Hospital Board Agrees To Assist New Doctor

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board met with Dr. V. Carandang and Dr. V. Simpao last Monday night with the board agreeing on a tentative basis to help Dr. Vidal Simpao establish his local medical practice by guaranteeing him \$4,000.00 a month.

Fisher County Hospital Administrator Perry Hunsaker indicated Monday that Dr. V. Simpao should have all the necessary paperwork back from Austin to begin seeing patients around January 15. He will be officed in the

Fisher County Hospital until such time as the new Fisher County Doctor's Clinic is completed.

guarantee to Dr. Simpao, Hunsaker said, "The Fisher County Hospital District has realized \$230,000.00 from in-patients in the first 21 months that Dr. V. Carandang has been on a monthly guarantee. We realize that there are some expenses to be attributed to the \$230,000 but that amount is still a significant increase in hospital revenue. During the 21 month period, the hospital dis-

kill any botulism toxinproducing organisms which can thrive on low-acid foods if not destroyed in processing.

In addition, both water bath canners and pressure canners will equalize the pressure inside and outside jars during processing to prevent explosion.

Microwave ovens cannot equalize pressure, so explosion likely will occur. Also, microwave ovens produce an uneven heat transfer, so jar centers probably do not reach a temperature high enough to sterilize food.

A second safety step, heat all home-canned food on the stove top before eating--10 minutes for pints of food, 15 minutes for quarts.



BEST Program Gets Students Prepared

Students in the Junior

and Senior classes at

Hobbs School were invol-

ved this week in activities designed to assist them in job seeking and job retention. The program is especially designed to assist students, who are approaching the time they will enter the job market, in developing skills in securing the very best job they can get with what they have to offer an employer. The program, known as Building Employability Sills in Teenagers (Best), is conducted two hours a day for five days, and emphasizes the concept of learning by doing. Activities are developed to make the experience as realistic as possible and as close to the real working world as can be done in the classroom. On the first day of the program, students are organized into working crews with foremen selected to "boss" each crew. To increase realism, students punch a time clock each day and those clocking the full ten hours will be awarded a certificate of achievement on Friday. The second day is devoted to leading the students to take a closer look at themselves and their interests and goals. The third day covers communicating with others and "selling" themselves to the employer on the day of interview.

The fourth day is devoted to the employer on the day of the interview. The fourth day is devoted to developing skills in decision making, especially those employed in career

The final activity on the

fifth day is a "role played" interview with a real employer from the community, with each working crew entering an applicant contestant for the job. The employer then selects the best applicant based on their completed application and personal interview. the persons acting as employer for Hobbs will be Mr. Alan Houston of National Gypsum Co. These interviews aré video taped and played back to the students. At the end of the 10 hour block, Certificates of Achievement will be presented to successful students.

This program is sponsored jointly by the Vocational Agriculture and Homemaking departments in the school with the assistance of the school counselor. People sponsoring the program at Hobbs are Mrs. Fran LeBleu, homemaking teacher; Mr. Gary Finley, Vocational Agriculture Teacher, and Mrs. Pat Hamric. Counse-

Time is short with the cold weather ahead. The money has been allocated to help with the high utility bills. Remember, you will not be automatically put on this program--you must




