# Knox City Elementary students raise \$903.25 in Jump Rope for Heart contest

Since 1971

The Knox City Elementary School's "Jump Rope for Heart" fund drive was an "overwhelming success" this year, according to P.E. teacher Greta Waldrip. The Knox City Elementary School students raised a total of \$903.25 for the local chapter of the American Heart Association.

Mrs. Waldrip explains how an extensive study of the heart and cardiovascular system begins during February or "Heart" month, not only in P.E., but in many classrooms. Students learn what exercises and activities kelp keep the heart and lungs healthy; they also learn the anatomy and physiology of the heart. They study the various diseases that affect the heart and ways people can help prevent developing heart problems.

Students participate in a twoweek unit in P.E. involving the learning of jump rope skills. By the time, the Jump Rope for Heart event is conducted, students can perform a variety of jumps.

The actual Jump Rope for Heart final event, scheduled for February 13, at the tennis courts, was rained out and there were too many conflicts with gym use to reschedule.

# **Cotton variety plot yields are complete**

By Paul Weiser County Ext. Agent-Ag.

The yields from the 1996 Knox County dry land and irrigated cotton variety plots have been calculated and are available. This year the Knox County Extension Service conducted an irrigated cotton variety plot with Mark Reed and a dry land cotton variety plot with Garry Brown.

The dryland plot was planted just north of the Texas A&M University Vegetable Research Station on June 10 and harvested December 16. A snapped cotton yield was determined by hand picking thirteen feet of row at two locations. The yields from these two pickings were averaged for a yield per acre. One sample was then transported to Lubbock to be ginned. This process would determine a percent gin turnout. This will allow a lint yield per acre to be calculated.

The top six varieties were: All Tex Atlas (698 lbs), Paymaster 280 (648 lbs.), Paymaster HS26 (597 lbs.), Paymaster HS200 (576 lbs.), TamCot Sphinx (557 lbs.) and Brownfield UTE (555 lbs.). A total of sixteen varieties were planted in this plot. The other ten varieties were: TamCot CAB-CS (514 lbs), Brownfield Tejas (509 lbs.), Hartz 1220 (494 lbs.), Delta Pine Acala 90 (489 lbs.), All Tex
