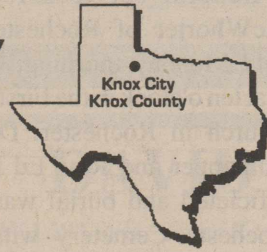

Scoring first with 10:02 left in the first quarter after recovering a Greyhound fumble, the Lions from Roby went on to dominate the game last Friday night here in Knox City by a score of 34-0.

The 'Hounds were plagued all night long by fumbles, blocked punts and mistakes. One blocked

punt was recovered in the end zone by Roby for a touchdown mid way through the second quarter.

With Roby scoring three touchdowns in the first quarter and a total of four touchdowns in the first half, Knox City fans were unusually quiet during the second

half of play.

The Greyhounds will face the Paducah Dragons this Friday night. The game will be played in Paducah, with the kickoff time set for 7:30 p.m. The Dragons lost to Munday, 35-7, last week. The Moguls are now ranked 4th in the state for Class 1A teams.

## Tragic Automobile Accident Claims Two Area Residents

News Of Tragedy Stuns Communities Of Knox City, O'Brien & Rochester

A Friday afternoon accident involving two vehicles on a highway east of Anson last Friday afternoon claimed the lives of E.L. "Jack" Tankersley, 83, of O'Brien and Dora McWhorter, 81, of Rochester.

According to reports from the Texas Department of Public Safety, the accident happened early Friday afternoon at the intersection of FM 600 and U.S. Highway 180, several miles east of Anson in Jones County.

Dora McWhorter was driving her 1995 Buick southbound on FM 600, when she collided with a pickup and camper truck that was traveling westbound on U.S. 180.

McWhorter was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident by Jones County Justice of the Peace Marlon Smith.

E.L. "Jack" Tankersley was a passenger in the McWhorter vehicle, and was flown by helicopter ambulance to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene. He was pronounced dead shortly after his arrival at the hospital.

Two occupants of the pickup truck were also transported by ambulance to Hendrick Medical Center. Their names were not released.

Jack Tankersley was a lifetime resident of both Haskell and Knox Counties. He was a farmer, and well known to everyone in the

Knox City area.

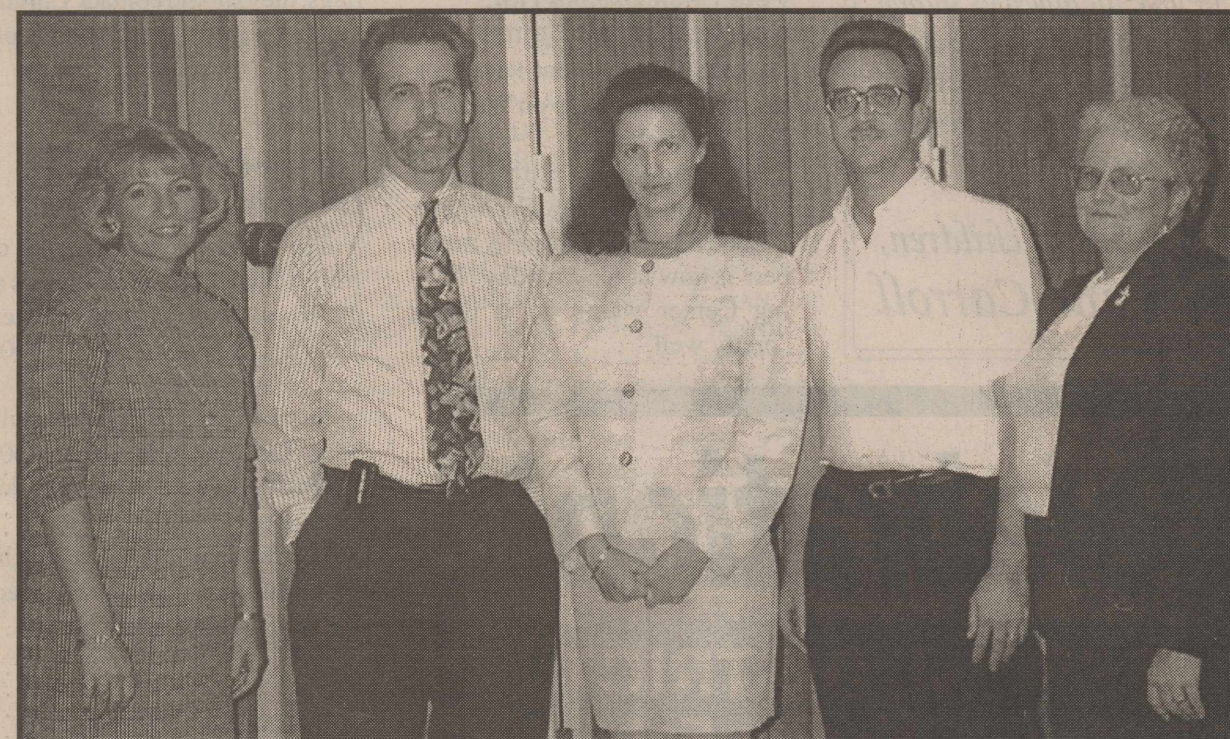
Dora McWhorter was a resident of Rochester. She was an LVN and a former employee of the Knox County Hospital.

