

Caprock Cowboy Camp Meeting Set May 20-23

The second annual Caprock Cowboy Camp Meeting, sponsored by Ranchmen's Camp Meeting Association of the Southwest, will be held on the Johnnie Burson Ranch, located six miles east and 234 miles north of Silverton May 20-23.

Ron Hart of Tucson, Arizona will be the camp preacher, and Jeff Gore of Liberty Hill, Texas will be the song

The camp meeting is an interdenominational Christian camping experience for people of all ages. There are no hookups, but you are welcome to bring your bedroll, tent, TV, travel trailer or motor home. Meals are provided, but donations to help defray the cost of the camp meeting will be accepted.

Included on the schedule are worship services, bible studies, crafts classes and demonstrations, horseback trail ride, games for all ages, trail hikes, singing, campfire fellowship and the prayer tree.

Cowboy camp meetings are over a hundred years old in Texas and over 50 years old in New Mexico. In the later 1930s, the organizing committees decided that cooks should be hired, beef donated and cooked over an open fire, and tents provided for services. There would be arranged four preaching services each day plus a men's prayer meeting under a tree and a women's prayer meeting under a tent. It was not uncommon for there to be 700 to 1000 in attendance at these early camp meetings.

Ministers of many faiths came to preach and when people made their professions of faith, they were urged to go back to their ranches, attend the nearest churches and become active Christians.

In those early days, a manager was selected to be in charge. His job was to secure outstanding ministers to preach, ring the bell before each service, lead the opening worship services four times a day, and see that meals were ready on time. He also was responsible for all the equipment necessary to shelter and feed 1000 people for the meeting.

The cowboy camp meetings are conducted in much the same way today. They are still held on ranches under tents and meals are cooked over the open fire. There is no charge for these events but donations are accepted to help cover the operation costs.

Anyone may attend a camp meeting: you need not be a cowboy. It is a great opportunity to get away from the fast lane for a few days and to enjoy the country atmosphere and dynamic worship services without the distractions of city life.

The camp meetings are a gathering of

all kinds of people from all Christian faiths. Bring your children and youth to the meeting because there will be opportunities for worship, nature walks and hiking along the canyons for all ages. Come for one day or for all four. Wear your blue jeans and bring your Bibles. It will be an exciting experience you will never forget.

From Silverton, drive three miles southeast on Highway 86 to the junction of Highway 86 and Highway 256. Take Highway 256 east three and a half miles to a camp meeting sign at the entrance of a county dirt road. From here turn north for two and three-quarter miles and you will be at the entrance of the Burson Ranch. For information, contact Johnnie Burson, 847-2524



Area Financial Institutions Get Highest Ratings

Two area financial institutions improved their ratings during the final quarter of 1992, according to Bauer Financial Reports.

The report card on banks and thrifts also found that one institution saw its ranking drop while remaining strong. The remaining 13 institutions maintained ratings reported at the end of the third quarter.

Bluebonnet Savings Bank in Plainview moved up from a four-star rating to a five-star rating, the highest given. First State Bank, Tulia, moved up from a three-and-a-half star rating to a four-star rating. And Olton State Bank moved from a five-star rating to a four-star rating, which means it remains a bank with good capital.

In addition to Bluebonnet, six other banks received five-star ratings. Fivestar ratings are given to institutions with at least twice the capital required by regulators.

Other institutions receiving the highest rating include American State Bank, First National Bank of Floydada, First State Bank of Abernathy, First State Bank of Petersburg, First State Bank of Silverton and Kress National Bank

Joining First State Bank of Tulia and Olton State Bank in receiving four-star ratings were six other banks. Four-star ratings are given to institutions having capital significantly higher than regulatory requirements.

Other institutions receiving four-star ratings include First National Bank of Lockney, First National Bank of Hale Center, First National Bank of Plainview, First National Bank of Tulia, First State Bank of Happy and Hale County State Bank.

Bank America Texas maintained its three-star rating, which means the institution meets all current regulatory capital requirements but does not meet more stringent capital requirements for higher ratings.

Mrs. Welch died Sunday at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock following a lengthly illness.

She was born in Hamilton County June 15, 1898. When she was three months old, her parents, John and Jessie (Kitchens) Vaughan moved to Erick, Oklahoma, where they lived in a dugout. In the summer of 1905, the family visited Briscoe County, searching for a place to establish a new home. Mr. Vaughan moved his family in a covered wagon to a 640-acre farm nine miles east of Silverton.

In the fall of 1908, she attended a one-room school at Haylake, which her father helped organize. They went ice skating when the lakes froze in winter and played croquet and other games in the summer.

The former Miss Vaughan married Merida Lee Welch August 29, 1920, at the parsonage of the Methodist Church late one Sunday afternoon. The young couple had known one another for years because they had grown up attending school together. She was a homemaker and a farmer, and was honored in 1988 for having been a member of the Methodist Church in Silverton for 70

She and Merida sold their team of horses and mules, and bought a John Deere tractor in the spring of 1939.

He died May 3, 1947.

Mrs. Welch completed a new home for her family on the farm in 1951. Flowers and gardening always were a love of hers, and she raised a vegetable garden until she was in her eighties.

She was preceded in death by two sons, Clauda Burel Welch in 1979 and Lynn Warren Welch in 1992, and by a grandson, Walter Carl Welch in 1981.

