'Heritage House' restaurant in Munday provides unique dining atmosphere

They have only known each other for a little over one year but already they are close friends and business partners.

Cynthia White, a resident of Munday for 2 years, and Tamara Weeks, a Munday resident for only one year, have recently opened a unique and creative restaurant and bed and breakfast in this small town that they both now call home.

It was in December of 1995 when Tamara's husband, John, was hired as the new City Manager in Munday and one of the first people that they met was Cynthia White - editor of⁵ the newspaper, The Munday Courier. The two families were immediately drawn together due to their two six year old sons becoming almost inseparable best-friends.

"Our boys wanted to play together every spare minute of the day so Tamara and I were always shuffling kids from one house to another or on the phone with each other making play date arrangements," remarked Cynthia.

It wasn't long before the two ladies realized that they had much in common with each other. "Not only were we new in town and had no other relatives on hand, but we also learned that we shared many of the same interests and had similar backgrounds," said Tamara. "We have both lived in Europe for several years and we were both professional musicians in the past," she further explained. Both ladies have been members of various musical groups - entertaining in Florida, California, Santa Fe, Alaska, and all over the east coast. They still enjoy getting together with local musicians in Munday and playing a few tunes. Both ladies had also been li-

censed real estate agents in the past

and had business backgrounds so it wasn't long before the twosome was making plans to open a business of their own.

State of Texas sends City of Knox City \$19,941.75 for November, 1996 sales tax

(Austin, January, 1997) State Comptroller John Sharp today delivered \$139 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,085 Texas cities and 117 counties, including a check of \$9,941.75 to Knox City. The rebate to Knox City reflects a, increase of 1.56% from a check of \$9,788.47 one year ago at this same time. Knox City collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax, with a full 1.000% of the tax directed towards EDC funding.

Texas cities received \$126.6 million, less than 1 percent above payments of \$125.7 million at this same time one year ago. Counties received a total of 12.38 million in rebates, again less than 1 percent above the \$12.37 million in allocations for January of 1996.

January, 1997 payments include taxes collected by monthly filers on November, 1996 sales and reported to the Comptroller in December of 1996.

For other Knox County cities, Benjamin received \$46.87, an 8.22% decrease from \$51.07 for the same period a year ago. Goree received \$408.00, up 37.04% from a payment of \$297.72 last year at the same time. Munday received \$4,041.05, down 35.95% from a payment of \$6,309.36 in 1996 at the same time. Munday collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax, with Benjamin and Goree collecting a 1.000% sales tax.

In Haskell County, Haskell received \$19,253.58, down 32.53% from a payment of \$28,536.70 in 1996. Haskell collects a 2.000% rate of sales tax. O'Brien received \$32.03 this period, with no report for the same period last year. Rochester received \$259.95, up 0.74% form a payment of 258.02 during the same period last year.

In Jones County, Stamford received a payment of \$32,878.13, down 9.08% from a payment of \$36,161.83 in 1996. Anson received \$6,660.12, up 1.53% from a payment of \$6,559.75 last year. Hamlin received a check of \$9,763.36, up 1.44% from \$9,624.55 in 1996. Stamford, Anson and Hamlin all collect a 2% rate of sales tax. In Baylor County, the city of Seymour received a payment of \$7,547.94, down 7.47% from a payment of \$8,158.04 in 1996.

In Foard County, Crowell received a payment of \$2,433.35, down 10.07% from a payment of \$2,705.95 in 1996. Crowell collects a 1.500% rate of sales tax.

In Dickens County, Dickens received no payment, down 100.00% from a payment of \$1,631.51 in 1996. Spur received a payment of \$2,349.22, up 19.81% from a 1996 payment of \$1,960.64. Dickens collects a 1.5% rate of sales tax, while Spur collects a 1% rate.

In Cottle County, Paducah received a payment of \$2,317.43, down 0.83% from a payment of \$2,336.85 in 1996. Paducah collects a 1% rate of sales tax.

Sales tax figures are furnished to *THE KNOX COUNTY NEWS* as a public service by the State Comptroller's office to be used as an economic indicator of the state of the economy in Texas. The full report is available at the *NEWS*.

This week's mail brought a large envelope from the organization Disabled American Veterans, and when I opened it up I found the ad that you see to the right. 'Don't take a Hero's Space' is an ad that says a lot and we are proud to reprint it here in the NEWS as a public service announcement.

While reading the material that came with the ad, I found myself thinking about how often I see someone right here in Knox City parking in a handicapped parking place without being handicapped. It does happen a lot and I see it most often at the Knox City Post Office. With just one handicapped parking place out front, it is amazing that there are so many who will pull right into that spot and not even give a second thought to the sign and markings indicating a reserved space for those with real medical disabilities.

Not only are these actions against the law, they are just downright rude for a small community like ours. But.....as usual, there are some good excuses for breaking the law and tying up a space reserved for those who have a hard time walking. The best I've heard was from one non-handicapped woman who said she uses



every Wednesday and reads this the space because she is 63 years old. Not a 63 year old with medical disabilities, just 63 years old! And there is one man who uses the space while he sits in his pickup in front of the Post Office

newspaper after getting it out of his mailbox. If he is sitting in the reserved space this week while reading this column, maybe he will look up, see the sign and realize that he is violating the law by parking in a handicapped zone.

Handicapped reserved parking spaces are designed to aid those who have a disability that impairs normal mobility. Whether it be an actual handicapped license plate or the placard that hangs from the rear view mirror, the only vehicles legally authorized to use a handicapped zone are ones that have a handicapped marking displayed.

I guess the above ad hit home with me because I too am a Disabled American Veteran. Yes, I do have a handicap placard assigned to me by the state because of my artificial knee, but you will very rarely ever see me use it to obtain the advantage of a handicapped parking area. The placard was issued because there are times when my leg swells and it is hard to walk, but there is always the thought in the back of my mind that there might be someone else who needs the spot worse than I do. Even with a partially artificial leg, I try to leave the handicapped spaces for those whose disabilities are more severe. So, I end up walking the parking lots just the same as everyone else, only to pass by non-handicapped cars that are utilizing the space with careless disregard for others who really need to park there. There are fines associated with illegal use of a handicapped parking zone. These laws mean nothing to some because they know there is little enforcement action in a small community like ours. With no disrespect towards our local law enforcement officers, I would suggest that the violation of this law needs to be strictly enforced with the harshest of penalties imposed on offenders. Maybe a strong jolt in the way of an expensive fine would serve as a reminder that only the legally handicapped can use those areas.

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

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




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
