

Hospital Money Crunch Coming

Fisher County Hospital Administrator Perry Hunsaker, in an interview last Monday morning concerning the financial operation of the hospital, said that 1980 was going to be the year of decision concerning the hospital's future.

"With the evaluation going down and the low occupancy rate, it appears that the hospital district will be out of money in 6 months unless the community gets behind us and supports the hospital and clinic", said Hunsaker.

For several years individual hospital board members have been saying that the day would come that the hospital would be out of money. It appears that the day will be coming during 1980. The hospital board, seeking to get the hospital on sound financial ground, recently authorized construction of a Fisher County Doctor's Clinic, in hopes of improving the already bleak financial status of the district.

Hunsaker attributed the continual losses at the county hospital to low occupancy. "We have averaged 14 patients a day in our hospital through November 1979 and it looks like we'll finish out 1979 with about that same average," said Hunsaker. "We need to be averaging 17 or 18 patients a day at the minimum to make the thing go financially", he added.

"This business about us running out of money has been coming ever since the inception of the

hospital district, we can't run a hospital and keep it open just charging for beds like a motel", Hunsaker said.

The administrator pointed out that the Callans operated the Callan Hos-

pital for years, but—they had the clinic with the laboratory and x-ray revenue also included with the operation of the hospital".

Hunsaker said that "unless the community supported the new clinic—

there won't be a hospital out here".

The administrator indicated that it was the idea and hope of the board that with the new doctor (Dr. Sampo) in Rotan, affili-

ated with the new clinic, would be supported by those Fisher County people that go out of town for medical attention, like to Hamlin and Stamford.

"We're hoping that this support will be sufficient to bring up the occupancy at the hospital", said Hunsaker.

In addition, Hunsaker said that the clinic will be self supporting. He said that the clinic will generate enough money in one month to make the yearly payments on the new clinic.

"The lab and x-ray revenue from the new clinic will be a strong boost

for the hospital", said Hunsaker, "for instance, if the doctors at the new clinic do several outpatient x-rays a day, financially it would be like having another patient in the hospital."

"We can pull out of this financial strain if the people will support the

new clinic, and if the people support the clinic, it (the clinic) will put the hospital out of the hole", said Hunsaker.

"It's not a question of Rotan vs Roby or one group of community residents vs another group—it's whether we have a hospital or close it down."

"It appears that the hospital district will be out of money in 6 months unless the community gets behind us and supports the hospital and clinic."

Hospital Board Plans Meeting Next Monday

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board will hold a special meeting on Monday night, January 7, at 6:30, for the purpose of discussing the budget, proposed pharma-

cy at the Fisher County Clinic and the working arrangements with the doctors working in the new clinic.

Administrator Hunsaker is expected to present a questionnaire to the Hospital Board members that will be sent to prospective operators of the new

pharmacy.

In addition to the discussion on the pharmacy, Hunsaker expects Dr. Vidal Sampo to appear before the board. Dr. Sampo is expected to begin his practice in Fisher County as soon as his license is approved by the Texas Medical Board.


She will be the head of all nursing in the Fisher County Hospital.

All animals must have health papers before they can be unloaded.

Sheep and hogs must be on the grounds by 9:00 a.m. Friday, January 4.

Judging will begin at 1:00 p.m. Friday with market hogs. Lamb judging will follow the swine judging. Judging the swine will be Don Ballard of Rochester. The sheep judge is Buddy Logsdon of Memphis, Texas.

Beef cattle judging will begin at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, January 5. Heifers will be judged first followed by steers. Max Stapleton of Haskell will judge the cattle.

A buyers lunch will be served at 12:00 noon followed by the premium sale at 1:30 p.m. with Bill Dennis of Stamford as the auctioneer.

Showmanship buckles will be presented in each division sponsored by the Fisher County Young Farmers.

All buyers are invited to the free buyers lunch. Everyone's support is

truly needed to make the premium sale a success. It takes only \$60 to \$125 to really add value of an exhibitor's animal. It can

then be let go to the floor bid or if an individual needs some meat for the freezer, the sale is a very good place to get it.

