His activities of the day and night of the fire, how he, Melton, and Skipworth met at the Abstens and Miss Stillwell, went to Rochester for two other girls, then stopped at a house for wine, drank whiskey during the afternoon, and later went to a beer establishment south of Haskell for more drinks.
He described the return to the Melton home, the Abstens returned to their home, his trip to take the Rochester girls home, and the subsequent arrival at the Melton house. There, said Jay, Melton was "pretty drunk" and decided to go to bed. After giving him a cigarette, Jay said he left the Abstens and Vera near O'Brien, and came to Haskell with them. It was after he had returned to their home and came back to his own house that he learned of the fire, he said.

No "Threats"

On cross examination by District Attorney H. F. Grundstaff, Jay denied there had been serious quarreling in the party during the afternoon. He said the "girls had a little trouble" and that "Dick and Herschel got a little sore" but that there were no threats. He also denied having trouble with Melton as the two, late in the day, took the Rochester girls home.
The state used 22 witnesses in its effort to spin a web of circumstantial evidence showing that Melton was murdered. Testimony has centered on the afternoon and night party attended by the Abstens, Jay, Melton, Skipworth, and three girls, immediately prior to the fatal fire and to the time elapsing between the meeting of Jay and the Abstens and Miss Stillwell at the Melton home, and the fire. Miss Stillwell testified to having seen a light in the vicinity of the Melton home, when the party was at a neighbors house, but detailed various rides and stops made by the party after Jay had been picked up and before they saw the fire.

A mother had two sons. One went to sea and the other became Vice President of the United States. Neither has been heard from since.

Haskell County Council of H. D. Renders Report

The Haskell County Council met in the county court room the first Saturday in April with seven clubs represented. Reports from the Lubbock Meat Show was given by Mrs. Ed Stodghill. Mrs. C. A. Lawless gave a report of the visit to the Jones County Council and Mrs. W. J. Kendrick gave the educational report.
Mrs. Ed Stodghill in giving the meat show report gave a number of suggestions to women canning meat. She quoted Miss Lola Blair as saying "Coarse and stringy meat is caused by overcooking or not having the meat cut across the grain." Other things told the women were that lined cans should be used for the mince meat and that the recipe should be followed closely to secure good results. A common fault in canning meat is not having the cans boiling hot when the cans are sealed, according to Mrs. Stodghill's report.
The educational report given by Mrs. W. J. Kendrick covered the home demonstration agent's activities for the past three months. This report shows that twenty communities are being reached by the agent directly and their plans for the expansion shows that forty communities will be reached.
Samples of cheese and butter brought in by Mrs. W. J. Kendrick and Mrs. A. A. Gauntt were scored by council members as preparation for the Dairy Show in Albany.
Clubs present were: Center Point, Hutto, Rose, Josselt, Midway, New Cook and New Mid.



ADVERTISING MAKES LOWER PRICES POSSIBLE

One of the fundamental facts dwelt upon at the open sessions on codes in Washington was that the consuming power of the country must be restored to its normal extent and that the confidence of the buyers must be gained through enforcement of the fair practice provisions of the codes.

The Consumers' Advisory Board reported that attempts are made to sell substitute merchandise with the argument that standard products must bear the burden of advertising costs. The fallacy of any such assertion should be apparent, but if it is not, there is plenty of proof in a recent statement from the Alexander Hamilton Institute, which quotes a report of a large soup manufacturing company back in 1929:

"In 1898 our output was 500,000 cans for the entire year. Now 18,000,000 cans are produced in one week. In 1898 the expense of salesmen was 7 1-2 per cent and for advertising 14 per cent of the selling price. Now the cost of salesmen is 2 1-2 per cent and for advertising less than 3 per cent, making a total selling cost of 5 per cent. If a consumer buys a can of soup for 12 cents (that was back in 1929), 36-1000 of 1 per cent is spent in advertising."

B. C. Forbes quotes other figures (for February 1934) as follows: On a 10-cent package of biscuits the advertising expenditure is less than one mill. On a \$1.95 shirt, 64-100 of a cent. On a \$1.75 sheet, 1 cent.

That advertising makes quantity production possible, which in turn makes possible lower prices, is a simple, indisputable fact, and consumers will be abundantly justified in disregarding any assertion to the contrary.

ABUSES OF THE LAW

At a recent annual meeting of the American Bar Association it was openly admitted by prominent members that public confidence in the courts and their administration of the law is being steadily weakened.

A report was adopted denouncing "the growing prevalence of the use of expert witnesses, with their conflicting testimony." This referred particularly to the use of alienists in criminal cases, where experts may always be secured to testify that the accused is insane, provided he has the money to employ them.

As a matter of fact, lawyers in convention very frequently criticize the prevailing method of criminal procedure, but so far they have done very little to correct it.

Legislators are also to blame for the present state of affairs, but as most legislators are lawyers the responsibility still rests almost wholly upon the legal profession.

By the passage of innumerable laws regulating everything under the sun, and imposing upon peace officers the task of enforcing trivial and often foolish statutes, the perpetrator of major crimes such as murder and robbery have all the better chance to escape punishment. If more attention were given to the prevention and punishment of these serious offenses, it might be possible to reduce their number.

