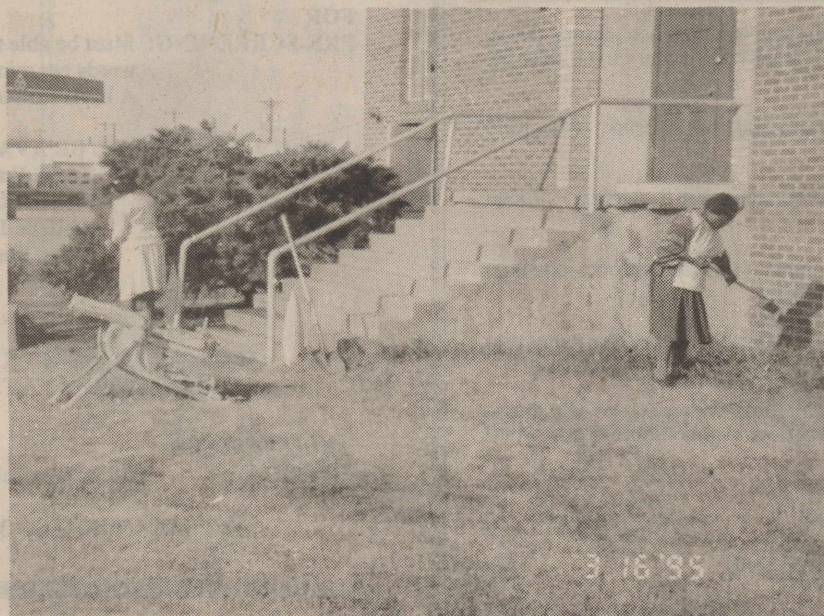

The concert will take place at First Baptist Church in order to accommodate a large attendance.

As a community service, First Baptist Church will telecast the event live over cable channel 17 here in Knox City and O'Brien for those unable to attend in person. Starting time for both the concert and the television broadcast will be at 7:30 this Saturday evening, April 1. Pastor and Superintendent Leon Ward of the Liberty Church of God in Christ stresses that "everyone is welcome."

Little League Set To Begin 1995 Season With Registration Meet This Thursday Night

Registration for all youngsters wanting to play Little League this year will be held tonight, Thursday, March 30, at 6:30 p.m. in the W.R. Baker Auditorium on the Knox City Campus. League officials once again ask that one or both parents of each player signing up to play be present at the meeting. In order to make registration a little faster, sign-up forms and medical release forms have already been distributed to school campuses for players to take home and have their parents fill out in advance. Coaches from each division will be present at the meeting to assist in registration and placement of players on teams. Immediately following the open registration, the coaches and officers of Little League will meet to draw teams. Coaches will then call players within a day or so to let them know their team assignment and practice dates.

Parents will note a different registration fee this year as league officials elected to both increase and reduce fees at the same time. The increased registration fee is for a single child in a family, that fee will increase to \$15.00. The reduction in fees will be for families with more than one child in Little League as each additional child's registration will only be \$10.00. For example, a family with two children in Little League

will pay \$25.00 total, down from the \$26.00 charged last year at \$13.00 each. A family with three children in Little League will pay a total of \$35.00, down from the \$39.00 charged at \$13.00 each last year. The slight increase is due to rising costs across the board. Even with the increase from \$13.00 to \$15.00 for a single child, Knox City's Little League still charges considerably less than some other area towns, whose fees range all the way up to \$35.00 for a single child.

After the registration on March 30, the first practice sessions will be held on Monday, April 3. Games will begin during the week of May 1-6 and will continue until the end of the second week in June. After a two week practice, All-Star games will begin during the first week of July.

Both girls and their parents are reminded that girls are not restricted to playing softball. If a young lady of either age division wants to play Little League or Pony League ball, she is encouraged sign up in those divisions.

Knox City Little League will have these divisions this year, depending on the amount of youth in each age group registering to play:

Ages 5-6 • T-Ball - For both boys and girls.

Ages 7-8 • Minor League - For

both boys and girls.

Ages 9-12 • Girls Softball - for girls only.

Ages 9-12 • Little League - both boys and girls may sign up for Little League play.

Ages 13-15 • Pony League - for both boys and girls, depending on registration.

Ages 13-15 • Girls Senior League Softball - for girls only.