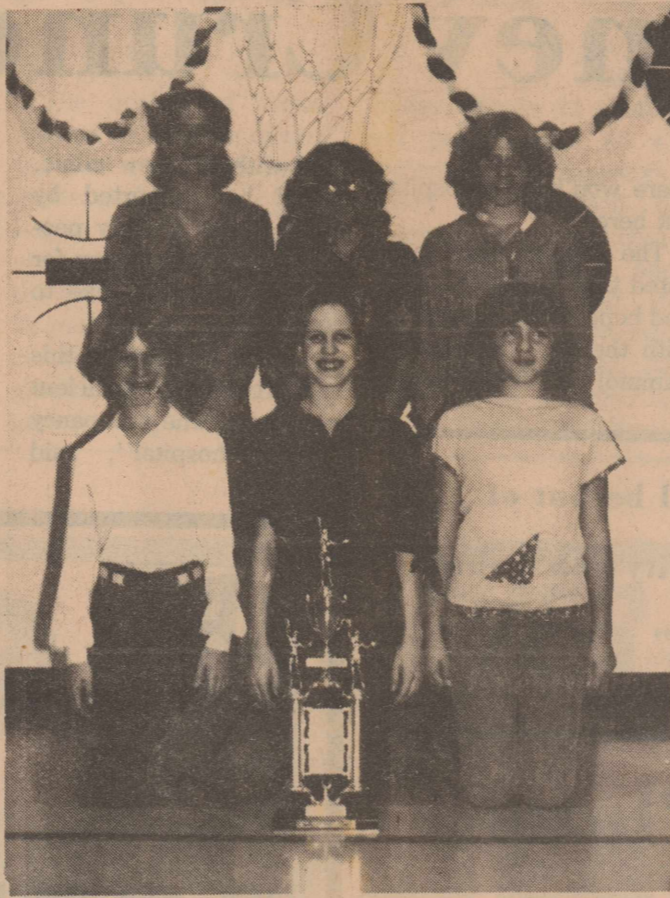

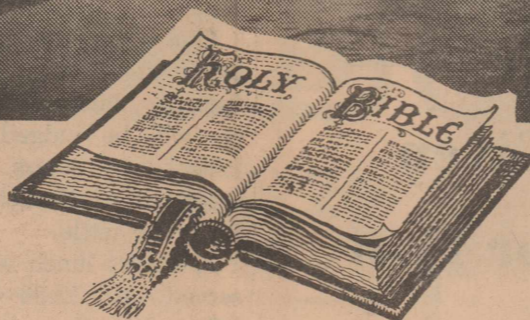
4. Appointments are to

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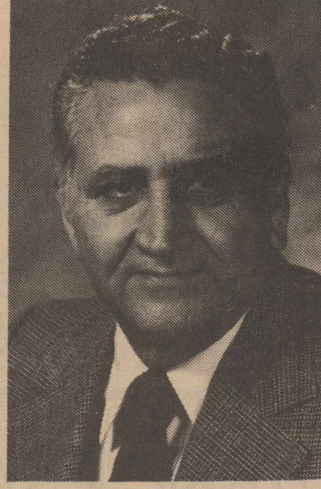
Bernie Hawley Named S.W.S. Vice President

"Collar" the now look. Update your collars, with a special emphasis on size. Smaller collars are fashionable now.

Most important in updating is to make the collar look like it's the original. Before you can do that, take a quick look at collar styles and reshaping limits. Basic collar styles are flat, rolled or stand up at the neckline.

Those standing up at the base of the neck, such as Mandarin, usually are small and they don't need changes this season.

Flat Collars

Flat collars, often called "Peter Pan" collars, are a duplicate shape of the bodice area they cover. In other words, the collar neckline curve is identical to the bodice neckline curve. Because it's flat, this collar can be any width or shape. To redesign a flat collar, mark the shape you want along the outside collar seam. Add seam allowances. Turn raw edges inward and top stitch. Or trim collar to the size you want and bind the edge.

