Please mark your calendar to reflect the change to Tuesday, October 17. More details will follow.

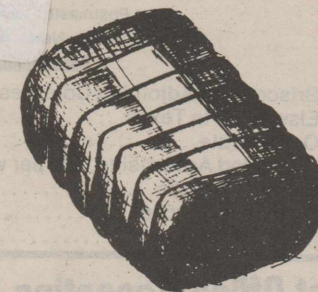

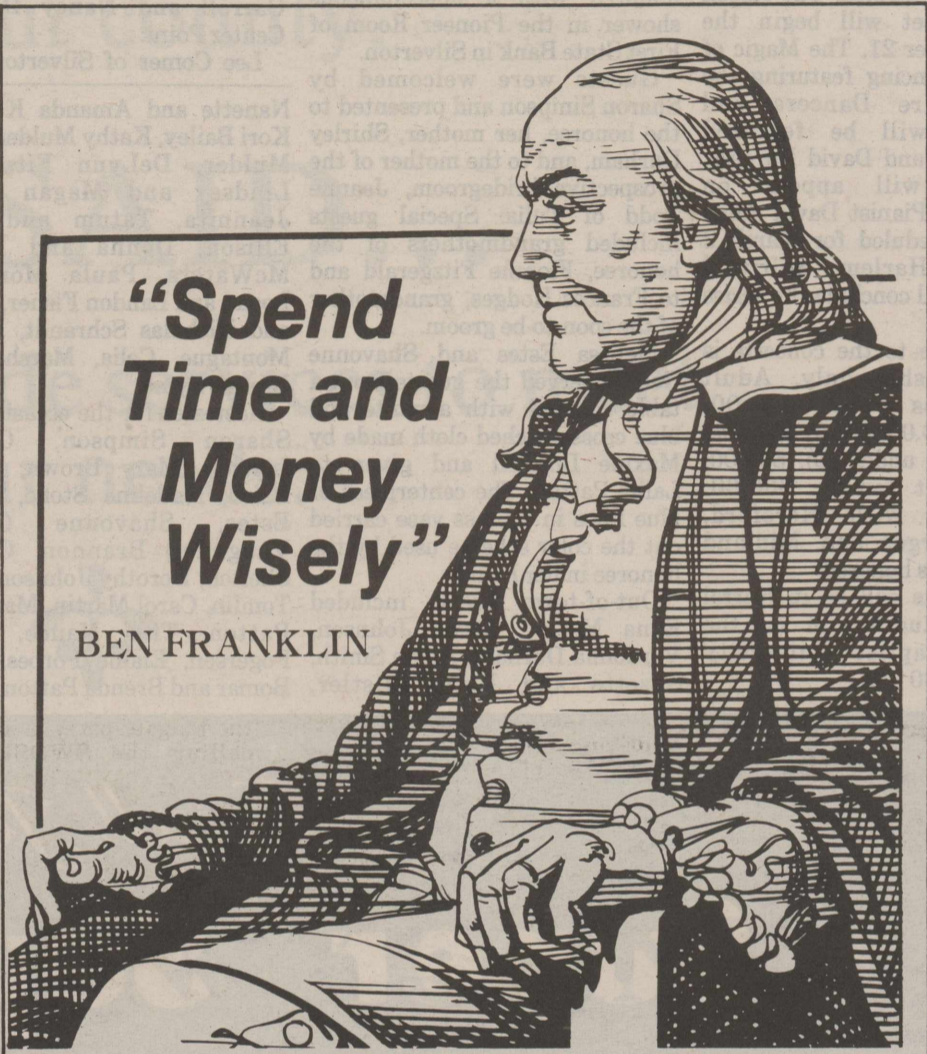

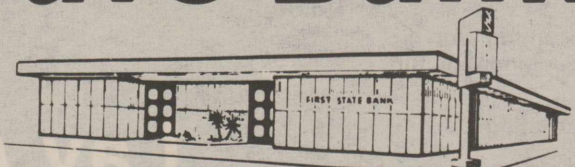

## August Weather Was Near Normal on Texas South Plains

Weather across the Texas South Plains during the month of August 1995 had near normal temperatures and precipitation. Temperatures averaged 0.7 degree above normal and ranged from 2.6 degrees above normal at Friona to 2.1 degrees below normal at Spur. Silverton's average temperature for the month was 76.8, which was almost two degrees below the South Plains. Maximum temperatures averaged exactly normal and ranged from 2.8 degrees above normal at Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge to 3.1 degrees below normal at Paducah. The highest temperature reported during the month was 100 degrees at Levelland on the ninth. Silverton's maximum temperatures averaged 88.5, which was a little less than three degrees below the South Plains figure. Minimum temperatures averaged 1.5 degrees above normal and ranged from 3.0 degrees above normal at Morton to 2.2 degrees below normal at Spur. The lowest temperature reported during the month was 56 degrees on the morning of the second at Dimmitt. Silverton's minimum temperatures averaged 65.0 degrees, very near the South Plains average. Precipitation averaged 0.01 of an inch above normal and ranged from 5.50 inches above normal at Matador to 2.20 inches below normal at Hereford. Silverton received 3.56 inches during the month, which was above normal for this area and was 1.13 inches above the South Plains average.

# Owls Put on Scoring Display While Beating The Pirates

Silverton's Owls came out and quickly jumped on the Pirates in the non-conference season opener last Friday night at Lefors. After scoring only 87 points all last season, the Owls put up almost half of that in their first game as they defeated the Pirates 43-14.

"We played excellent. We looked like the Silverton teams of yesteryears," Owl Coach Clyde Parham said. "A year of maturity goes a long way."

Parham pointed out that Lefors was without its best player, runningback Tommy Green, who injured his knee in a scrimmage the week before. Green was scheduled for surgery Monday.

