox County Hospital District receiving 199 votes in Knox City, 33 in Benjamin, 14 in Gilliland, 29 in Truscott, 12 in Vera, 26 in Goree, and totals were not available from Munday.

Two Separate Storms Bring Rain To Area

Two thunderstorms in the area have brought much needed precipitation.

On Thursday night about 11:30 o'clock approximately .6 was received in Knox City and again early Sunday, the scanner on Channel 2 recorded an inch. Heavier amounts were received west of Knox City.

At the meeting, a list of cemeteries with completed inscription surveys will be compiled and announced in the papers so that those interested in the few cemeteries which have not been covered may be motivated to join the survey.

At the May meeting, a due date in 1989 for the final report will be chosen by those present. All those who have worked on the survey and any other interested persons are invited to attend the May 17 meeting.

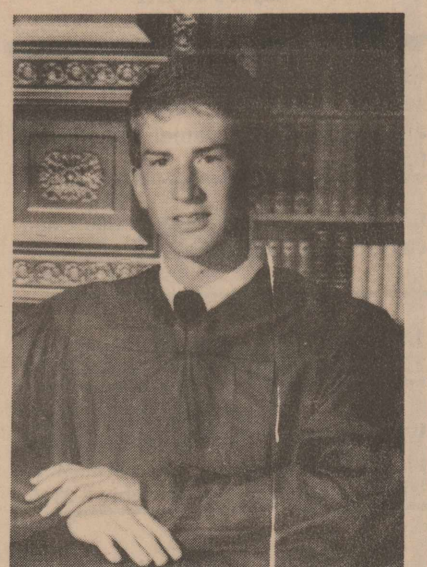
Class salutatorian is Patrick Wupperman with an average of 96.2917. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R.L. Wupperman.

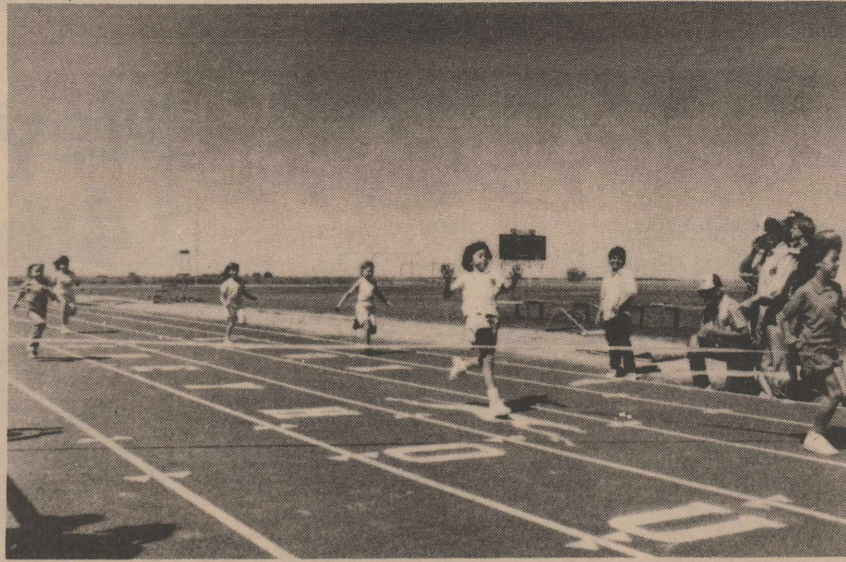

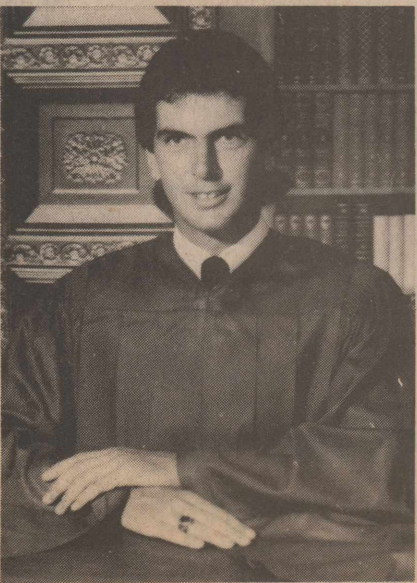
On a brisk Wednesday morning at 7:29 a.m., March 17, 1971, Leon and Leona Burkham became the proud parents of a baby boy.

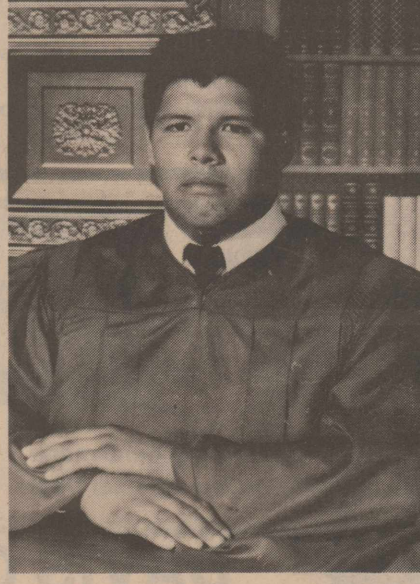

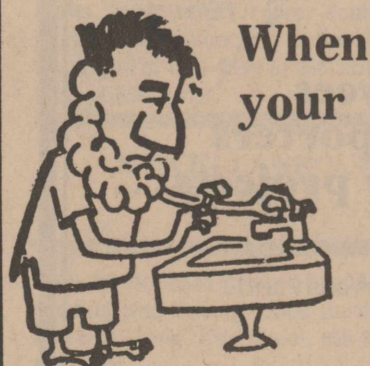
