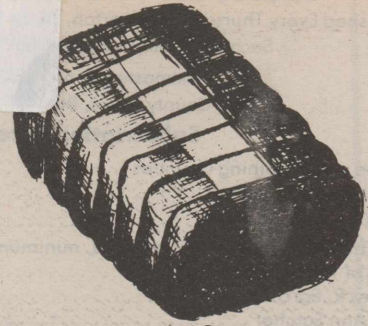

## Homecoming, Rodeo, Parade To Highlight Birthday Celebration

The celebration of Briscoe County's 102nd birthday began with the County Team Roping at 7:00 p.m. Wednesday, and will continue through Saturday, with a great many activities planned during this time. Anyone who lived in the county now or in the past was eligible to enter the County Roping.

Everything is in readiness for the bi-annual Silverton School Homecoming which will take place the weekend of August 12-13.

Various class reunions are planned Friday night, and the general homecoming meeting will be Saturday at the school. Registration begins at 9:00 a.m., and a catered brunch will be served in the school cafeteria from 10:30 until 11:30 a.m. Charge for the brunch will be \$5.00 per person.

The homecoming program, which will feature a musical presentation by the 3-M Company from Motley County, begins at 12:00 noon in the auditorium.

The homecoming is held during the annual Briscoe County Birthday Celebration, and former students will be treated to rodeos, dances, a parade and barbecue during the two-day homecoming.

Rodeo entries are due August 8, and must be called in to (806) 995-4416. Non-TCRA members must have their entry fees paid in cash one hour prior to the beginning of the show.

Entry for rough stock will be from 10:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon, and entries in the timed events will be taken from 12:00 noon until 6:00 p.m.

Stock will be furnished by Maverick

Rodeo Company of Tulia, and the rodeo is being sponsored by Briscoe County Activities Association. The events begin on Friday and Saturday nights at 8:00 at Wood Memorial Arena in Silverton.

Events and fees include Bareback Bronc Riding, Bull Riding, Ladies Barrel Racing, Calf Roping, Saddle Bronc Riding and Steer Wrestling, \$60.00 per entry; Open Team Roping (enter only twice) and Steer Roping, \$100.00 per entry. A purse of \$125.00 will be added to the above events.

There also will be Novice Saddle Bronc Riding and Novice Bareback Riding, with entry fees of \$30.00, and a Kids Calf Scramble that has no entry fee.

Rodeo admission will be \$5.00 for adults and \$3.00 for children 6-12. There is no admission for children under six.

At the Saturday night performance, there will be drawings for a handmade saddle, quilt, spurs, lotto tickets and a 'night on the town'.

There will be dances Friday and Saturday nights at the showbarn, with music by the Blue Denim Band. Dancing will continue from 9:00 p.m. until 1:00 a.m.

Saturday will be the BIG day in Silverton, when booths selling arts and crafts, various foods, toys, games, etc. will be set up around the courthouse square. A band will play underneath the shelter from 1:00 until 3:00 p.m., and there will be a parade through

## Ashel and Mildred McDaniel Are Pioneers of the Day

Ashel and Mildred McDaniel have been chosen as the Pioneers of the Day and will be honored at the Briscoe County Birthday Celebration Saturday. They will be riding in the parade on a special float prepared by members of L. O. A. Study Club. They were selected for this honor by the Briscoe County Historical Committee.

Ashel Cross McDaniel was born January 8, 1914, in the Rock Creek community of Briscoe County. He was born and reared in the family home that once stood near where the home of Billie and Lucy McDaniel is now located. He attended the Rock Creek school and was graduated from Silverton High School with the Class of 1931.

After finishing school, he farmed and worked for wages until July 1935 when he got a contract to carry the mail from Quitaque to Silverton.

During that same month, he met his future bride, Mildred Lucille Martin.

During their courtship they went to movies for 20c each, went to the drug store and got "curb service" ice cream for 5c a dip. They were married November 16, 1935 at the Briscoe County Courthouse by the judge, W. W. Martin (no relation to the bride).

In 1939, they made their home in the Rock Creek community, and continue to reside there today. They lived in the Missouri Ozarks for part of their married life, but most has been spent right here.

Mr. McDaniel was employed at Luke Thompson's service station, and on April 1, 1963 he purchased the station and operated it for a number of years. He continues to raise crops and cattle and now is employed by Myers-Long Funeral Directors.

Mildred Martin was born February 17, 1919 at Flomot in Motley County.

## Silverton's School Ranks High in State

Silverton Independent School District has been recognized as one of the highest-performing schools in the state, this rating coming about as a result of high student scores on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TASS). The high rating is due to Silverton's outstanding faculty and administration and their innovative school policies. Scholarship is rewarded in the school system, making students eager to excel.