both were so special to everyone they came into contact with.

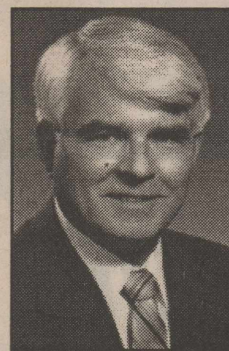
Jack Tankersley and Dora McWhorter will be missed by many, but they will always be remembered in a very special way by all.

## Counts' Opponent Announces Upcoming Debate, But Apparently Forgets To Invite Representative Counts To The Debate

State Representative David Counts today announced his surprise at recent media reports of a debate scheduled between himself and his republican opponent for the upcoming November election.

"My first knowledge of this debate was an announcement I heard on a radio station while traveling through the district," stated Counts, who went on to add that neither he nor his office had been contacted inviting him to participate in the event which has supposedly been set for October 15 in Aspermont, Texas.

"This must be an attempt to try and garner publicity for a lagging campaign by my opponent," said Counts. "I already have a prior, long standing commitment scheduled for that date and would not have been able to attend anyway."

Counts did note that he has already agreed to a debate being held in Sweetwater on October 22, at 7:00 p.m. that is being sponsored by the Sweetwater Chamber of Commerce State and Federal Committee.

"I am not opposed to debating, but it would be helpful if I were invited to participate," stated Counts, adding, "Folks can look at my legislative record and understand why I am supported by every major education organization in the district, as well as groups like, the National Federation of Business, The Texas Association of Business and Chambers of Commerce, Texans for Lawsuit Reform, the Civil Justice League, the Texas Hospital Association, Texas Farm Bureau, and the Southwestern Cattle Raisers. I have a strong record of leadership for West Texas."