All parents are again reminded to make every effort to be present for the registration tonight, March 30 at 6:30 p.m. in the W.R. Baker Auditorium. Please note that if your child did not turn in his or her uniform at the end of the season last year, you will be asked for the uniform. League officials have a list of those who turned in uniforms last year. A major effort, at considerable expense, was made to have new uniforms last year, and the league needs those back to keep expenses down this year.

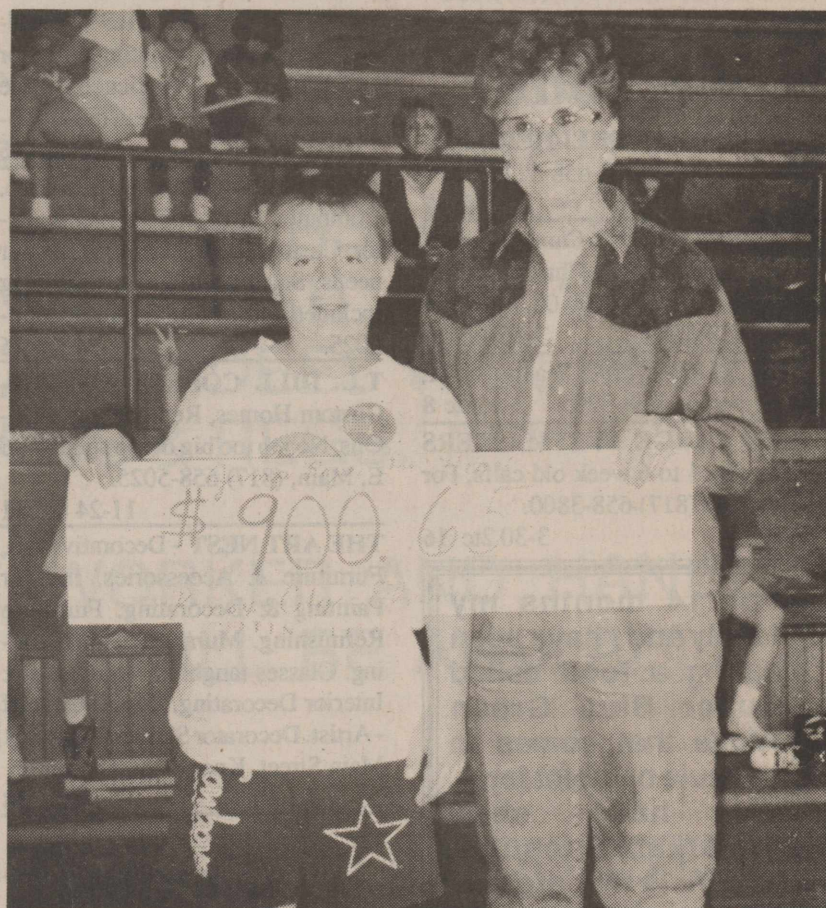

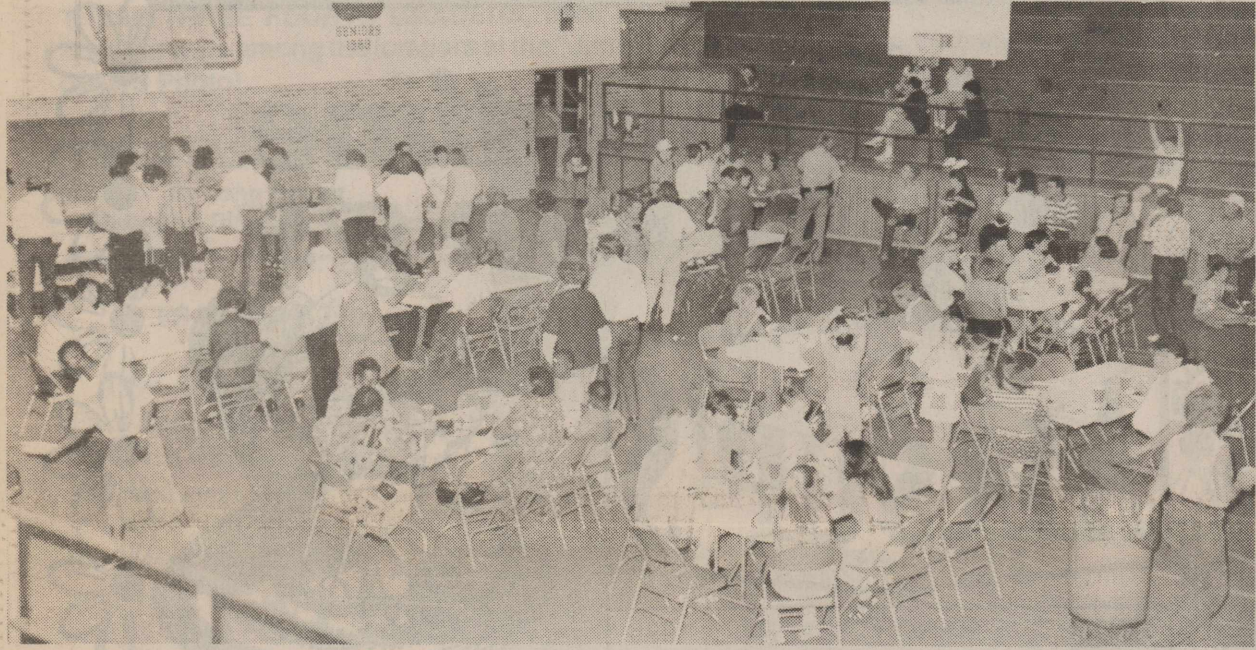
MRS. BARNARD IS REMARKABLE RESIDENT

A reminder, I get several calls each year about buying glasses for children who already have an appointment with an Optometrist. Requests for glasses must be made through our school nurse. She has the appropriate forms to be filled out and my phone number and address. A letter from the school nurse goes with the child to the eye doctor to be filled out and returned for her records. Please follow this procedure when requesting assistance with glasses. We deal directly with the doctor and know in advance how much the glasses will cost us. Right now we are using the Haskell Eye Clinic because they provide glasses and exams less expensive than other eye clinics in our area. We provide a letter which must accompany the child at the first exam alerting the doctor that this child is being assisted by the Lions. The doctor then provides the exam at a special rate to the Lions and allows only certain choices in frames which keep his and our costs to a minimum. If you need assistance buying glasses remember, contact our school nurse, L.R. Schumacker RN.

Foster Care Now Available In Area

Nursing homes are no longer the only choice when caring for one's self becomes difficult.

The Department of Human Services now offers another choice to persons who can no longer live alone.

Adult foster care is a community based service. It offers 24-hour supportive care in a private residence.

Foster care homes are available in most areas of Texas. Knox and Haskell counties now have three approved homes.

Individuals who are good candidates for this type of care are those who are aged and disabled or who are unable to live alone but do not require daily nursing care.

The type of care provided includes help with daily living activities such as bathing and dressing, full-time supervision and transportation.

Persons also may qualify be-

cause of physical mental or emotional limitations, because they are unable to function independently in their own homes or because they need and desire the support and security of family living.

These individuals do not need institutional care, but are unable to live alone or have no relatives who can provide them a home.

The cost of care may be private pay or a DHS client.

If an individual qualifies for DHS assistance, the DHS pays the provider a daily rate for supervision and services provided. The individual pays the provider directly for room and board from Social Security or other income.

