

More about the picnic. It was customary to hold a rodeo when a crowd gathered. This was no exception. A certain Mr. John Blackwell was, in this case, the owner of the rodeo stock. His corral consisted of four corner posts and a gate, with a rope around them. The proceedings usually went on this wise: John would furnish a bronc, and pass the hat among the crowd for a donation, then challenge the cowboys to ride his horse. I had no idea then how close friends these two young men would become to me. They both were destined to become friends to all who knew them. Both were admired for their wit and humor. I think Buck lay awake trying to think up new words or figuring how to mispronounce common ones, and Rusty became known and loved for his lively wit. New Stamps Send a Little Love in a Variety of Ways

Hearts in Silverton and across America will be set aflutter by three new additions to the Love stamp series.

Romance is the mood captured by two of the stamps, which feature Victorianinspired visions of doves and roses.

A more contemporary rendition of the Love theme is featured on the third stamp. It offers customers the convenience of being the first-ever selfadhesive Love stamp.

All of the Love stamps can be used to create unique gifts. A sheet of the stamps can be framed to commemorate an important occasion, such as a wedding or an anniversary. A more personal gift can be created by framing the stamps along with a cherished momento, such as a wedding invitation or photograph.

The 29-cent self-adhesive Love stamp was issued January 27 in Loveland, Ohio just in time for Valentine's Day. The colorful stamp features an image of a sun shaped like a heart. It was designed by renowned artist Peter Good of Chester, Connecticut, who also designed the recently-issued contemporary Christmas stamps. Selfadhesive stamps are becoming a prominent part of the U. S. stamp program, as more and more customers discover the convenience assiciated with not having to tear and lick stamps.

The pair of regular Love Stamps consists of one with a 29-cent denomination, and a second valued at 52-cents, which is useful for mailing heavier items, such as wedding invitations.

The first day of issue for these two stamps was February 14. They went on sale nationwide on February 15. Niagara Falls, New York was selected as the issue city for these romantic, colorful additions to the Love stamp series, which began in 1973. The designer of the stamps, Lon Busch, was



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TO THE VOTERS OF BRISCOE COUNTY

I take this opportunity to ask for your vote for re-election as Briscoe County Judge in the March 8 Democratic Primary Election. I am making a concerted effort to try and contact each of you personally before election day to ask for your vote and answer any questions you may have about your county government or the office of County Judge.

Your county government, which includes the Commissioners Court and all other elected county officials, is charged by the Texas Constitution to provide certain services which are all clearly defined. It has been one of my goals to see that these services are provided to you at the most impartial and economical means possible. Also, I have worked diligently to see that a good working relationship exists between the Commissioners Court, of which the County Judge is presiding officer, and the other elected officials and offices. Not to say that disagreements have not existed, but rather that differences can be aired, argued and acted upon while still maintaining an effective and healthy working relationship. That is the very nature of County Government. Since becoming your County Judge, I point proudly to the fact that your county government has run smoothly and efficiently because of the determined efforts of many people, including myself, that strive to give you a county government that you can be proud of, that is not embroiled in controversy or discontent, and is fiscally sound.

Although the County Judge is the chief administrative officer in each county, and his other duties are many and varied, the County Judge does not singularly set the tax rate, the number of county employees or their salaries, nor can the County Judge or any elected official expend local funds without prior approval of the Commissioners Court. All of your Commissioners Court minutes are a matter of public record, all regular and special meetings are open meetings where you are welcome to attend, and the county budget and tax rate can only be adopted after a public hearing which has been properly posted and notice published. These are safeguards put in place so that citizens are afforded an opportunity to examine and evaluate for themselves the actions of their county government and elected officials.

The Plainview Symphony Orchestra will present its annual concert of chamber music in Harral Auditorium on Thursday, March 3, at 8:00 p.m.

Guest conductor for this fifth concert in the Symphony's fifteenth season is Boyce Wyrick, director of the Coronado High School, Lubbock orchestra and principal bass with the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra.

Special guest artist for the evening is Mark Pair, instructor of piano and professor of music at Wayland Baptist University. He will play with the Symphony in Mozart's Concerto No. 12.

