### CSD Reappraisal Notices Mailed

by Carlye Fleming Chief Appraiser

Every taxpayer whose property values increased or decreased over \$10.00, owners of new property, and those who rendered less value than was assessed, have received reappraisal notices within the last few days. Notices were not mailed if your property value remained the same. A total of 1,786 notices were mailed.

Tax rates shown on the notices were the 1992 rates and included the County Education District because it was unknown at the time of mailing exactly what kind of school financing system would be adopted by the current legislature.

Several adjustments were made to the district's schedules to reflect market trends. Some residential properties increased in values but the majority of homes decreased in value or remained the same. The ag-use schedule, which is based on five-year production schedules, did not change for 1993. Total property values for each taxing unit decreased as follows:

City of Quitaque	down 3.4%
Mackenzie Authority	down 1 50%

The value losses are due mainly to changes in residential, commercial and utilities

Most vehicle owners dislike paying

taxes on their vehicles; however, personal vehicles total more than \$5,000,000 to the county with lesser amounts to the other entities.

The values discussed above are preliminary values. Every property owner has the opportunity to meet with the Briscoe Appraisal Review Board to protest the values set by the Appraisal District. The ARB is composed of three citizens who have the responsibility to make any changes they find necessary. The deadline for filing a Notice of Protest is July 6.

Many problems can be settled by the district staff before the ARB meeting which will be held July 21. If you have any question about your values notices, please call 823-2161 or come by the office in the basement of the county courthouse in Silverton.

Contact us if you feel there is a problem on your vehicle notices, so we can make any corrections necessary as soon as possible. Please fulfill your responsibilities; apply for exemptions, etc. before the deadlines, and provide us with the correct name, address and property description.




