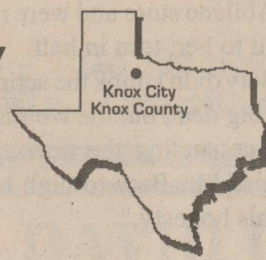

It all started Wednesday when the Abilene widow, who is disabled, sent an employee to run several errands. She sent along three blank, but signed, checks to pay for purchases.

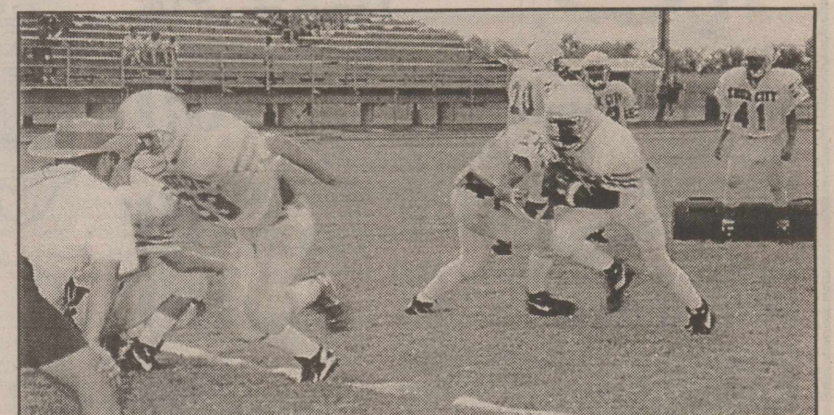
The temporary employee lost one of the checks, but apparently was afraid to tell her employer. But the woman discovered it was missing Wednesday evening when Baty called from Knox City

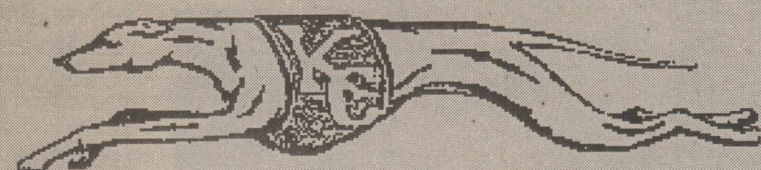
Greyhounds to scrimmage Friday at Breckenridge

Dr. Rao to begin duties at Knox County Hospital

To begin here Monday, August 25

Knox County Hospital District is pleased to announce the arrival of its newest doctor, Imran Rao M.D. Dr. Rao will be moving to Knox City this weekend and will begin work on Monday, August 25, at the Knox County Hospital Clinic.

Dr. Rao (pronounced as though it rhymes with "how") is a specialist in Internal Medicine and will treat all age groups as he practices in both the Knox City and Munday clinics. Dr. Rao is a native of Pakistan and comes to Knox County by way of Rush-Westlake Hospital in Melrose Park, Illinois, just outside of Chicago. He completed this three year residency requirement in June 1997 and passed his licensure examination to practice in Texas last month.

While assessing his future practice options last spring, Dr. Rao saw an advertisement in the Jour-

nal of the American Medical Association for a physician at Knox County Hospital. "I was very excited to learn of the practice opportunity in Knox City," Dr. Rao stated. "The climate in West Texas is very similar to Pakistan. I was anxious to leave the cold weather and snow of Chicago. My experience as a licensed physician and surgeon while in both Pakistan and Illinois should provide a complement to Dr. Barretto's skills."

"We are pleased to add Dr. Rao to our fine staff of physicians," Kevin Ansley, Knox County Hospital administrator, said. "He provides us with an internist to assess complex health problems and his personality should be well received by our communities."

A reception for the public to meet Dr. Rao will be held in September at Knox City and Munday.

Real Relief for Main Street

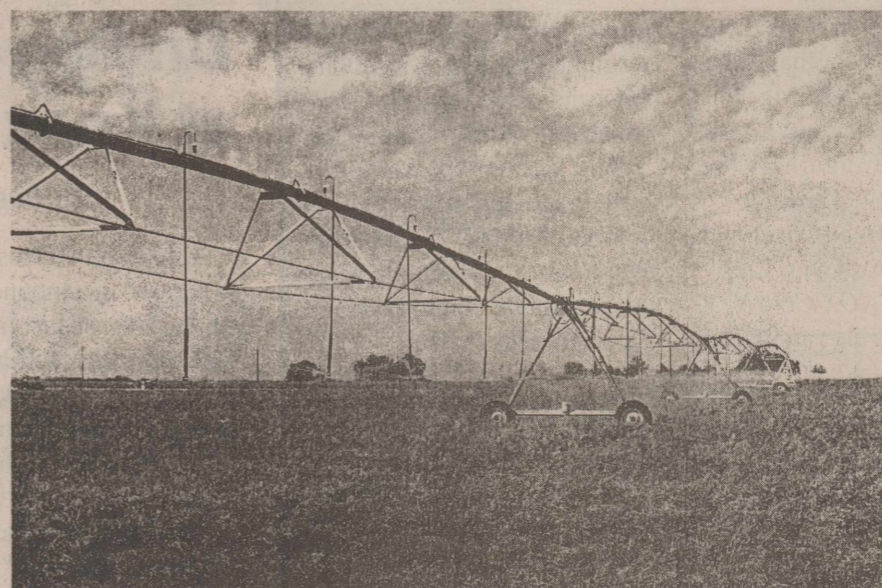

- o Small corporations (those with \$5 million or less in gross sales) will now be exempt from the Alternative Minimum Tax.