Rolled Collars

A rolled collar stands up and turns back over itself at the base of the neck at center back. This collar's neckline is the same length as the bodice

neckline, but the shape itself will be different from the bodice neckline shape, varying from straight to slightly curved.

Remember, the outside shape of the collar must cover—or meet—the neckline seam at the center back.

You can reduce wider rolled collars in the same manner as the flat collar described above.

Other Changes

Other changes that will update a collar include these: rounding collar points and changing the angle of the seamline edges at center front. Also, you might remove an original collar, face the neckline, and cut a new collar from matching or contrast fabric scraps.

Or you might attach a commercial lace collar.

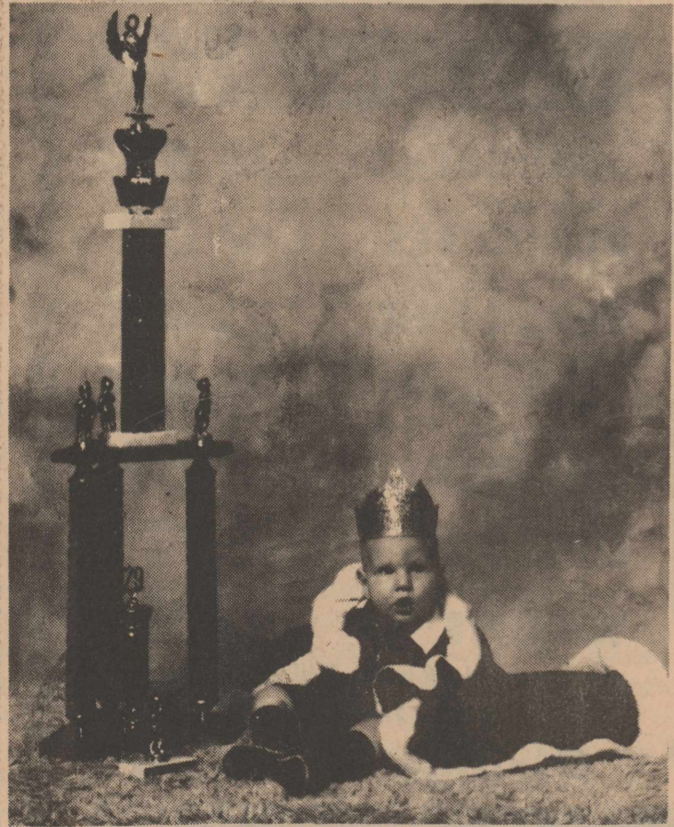

Abilene Reports Low Cotton Grades

B.B. Manly, Area Director of the USDA Cotton Marketing Services Office reported that 51,000 cotton samples were classed in Abilene during the week ending Friday, December 21. This brought the season's total to 588,000, which compares to only 160,000 samples classed by this time last season.

Local cotton prices were firm to 1 1/2 cents per pound higher during the early part of the week before, but were weak to 1

cent per pound lower late in the week. Prices ranged from 13 1/2 to 16 cents per pound over loan values for 3.5 to 4.9 mike cotton. Low micronaire cotton sold at mostly 5 to 12 1/2 cents over the loan. Most mixed quality lots of cotton sold at physical prices ranging from 59 to 63 cents per

pound. Demand was moderate to good for base mike cotton, and was light to moderate for low mike cotton. Producers offered cotton freely, and trading was mostly active.

Cottonseed prices paid producers at gins ranged from 105 to 125 dollars per ton.

The quality of cotton classed in Abilene during the past week was lower grade, slightly longer fiber length, and about the same micronaire as during the previous week. About 72 percent of the samples classed were light-spotted grades, and about 24 percent were white

grades. Grade 32 continued predominant at 43 percent of all classings. Grade 42 comprised 18 percent, grade 41 comprised 13 percent, and grade 31 comprised 10 percent. Fiber length was 54 percent staple 32, 32 percent staple 31, and 10 percent staple 33. Micro-

naire readings were 56 percent within the 3.5 to 4.9 range, the same as during the previous week. Sixteen percent miked from 3.3 to 3.4, and 22 percent miked from 3.0 to 3.2. About 7 percent of the samples were reduced in grade because of bark or grass content.
