SNARLING CUBS FROM CHILICOTHE TO PLAY BRAVES HERE SUNDAY

SHORT BALLOT TO BE GIVEN VOTERS

Results of Run-off Primary Will Again Be Posted On Large Bulletin Board

One of the shortest ballots in years will be presented to the voters of Haskell county when they enter the various polling places Saturday, August 25. Only the race congress, five state races, the race for representative and two county contests are yet to be decided by the majority of voters, while Precinct No. 1 voters will also decide the fate of the candidates running for Public Weigher and Justice of the Peace.

The name of Matt N. Graham candidate for county superintendent, will also be found on the ballot, but this was done to conform to election laws, even though his opponent Miss Minnie Ellis has withdrawn and Graham will automatically become the Democratic nominee with the first few votes.

The results of the various races in Haskell county will again be posted on a large bulletin board on the courthouse lawn and will be made known immediately after they are received by telephone. A loudspeaker will be in use throughout the evening for the benefit of those unable to get close to the bulletin board.

WATER RATE REMAINS IN FORCE TO SEPT. 20

According to Mayor A. F. Thurman, the allowing of a total of 7,000 gallons of water to users in Haskell extends to September 20 instead of September 1 as many citizens figured and the charges will be in effect for that minimum until that date, unless otherwise arranged.

While many of the lawns in Haskell have been injured during the drought, they would have been destroyed completely, so many people think, if the city had not allowed the 7,000 gallon rate to all users.

Champions of the Red River Valley League Booked; A Fast Ball Game Assured

For the first time in over two weeks, the Haskell Braves will play ball on the local ground Sunday afternoon, and will have as opponents the snarling, fighting Chillicothe Cubs, who fought their way to the top of the Red River Valley league and engaged as season-play champions. The game has been called for 3:30 o'clock sharp.

The baseball fans of this section who attend the game here Sunday will have an opportunity to witness one of the fastest baseball clubs in northwest Texas in the play of the Chillicothe entry. The team is composed of younger players, who smacked down other teams in the league which sported ex-professional players, and the record of the Cubs show that the team battles down to the bitter end to win every game.

Business manager Gene Tonn and field manager Elie Thurman, of the Braves, are assembling players to fill in the local team's weak spots and when the "umps" call play, the rampaging Cubs will find plenty of opposition.

Considerable controversy has taken place relative to the strength of the Red River Valley teams and those teams in the Wichita Valley league, therefore the game here Sunday will be the first test as to the merits of the league, even though Chillicothe finished on top of the northern league, while Haskell sported something like third in the Wichita organization.

Anyway, win, lose or draw, Tonn and Thurman believe that they are giving the Haskell county fans a real treat with the Chillicothe game, and that every person plunking down the small admission price Sunday will get their money's worth to the last penny.

PLANS TO HELP NATION'S FARMERS IS NOW UNDERWAY

Loans of 12 Cents A Pound To Cotton Growers Sets A Minimum Price

FUNDS FROM R. F. C.

Government Outlines Newest Proposals For Betterment Of Cotton Producers

WASHINGTON, D. C.—President Roosevelt Tuesday ordered the price of cotton pegged at 12 cents a pound, according to United Press report.

Mr. Roosevelt said he had instructed the Reconstruction Finance corporation to furnish enough money to the commodity credit corporation to increase loans to cotton producers from 10 cents a pound to 12 cents.

This is not as much as Senator John Bankhead, Democrat, Alabama, co-author of the Bankhead cotton control plan, asked. He wanted 13 1/2 cents a pound loans.

Aid to Farmers
A statement by the president pointed out that the increased loans would enable cotton farmers to hold back their sales for a favorable market rather than flooding the country with cotton at picking time.

Considerable significance also was attached to the president's action inasmuch as it came in the face of a threatened strike in the cotton textile industry.

If the walkout materializes, it was pointed out, mills would be unwilling to take cotton and growers would be faced with unloading it at a loss.