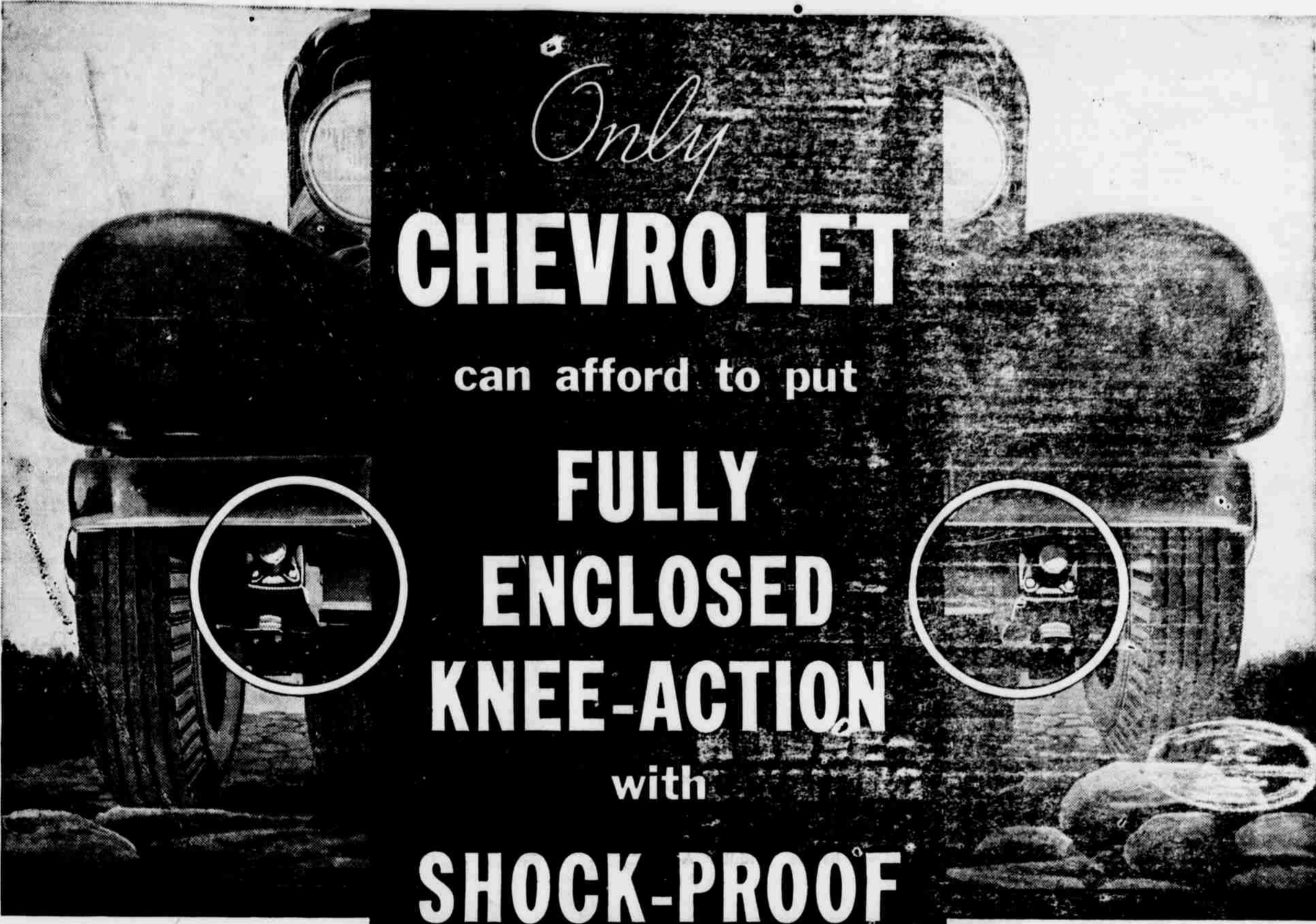

Terror of Texas Bankers Killed

Aubrey Ray, terror of West Texas bankers of a few short years ago, is dead.

Ray escaped from a Texas prison farm 10 days ago and paid the penalty of death for his life of crime last Friday when a sharp shooting Nebraska policeman beat him to the draw.

The fact that he had escaped from the penitentiary came to light Saturday when his fingerprints were studied. His father, J. S. Ray, who lives 7 miles south of Anson, was unaware of his son's escape from the penitentiary until he received news of his death in the Nebraska gun fight with officers.

In the gun battle at Lincoln, Neb. Walter Dean, recently freed from the Texas penitentiary after completing a 10-year sentence, also was shot down and Sam Rivette, recently paroled, was also captured. Luceen Marshall, a 14-year-old Lincoln school boy, was wounded fatally by a stray bullet fired by the bandits.

Saturday Ray and Dean were identified by C. A. Wallace, president of the Farmers State Bank of Bethany, Okla., as the men, who had looted the bank Thursday of \$969. About \$940 was taken from the gunmen.

Ray was under sentences totaling more than 300 years for a series of bank robberies, starting in 1927 in Taylor, Fisher, Dallam and Correll counties.

With his cousin Togo Ray, Aubrey in March, 1927, looted a bank at Ovalo. Captured, he was tried in Abilene and drew a 30 year sentence. Togo got 15 years. Aubrey escaped from prison shortly and
