Knox County Youth participate in district level 4-H Horse Show

Knox County 4-H was represented by ten youth at the recent District 3 4-H Horse Show held in Vernon on June 19-21 at the Finley Bradley 4-H Arena. Knox City 4-H was represented by three youth - Roni Morrow, Logan Morrow and Nathan Bloxham. Benjamin 4-H had seven representatives -Jacy Collins, Tyler Collins, Cassie Lyles, Tom Lyles, Shaylee Propps, Trey Propps and Jay Whitten.

In the tie-down calf roping Jay Whitten placed third with a time of 50.84 seconds on two head while Nathan Bloxham followed in fourth place with a time of 55.22 seconds on two head. Nathan also placed ninth in the breakaway roping with a time of 4.62 seconds on one head. Tom Lyles and Jacy Collins placed sixth in the team roping with a time of 15.47 seconds on one head while Jay Whitten was on the team that placed ninth with a time of 24.028 seconds on one head.

In the team penning contest, Roni Morrow teamed up with two Haskell County 4 H'ers — Hegan and Cassie Lamb — to place sixth by penning three head in 115.73 seconds. The team of Jay Whitten, Logan Morrow and Nathan Bloxham placed ninth by penning two head in 110.75 seconds.

Last year Tom Lyles, Jacy

Collins and Tacy Condron won both the District 3 Team Penning and the Texas 4-H Team Penning contests. Tacy graduated and is no longer eligible for 4-H competition. Tacy's empty position was filled by Trey Propps. This team drew two runs on a group of very energetic cattle. This resulted in two no times.

A group of rookies from Benjamin were the most exciting youngsters at the show. The team of Shaylee Propps, Cassie Lyles and Tyler Collins did an excellent job for their first year. These three youngsters sorted out their three head of cattle but had some bad luck while trying to pen them.

In the speed events Roni Morrow placed third in the stakes race with a time of 18.001 seconds on two runs. Roni also placed in the barrel race. A time of 36.751 seconds on two runs was good enough for eighth place. These two placings were good enough to give Roni the honors of seventh place overall in the speed events and tied for ninth place overall in the qualifying events.

All of these youth will once again compete in the Texas 4-H Horse Show in Abilene on July 20-26. Several of the events can only be entered by qualifying at the District Horse Show. Roni Morrow qualified for these events with her outstanding runs in the speed events. The roping and team penning events are open and do not require a District 4-H Horse Show qualification. The only restriction is that they must be a current 4-H member.





On A Wizer Note.... By Paul Weiser, Knox County Extension Agent - Ag.

When will boll weevil sprayiong begin???

The question of "When will the boll weevil eradication spraying begin?" As of now I have not been given a date. Hopefully they will begin as soon as the cotton is ready for its first spraying. However, that is not very far off.

Overwintered weevils trapped in Knox County appear to have hit a peak during the week of May 31 - June 6. In the six traps that I check, an average of 234 weevils per trap were caught. This number is higher than in 1996.

With the diapause spraying last fall, many producers ask "Why, are the numbers so high?" The best answer is lack of a hard winter. Weevil numbers in traps located in counties that have had no eradication spraying are much higher than in counties that had a diapause. The Southern Rolling Plains eradication zone, where they sprayed most of the season last year, are catching fewer weevils than in a diapause only zone.

As noted earlier, I am not sure if Knox County will receive any spraying this summer or if we will suffer through another diapause. It would be wise to keep an eye on the situation. Any producer that has cotton beginning to square should be aware that they may need to do their own early weevil control spraying.

As fields begin to square, the weevils will move into the fields at high rates. By controlling the overwintered weevils, farmers will lower eradication costs and help avoid losing any ground that was gained by the diapause spraying last fall.

Boll weevil populations will begin to increase in fields as cotton begins to square and will begin to deposit eggs. A one-third grown square, one-quarter inch in diameter, is just large enough to support a single boll weevil larva. Squares will grow from the pinhead stage, one-sixteenth inch in diameter, to the one-third grown in about 3 days. Two to four insecticidal treatments with about 5 day intervals will probably be needed to control overwintered boll weevils.

28 days after stand establishment or when cotton reaches the five leaf stage to determine the stage of square development. Where weevils numbers are greater than one per twenty-five feet of row or about 530 per acre, an insecticidal application will be needed just prior to the development of the first onethird grown squares. When boll weevils continue to move into a field, a second application is needed about 5 days after the first.

Be sure to remember one thing, no matter who sprays for the weevils, the producer or the eradication people, it will be the producer's responsibility to control any secondary pests. Do not postpone any inspections or applications because you think the Eradication will be controlling all cotton pests.