The 12-cent loan, it was explained, will give cotton farmers an incentive to hold until after the strike is settled.

Not Price Fixing
Agricultural adjustment administration officials said Mr. Roosevelt's order was not an actual case of price fixing. They added, however, that no farmer was likely to sell his cotton for less than 12 cents a pound so long as the federal government was willing to lend him that much on his crop.

During the 1933 loan program the cotton price sometimes fell below (Continued on Page 5)

An Omnivorous Appetite For The Girls? Yes, Sir!

DENTON, Tex.—An omnivorous appetite? No, not for circus elephants, but for girls! A different story!

With a monthly bill of fare requiring 3,000 dozen eggs, 12,000 pounds of meat, 8,000 pounds of flour and 2,500 pounds of shortening, students at Texas State College for Women (CIA) can't help but be "well fed."

It's a dairy "miss" who's monthly consumption of canned fruits required 275 gallons of sliced pineapple, 170 gallons of yellow cling peaches, 100 gallons of whole sweet pickle peaches and 200 gallons of choice pears. She eats 175 gallons of peas each month, and for that "occasional cup" consumes 1200 pounds of coffee and 70 pounds of tea.

Corps of Teachers Selected With Only Slight Change; 1934-35 Budget O. K.

SCHOOL COST LOW

Budget Shows Local System At Least 50 Percent Under Like Schools

Haskell's city schools will open Monday September 10, for the term of 1934-35. It was decided by the school board Tuesday night, when the members met in a regular meeting. The schools will again be under the leadership of Supt. C. B. Breedlove, and with the exception of one teacher in a ward school, the entire corp of teachers will be retained. There are 937 students in the Haskell schools.

The school board members also voted to have Mrs. Ada Rike placed in the vacancy created by the resignation of Mrs. C. T. Jones, who will teach in the Weimer schools.

The budget for the school year 1934-35 was approved.

Breedlove Again Leads
Headed by Supt. Breedlove, the schools of Haskell will employ the following teachers: High School: Geo. V. Wimbish, principal; W. L. Richey, mathematics and coach; H. K. Henry, vocational agriculture; Miss Donna Davis, English; Mrs. Geo. V. Wimbish, mathematics and English; Miss Jessie Vick, Spanish and history; Mrs. Nina Young, home economics.

South Ward: Mrs. Irene Ballard, principal and first grade; Mrs. W. M. Murphy, second grade; Miss Alma Sprowls, third grade; Mrs. Ada Rike, geography and penmanship; Miss Patsy Lou Koonce, arithmetic and spelling; Miss Velma Hamblen, English and reading.

North Ward: Miss Madeline Hunt, principal, public school music and reading; Miss May Fields, arithmetic and penmanship; L. S. Ramsey, history and geography; Miss Mattie Letha Phippen, English and spelling; Mrs. H. K. Henry, fourth grade; Mrs. O. W. Maloy, third grade; Mrs. Cretia Brooks, second grade; Miss Ruby Fitzgerald, first grade; Mrs. M. D. Crow, first and second grades.

Few Changes Made
This year marks the fifth term for Supt. Breedlove in the Haskell school system, and before coming to Haskell he served in the Rule school organization for six years. Only four or five changes have occurred in the personnel of the Haskell school since Supt. Breedlove assumed charge. Only one change has been made in the high school.

Budget Submitted
Showing only a cost of approximately \$36 per scholastic, at least fifty percent under most secondary schools, the budget for the school year of 1934-35 was presented to the board by Supt. Breedlove. For that term, the scholastic enrollment in the Haskell city schools was 937 and the total number of teachers was set at 23 exclusive of the superintendent, making an average of more than 41 scholastics per teacher. The total salaries of teachers was given as \$17,350.00.

Other costs of the school were approximately the same, making a total cost of approximately \$34,000 or about \$36 per scholastic for the school year.

