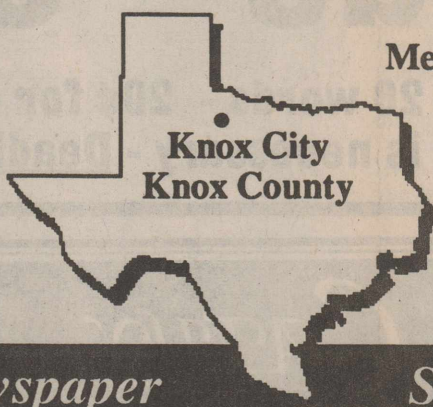

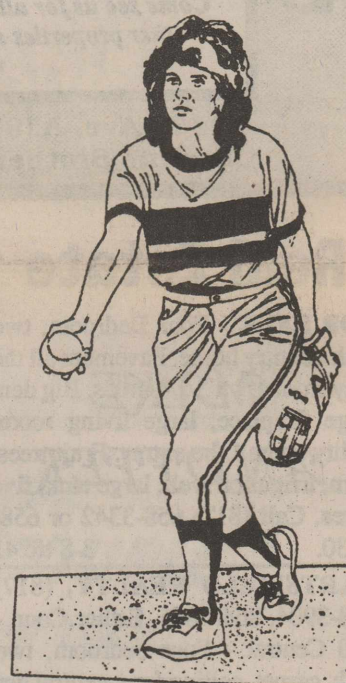

Jody, who was raised in Blanchard, Oklahoma, has had a successful string of recordings with "He's So Fine", "There's A Party Goin' On", "He Walks Like A Man", "House of the Rising Sun", and "Baby I'm Yours". She is probably known best for her 1965 recording of "Queen of the House", which won her a Grammy Award.

She has appeared with Bob Hope, Don Rickles, Roger Miller, Red Skelton, The Beach Boys, Dale Robertson, Bob Newhart, Ronnie Millsap and Roy Clark. She has made numerous tours to the Far East and Europe and entertained troops with Bob Hope in Alaska. She has recorded in studios in Milan, Italy; Cologne, Germany; New York, Los Angeles, Detroit and Nashville.

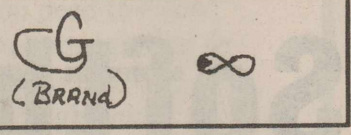

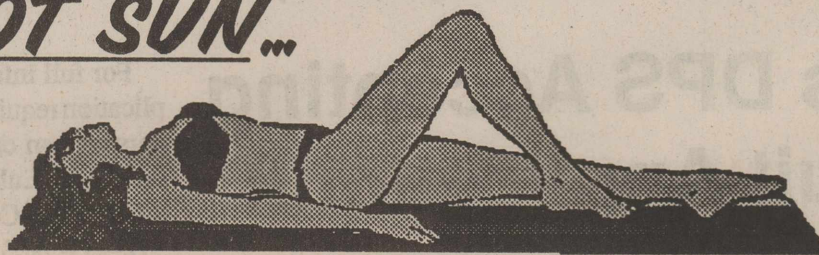

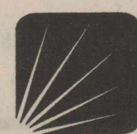

Texas DPS Accepting Recruit Applications

The Texas Department of Public Safety is accepting applications for recruit training schools that will begin in October of this year and February 1996.

"I encourage any person who meets our initial screening criteria and who is interested in a career in law enforcement to consider joining what many say is one of the premier law enforcement agencies in the country," DPS Director Col. James R. Wilson said.

In order to apply, applicants must be at least 20 years of age (there is not a maximum age), have a minimum of 60 semester hours of college (for some educational requirements, prior law enforcement or military service can be substituted), be a U.S. citizen, pass a written examination, meet certain physical fitness standards and be willing to accept assignment anywhere in Texas.

Formally known as an All Field Service Recruit Training School, graduates of the 26-week course will fill existing and anticipated vacancies in the DPS's Traffic Law Enforcement Division - Highway Patrol, Driver License, License & Weight, Safety Education and Vehicle Inspection Services. After gaining experience in entry-level law enforcement positions in TLE, troopers can promote with TLE or to various positions in the Criminal Law Enforcement or Texas Ranger Divisions.

During the 26 weeks of training, the trainees learn arrest, search and seizure policies, physical education, strategies of self defense, patrol procedures, crowd management, accident investigation techniques, problem solving and critical thinking, interpersonal communications and a number of other state- and DPS-required subjects.

Trainees stay in the DPS Training Academy dormitory in Austin during the school. Salary during the training session is \$1,721 per

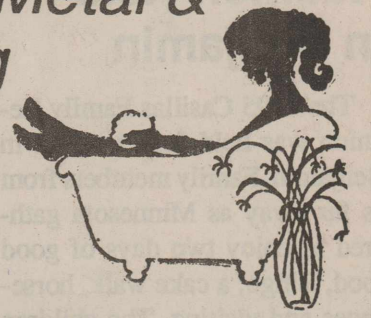

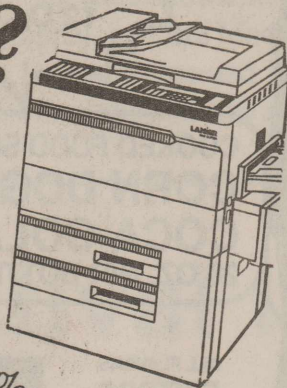

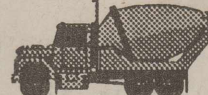

SPEAKING OUT FOR CHILDREN Tips From Tots On Parenting

(NU) -The Child Welfare League of America and children's clothing manufacturer OshKosh B'Gosh teamed up to launch a national positive parenting campaign aimed at increasing awareness of children's needs and strengthening parenting skills. Following is the result: a list of 10 ideas to help parents do their job better from a child's perspective.

1. When I spill my milk or juice, don't yell or hit me. Help me clean it up and show me how to hold my cup.
2. When it's time to go to sleep, don't rush me. Give me a little time to play or read me a story so I feel cozy and safe when I close my eyes.
3. When you take me shopping, don't let me get lost. Teach me to stay in your sight and right by your side.
4. When you see me hitting my sister or brother, don't hit me too. Ask what made me mad and help me talk it out.
5. When it's time for me to give up my diapers, don't get mad if I have an accident. By the time I'm 3

- or 4, I'll do much better.
6. When you have an errand, don't leave me alone in the car, even for a few minutes. I get scared and I could get hurt.
7. When it's time to eat and I don't want to, don't shout or try to force me. My stomach is small, so I like small helpings of healthy foods at mealtime and as snacks.
8. When I want to watch cartoons on TV for hours, don't just let me sit there. Suggest something for me to do. I need to learn by doing, not just by watching.
9. When I do something that makes you angry, don't ever shake me or tell me I'm no good. Take time to cool down and then come and talk to me.
10. When I feel mean and call people nasty names, don't yell at me. Explain how names hurt people's feelings and show me how to make myself feel better without hurting other people.
