Bro. Johnny was licensed to the ministry by the First Baptist Church in Perryton in 1985 and ordained to the ministry by Calvary Baptist Church in Brownfield in 1994. He received his bachelor of arts in business administration and Bible from Wayland Baptist University in Plainview in 1988. He also received his master of divinity at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth in 1994.

His prior service in the ministry has been summer youth minister at First Baptist Church in Follett, 1986; youth / music minister at Key Heights Baptist Church in Perryton, 1987-1988; associate pastor, youth / education, Calvary Baptist Church, Brownfield, 1988-1993; summer youth minister, Stadium Drive Baptist Church in Fort Worth, 1994; and pastor, Red Oak Baptist Church, Kaufman, from 1995 until present.

Greyhounds fight hard with Rotan

Yellowhammers pull ahead to defeat Greyhounds 36-12

In one of Knox City's best efforts of the 1997 football season, the Greyhounds challenged a tough team from Rotan and played a very physical game right up until the final buzzer.

Even though Rotan pulled ahead on the scoreboard to the game ending numbers of 36-12, the Greyhounds from Knox City never gave up.

Knox City's two touchdowns were provided on a 12 yard pass reception by Aaron Large from Brandon Gutierrez, and a 19 yard run by Michael Baez. On both touchdowns, the point after attempts failed.

Knox City had 11 first downs to Rotan's 13, 68 yards passing to Rotan's 70, and the pass completion/attempt/interception was 6-12-2 to Rotan's 5-11-1. The game winner factor for Rotan was the ground rushing statistics with the Yellowhammers picking up 412 yards on 43 carries while the Greyhounds only picked up 195 yards on 35 carries.

Knox City will host the Crowell Wildcats this Friday night for Homecoming, kickoff is 7:30 pm.

A nursery will be provided and each lady is asked to bring a canned food for Christmas gifts.



health, a staggering number of women simply do not have access to the information and services they need to prevent disease and to enhance their health.


Of particular concern to women are cardiovascular disease, cancer and osteoporosis, three leading causes of illness, disability and death in women.



The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.

(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.

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