The Texas Education Agency reports an increase in the number of high-performing schools and a decline in the number of low-performing schools.

Other Panhandle-area school districts that received recognized ratings from TEA include Follett, Nazareth, Sundown, Texhoma and White Deer.

Continuing poor student performance has kept the Lakeview ISD in Hall County on the TEA "accredited warned" list for the second consecutive year. The report shows that Lakeview, with about 90 students, is one of only three districts in the state placed on warned status.

Lakeview's new school superintendent says that 95 percent of the school's students are economically disadvantaged and that about 90 percent have limited English proficiency.


The Education Commissioner has the authority to temporarily replace school board members and administrators with a management team of his choosing if a school continues to be low performing.



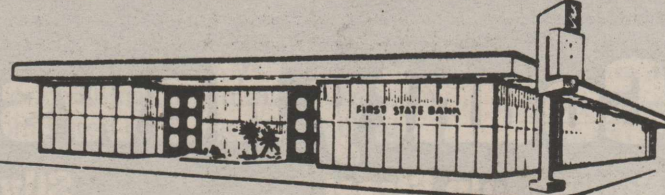

## School's Free Lunch Policy is Defined

The Silverton School serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for 75c and breakfast for 35c. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40c for lunch and 30c for breakfast.

To get free or reduced-price meals for your children, you must complete an application and return it to the school. An application that is not complete cannot be approved.

### HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member.

If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature.

If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Frank Kirchoffner, 823-2476, Box 608, Silverton, TX 79257.

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250.

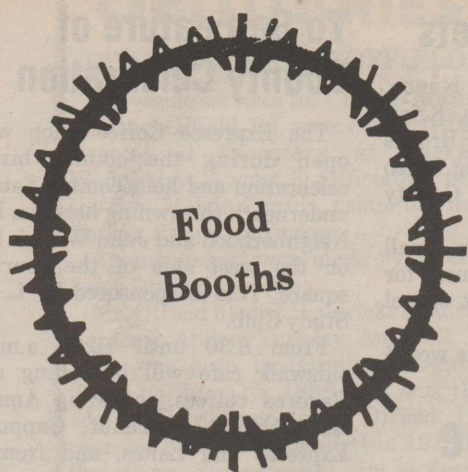

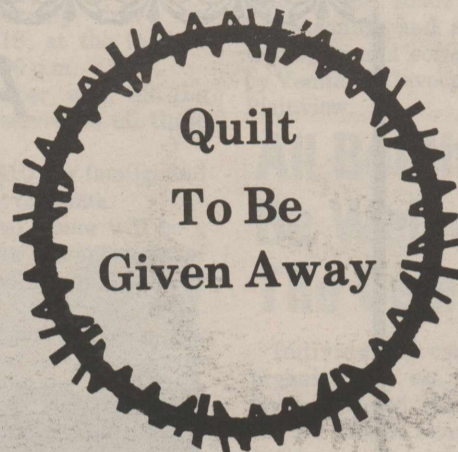

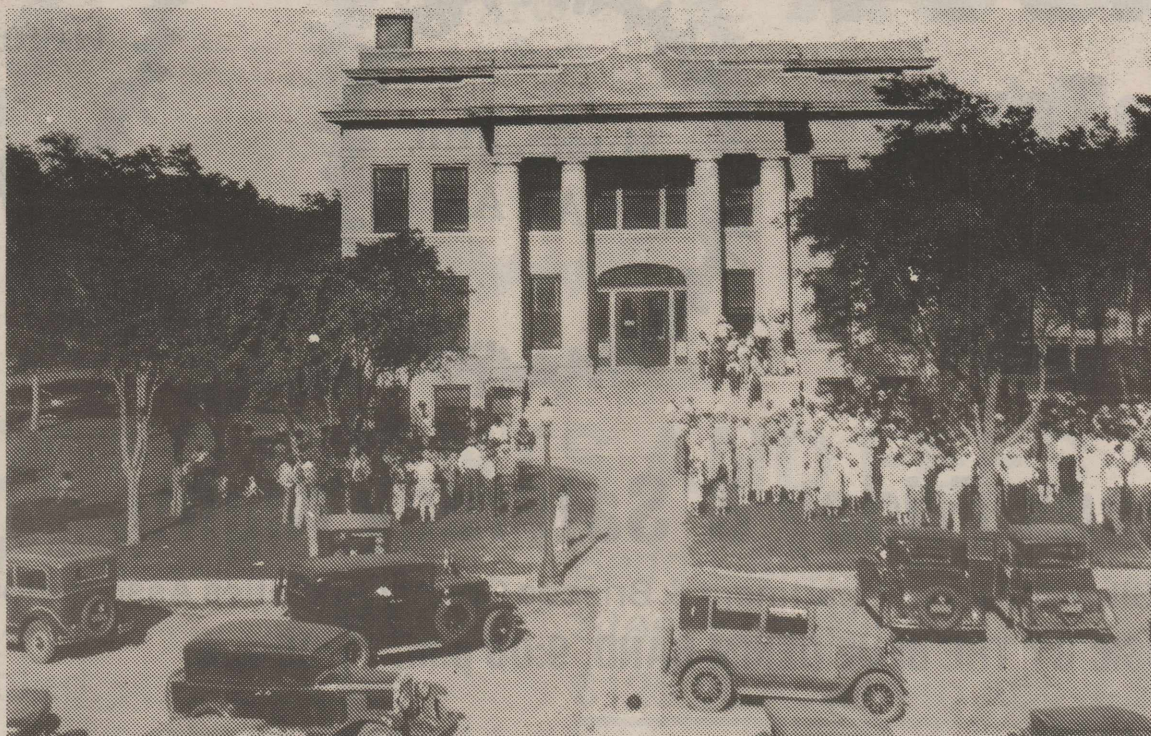
Instructor for the course is Donna Womble, RN, and director of the vocational nursing program at South Plains College in Plainview.