TWO MEN ARRESTED FOR THEFT OF CAR

The chassis was found in a pasture in Stonewall county by Constable Hal Carr, of Old Glory. Deputy Sheriff Dan Kirkpatrick and City Marshal Jim McCoy of Rule, made the arrests in Graham.

The beret is more prominent this fall than it has been for many seasons. However, it is far removed from the flat little pancake, beloved of school children and Paris students, which used to be called berets. The new types are large, soft and drapy, cleverly manipulated to prove becoming to every face of every woman. One of the smartest styles took its inspiration from a man, the popular Prince of Wales, whose every change of costume affects the fashion world. The Scotch tam-o-shanter which he wears when in Scotch costume has been modified so as to create a tam with a decided forward sweep over one eye. This style is equally smart in velvet or gay plaid wools.

Paris Favors Berets

Not to be outdone by a mere man (even though he is a prince) the millinery designers of Paris all presented variations of the beret in their collections. Mile. Martine endorses the wide flat forward movement. Descat created an octagonal pointed beret lifted up at one side. Patou's berets frequently are of the tricorne type. Other versions, endorsed by all the leading designers, include wide flat, round berets (frequently stitched for interest) and turned-up versions that suggest the popular Breton sailor hat. In general, the berets are soft and drapy and can usually be manipulated to please the wearer's fancy and her profile. Tested Recipes

Following are two tested recipes that have proved favorites:

Ice Box Cookies
1 1/2 lb. butter, 1 cup brown sugar, 3 1/2 cups flour, 1 cup pecans.
Cream butter and sugar, add eggs and beat well. Add flour slowly until mixed well. Add chopped pecans. Form in loaf and roll in waxed paper. Let chill two hours before baking. These are better if baked a few at a time. Slice thin and bake in oven 350 degrees six minutes until light brown.

Vanilla Ice Cream
2 cups whole milk, 1 cup sugar, boil together ten minutes; 3 eggs (beaten together).
Add to cooked sugar and milk and let thicken stirring constantly. Remove from fire, add remainder of quart of milk and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Pour into tray and freeze 45 minutes and stir once when cream has been freezing 30 minutes.

House Joint Resolution No. 30

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 16, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 16. All land mentioned in Sections 11, 12 and 15 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, now belonging to the University of Texas shall be subject to the taxation for county and school district purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned, provided they shall be rendered for taxation upon the values fixed by the State Tax Board and that the values fixed for school district purposes shall not exceed the values fixed for county purposes on the same land; and provided that the University of Texas from the University Available Fund, shall remit annually to each of the counties and school districts in which said lands are located an amount equal to the tax imposed upon said land for county and school district purposes."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school district purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located."

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years; and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years."

LOAN LAW FUTILE

Industrial concerns which expected financial aid through the new government plan to make loans direct to industry seem likely to be disappointed, because of the drastic requirements imposed upon borrowers and the immense amount of red tape involved in obtaining such loans.

Prospective borrowers are required to submit salary and wage scales for government approval, must permit government inspection of their books at any time, must have government approval of all dividend payments or other distribution of profits. A business man applying for a government loan must fill out a complicated 20-page form, giving information concerning his business in the most minute detail. He must then wait until the information is checked and double checked, first by regional officials and then again in Washington. Loans will not be made to finance new construction, to pay debts or taxes, to finance consumer purchases, imports, exports, or promotional work, and no loans will be made to inactive industries or to those in receivership.

If the business man could meet the drastic government requirements he probably could obtain a loan from private sources more readily, and by the time all the red tape could be cleared away in getting the government loan he likely would be closed up by the sheriff anyway. As an indication of the futility of the government's gesture to aid industry, it is significant that only last week the Federal Reserve Board announced that out of the \$280,000,000 appropriated for that purpose, it had loaned the magnificent sum of \$5,000 to industries in need of refinancing.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 13