"Not to take anything away from our kids, but that hurt them a lot," Coach Parham noted.

Silverton makes its home debut Friday against third-ranked Chillicothe, upset by Guthrie 60-54 in their opener.

When Lefors kicked off to open the game Friday night, the Owls mishandled the ball and wound up taking possession on their five. After runs by Andy Bullock and Arnold Garza, they punted short to the Silverton 23, and with 8:41 still to be played in the first quarter, it looked like the Pirates were just a chip shot away from the endzone. The Owls went into their "awesome" defensive maneuvers, and after allowing the Pirates a total gain of seven yards, Garza threw them for a three-yard loss. An incomplete

pass on fourth down gave the ball back to the Owls on the 20.

At this time, the Owl offense went to work in earnest, with Bullock picking up four yards and Garza getting a first down on the 36. Garza ran for another first down on the Lefors 20, after which quarterback Cory Chandler passed to Garza carrying to the eight. Chandler passed to end Jack Cherry for the touchdown, and Bullock kicked the PAT to give the Owls an 8-0 lead with 3:54 still to be played in the first quarter.

Silverton kicked off to Lefors, and Zeb Holt came up with the ball before the Pirates knew what had hit them. Bullock ran for eight and Garza picked up six, before Bullock carried to near the goal. Garza carried into the endzone with 2:15 still to be played in the first stanza. Bullock's PAT didn't get away, and the Owls held a 14-0 lead.

Lefors took the Silverton kickoff out to their 27 where the stop was made by Garza. A pass completion picked up a first down on the Silverton 30, and another carried to the Silverton nine. The Pirates carried into the endzone with five seconds remaining in the first period, but Lefors was penalized back to the Silverton 25. As the second quarter began, Lefors passed complete for a first-and-goal, but on the next play Garza intercepted a Pirate aerial and ran all the way to the Lefors

11.

Bullock ran for two or three and Jeremy Holt picked up four. The Owls were penalized for holding back to the Lefors 20, but a pass from Chandler to Jeremiah Brooks carried to about a foot outside the goal. Garza carried the touchdown, Bullock kicked the PAT and moved the Owls into a 22-0 lead with 8:19 remaining in the second quarter.

