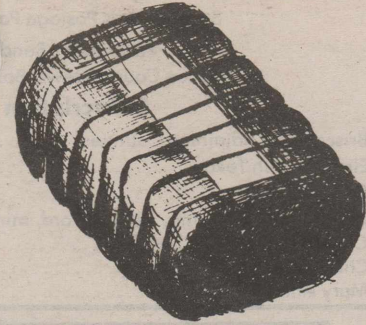
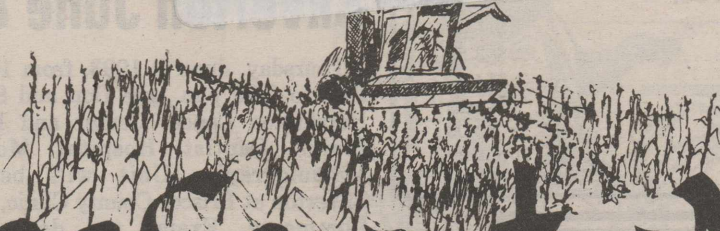

There will be a Deejay Dance at the showbarn beginning at 9:00 p.m.

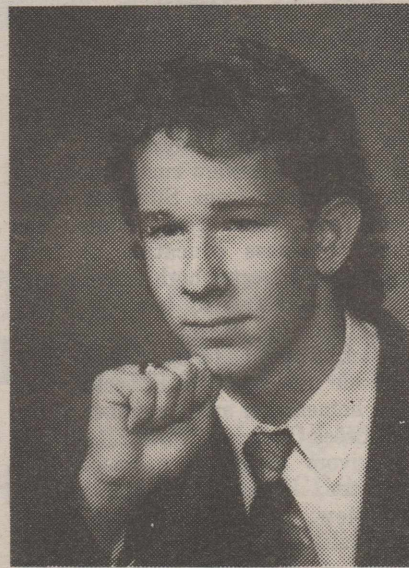
A Senior Roping will begin at 9:00 a.m. Sunday, June 13, and the Open Roping will begin at 1:00 p.m.

Water conservation and efficient use of irrigation water has always been an issue in production agriculture. Briscoe County is not immune to this issue. Especially as our groundwater continues to be depleted faster than it is restored and the profit margin remains tight for most crops.

There will be a program Wednesday morning, June 2, to address questions related to irrigated production in Briscoe County. It will be held at the county showbarn in Silverton and will begin at 9:00 a.m. and will conclude with the noon meal being sponsored by Zimmatic and Rhoderick Irrigation. All area producers are invited to attend.

The following topics will be covered during this meeting: Factors in Irrigation Efficiency, Leon New, Extension engineer; Surge Flow Irrigation, Rose Mary Seymour, Extension engineer; How to Pay for Center Pivots, Steve Amosson, Extension economist; Pesticides and Effect on Water Quality, Scott Strawn, Briscoe County Extension Agent; and Zimmatic and Rhoderick Irrigation, Center Pivot Systems.

Exams are done BY APPOINTMENT ONLY. For information or to schedule an appointment, call 1-800-377 HOPE (4673) or (806) 359-4673.

The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. This includes the X-ray, physical breast exam, and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age:

Age	
35 to 39	One baseline mammogram
40 to 49	A mammogram every 1 to 2 years
50 and over	Yearly mammograms

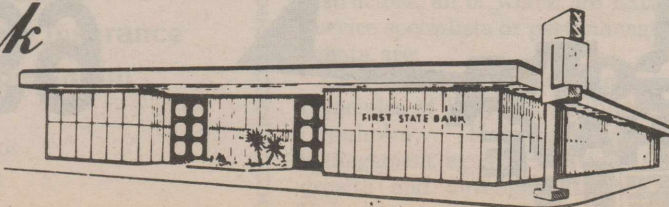

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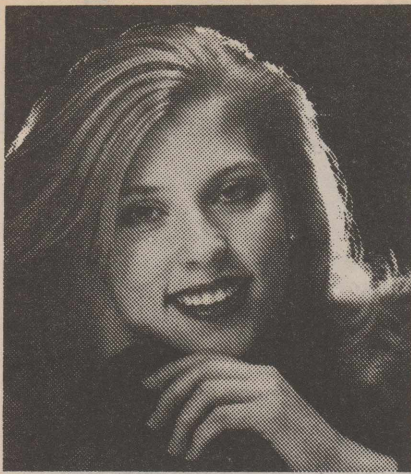