Survivors include two sons, Carroll Welch of Kress and Ronald Welch of Tulia; two daughters, Wilma McElmurry of Taft, California and Othel Long of Lubbock; two brothers, Cecil Vaughan of Springdale, Arkansas and Hershal Vaughan of Hollis, Oklahoma; two sisters, Irene Vardell of Clovis, New Mexico and Gladys Brannon of Chillicothe; grandchildren; 18 great-grandchildren, and three great-great-grandchildren.

Grandsons were pallbearers.

Mrs. Hodges died at 2:45 p.m. Saturday at her residence. She was under hospice care.

The former Miss Annie Dewberry, she was born in Falls County, Texas. She was graduated from San Marcos State Normal School, and came from Marlin, Texas to Silverton in the fall of 1914 to teach. She came by train to Tulia and rode the mail car to the home of her sister in the Rock Creek community. During her second year of teaching, she met Herbert A. (Hub)

August 2, 1916, Miss Dewberry married Mr. Hodges at the First Baptist Church in Marlin. In a Model T Ford car they traveled to their new home in eastern Swisher County, which was located about three miles south of the old Mackenzie Battleground.

She taught in the Alexander, Beverly, Whitfield and San Jacinto rural schools.

She was a member of the First Baptist Church in Tulia.

Mr. Hodges died in 1963. A daughter, Phyllis Jefferson, died in 1944.

Survivors include a son, Lawrence Hodges of Racine, Wisconsin; a daughter, Mary Nell Brown of Tulia; a grandchild and two grandchildren.





And I thought cowboys never fall off the horse but I witnessed the opposite. One of the most experienced cowboys fell off his horse. Well, nobody is perfect and it was obviously not his luckiest day.

Then while on horseback I even helped to separate the cows and calfs. The smell of sweat, dust and burned skin introduced me to the daily hard work of a cowboy.

Save Dollars the Simple Way

Although we have had cool weather lately, the summer heat will be with us soon. This doesn't necessarily have to mean your energy bills will increase with the heat. Proper selection, installation and maintenance of your cooling system can save you money while improving the comfort in your home.

The simplest way to begin conserving energy is not to cool rooms which aren't being used. Some rooms or areas may need only a small amount of cooling. Another way to adjust the cooling in some rooms is by opening and closing registers. If you registers aren't adjustable, you might consider replacing them.

Proper ventilation of your house also can reduce the need for air conditioning. You can use windows, screened doors, other natural ventilation or you can use electric fans. Avoid ventilating your house when it is cooler inside than out; you need to keep

National Ag Survey Planned

Juannah Jennings of Silverton will be calling on several Briscoe County farmers and ranchers over the next few weeks asking them to take part in a major agricultural survey. During the survey, she will be working as an official enumerator collecting data.

Local farmers and ranchers are among the more than 125,000 farmers and ranchers selected by statistical sampling procedures to participate in the annual June Agricultural Survey conducted by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service. The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service in Austin, the local arm of the service, is handling the Texas portion of the survey.

"The information gathered will be used to make state, regional and national estimates of crop acreage, grain stocks, livestock inventories, and number of farms and land in farms," said Dennis Findley, state statistician.

Findley added that USDA and university economists, Extension agents, farm organizations, lenders, and others depend on the information. "In addition, federal and state agricultural officials base many of their decisions on the results of this survey," he said, "as well as farmers and ranchers who rely on these estimates to reach production, marketing, and investment decisions."

It is, therefore, important for Briscoe County farmers to participate in the survey to ensure that local agriculture is reflected accurately in the results. Most farmers selected for interviews already have been notified by mail.

"Responses to survey questionnaires are kept strictly confidential," Mrs. Jennings said. Data about an individual farm or ranch are used only in conjunction with reports from other producers. USDA will analyze the results and begin reporting the findings in the next few weeks.

Announcement of the 1993-crop Upland Cotton Premium and Discount shedule by USDA May 5 was slightly premature according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG).

Following the initial release of the loan schedule several mistakes were recognized by PCG and other industry officials. After calling these problems to the attention of USDA it was discovered that the wrong schedule had been released May 5. USDA officials say that growers need to be careful and check to make sure they are using the correct schedule that was released May 11.

"In order to make sure the correct premium and discount information is used, PCG is in the final stages of putting together a schedule of minimum loan rates for the various qualities of cotton," says Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President. "We are putting this together so that everyone will have the correct information to go by."

Problems that made the initial premium and discount schedule inaccurate were isolated in color grades 52 and 62. It seems a few of the grade 52's in Leaf grades 1-2 and all the Leaf grade 3's were valued more than their grade 51 counterparts. Color grade 62's also were valued higher than grade 61's in all leaf grades except 5 and 6 which were correct.

"If the loan values you are using have the grade 62's worth more than the grade 61's then you are using the wrong loan schedule," says Johnson. "If this is the case, please throw away the schedule you are using and get a copy of the corrected premium and discount schedule."

PCG encourages everyone to take a few minutes to determine if they have the correct premium and discount schedule.

DATE SET FOR 1993 SCOUT TRAINING WORKSHOP

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has announced the date of the 1993 High Plains Scout Training Workshop. The annual workshop will be held at the Ollie Liner Center in Plainview on June 1.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) the workshop has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture for up to five Continuing Education Credits (CEU's) for commercial, noncommercial and private pesticide applicators. There is no charge for the workshop and the public is welcome to attend.