The Owl kickoff was returned to near the Lefors 30. After picking up seven yards on the ground, the Pirates threw three incomplete passes and the ball went back to the Owls near midfield.

Bullock ran for eight and Garza picked up one before Chandler was sacked. There was an incomplete pass on fourth down, and the ball went back to the Pirates. After three incomplete passes, the Pirates punted out of bounds on the Silverton 15 with 6:28 remaining before halftime.

Bullock ran for what would have been a first down except that the play was called back because of illegal procedure. Once again Bullock ran for enough yardage for a first, but it was called back due to a penalty. On third down, Chandler passed complete to Bullock and Garza picked up enough on fourth down to give the Owls another first down. After another sack and incomplete passes, the ball went back to Lefors on the 35. The

defense held and got the ball back at midfield with 1:37 remaining to be played in the first half.

Garza ran to the Lefors 11, after which Bullock and Garza combined to move the ball inside the five. Garza carried the touchdown with 30 seconds remaining on the clock, Bullock kicked the PAT, and the Owls held a 30-0 lead.

Silverton kicked off once again to open the second half of play, and held Lefors deep in their own territory. The Pirates picked up a first down on their 21, after which defense by Brooks and Cherry held and the ball came back to the Owls on the 35. This offensive possession was cut short when the Pirates intercepted an Owl aerial and returned it to the Lefors 27.

They made a first down on the Silverton 23, stopped there by Trey Wyatt, then received a procedure penalty. Brooks threw the Pirates for a small loss, then Wyatt and Garza combined to break up a Pirate pass. On fourth down the Pirates carried to the eight, but the ball went over on downs to the Owls with 3:26 still showing on the third-quarter clock. The Owls were unable to move the ball and it went back to the Pirates. After a rather shaky personal foul call against the Owls, the Pirates got an automatic first down on the Silverton six, and they scored with 1:03 still on the clock. Jon Ivory blocked the PAT, and the Pirates were on the board with a 30-6 score.

Lefors kicked off, and the Owls controlled the ball on their 35. Jeremy Holt picked up three yards, and a pass to Cherry was good for another eight yards. Garza picked up a first down on

the Lefors 28. Jeremy Holt carried the next touchdown with 8:37 remaining in the game. There was no PAT, and the Owls moved into a 36-6 lead.

When the Owls kicked off, Brooks stopped the return at the Lefors 23. They gave up a first down at midfield, but tightened their defense with plays by Jeremy Holt, Brooks and others, and got the ball back near midfield.

Trey Ziegler scored with 4:55 on the clock, but it was ruled that he had stepped out of bounds about the five. With Leland Wood at the quarterback position, Ziegler took the handoff again and ran into the endzone for another score. Jared Francis plunged into the endzone for the PAT, and gave the Owls a 43-6 lead.

When the Owls kicked off, the ball carried to near the goal and every player on the field touched the ball carrier as he ran to midfield. Representing the Owls in the game at this time were Lorn Estes, Cory Chandler, Jeremy Holt, Matt Martin and Wood. Several Owls weren't able to play in the game, but all who were in uniform got into the action.

The pirates scored again with 3:16 still on the game clock, bringing the score to 43-14. The Owls took the ensuing kickoff on about their 20, and a highlight of this possession was a completion by Wood to Ivory. Lefors intercepted the Owls and carried the ball to near midfield, but the referee whistled the play and placed the ball on the Lefors 17 on a penalty. The game ended near this spot.