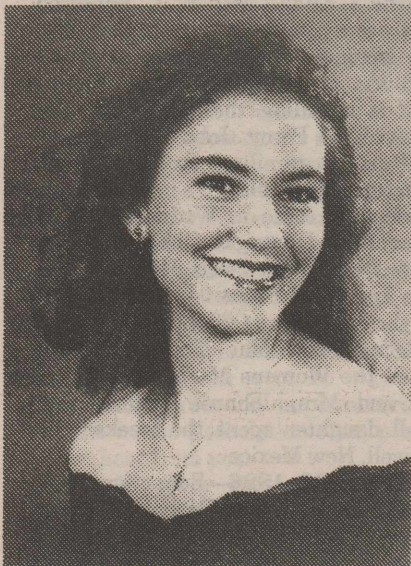

## Senate Passes Medical Reform

Lt. Governor Bob Bullock said a bill passed recently by the Texas Senate represented major progress toward reforming the state's malpractice law.

Senate Bill 1409 by Sen. Carl Parker "is an excellent bill that resulted from extraordinary effort by the Senator and those at the negotiating table," Bullock said.

"While this stops short of comprehensive malpractice reform, it shows major progress and Sen. Parker is to be commended," he said.

The bill, negotiated by the Texas Medical Association, Texas Hospital Association, Texas Trial Lawyers Association, the Texas Medical Liability Trust and others, attempts to expedite the resolution of malpractice cases.

The bill streamlines the discovery process, encourages the settlement of cases outside the courtroom, allows spouses access to the medical records of their deceased wife or husband and extends the existing cap on damages for medical negligence and other provisions of the Medical Liability and Insurance Improvement Act.

"This has been an issue that has needed attention for a long time," Bullock said. "I am pleased that we are

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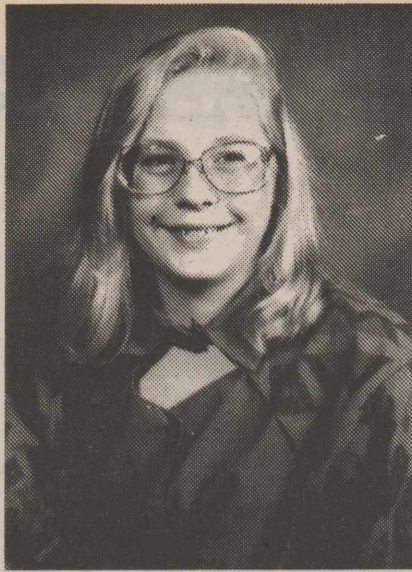

