















Watermelon Festival **Begins Saturday At 10:00**



Knox City will once again celebrate the watermelon industry in the surrounding area with the 8th Annual Watermelon Festival sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and scheduled to kick off this Saturday morning at 10:00 in the Knox City Park. As in past celebrations, the day long community festival should provide something for just about everyone with many different events scheduled to take place.

For seven years in a row, the Watermelon Festival has attracted huge crowds to the day long festivities. Traditional events like the watermelon sculpting contest, free swimming at the city pool, musical entertainment and free watermelon will be back again this year, along with some new attractions, such as an exhibition of exotic animals. Other crowd pleasers in the park that will be returning this year are the miniature train that provides rides for young children, the basketball toss both, the dunking board, and the official Watermelon Festival stamp cancellation booth set up by the U.S. Postal Service in Knox City.

Sporting events offered this year again offer both the sand volleyball tournament and the 3 person scramble golf tournament at the Knox City Country Club Golf Course.


















O'Brien Happenings

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

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree. Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device. (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device. (3) Unauthorized activation of service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without

special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies, the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.


Knox County Hospital To Host Tea On Monday In Honor Of Stephen Kuehler

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Historical Marker For Cee Vee Approved

The Cee Vee Historical Marker Committee received notice on June 26 that the Texas Historical Commission has approved their application for an Official Texas Historical Marker to be placed at the site of the Cee Vee Mercantile Store and near the site of the original Cee Vee Ranch House. The Texas Historical Commission congratulated the Cee Vee Committee "on your efforts to record and preserve Texas history." The Cee Vee Committee is very pleased and excited that their original application was accepted without any further requests for documentation or clarification.

The Cee Vee area has a rich history dating back to Indians who traveled the Pease Rivers, open range during the cattle kingdom, the CV Ranch named for Charles Goodnight's cattle brand, which was purchased in 1889 by Colonel William E. Hughes, owner of the great MILL IRON RANCH, and the farm community of Cee Vee which began in the late 1920's.

The marker will be 27" X 42" on a metal post. The Texas Historical Commission is composing the text for the marker. The Cee Vee Historical Committee has suggested several possible texts. When the Cee Vee Committee approves the final text, the marker will be sent to the foundry for casting. A dedication ceremony is planned at the time of placement, which may be during the next 2 to 6 months.

Tracy Evans Memorial Park is planned at the marker site commemorating the late Tracy Evans,


Hall Rites Are Held Saturday In Benjamin

June Police Report

The Knox City Police Department had another very busy month during June 1996 receiving a total of 346 calls and tasks which required attention. This total included 15 actual criminal offenses. of which 12 were cleared or otherwise handled. No charges were filed in regard to the above offenses, however, charges are possible on the remaining uncleared offenses. Two of the criminal offenses involved juveniles as offenders. They will be referred to the Juvenile Authorities for further action.

Offenses Reported Include: Assault (Domestic Related) - 1, Aggravated Assault - 1, Criminal Mischief - 2, Burglary of a Residence - 1, Criminal Trespass - 1, Disorderly Conduct - 1, Theft - 1, Harassment (By Phone) - 3, Enticing a Child - 1, Violate Ordinance #1106 (Dog as a Nuisance) - 1, Violate Ordinance #1105 (Livestock reglations) - 1, Violate Article 2.300 (Regulation of Dangerous Dogs) -1, Traffic charged Filed - 3, Warnings Issued - 9, Accidents - 1.

The Knox City Police Department Reserve Officers contributed a total of 21.5 hours of duty time to the City of Knox City during the month of June 1996.

Other items reported to the Knox City Police Department during June are classified as incidents. These incidents either did not occur in the City of Knox City or for some other reason were not able to be considered as a criminal offense. However, they must be investigated to determine if a record is to be made for future reference or if the case should be referred to another agency.

Incidents Reported Include: Found Property - 1, Attempted Suicide-1, Dog Bite-1, Domesic Disturbance - 1, Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle - 1.

On June 6, the Knox City Police Depart held its regular meeting. A film relating to witness interviewing was viewed and a practical discussion followed.

During the month of June, a particular disturbing situation came to light to the Knox City Police Department. It seems that several of the young people, ages 12 thru 14, have been involved in some damage to a vacant house within the City of Knox City. At

the time of this report, no charges have been filed, however, the case is being referred to the Juvenile Authorities for the consideration of charges. As far as the damage is concerned, quite a bit of sheetrock in some of the rooms was kicked out, with the remaining sheetrock having been spray painted on. There were several slogans, names and various profane drawings and words left on the walls. This department has learned through the investigation that numerous kids have been in the house, although possibly only a few are actually involved in the damage. It also sounds like several various parents knew that "something" was going on in the area, but didn't seem concerned enough to contact the authorities about the situation. The kids involved in the damage probably will be filed on for their involvement. The kids visiting the vacant house have apparently been doing so for several months. As already seen this summer, numerous kids just hang around the park with nothing to do. Many parents have no idea what their kids are doing. Some of the kids are getting in trouble, or hanging around with the trouble makers, which probably will get them involved also.

As a part of the problem with the young people being unsupervised for extended periods of time, a popular thing called "COOLER HOPPING" is continuing. Cooler hopping is where the kids prowl the streets at night, usually the early hours of the morning, (midnight to daylight), looking in the back of pickups or inside vehicles to try to locate coolers with alcohol in them. We have had numerous reports of this in the past, someone comes out to find that the ice chest that they left in the back of their vehicle is missing. Occasionally, we locate a cooler in an alley or vacant lot. These kids are taking the cooler and drinking the alcohol, not realizing that they are committing Burglary of a Vehicle, a class A misdemeanor. If you insist on leaving the cooler and alcohol available to the public, at least use a marker and write your name or some other identification on it where we will have some idea what part of the town they are prowling in. Better yet, don't leave it in a place where it can be obtained so easily. The kids doing this are also driving around looking for possible locations to locate coolers. They know who may have it from past experience, by seeing someone at the liquor store or at a party, or by cruising the Country Club and stopping briefly to either pick up a cooler or check out the vehicles to see which ones have a cooler in them. This department would welcome any comments or assistance in stopping this cooler hopping or in attempting to control the above vandalism before it gets
