Jim Waller: True Texas Sheriff

Sheriff Of King County Dedicated To Serving, Seeks Another Term

Staring into the face of an uncertain future, Jim Waller seems to handle everything with a smooth, easy manner that most would naturally associate with a Texas Sheriff. Tall, lean, and western throughout, Sheriff Jim Waller of King County gives the impression that he would have been a great sheriff back in 1896, just as he is now, 100 years later in 1996.

Dedicated to serving the residents of King County, Jim Waller has been the Sheriff since November of 1984. Even though he has always been totally committed to his job, Waller faced a tough decision back during the primary elections in March. With his father very ill back in East Texas, Sheriff Waller did not seek reelection because he was certain that he would have to move closer to his father in order to care for him. A man with strong family ties, Waller wanted to provide for his father, just as his parents had done for him while growing up.

Thanks to a lot of prayers and good medical care, Waller's father has improved and there is no longer an immediate need for Jim and his wife JoAnn to move back to East Texas. In fact, when Jim's father found out that Jim and JoAnn were planning on moving back home to take care of him, he wouldn't hear of it and told Jim exactly that!

Now able to stay in Guthrie, Sheriff Waller faces an upcoming election process in November that won't have his name on the printed

ballot. Since he did not run during the primaries, Waller has filed to run as a write in candidate for the office he currently holds: Sheriff of King County. While Jim's name will not appear in print, there will be a blank line on the ballot for voters to write his name in.

Seeking reelection to the job he now holds, Sheriff Waller has a tremendous amount of law enforcement experience that just about everyone in King County has come to appreciate.

Certified as a police officer by the State of Texas, Waller holds many different law enforcement certificates. Specialized training includes an advanced certificate from Texas that allows Waller to testify in court cases as an expert in the area of forensics, certification in fraud investigation, and certification in the area of investigative hypnosis.

Highly thought of in West Texas law enforcement circles, Sheriff Waller is a member of the Board of Directors of the Lubbock County Sheriff's Academy, and a member of the U.S. Attorney's office in Dallas - serving for 7 years in the field of gang crimes. Waller has also been a twelve year member of the Sheriff's Association of Texas, and has served eleven years on the Board of Directors of the Caprock Peace Officers Association. Other recognition for Sheriff Waller includes a 9 year member of the Texas Association of Investigative Hypnosis.

A resident of Guthrie since 1978, Jim and his wife JoAnn have one daughter, Angie, who is a graduate of Guthrie High School and now resides in Lubbock. An military veteran, Jim served in the United States Air Force from 1966 to 1972 before receiving an honorable discharge. Jim is a Methodist, and JoAnn is a Baptist, with membership in the Guthrie Baptist Church.

In reflecting on his performance as the Sheriff of King County, Jim Waller stated: "I believe in equal law enforcement for all, and stand ready to assist other agencies, when needed." Maintaining an open door policy, Waller makes himself available for anyone to come in and talk, "Whether it be for approval or criticism of the job I am doing,"

Waller went on to say, "As the only full time law enforcement officer in King County, I would like to meet and talk with every citizen of the county, but I have to put the job first and then try to talk with folks as time permits."

In voicing concern about the upcoming election, Sheriff Waller commented that regardless of who King County residents voted for, he wants to urge everyone to go and vote.

Everyone who knows Jim Waller also knows his capabilities, his experience, and the professional manner that portrays his job performance as Sheriff. While many can remember times when he has been there for them, they'll have to remember him in a different way on November 5. King County residents wanting to retain his years of experience and reelect Jim Waller as their Sheriff will have to remember that a vote for him will be cast on a blank line on the ballot - after writing his name in.

Commissioner's Court Sets Budget

Commissioners Hold Line On Spending With Lower '96-'97 Budget

The Knox County Commissioners' Court approved a proposed budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 1996 and ending September 30, 1997. The proposed budget and tax rate will be adopted after a public hearing is held on September 23, 9:00 A.M. in the Commissioners' Courtroom in Ben-

The Tax Rate being proposed would be .76899/\$100 down from last year's rate. This rate will also be adopted after the public hearing. As you will note from the chart under salary fund of which all elected

officials are paid from, no raises were approved.

A public meeting on the proposed 1996-1997 budget will be held on Monday, September 23, at 9:00 a.m. The meeting is scheduled to take place in the Commissioners' Courtroom at the Knox County Courthouse in Benjamin.

On the chart shown below, an asterisk appears on the approved budget for the County Aging Center. The total of \$45,114 would be county funds. We expect about

\$75,000 will be returned with State and Federal Grants, plus local cash income. These funds normally amount to approximate \$120,000.

In the General Fund our budget includes funding to begin construction of an elevator, renovation of the third floor of the court house, new ADA restrooms and rewiring of the courthouse.