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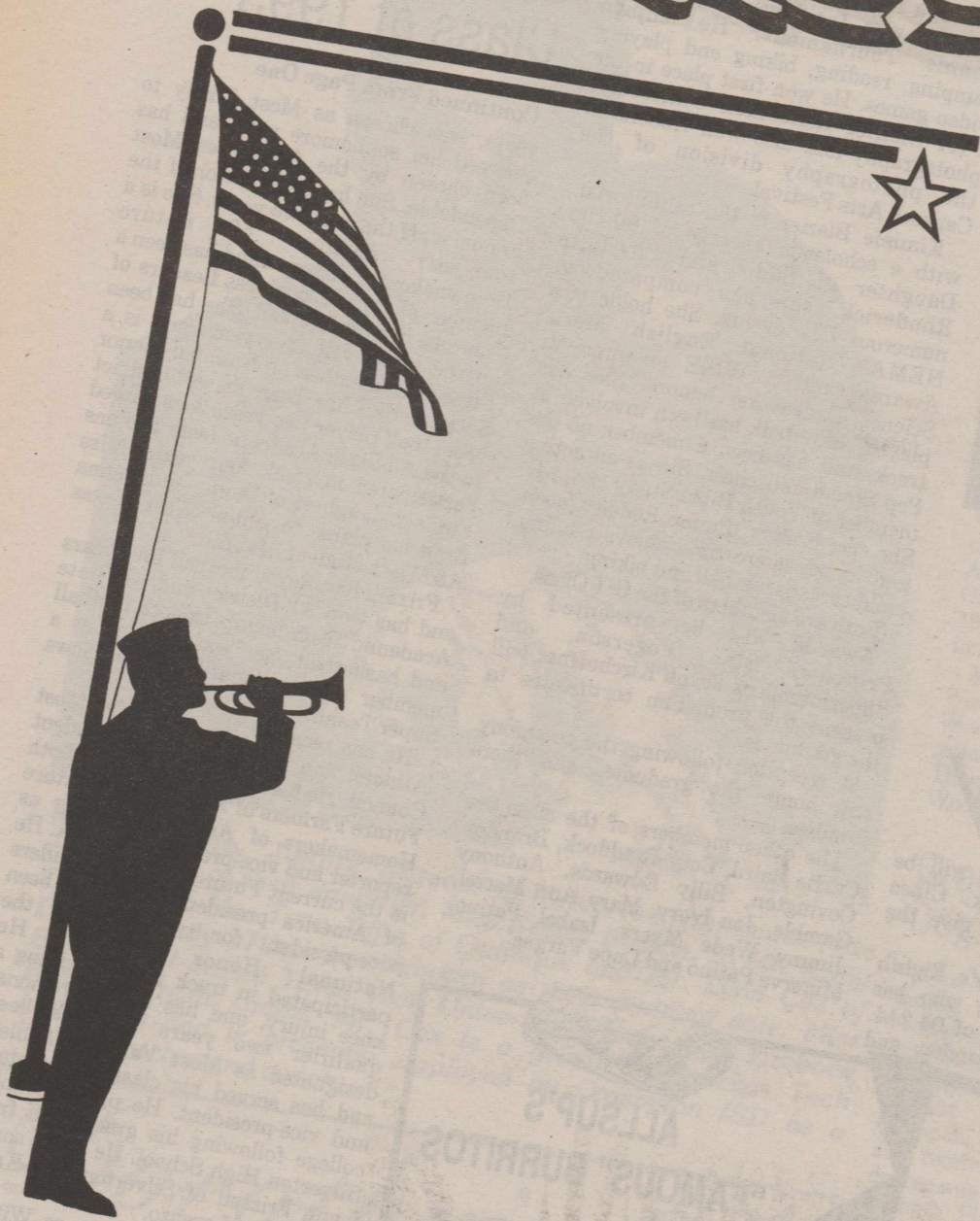

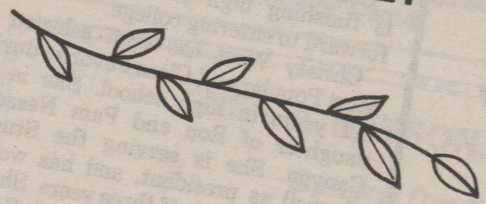

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## Crop Scouting Principles To Be Taught at Workshop

Training of scouts who survey crops to assess pest infestations in integrated pest management (IPM) programs across the area will be held June 1 at the Ollie Linder Agricultural Center, on South U. S. Hwy. 87 (business 87), in Plainview.

The workshop is open to summer scouts of private consultants and aerial applicators as well as farmers who scout their own fields. It is conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Training begins at 8:30 a.m. and ends at 4:30 p.m.

It has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture for five continuing education units (CEUs) toward recertification requirements for private, commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators.

This year's workshop will provide instruction on scouting cotton and grains, identification of plant disease and nutrient deficiency symptoms, use of herbicides and safe handling of pesticides, said Dr. James F. Leser, Extension Service entomologist at Lubbock.

IPM is a coordinated approach to management decisions based on pest infestation levels and economic thresholds. The goal of IPM is to effectively control weeds, insects and diseases and maximize net profit while creating minimal harm to the crop or environment.

Scouts examine fields in a systematic pattern at regular intervals each week. Producer treatments for pests are based on economic threat to the crop, presence of beneficial insects, which are enemies of the pests, and proper timing of pesticide applications for maximum returns with the lowest chemical input.

Topics for the workshop, and the instructors, all of whom are Extension Service specialists or pest management agents, are:

CEU training and instructions, Leser. Principles of IPM and sampling, Greg Cronholm, Hale-Swisher pest management agent, Plainview. Cotton growth and development, Dr. Kater Hake, agronomist and cotton specialist, Lubbock.