Other works scheduled for performance are the Suite from the Ballet Sylvia by Delibes and the Petite Symphony for Winds by Gounod. The Symphony also will offer the St. Paul Suite by Gustav Holst, and Fanfare and Arrayment by M. L. Daniels.



Businesses Have April Deadline For Property Tax Renditions

State Comptroller John Sharp has reminded Texas businesses that they must render their property with county appraisal districts by a new deadline—April 14. Beginning in 1994, state law changed the rendition deadline from April 1 to April 14.

To "render" means to list the taxable property that businesses owned or managed as of January 1, 1994.

While state law requires business owners and operators to render any owner-including property farmers homeowners. and ranchers-may render his property with county appraisal districts.

"Homeowners who render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers," Sharp noted. "They are ensuring that the appraisal district has their correct address so they will receive notices of any actions that affect their property or tax bills."

If the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect address, the property owner is responsible for paying the taxes, plus the late payment penalties, Sharp added.

State law requires anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 to render with the local appraisal district. An exception is a business that receives the freeport exemption for managing cotton stored in a warehouse.

"For example, businesses must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment and other tangible personal property by filing this annual report," Sharp said. "Appraisal districts use the reports to set business property values. When a business owner doesn't render his or her property, the chief appraiser estimates the value."

Sharp also announced that property owners who had property damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year may file a special decreased value report that could lower their final tax bills.

Property owners may ask the chief appraiser for additional time-though April 30-if the owners can demonstrate good cause. The chief appraiser must grand owners of property regulated by the Public Utility Commission or the Railroad Commission an extension to April 30 to file the reports and may extend the deadline another 15 days if the owners request it in writing and show good cause.

Also, property owners can record their opinions of their property's value. By stating their opinion, property owners make sure that the appraisal district sends them a notice before placing a higher value on their property. This notice allows property owners the time to gather information to protest the appraisal if they believe the proposed value is too high.

If more than one appraisal district appraises a property, the property owner should render in each appraisal



The final piece of the puzzle is now in place, according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG). That puzzle is the 1994 Upland cotton program and the final piece was the announcement of an upland cotton advance deficiency payment rate of 6.45 cents per pound.

The advance payment rate is 50 percent of the 12.9 estimated deficiency payment rate announced February 18. The advance will be available to producers when they signup for the 1994 cotton program. The sign-up period was scheduled to begin March 1 and will run through April 29, 1994.

The announcement of the 50 percent advance payment rate is especially good news for producers, according to Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President.

"Having the advance payment set at 6.45 cents will make a big difference to producers this year," says Johnson. "Combined with last week's announcement of the 1994 program's common provisions, producers now have all the information they will need to finalize their 1994 operating plans."

Concerned producers were worried that USDA would set the advance

payment at the 30 percent minimum level. Most agree that if the payment had been set at the lower level they would have been forced to borrow more money up front to get them through the crop year.

Even though producers have been able to improve financial positions following the 1993 crop, money is still tight and the higher advance payment will help by lowering the amount they have to finance.

In making the announcement USDA estimated upland cotton advance payments will total \$340 million. ELS cotton producers can expect an advance payment of 8.48 cents per pound, with USDA estimating \$6 million in advance ELS deficiency payments.

In addition to the announcement of the advance payment rate, Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy also announced that upland cotton producers may plant designated crops such as oilseeds (soybeans, sunflowers, safflower, canola, rapeseed, mustard seed and flaxseed) and mung beans on up to 50 percent of the announced 11 percent reduction acreage program requirement. Producers, however, must agree to give up deficiency payments on an acre for acre basis for each acre (or portion thereof) of the reduced acres planted to the designated crops.

Be Prepared When You File For Benefits

As soon as you become disabled, you may file for disability benefits with your local Social Security office. Whether you choose to file by phone or by scheduling an appointment with a Social Security Representative, you should have on hand all the documentation and information that will be necessary for your claim to be processed efficiently. ¹/₂

When you file, bring the necessary documents. These include:

* the Social Security number and proof of age for each person applying for payment (this includes your spouse and children, if they are applying for benefits);

* names, addresses, and phone numbers of doctors, hospitals, clinics, and institutions that treated you and dates of treatment;

* a summary of your last 15 years of employment and the kind of work you did;

*a copy of your W-2 Form (Wage and Tax Statement), or if you are selfemployed, your Federal tax return for

the past year; and * dates of prior marriages if your spouse is applying.