## Fire Safety Tips For Back-To-School Days

School days, school days, good ol' fire safety rule days.

As children head back to school, it's a good time for parents and teachers to review fire safety rules. The Texas Commission on Fire Protection offers these tips as the season changes to fall:

Be sure that children are supervised after school. Fire departments report that the number of false alarms and fires caused by children increase in the afternoon, after school is dismissed. Remind older children who stay alone after school that most 9-1-1 and other emergency number phone calls can be traced to the phone where the call was made.

Encourage your local school to conduct its first fire exit drill during the first two weeks of school. Teachers should review exit procedures on the first class day.

Begin testing your smoke alarm each month. Check the type of batteries used by your smoke alarm, and buy a supply of that type. Replace the batteries if you have not changed the batteries in the past year or if you cannot remember when the batteries were changed last.

Prepare now for cooler weather. Have a qualified technician check your heating equipment before you need to turn it on. Have your chimney cleaned now.

Take care of "fall cleaning" before cold weather closes in. Clearing dried plants, dead limbs and other rubbish from outside will improve the fire safety of your home. Clean old rags, unused paint and cleaners and other flammable materials from the garage and workshop; take these hazardous materials to an approved disposal facility.

Help high school students plan now for a safe homecoming bonfire. Encourage students to meet with the local fire department before planning the bonfire. Some cities have specific regulations on outdoor fires, so students should plan early to avoid disappointment. Local fire fighters also can help students supervise the event.

Write to the Texas Commission on Fire Protection for more information on preventing fires. Teachers can have

students write to Fire Prevention Education, Texas Commission on Fire Protection, P. O. Box 2286, Austin, Texas 78768-2286.

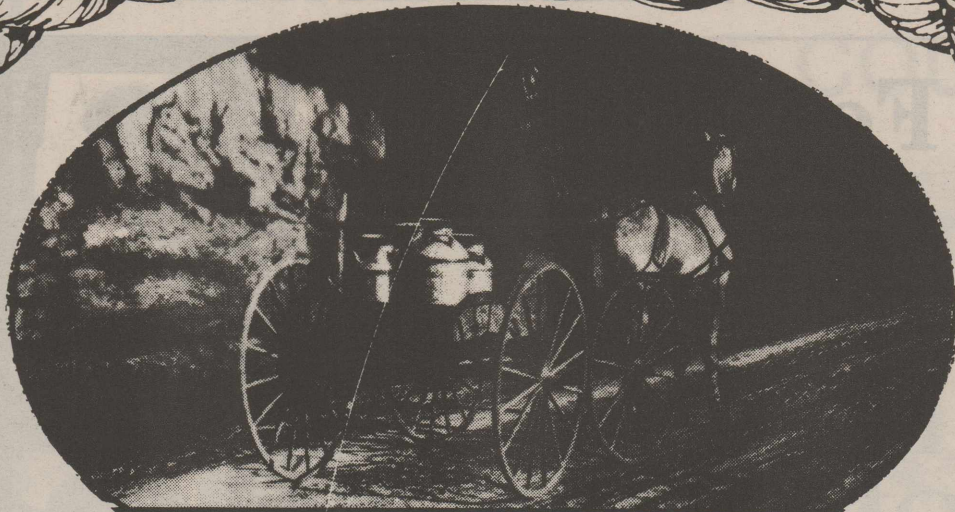

## Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor and Briscoe County Residents:

Once again our property rights are under attack. The U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service has proposed to designate 33 counties in Central Texas as protected habitat for the Golden Cheeked Warbler, a small bird which uses mature Juniper bark for nesting. This designation would eliminate all brush control work in the designated area. All construction or development of any kind would require a permit from the Fish & Wildlife Service. This designation would be tantamount to the Spotted Owl habitat in the Pacific Northwest.

