Joel Morris brought his wife and daughters here last week to spend their spring break vacation and to see where he lived when he was young. During my visit with Joel, he reminded me that I was the one who started him eating cheeseburgers, but time had erased this from my memory. He said when he returned home that day his mother asked him what he had to eat at Ken's house, and he told her "cheeseburgers and French fries." Her comment was, "You don't even like cheese." "I do now," he told her

You will remember that Joel is the eldest son of Gene and Doris Morris, who lived here and operated Morris Pharmacy many years ago. They moved to Seabrook, near Houston, when they left here. Joel and his brother, Tim, still live in the Houston area. Tim was so young when they left that I still think of him as the little kid that tried to eat the soap everytime he took a bath.

Gene and Doris have "retired" to Fredericksburg. Joel says his dad laughs and says that he doesn't understand retirement. He got rid of the drug stores and started working seven days a week in their store, "Sweet Annie," named for Joel's eldest daughter. They sell antiques, collectibles, dried wildflowers, etc. in Fredericksburg where they have lived for about a year and a half.

The store is on the highway going through town, north (I think) of the Nimitz Museum. Joel assures me that Gene and Doris would be very happy to see any of their friends from here when they happen to be in that area of Texas.

While Joel and Sherry were here, they stayed at Quitaque Quail Lodge, which they learned about from a magazine article they found in Houston.

Joel said he would move back here in a heartbeat if he could make a living here. He still likes the laid-back country life. He works at a motorcycle shop, and his wife also is employed. The lack of good jobs is our number one problem in this area.

We were talking with Mr. Kirchoffner the other day, and he told us that the school's enrollment is up about 30 over what it had been, and that he knew of at least one family that he thinks is planning to move here soon.

We've got houses available of almost any size!

We've got an excellent school system, good churches, lots of good people and a relaxed country atmosphere.

I'll admit that it's hard to make a living here—we couldn't do it without our out-of-town printing customers—but I wouldn't trade living here for anywhere else. I like to visit the far-flung places, but I surely do like to

Silverton Firemen's Spring Ball,Steak Supper Sat., April 9, 1994 KAIROS Walk #1 for Clements Unit, Texas Department of Corrections, Amarillo, was determined to be a complete success. The forty-two residents who attended the entire event testified that this was the most awesome experience of their lives. There were seven thousand dozen cookies consumed by the population of the prison, AGAPE gifts from all over the Panhandle. Home-cooked meals were provided by the women on the team twice each day, plus fresh fruit, lemonade, coffee and iced water vessels kept full 12 hours a day.

Comments were heard like: "I didn't know anyone cared anymore," "I haven't even had a letter in 13 years," "I have been on Death Row 23 years," "I don't have any family anymore," "ME loved by God—look a seven-year-old child wrote that he and his sister are praying for me," "Look here, this lady wrote that her father had been a felon and never got a chance to know God could forgive his sins," "ME hug another man—why they'd call me Gay and now look at me hugging this ape."

Joe Luckenbach was adopted by several of the younger residents to become their "father." Of the 56 residents involved, all said it was the most wonderful experience of their lives. Several accepted Christ for the first time, many re-dedicated their lives. All persons involved agree that the help from all over the United States was indescribable: prayer, posters, cookies, pies, cakes, equipment, training aids, letters. "Who ever heard of a kid writing an inmate like me a letter and saying he loved me. I ain't heard from my own kids in three years!"





Facts on Fat

The following information was provided to me by the American Cancer Society. I hope it will help you to better understand fat and how it affects your diet. If you would like further information about this subject or others, please feel free to come by the Briscoe County Extension Office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

*Studies indicate that high-fat consumption could play a role in cancers of the colon, rectum, prostate and breast. Fat might have an initiating effect on some cancers and a promoting effect on others. Researchers have not pinned down the roles of different kinds of fat (e.g., saturated, monounsaturated, polyunsaturated, and cholesterol), but total fat intake seems to be the most important factor.

*High-fat diets are likely to be high-calorie diets. Fat-loaded calories most likely will mean a weight gain, especially if a person is not getting much exercise. Obesity, defined as being 40% or more overweight, could increase the risk of colon, breast and uterine cancers.

*Reducing fat intake means eating fewer high-fat foods. Many of these, such as dairy products, meat, nuts and seeds, contain vital nutrients for good health and need not be avoided completely. Fats carry fat-soluble

vitamins A, D and E; fatty deposits serve as reserves of energy and protectors of vital organs.

*Fat should account for only 30% or less of daily calories. For a person consuming approximately 2,000 calories a day, 40% of them fat, reducing intake to 30% fat would involve only 200 calories or 22 grams of fat, the same amount contained in one tablespoon of butter or one tablespoon of mayonnaise.

*Reduce fat intake by choosing lean meats, trimming away all visible fat, and serving 2-3 ounce portions.

*Use less butter, margarine and oils. Instead, use more herbs and spices to flavor meats and vegetables.

*Cook foods by steaming, poaching, broiling, microwaving, baking or stir-frying them. Use vegetable cooking sprays instead of frying in fat. Avoid cooking in fatty sauces and gravies.

*Rich desserts can be the largest contributors of fat in diets. Choose lowfat alternatives such as fruit or frozen yogurt.

Social Security Benefits May Be Retroactive

Did you pass the "age 65 milestone" without retiring, and now, a few months later, you've changed your mind? If so, that's not unusual. Sometimes life's circumstances cause people to change their plans. Take for example this conversation I had recently with a member of the community: "When I had my 65th birthday five months ago, I wasn't ready to quit working. I signed up for Medicare, but I didn't file for benefits. Now I've changed my mind. I have an opportunity to do some traveling with friends and I would like to retire and collect Social Security. Since I was eligible to retire five months ago, can I file now and collect benefits for those months I missed?"

Yes. I told him that it's possible to collect up to six months of Social retirement Security retroactively as long as it doesn't permanently reduce his benefits. After reviewing this man's record, we were able to give him four months of retroactive benefits. Here's now we did it: He had already earned \$15,000. Social Security rules say we have to withhold \$1 from his benefits for every \$3 he earns over \$11,160. So we had to withhold \$1,280 from his 1994 Social Security checks. (\$15,000 minus *11,160 = \$3,840 divided by 3 = \$1,280.) His regular monthly Social Security check was \$846. We held back his first check and \$434 from his second check (\$846 plus \$434 = \$1,280). That means we were able to pay him one partial retroactive check and three full retroactive checks for the five-month period when he could have been receiving benefits but was not.

While this man worked beyond his 65th birthday, many people want to retire as soon as they reach 65. We encourage them to come into the office well before their birthday. Some claimants are surprised to learn that they may be able to receive a partial check before they turn 65.

The law says her benefit is permanently reduced only if she received a full benefit before her 65th birthday. Because she is due only a partial Social Security check before age 65, her benefit is unreduced at age 65. Therefore, her payment in June is the full \$1,029 rate. So, the rules worked to Rita's advantage and she was able to get an extra \$500 in Social Security benefits.

As you can see, the rules are complicated. To find out if the rules will mean more money for you, check with Social Security well before your 65th birthday.

Antique shopping, lunch at Lakeridge Country Club and a tour and tasting of Llano Estacado Winery will be the highlights of this tour.