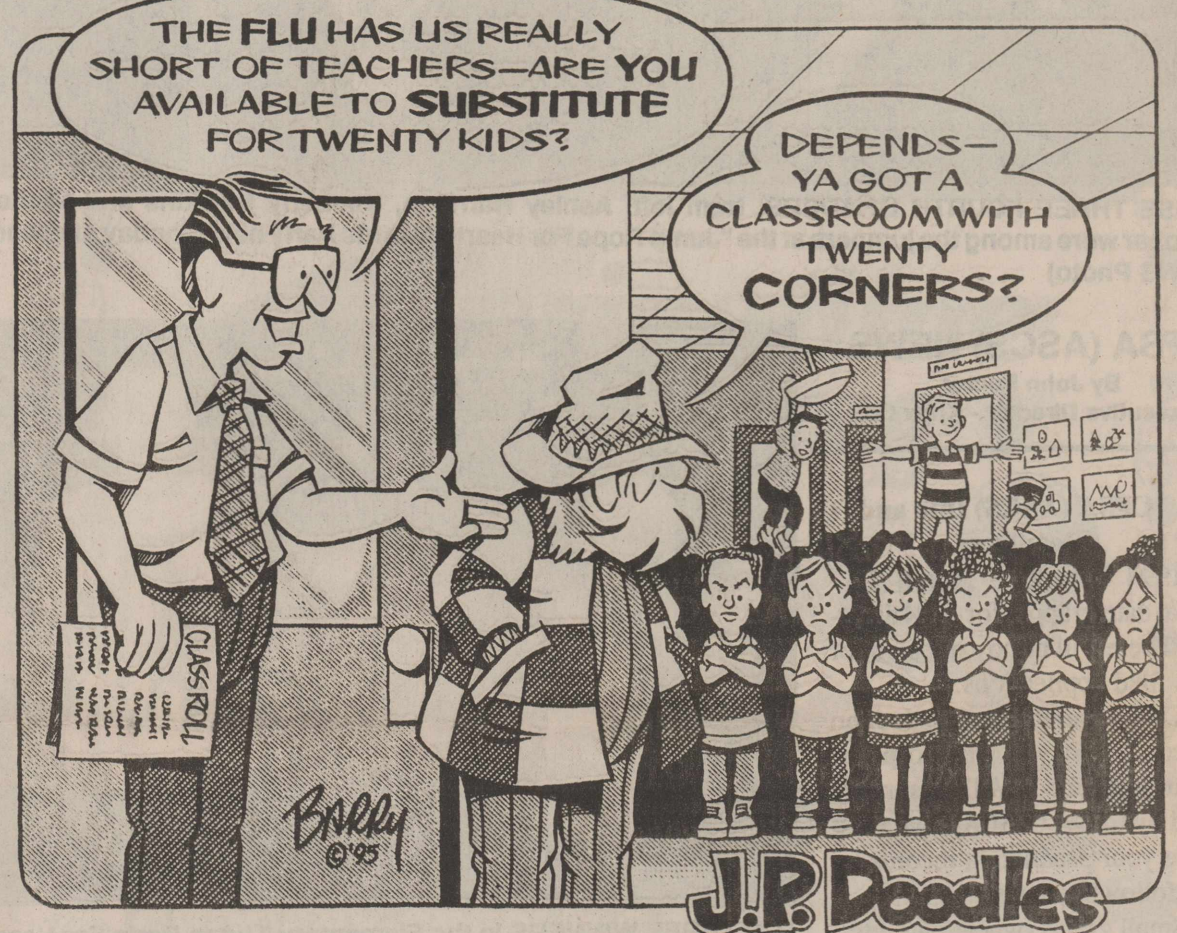

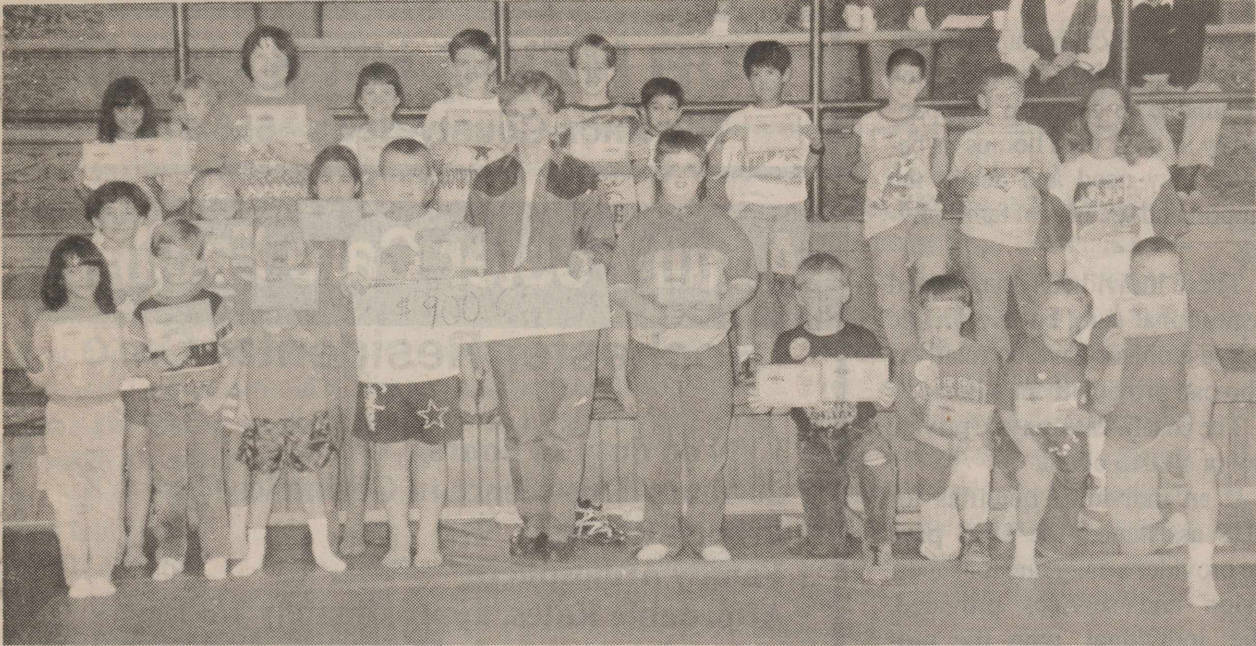

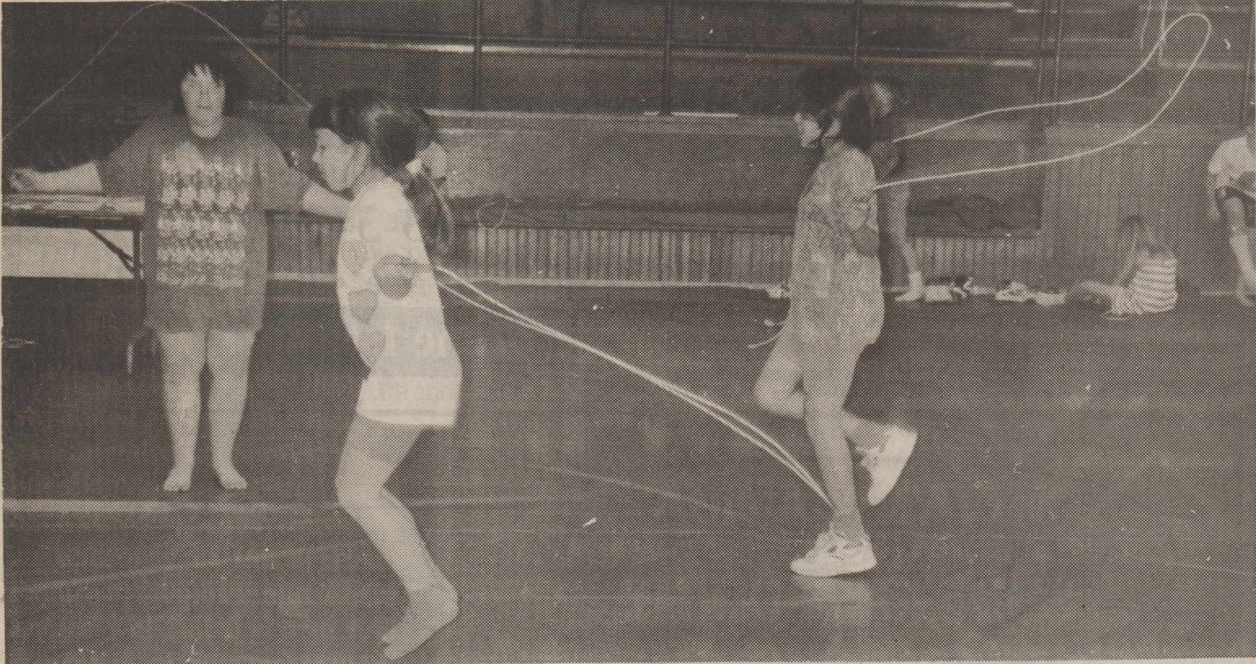

CFSA (ASCS) Info and Deadlines

1994 Disaster - **March 31** - Final date to apply for 1994 disaster. There will be **no extensions** or late filed applications.

CAT Insurance - (Production Records) - If you wish to prove your yield for "CAT" insurance sold by CFSA (ASCS) - we must have your production records by the following dates:

Small grains (wheat/oats, etc.) - Earlier of date claim filed or **May 31**.

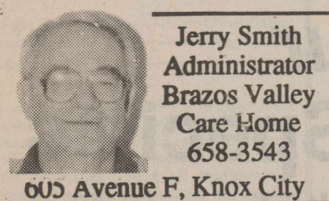
Cotton, grain sorghum, peanuts - Earlier of date claim filed or **July 15**.