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 3. Taxes shall be levied and collected by general laws and for public purposes only; and the total amount of revenue which the State shall be authorized to collect during such biennium from taxes, licenses, permits and fees (except fees paid by students to state educational institutions, and except rentals, bonuses and royalties obtained from public lands and other public property) shall not exceed a sum reasonably estimated to equal the product obtained by multiplying the number of the inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50/100 (\$22.50) Dollars; provided however, the total amount of such revenue which may be so collected, shall be reduced by the amount of any surplus funds or unexpended appropriations remaining at the close of the preceding biennium. The expenditures of the State government of funds derived from the sources above referred to shall never exceed during any biennium a sum equal to the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 70/100 (\$22.70) Dollars; provided however, that the population of the State (in determining the amount of revenue which may be collected from taxes, licenses, permits and fees or expended from the revenue thus obtained) shall be determined by the then last preceding Federal census, to which population shall be added or deducted, as the case may be, for each year that has elapsed since the last preceding Federal census, the average yearly increase or decrease of the population as shown by said Federal census when compared with the Federal census which immediately preceded said last Federal census. Provided, further, that in case of war, riots, or insurrection, or a statewide calamity caused by earthquake, fire, flood or an epidemic which seriously threatens the health of the citizens of this State, the Legislature shall have authority by a two-thirds vote

of both Houses, to suspend for a definite period this constitutional limitation as to the amount of money which may be collected and expended during the biennium."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 3. Taxes shall be levied and collected by general laws and for public purposes only; and the total amount of revenue which the State shall be authorized to collect during such biennium from taxes, licenses, permits and fees (except fees paid by students to state educational institutions, and except rentals, bonuses and royalties obtained from public lands and other public property) shall not exceed a sum reasonably estimated to equal the product obtained by multiplying the number of the inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50/100 (\$22.50) Dollars; provided however, the total amount of such revenue which may be so collected, shall be reduced by the amount of any surplus funds or unexpended appropriations remaining at the close of the preceding biennium. The expenditures of the State government of funds derived from the sources above referred to shall never exceed during any biennium a sum equal to the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 70/100 (\$22.70) Dollars; provided however, that the population of the State (in determining the amount of revenue which may be collected from taxes, licenses, permits and fees or expended from the revenue thus obtained) shall be determined by the then last preceding Federal census, to which population shall be added or deducted, as the case may be, for each year that has elapsed since the last preceding Federal census, the average yearly increase or decrease of the population as shown by said Federal census when compared with the Federal census which immediately preceded said last Federal census. Provided, further, that in case of war, riots, or insurrection, or a statewide calamity caused by earthquake, fire, flood or an epidemic which seriously threatens the health of the citizens of this State, the Legislature shall have authority by a two-thirds vote



HASKELL FARMER SLAIN BY TRAIN

D. R. Poer Found Dead Near Railroad Track; Believed Asleep When Struck

Poer, 55, a prominent farmer residing in the northeastern part of Haskell county, was found dead early Sunday morning on the Wichita Valley right-of-way. Investigators believe Poer fell asleep a few inches from the tracks, and while in a sleepy condition was awakened by the passing train, with the result that his head was struck by the moving cars.

County Line Beer and Lunch stand where Poer was last seen alive Saturday night. The body carried no other marks other than a deep gash on the forehead.

Car Would Not Start

Judge Pat O'Reilly, justice of the peace, returned a verdict of death by means unknown.

Poer had gone to the beer stand Saturday night and remained for some time talking with friends. When Poer prepared to go home he was unable to start his car and friends advised him to sleep in the automobile and left him, thinking he had taken the advice. That was the last time he was seen alive.

It was believed that Poer started walking home, but had gone to sleep near the track, not realizing how close he was to the rails. The roar of the passing train startled the victim causing him to raise his head as the freight cars whirled by a few inches above his face, investigators believed. A gash six inches long was torn in his head.

Well-Known Farmer

Poer had resided in this section for many years and was widely known. At one time, several years ago, he operated a tin shop in Haskell, moving from this city to his farm, where he has resided since. The body was taken in charge by a Munday funeral home, pending completion of funeral arrangements.
