Paperbacks that have been added to the shelves of the Silverton Public Library include "Century" by Fred Mustard Stewart. It began with the attempted kidnapping of a young Italian princess by an impoverished gardener. The abduction failed but the love between them was a link of a family chain that extended from the old world to the new. It led to a great American banking family to New York society. A Book-of-the-Month Club alternate selection.

"Master of the Game" by Sidney Sheldon is a tale of one hundred years of a family that climbs from obscurity to opulence — the story of Jamie McGregor—a young Scot; Kate Blackwell—his daughter who converts wealth into world-wide dominance—a legacy for her son whether he wants it or not; Tony Blackwell—with the talent to be a great painter and the misfortune to be Kate's son.

Two Charged In Dallas With Capital Murder

Two people have been charged with capital murder in connection with last week's shooting death of a former Quitaque man and his girlfriend in Dallas.

Charles R. (Bubba) Clardy, jr., 21, and Laticia Brown, 19, were shot late Thursday or early Friday (Christmas Eve) in their northeast Dallas apartment, police said. Clardy was a lifelong Quitaque resident before moving to Dallas two years ago, a family member said.

Their bodies were not discovered until late Sunday when Clardy's co-worker came to the apartment complex to find out why Clardy had not reported for work, police said.

The couple's 11-month-old daughter, Camesha LaShell Clardy, was missing when police arrived on the scene, according to a Dallas Police Department report.

Zeola Taylor of Quitaque, a relative of Clardy's, said police told Clardy's family that Camesha was taken by the two suspects, who surrendered to police on Monday.

Mrs. Taylor said the girl is in the custody of Children's Protective Services in Dallas.

Ms. Brown, a Dallas native, was several months' pregnant when she died, according to Mrs. Taylor and the police report. Ms. Brown and Clardy had planned to marry in March, when the baby was due, Mrs. Taylor said.

Charged in the deaths were Johnny Aaron Sanders, 22, and Conquista Desheon Ellison, 19, both of Dallas. They turned themselves in to the Dallas Police Department on Monday, the police report said. They could face a maximum sentence of death or life in

prison if convicted of capital murder. Mrs. Taylor said police told Clardy's family that the suspects probably knew Ms. Brown and Clardy because there was no sign of forced entry at the apartment.

Clardy, who was born in Lockney, grew up in Quitaque and was graduated from Valley High School in 1991. Mrs. Taylor said he moved to Dallas soon after his graduation.

"Bubba," as Clardy was known by friends and family, was remembered as a gifted athlete by one of his former coaches at Valley High School.

"He played football and was a good running back, but track was really his sport," said Rick Price, an assistant football coach at Valley from 1986 through 1990 and currently the head football coach at Nazareth. "In the spring of 1990, he went to the state track meet in the 200 (meters) and was on the sprint relay team that went to state.

"He was a good athlete, and a nice, quiet kid, too. He was a yes-sir, no-sir kind of kid. You really had to work on him to get him to say much else."

Clardy had been working at a restaurant across the street from his apartment, which was in the 8300 block of Park Lane, police said. Ms. Brown worked at a Pizza Hut nearby.

The murders were discovered when a neighbor and a co-worker looked through the apartment window and saw Clardy's body lying on the floor in a pool of blood, according to a story in *The Dallas Morning News*.

Ms. Brown's body was found in a closet, the story said.

Funeral services for Clardy, Ms. Brown and their unborn daughter were conducted in Quitaque Thursday, December 30. Officiating at the services was Rev. Bennie Anderson of Lubbock. Burial was in Rest Haven Cemetery.

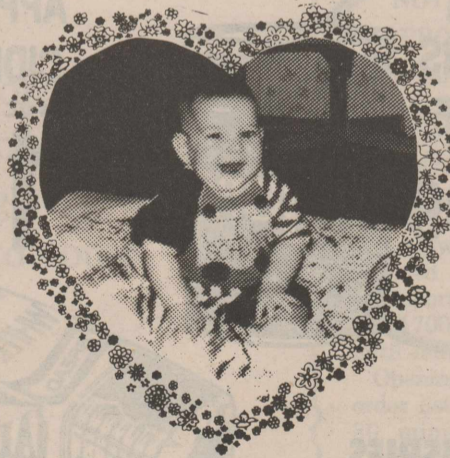

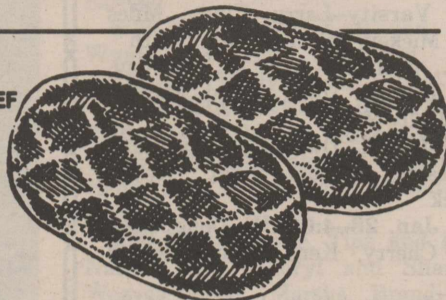

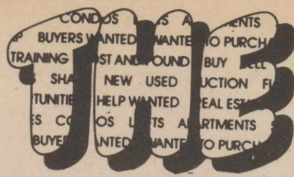


THE NEW YEAR SHOULD SIGNAL THE START OF A NEW LIFE

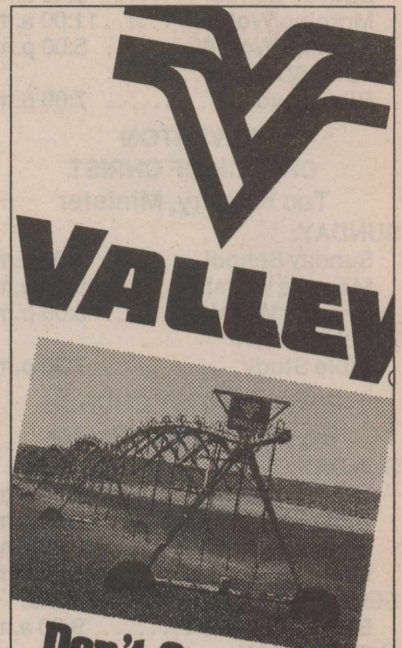