So celebrate today, if you are a small-business owner... or if you work for a small business or know someone who owns one. Celebrate the fact that the small businesses you frequent --- your favorite restaurant, dry cleaner and mini-mart --- have won some of the relief that they need, that they deserve, and that will help them continue to do what they do best: create jobs and grow the economy.

These very positive developments are the appetizer before the main course — if government officials in Washington stay this course, we will someday see a complete overhaul of the U.S. tax code, a reformed legal system, and regulatory reform that recognizes that not all business is big; in other words, public policy that lets small business breathe, helps create jobs and encourages sustained economic growth.

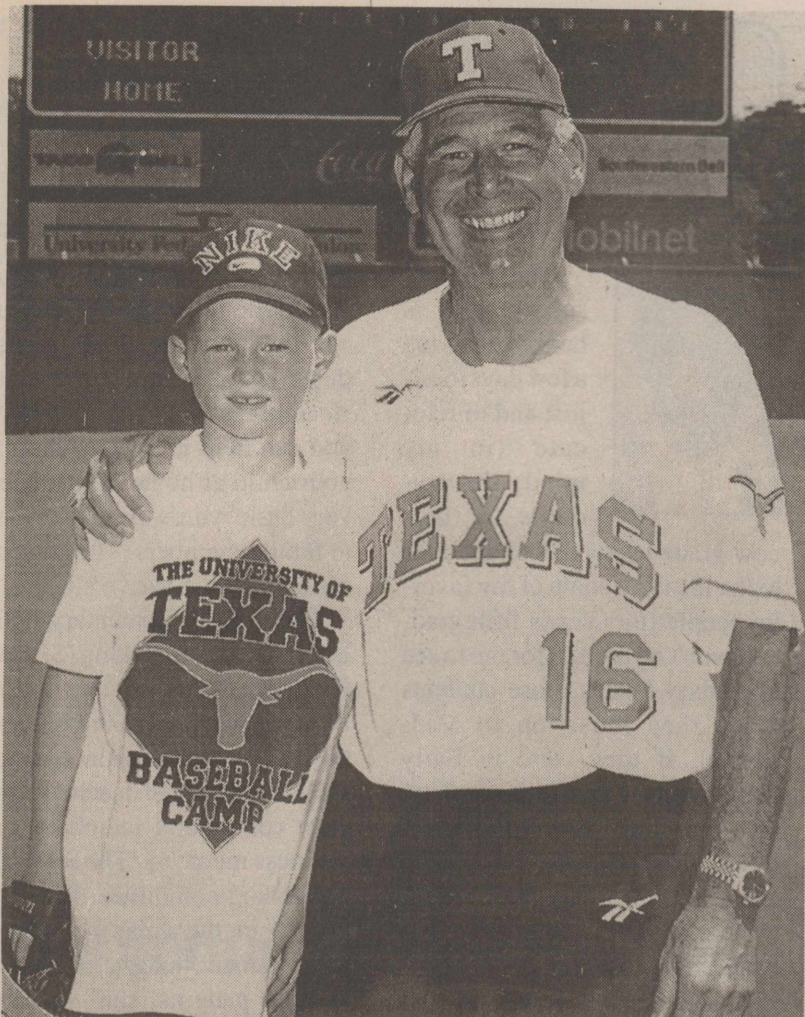

New Texas area codes required by August 24

IRVING - - Telephone users are reminded the new area codes assigned last May to portions of north and central Texas must be dialed to complete a call beginning August 24.

The metropolitan Fort Worth area retains the 817 code. Cities in the northern part of the state changed from 817 to 940, including Childress, Wichita Falls, Gainesville, Denton, Mineral Wells, Throckmorton, Haskell and Aspermont. Central Texas cities in 817 changed to the 254 area, including Waco, Breckenridge, Glen Rose, Hillsboro, Donie, Cameron, Killeen, Evant, May, Cross Plains and Cisco.

GTE reminds telephone users to reprogram automated equipment that uses the area code, such as storing or analyzing telephone numbers, security systems, business telephone systems, modems, speed call lists and automatic dialing.

Central and North Texas are two of 70 regions nationwide to receive new area codes over the last two years.

The need for codes has increased due to population and business growth, entry of new competitors for local service, and the proliferation in use of fax machines, modems, cellular phones, pagers and additional phone lines.

In 1996, the 972 area code began serving the suburban areas surrounding Dallas, and the 281 area code replaced 713 for suburban areas surrounding Houston. In July of this year, the 830 area code was assigned to the part of the 210 area code north of Webb County, and the 956 area code was placed in service for the portion of the 210 area from Webb County south.

The San Antonio metropolitan area remained 210. Mandatory use of the new south Texas codes will occur October 6.