"We are pleased to be able to offer this valuable and lifesaving service to the families of Knox County and the surrounding areas. From a paramedic's viewpoint, we would rather prevent an injury to a child than be on the scene of a wreck to assist at that point."

Immunization clinic set for Thursday, July 10

The Texas Department of Health will conduct an Immunization Clinic at the Community Center in Knox Cityon Thursday, July 10 from 10:00-11:30 a.m. and 1:00-3:00 p.m.

Immunizations offered include DTaP, Hib, Polio, Measles, Mumps and Rubella and Hepatitis B for infants as well as all school immunizations.

The second MMR is required for Kindergarten entry in the fall of 1997. The hepatitis series will be required for Kindergarten entry in the fall of 1998. The Hepatitis B series (three immunizations) takes a minimum of 6 months to complete. Parents are asked to check their child's immunization record for this series. Even though it is not a school requirement, the Hepatitis B series is available for all school age children through the age of 18, if they or their parents want it for prevention or the child is at risk. For more information on the immunization or the disease, call the Texas Department of Health or take to a healthcare provider.

The varicella (chickenpox) vaccine has arrived at the office and is now being given to 12-23 month old children and 11 year olds. Those interested in more information on the varicella, call the office.

Participants are asked to bring immunization records to the clinic. A parent or legal guardian must accompany a minor. All services provided by the Texas Department of Health are provided on a sliding fee scale but no one is denied services due to an ability to pay. HEALTH CARE REFORM— WITHOUT THE MANDATES_

Virginia small-business owner Dale Gillilland used to provide health insurance for his employees. But when one employee filed a lot of claims, his health care premiums skyrocketed. Today, Gillilland wants to offer health insurance to his employees, but he cannot afford it. And he's not alone.

No one wants to offer health insurance to their employees more than small-business owners, but they are the group least able to do so. According to the Small Business Administration, two-thirds of the working uninsured are either in firms with fewer than 500 employees or are selfemployed. In an NFIB Education Foundation survey, small-business owners listed rising health care costs as their No. 1 problem in 1991 and again in 1996.

Congress did take some small steps toward health care reform last year. A new health care law increased the tax deduction that the selfemployed may take for the cost of their health insurance from 30 percent to 80 percent, phased in over 10 years. But it doesn't go far enough. Big businesses can currently deduct 100 percent of their health costs. The self-employed business owner should have that same deduction. This would equalize insurance costs for the two and enable many of the uninsured self-employed to purchase health insurance for themselves and their employees.

The new health insurance law is also a test-run for Medical Savings Accounts (MSAs) which are similar to individual retirement accounts in their design. MSAs will allow employers (with fewer than 50 employees) or the employee to buy traditional type insurance policies with a very high deductible so that the policies cost less. Then, employees or employers can put the money into a tax-free account that can be used to pay for out-of-pocket medical expenses until the deductible is reached and insurance coverage kicks in.


Private, voluntary national purchasing groups for small businesses are another way to make health insurance more accessible and affordable. These groups, which would allow small firms to band together and selfinsure, would give small employers the advantages that big businesses currently enjoy: bargaining power in the marketplace, administrative savings from volume buying, and freedom from those costly state mandates that are constantly raising premiums.

For example, when small-business owners buy health insurance, they must pay for benefits mandated by their state (such as acupuncture and fertility treatments). Companies with tens of thousands of employees (such as General Motors) self-insure—pay claims out of company funds—and are exempt from state mandated-coverage requirements which can add 30 percent to the cost of premiums. U.S. Sen. Tim Hutchinson, R-Ark., and Rep. Harris Fawell, R-III., have introduced legislation on purchasing groups.

And small employers are facing another health care threat: incrementalized federal mandates. In the last year, there have been two new federal health care mandates forced on employers—the mental health parity provision and the 48-hour maternity stay provision. It's difficult to argue against the need for accessible, affordable mental health care, or against allowing a mother to stay a safe length of time in the hospital after giving birth. The emotional arguments for these issues have obscured their costs. But mandates defeat the very purpose of health care reform, which is to lower health care costs and to insure more people. According to Blue Cross-Blue Shield, monthly premiums have increased an average of 10 percent in states that have enacted general mental health coverage mandates.

The reforms in last year's law were good first steps toward making health care available and affordable to the small-business community. But new federal mandates on health care run counter to this goal. Smallbusiness owners need reforms that encourage purchasing groups, not new mandates, to help keep down excessive health insurance costs. Smallbusiness owners like Dale Gillilland need health care reform, not only for themselves but for their employees and their families, and they need it soon.

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
