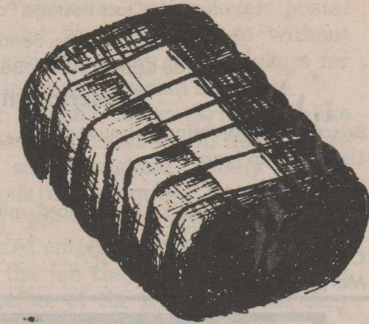
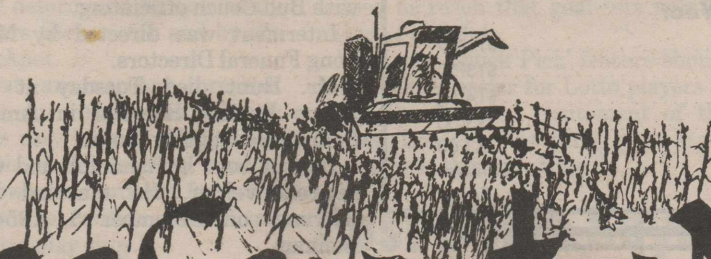

Wildlife Shelter Belt Established Here

Carolyn and Joe Luckenbach recently installed a Wildlife Shelter Belt south of Silverton. It is 1/4-mile long and 150' wide.

The trees were planted by the Texas Forest Service and the fabric was laid by the U. S. Forest Service. The fabric that was placed around the trees

collects moisture and channels it to the trees, and with this system in place, only three or four irrigations a year are necessary.

There is one alternating row of Fourwing Saltbrush and Skunkbrush Sumac, two inside rows of Rocky Mountain Junipers, and an outside row of Bois d'arc and Honey Locust trees in the shelter belt.

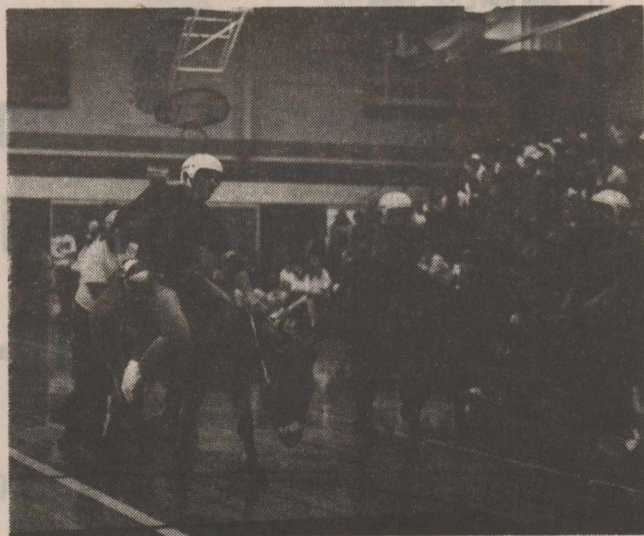

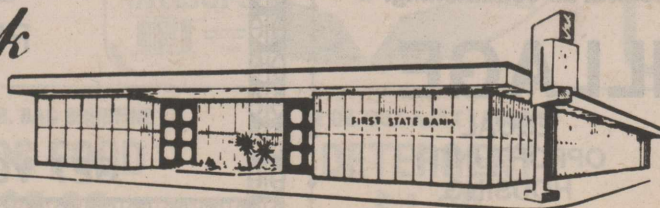

Parents Are Role Models

Children will pick up the subtle and not so subtle attitudes about food from their parents' behavior. If either parent is on a diet, all treats should not be removed from the house and forbidden to children.

An adult's need to reduce caloric intake should not influence a child's nutrient needs. If parents want their children to have healthful eating habits and follow a high carbohydrate, high protein diet, the best way to teach them

is for the parents to demonstrate the eating plan they want their children to have.

children will want to do the same. One of the most powerful teaching methods for children is learning by modeled behavior.