Here are some other ways that you can help us to help you.

*Keep thorough records that document the symptoms of your illness and how it affects your daily activities.

 \star Ask your doctor or other health care professional to track the course of your symptoms including any evidence of hard-to-document symptoms like fatigue, depression, forgetfulness and dizziness

 \star If you are working, keep records of how your illness affects you on the job. If you lost your job because of your illness, make notes that describe what it is about your condition that forced you to stop working.

 \star Give us copies of all these records when you file.

Do not delay filing for benefits just because you do not have all the information you need. Your local Social Security office will help you.

The 'Social' Part of Social Security

Many people mistakenly try to compare Social Security to private pensions or investment plans. Although there are similarities, the differences are more important . . . and more revealing about the true nature of Social Security.

The key difference is summed up in the word "social". It was paired with the word "security" for a reason: social objectives are a key element of the Social Security program. Such objectives are generally not a part of any kind of private investment system.

One of the primary social objectives of Social Security is to raise the standard of living for lower income workers. Social Security planners accomplished this through a benefit computation formula that is weighted in favor of workers with low wages who have less opportunity to save for their retirement during their working years. For example, low-paid workers could conceivably get a Social Security benefit that replaces up to 90 percent of their preretirement earnings. Highly paid workers receive rates of return that are considerably less. The average is about 42 percent.

Another of Social Security's social objectives is to provide greater financial protection to families than is generally available through private retirement systems. Please keep these points in mind the next time you try to assess the value of Social Security in terms of other pension or retirement plans.



USDA announced the final components of the 1994 Acreage Reduction Program (ARP) Thursday beginning with a sign-up period from March 1 through April 29. According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers the information will help farmers across the High Plains finalize plans for the 1994 crop.

In addition to the sign-up period, several other provisions also were *********** THURSDAY, MARCH 3, 1994

announced. One of the most important was the setting of an estimated 1994 upland cotton deficiency payment of 12.9 cents per pound.

Unfortunately, producers were left in the dark concerning the percentage of the estimated payment rate that will be available at program sign-up. The estimated payment rate for 1994 is 10 cents below 1994's maximum possible payment rate of 22.9 cents.

According to PCG officials, the 1990 Farm Bill stipulates that, if the Secretary of Agriculture determines a deficiency payment is likely to be made, an advance payment for upland cotton producers will be available at program sign-up.

The 1990 Farm Bill also sets parameters for the advance payment at not less than 30 percent or more than 50 percent of the estimated payment rate. This means upland cotton producers can expect an advance payment somewhere between 3.87 and 6.45 cents per pound at sign-up.

"The announcement of the sign-up period and the estimated upland cotton deficiency payment means producers can finish some of the preliminary work that needs to be done to set up financing and finish land preparations for the coming year," says Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President.

Johnson notes that much of the information needed to prepare for 1994 is now available.

In addition to those already discussed, the following provisions also were announced:

50/85/92 Provisions-Upland cotton producers that report at least 50 percent of their Maximum Permitted Acreage (MPA) planted to the crop may devote acreage in excess of 15 percent of the MPA to Conserving Use (CU) for payment and be eligible for deficiency payments if the sum of the acreage does not exceed the MPA.

50/85 Exceptions-Producers that report at least 50 percent of the MPA as planted to the crop shall be eligible for deficiency payments on any designated acreage above eight percent of the MPA that was: (1) planted to an IOC (industrial and experimental crop), or; (2) if the rice or upland cotton crop failed or was prevented from being planted and the acreage was subsequently devoted to CU for payment.

ACR/CU History Requirement-Land may be designated as ACR or CU for payment if all other eligibility requirements are met and the land was planted, prevented from being planted, or designated as ACR or CU for payment in either: one out of the last five previous years; or any year between 1985 and 1993.

Qualifying Acres-If only CU for payment is designated to a crop 15 percent of the MPA is required as qualifying acres. If both CU for payment and an exception to the 50/85 provisions applies a total of 15 percent of the MPA is required as qualifying acres.