*You must start with the most recent year that you had the crop and work back to a maximum of 10 years.

April 28 - Final date to sign into the 1995 program for cotton, wheat and feed grains and final date to **certify** all small grain acres. Small grains (wheat, oats, barley/rye) must be certified regardless of intended use.

***Important - Do not destroy any failed acreage of wheat or oats intended for harvest without certifying the acreage, filing an ASCS-574, and requesting an appraisal of the acreage. Failure to follow the above procedure will cause you to lose insurance and program benefits.**

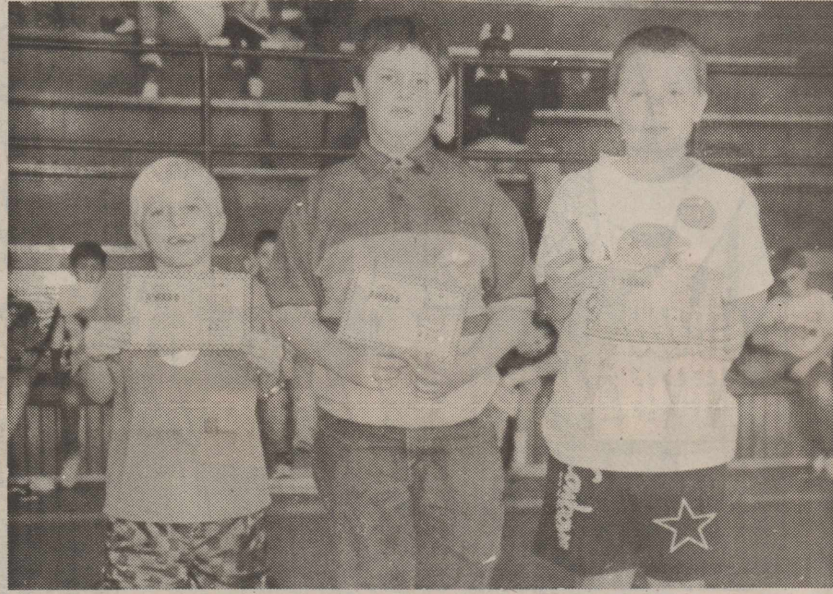

Could It Happen In YOUR Home?

Accidental Poisoning is one of the most common accidents in the home, and usually involves a youngster.

Do you know what to do when you suspect an accidental poisoning?

- If the victim is conscious, ask what was swallowed.
- Call an ambulance immediately.

IT IS VERY IMPORTANT TO TELL EMERGENCY PERSONNEL WHAT THE SUSPECTED POISON IS!

- Place the victim on his or her stomach, with head to the side, and knee drawn up.
- If the victim is not breathing, begin artificial respiration. Place your mouth over the victim's nose (to avoid possible contact with the poison) and breathe in.

DURING NATIONAL POISON PREVENTION WEEK, remember that preventing accidental poisoning is the best prevention. Check your home for low cabinets where inquisitive toddlers might find poisonous substances, such as cleaning solutions. Read labels, and keep all poisons out of the reach of children.

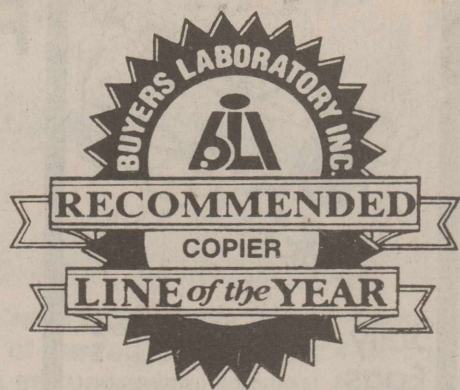

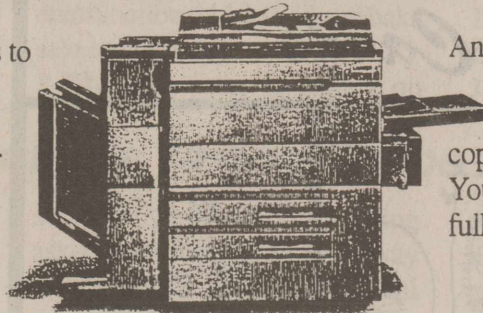