The Endangered Species Act has become a means for the government to obtain control of private land. As a government employee I can assure you that I have been asked to search for endangered species in this area. Since every area in America has some type of endangered species, it is only a matter of time before this area will also be the target of environmental groups.

The Endangered Species Act is up for renewal in 1995. I urge you to contact your congressman and ask that provisions for the protection of private property to be added to this law.

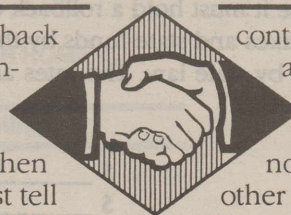

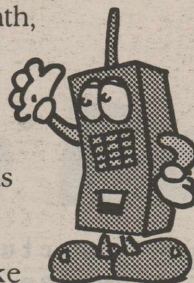

### Briscoe County Celebration

Happy Birthday, Briscoe County! it's your 102nd. To celebrate this event, there will be many activities going on this weekend, including class reunions, parade, barbecue and even a rodeo. Make sure you get out this Saturday afternoon and come by the courthouse square. There will be a variety of things to do and see, including music by Caprock Jamboree and friends, food booths, arts and crafts, and games.

In celebrating our county's birthday, we are also celebrating its history. Test your knowledge to see how much you know about Briscoe County history.

Briscoe County was named in honor of Andrew Briscoe, who helped bring about the independence of Texas from Mexico. The territory of Briscoe County was one of the last strongholds of the Indian tribes. Settlement of the county was delayed because of its

inaccessibility and Indian danger. The Land Act of 1887 opened the area to colonization by allowing settlers to take up to three sections of ranch land or one section of farm land on liberal terms with 40 years to pay at 5% interest. Surveying began in 1890, with settlers arriving almost daily. Briscoe County was organized March 15, 1892.

The rich history of our county is one of our biggest marketing tools for attracting tourists to our area. Tourists aren't just the people who drive through town that we do not know. They are friends and relatives who come to visit us. When they leave after a visit, they go back and tell their friends about their trip. Their friends then become interested in coming to visit and that gets the tourism industry rolling.

Don't be afraid to share the secret of Briscoe County and its history. I'm sure there are people like me who will find it extremely interesting!

### Volunteer Firemen Attend A&M School

Tom Justice and Doug Bradford, volunteer firemen of the Silverton Volunteer Fire Department, attended the 64th Annual Texas Firemen's Training School July 24-29. The school, attended by nearly 2,000 students representing about 750 cities from more than 25 states, was held on the Texas A&M University campus.

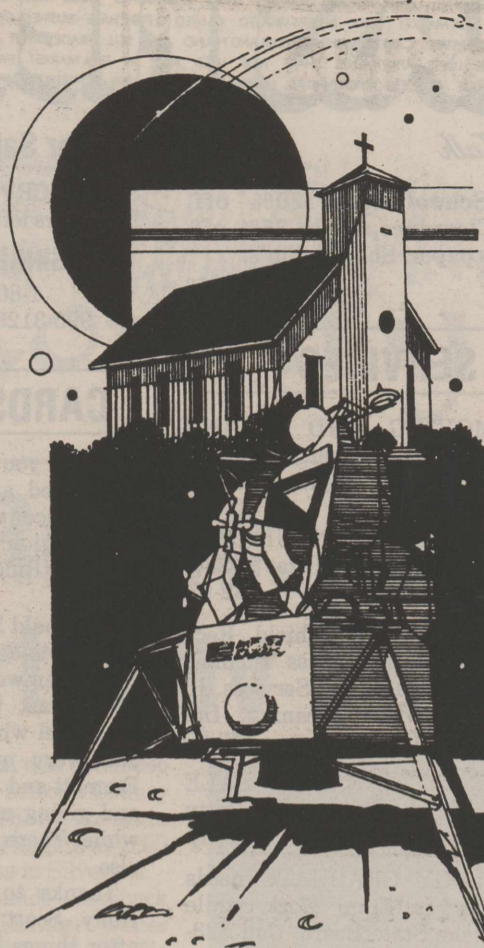

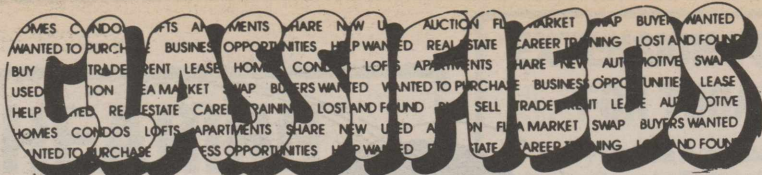

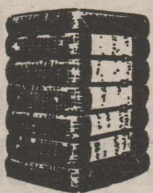