A copy of the proposed budget is available for public inspection in the office of the Knox County Clerk or in the office of David N. Perdue, Knox County Judge.







Police Department Activity Report

For August, 1996

The Knox City Police Department had another very busy month during August, 1996, receiving a total of 427 calls and tasks which required attention. This total included 25 ~actual criminal offenses, of which 20 were cleared or otherwise handled. Seven charges were filed in regard to the above offenses, with three of the offenses involving juveniles as offenders. The cases involving juveniles were referred to the Juvenile Authorities for further action.

The Knox City Police Department Reserve Officers contributed a total of 29.5 hours of duty time to the City of Knox City

during the month of August, 1996.

Other Items reported to the Knox City Police Department during August are classified as incidents. These incidents either did not occur in the City of Knox City or for some other reason were not able to be considered as a criminal offense. However, they must be investigated to determine if a record is to be made for future reference or if the case should be referred to another agency.

On July 16, this department held its regular monthly meeting. Discussed were several simple exercises that an officer can preform to keep his muscles from tightening up while riding in a vehicle. At a moments notice, an officer may be required to exit the patrol vehicle and encounter resistance from a subject. If an officer's muscles are stiffened and he is not able to move freely, even simple activities can seriously injure the officer.

Also, during the meeting, a film was viewed on different types of fraud schemes used. This film was sent to this department from

the Attorney General's office and was intended to be used as an educational tool. As described in the film, many of the fraud schemes are targeted towards elderly individuals. Many think that it is because the elderly are easier to con, which is partially true. However, many elderly are more trusting and fall prey to these con games. Many of the con games are called different names which include Sweepstakes, Tele-marketing, or other schemes to get a person to purchase something/ anything. There are some very reputable Tele-marketing business, however, if someone calls you and after the offer requests you to send money or wants you to give information on your credit card(s), be aware that someone may be trying to con you. If a Sweepstakes or similar offer indicates that you have to make a purchase, like buying magazines or some other items that you don't want or need, to become enrolled in the Sweepstakes drawing, save your money. It probably

Veterans' News

Toll Free Mammography Number Opened

The VA has established a tollfree number - (800)492-7844, for women veterans to obtain information about the department's mography services.

The line is staffed between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Callers can obtain information on VA mammography policies and the locations of all VA and VA certified mammography facilities within their geographic areas. .

Callers also can comment on the services. During non-business hours, messages may be left on a recorder for response the next business day. The VA's Women Veterans Health Care Guidelines call for breast screenings, including mammograms, as part of the VA's provision of basic primary care for women veterans.

In-house mammography units currently are located at 42 VA medical facilities. The VA uses community facilities for these services elsewhere. VA facilities with mammography units are required to follow the American College of Radiology Quality Standards and, like all Food and Drug Administration-certified facilities, meet the requirements of the Mammography Quality Standards Act. Community facilities must be FDA-approved and certified.

State benefits

Various states provide benefits for veterans and their dependents

that generally are in addition to federal government benefits. Included are state veterans homes, home loans, educational benefits for spouses and children of prisoners of war and servicemen missing in action. Some states provide, for certain disabled veterans, free car licenses, tax exemptions, and special exceptions as to residence requirements for various pro grams, particularly welfare assistance. A unique state program is land grants for veterans.

If you would like more information on Texas State Benefits. or information on other states, pamphlets and information are available at your local veterans service office. For Texas benefits, you may also call the Texas Land Board at (800) 252-8387.

Appealing a VA Denial

Do you wish to appeal a compensation claim denied by the Board of Veterans Appeals?

The first step, according to the VA: After receiving a determination on your claim from a VA regional office, you should send a letter to the same regional office explaining why you disagree.

If the local VA office does not change its decision based on your letter of disagreement and still does not grant the benefit you claimed, it will prepare and mail a Statement of the Case as well as a VA Form 9.

You can use that form to state: the benefit you are seeking and to point out any mistakes you think the VA has made. VA Form 9 includes a section used to request a Board of Veterans Appeals hear-

You must submit VA Form 9 with in 60 days of your receipt of the Statement of the Case (the mailing that included the form). However, you may have a longer period if less than a year has passed since the regional office mailed its original decision.

In the latter case, you have until the one-year anniversary if it is longer than the 60-day period. You can also request an extension of the 60-day period by writing to the VA regional office handling your appeal. Veterans are urged to contact their local veterans service officer for assistance in preparing their appeal, or to call the regional office at (800)827 1000.

Persian Gulf Claims

The Department of Veterans Affairs is seeking to interview Persian Gulf veterans whose claims for compensation were considered and denied under the rules for undiagnosed illnesses. VA is most interested in Persian Gulf veterans whose physical problems started two years or more after separation from active duty. Veterans who fit the above pro file and who would like to participate in this special interview process should call the Persian Gulf Helpline at (800)749-8387.