# PUBLIC NOTICE

## BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

### SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 7, 1995

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 50 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature by general law may authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue general obligation bonds of the state in an amount not exceeding \$300 million to finance educational loans to students. The maximum interest rate to be borne by the bonds must be set by law. The legislature may provide for the investment of bond proceeds and may establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$300 million in general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation the property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas if the property is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization as defined by general law. The Comptroller's Property Tax Division has identified the Grand Lodge of Texas, also known as the Masonic Lodges, as the primary organization which would qualify for this tax exemption.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 51 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides that the farm and ranch finance program fund shall be administered by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority and not by the Veterans' Land Board, as provided by current law. In addition, the proposed amendment provides that the proceeds of \$200 million of the \$500 million in bonds authorized by the Texas Constitution for the farm and ranch finance program fund may be diverted to the agricultural fund and the rural micro-enterprise development fund, also authorized by the Texas Constitution, to be used for agricultural and rural economic development programs.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the use of existing bond authority of the farm and ranch finance program to include financial assistance for the expansion, development, and diversification of production, processing, marketing, and export of Texas agricultural products."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 46 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition. In divorce and probate situations, a piece of property may be owned jointly by two

or more people, and each person owns an undivided interest in the property, as opposed to a specific portion of the property. If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the purchase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. Senate Joint Resolution 46 would allow the lending institution to foreclose on the homestead property for an owelty of partition if the purchaser defaulted on the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would allow the refinancing of a lien against a homestead. Finally, the proposed amendment would allow a purchaser or lender to rely on an affidavit that states that the property to be conveyed or encumbered is not the homestead of the affiant.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting an encumbrance to be fixed on homestead property for an owelty of partition, including a debt of a spouse resulting from a division or award of a homestead in a divorce proceeding, and for the refinancing of a lien against a homestead, including a federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of the owner."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase by \$500 million the constitutional authorization of the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell general obligation bonds of the state to provide housing financing to Texas veterans. The proceeds from the bonds authorized by this amendment shall be used to augment the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II to be administered and invested as provided by law. The bonds authorized by this amendment shall be incontestable after execution by the Veterans' Land Board, approval by the attorney general, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund II."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 64 proposes a constitutional amendment which would extend the tax exemption under article VIII, section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution for the residence homestead of a person age 65 or older to the surviving spouse of a person who received the exemption. The surviving spouse must be age 55 or older when the deceased spouse died, and the property must be the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the deceased spouse died and remain the surviving spouse's residence homestead. A surviving spouse who already receives an exemption under this section of the Texas Constitution is not entitled to an additional exemption under the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting from ad valorem taxation the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of an elderly person."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would reduce the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for the superconducting super collider fund from \$500 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment reducing the amount of general obligation bonds authorized for undertakings related to the superconducting super collider research facility from \$500 million to \$250 million."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 80 proposes a constitutional amendment abolishing the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties. In Mills County, the office of constable is abolished, and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff. In Reagan and Roberts counties, the office of constable is abolished and the powers, duties, and records of the office are transferred to the sheriff only if a majority of voters in each of the respective counties favors the proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the abolition of the office of constable in Mills, Reagan, and Roberts counties."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia. Currently, such investments are prohibited by article XVI, section 70(r) of the Texas Constitution, which would be repealed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing investment of money from the Texas growth fund in a business without the business's disclosure of its investments in or with South Africa or Namibia."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the constitutional office of state treasurer effective September 1, 1996. The transfer of specific constitutional powers and duties to the comptroller of public accounts takes effect on that date. The statutory powers and duties and the property and other obligations of the state treasurer are transferred to officers and agencies of state government as the legislature provides by general law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of state treasurer."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment requiring that land devoted to wildlife management be taxed on the basis of its productive capacity. The proposed amendment also adds a temporary provision to the Texas Constitution validating the changes to the law made by Chapter 560, Acts of the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session, 1991, which amended the Tax Code to allow land used for wildlife management to be appraised as agricultural land. The temporary provision also provides that a property owner is not authorized to claim a refund of taxes paid unless the tax payment was challenged before the effective date of the proposed amendment. The temporary provision expires on January 1, 1998.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow open-space land used for wildlife management to qualify for tax appraisal in the same manner as open-space agricultural land, subject to eligibility limitations provided by the legislature."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that the legislature may exempt from ad valorem taxation income-producing personal property and mineral interests that have a taxable value which is insufficient to recover the costs of administering the tax.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation personal property and mineral interests having a value insufficient to recover the administrative costs of collecting the taxes."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution No. 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the governing body of a political subdivision to exempt from ad valorem taxation boats and other equipment used primarily in the commercial taking or production of fish, shrimp, shellfish, and other marine life."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 68 proposes a constitutional amendment that allows the legislature to raise the current ad valorem tax exemption for disabled veterans and their surviving spouses and minor children. The tax exemptions would be raised based on a veteran's disability rating as follows:

Disability	Maximum Tax Exemption
10%-30%	\$ 5,000
30%-50%	\$ 7,500
50%-70%	\$10,000
More than 70%	\$12,000
Age 65 and 10% or higher	\$12,000
Loss or loss of use of limb	\$12,000
Blindness or paraplegia	\$12,000

The spouse and children of any veteran who dies while on active duty may be granted an exemption of up to \$5,000. The amounts of the exemptions provided for in this proposed amendment may be repealed by the legislature by general law.

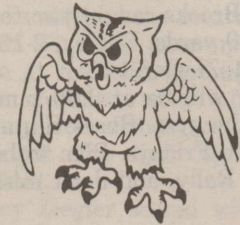

"The constitutional amendment relating to raising the limits of the exemption from ad valorem taxation of property owned by disabled veterans or by the surviving spouses or surviving minor children of disabled veterans."

The 1995 Plains Ginners' Association (PGA) Annual Meeting was held Saturday, September 9, 1995, in the Holiday Inn - Civic Center in the University Ballroom.

Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) was represented on the program by Frank B. Jones, jr., president of the 25-county producer organization. Jones discussed recent developments in several areas,

including the development of the 1995 Farm Bill and the development of boll weevil populations on the High Plains. Jones' comments included an update on the preparations for the Enhanced Diapause Control Program recently approved by producers.

Texas Cotton Ginners' Association Executive Vice President Tony Williams reported on the current activities of TCGA.

Other scheduled speakers at the PGA meeting included Dr. Ken Jones, president of Lubbock Christian University; Dr. Mark D. Lange, director of economic services for the National Cotton Council; Tom C. Wedegaetner, associate director of Cotton Inc.; and Ed Small, attorney.

Among the topics discussed were private property owners' rights, an update on the cotton supply/demand situation, leadership applicable to cotton gin management and a report on cottonseed research and marketing efforts.

Following the program, lunch was served and the PGA announced the recipient of their 1995 scholarship award. A style show was held beginning at 12:55 p.m.

PCG officials announced that the final contract for the 1995 High Plains Enhanced Boll Weevil Diapause Program has been awarded to Kubin Air of Bovina, Texas.

The contract is for control operations in the Crosbyton unit and puts the final piece in place for the start of the control phase of the program around September 26.

The goal of the diapause program is to reduce the overall numbers of boll weevils before they can enter overwintering habitat, reducing the number that will eventually be able to survive and have an opportunity to infest the 1996 crop.

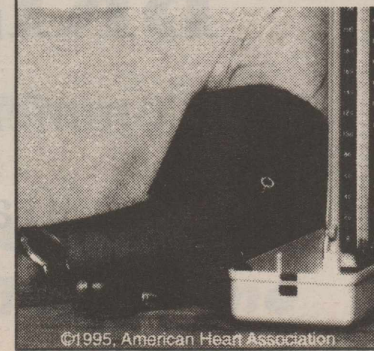

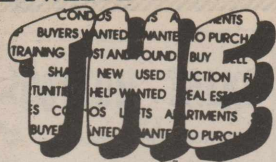

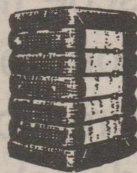