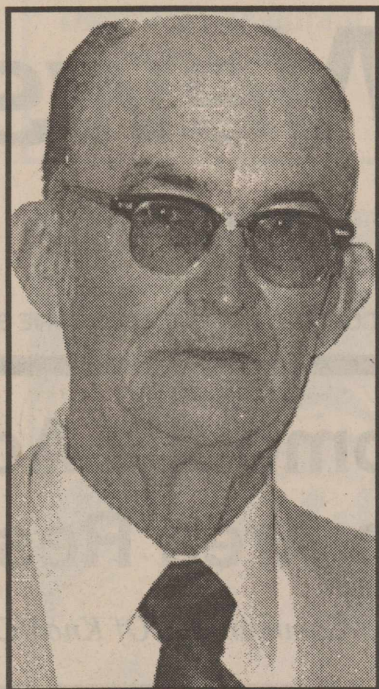

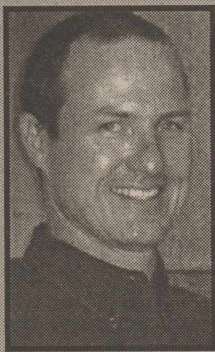

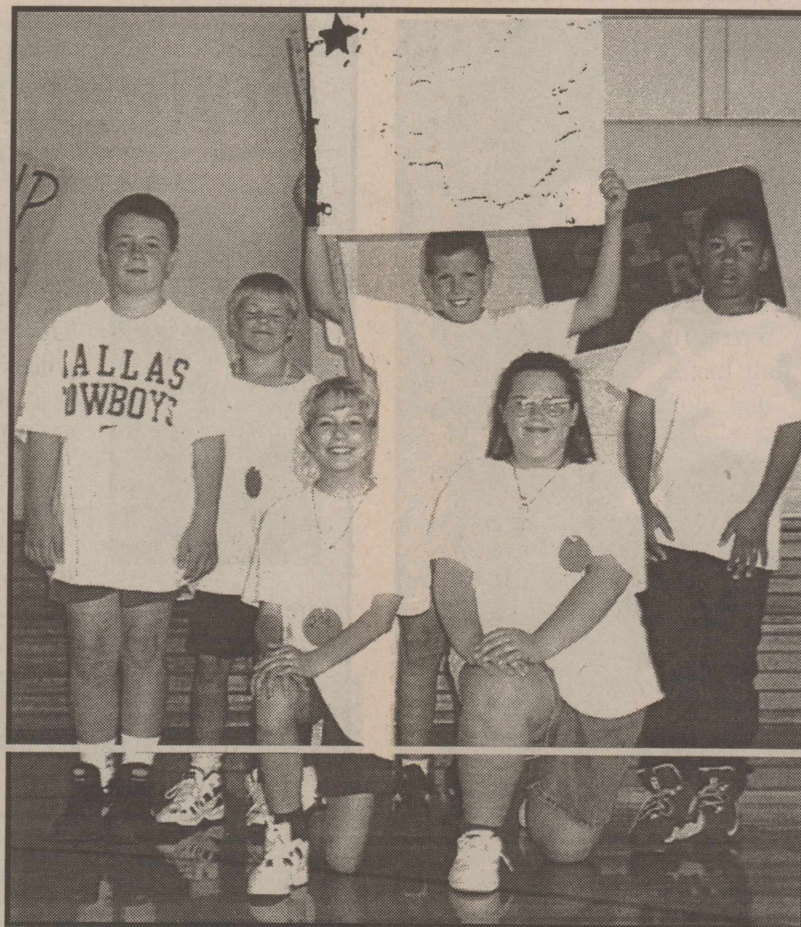

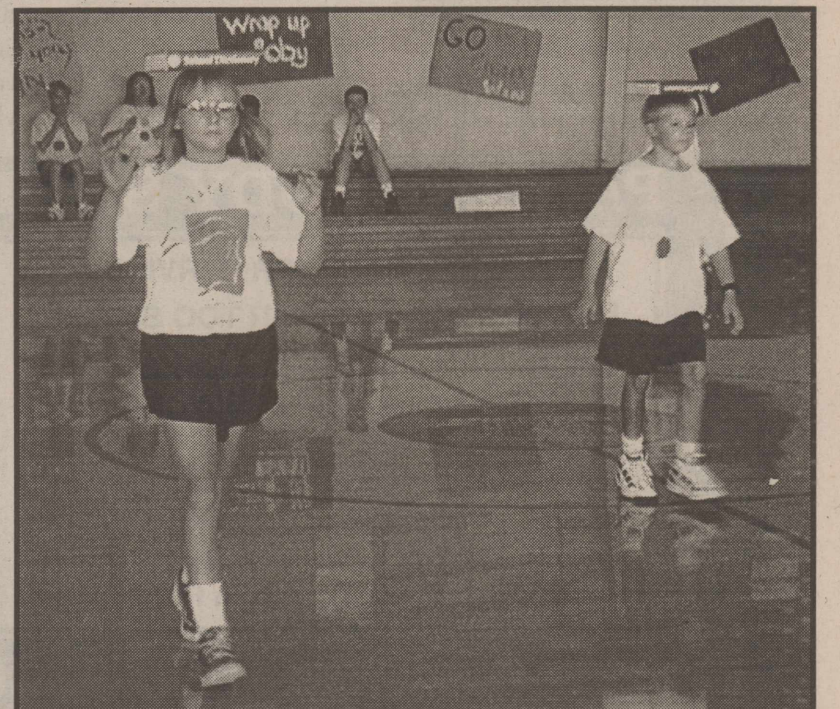