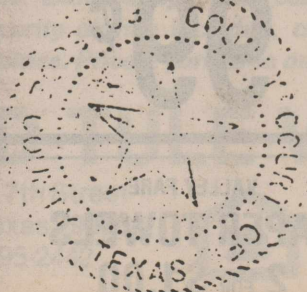

Record Sales, Lines Prompt 'Quick Pick' Feature Addition

"Lotto Texas players who don't have their own set of lucky numbers soon will be able to let Lottery computers select those six figures at random by the end of May—the anniversary of the first year of Texas Lottery operations," State Comptroller John Sharp announced.

"We haven't announced the so-called 'Quick Pick' feature until now to allow Lotto players a better chance of learning how the game is played," Sharp said. "But the long lines of players waiting to buy tickets during Wednesday's record-breaking sales day convinced us that the time for 'Quick Pick' has come."

Lotto sales in anticipation of the \$14 million jackpot on Wednesday, March 31, were \$9.8 million, the largest single day of sales since Lotto began on November 7. Sales volume grew throughout the day Wednesday, peaking at a rate of more than \$26,000 per minute from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m.

Lotto Texas is a computerized game in which players pick six numbers from one through fifty and pay \$1 for a

ticket on which those numbers are printed. The Lottery holds televised drawings at 9:59 p.m., central time, every Wednesday and Saturday to pick the six winning numbers. Players' winnings are determined by how many of the numbers they match and by the size of the jackpot.

"This 'first anniversary present' should make our retailers and many Lotto players very happy," Sharp said. "Of course, those players who want to select their own six numbers from one through fifty can continue to fill out their own Lotto play slips."

Over the next six weeks, the Lottery will:

- Write the software that will allow the computer to generate the random numbers;

- Train retailers on how to use the "Quick Pick" feature for their customers;

- Print and distribute new labels for the in-store Lotto terminals; and

- Develop an advertising campaign to educate Lotto players about the new feature.

Through the first five months of operations, Lotto ticket sales have totaled nearly \$300 million, averaging nearly \$7 million for every Wednesday and Saturday drawing.

"After just nine months of operation,

the Texas Lottery already has produced more money for the State Treasury than originally projected for the entire two-year budget period," Sharp said. "And Lotto Texas sales certainly have helped us reach that goal—six months ahead of schedule."

"The new 'Quick Pick' feature should make it ever easier for Lotto players to enjoy the fun and excitement of the Texas Lottery, helping the state Treasury at the same time."

Post Office Says Service Taken For Granted by Most Patrons

"United States Postal Service employees deliver mail from Bangor, Maine to Pago Pago, in American Samoa, all for the same universal price," Acting Postmaster Dan Longbine says. "And, we do it so well, we are taken for granted," he adds.

uniform rates. We have achieved a break-even status—that is, to make postal revenues fully cover postal costs—and we have done so without using a single penny of tax dollars for operating purposes, said Longbine.

"Our nation's letter carriers, unlike milkmen and doctors, still make house calls," said Longbine. "Many of the hundreds of thousands of letter carriers across the nation are long-term, dedicated employees who not only care about the job they do, but care about the welfare of the neighborhoods they serve."

Longbine added that the letter carrier represents just the tip of the iceberg. "Internally, we have gone from manual sortation to mechanization and now to automation," the acting postmaster explains. "We will continue to make changes to ensure our customers receive the highest level of quality service at every encounter with the Postal Service."

"Many of our employees work behind the scenes and at night to provide quality service," Longbine explains. "Our clerks and mail handlers perform the tasks of sortation and distribution to ensure your letter carrier has your mail to deliver."

"Our Postmaster General and Chief Executive Officer Marvin Runyon has guided our organization through a major restructuring," Longbine continues. "We have cut layers of management and eliminated bureaucracy, which allows us to make decisions more quickly."

"We understand what mail means to our customers and we believe it is important that we restore our accountability, credibility, and our competitiveness and make it a normal part of our business culture."

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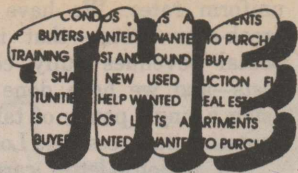