Thrips, fleahoppers and aphids, Tommy Doederlein, Dawson-Lynn Pest Management Agent, Lamesa. Bollworms, loopers and armyworms, Mark Logan, Scurry Pest Management Agent, Snyder. Beneficials, David Kostraun, Crosby County Pest Management Agent, Crosbyton.

Major diseases and symptoms, Dr. Harold Kaufman, plant pathologist, Lubbock. Plant nutrient deficiency symptoms, Dr. Michael Hickey, soil chemist, Lubbock. Herbicide injury and common weeds, Dr. Peter Dotray, weed scientist, Lubbock. Corn and sorghum growth and development, Dr. Brent Bean, agronomist, Amarillo.

Sorghum pests, Dr. W. Pat Morrison, entomologist, Lubbock. Corn pests, Brant Baugh, Bailey-Parmer Pest Management Agent, Farwell. Pesticide safety, Andy Williams, Castro-Lamb Pest Management Agent, Dimmitt.

## Use of Funds Up to Representative Payee

Representative payees are appointed by Social Security to manage the Social Security checks of beneficiaries who are unable to handle the funds themselves. To carry out these duties, the representative payee must remain aware of the beneficiary's current and future needs.

The representative payee's most important responsibility is to make sure the beneficiary's day-to-day needs are met. These day-to-day needs include food, clothing, shelter and personal expenses. Beneficiaries who have the ability to handle small amounts of spending money should have the necessary funds made available to them. After day-to-day needs are met, Social Security benefits may then be used for any special needs such as school, rehabilitation, medical expenses, or insurance premiums.

## FmHA Money is Available For Farm Ownership

Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) makes and guarantees farm ownership loans and provides technical management assistance to eligible applicants who will operate family-size farms. There is money available for both Direct and Guarantee land loans according to Swisher/Briscoe County Supervisor Ross W. James. There are two types of programs used under the

Farm Ownership program.

Insured loans are made directly from an FmHA revolving fund to the borrower. This program is especially good for beginning and socially disadvantaged applicants but is available to everyone who may qualify. The terms for this loan presently are 40 years and may qualify for repayment at a fixed rate of interest (presently 7 3/4%). This is a 100% loan on an appraised value with the applicant paying closing expenses.

Many times we participate in "piggyback" loans with other lenders loaning a portion of the money, or sellers carrying part of the loan, Mr. James said. The remainder is loaned by FmHA.

Mr. James said funding for this program had been low but appears that today there are funds available.

FmHA also makes farm ownership loans on a guaranteed basis. A possible 90% loan may be made on the loan with another lender. This gives the lender additional collateral in making the loan. The interest rate and terms will be agreed upon by the borrower and the lender. Mr. James said, "Normally the lenders are requiring 10% down and terms varying from 15 to 20 years." Each farm ownership loan is tailored to the borrower's needs. The lender or the FmHA County Supervisor helps the borrower analyze the situation, determine available resources and plan how these resources, plus the funds obtained by the loan, may be best used.

High Plains cotton producers have gotten off to a slow start in 1993 according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG).

PCG officials believe that many of the delays up to this point have been caused by generally dry conditions across the region. Scattered rainfall during the past week has also worked against some producers by keeping them out of the field for several days.

The combination of too dry and too wet makes it particularly difficult to get an accurate picture of the area crop's progress.

Planting is estimated at this time to be slightly less than 65 percent complete according to reports from County Extension agents, says Extension cotton specialist Kater Hake.

Hake adds that some of the stands he has seen shown signs of reduced vigor and some seedling disease. Many of these problems are a result of the young plants exhausting a great deal of their energy just getting out of the ground, leaving very few reserves to fight off disease or stress.

"Many of the stands I have looked at are in a precarious position right now," says Hake. "At this time any significant move away from warm, moderate temperatures could damage these seedlings and bring about the possibility of replanting."

Producers considering the option of replanting cotton should thoroughly evaluate the stand for seedling health and population. Examination of root systems will give an indication of the plant's ability to continue developing normally.

Hake notes that a population of two plants per foot of row, evenly spaced, maintains a better yield potential than cotton replanted in June. He encourages producers who consider replanting to keep this in mind as they

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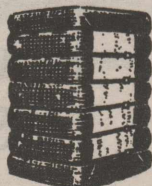
