

Commissioners OK Juvenile Officer

The members of the Fisher County Commissioners Court approved a program that will provide Fisher County with a Juvenile Probation Officer beginning on February 19, 1980, at their regular meeting last Monday morning.

Steve Lawhon, Nolan County Juvenile Probation Officer, made a presentation to the Commissioners and outlined the financial obligations of approving the program. Lawhon said that the officer's salary would be paid, but that Fisher County would be responsible for (1) psychological testing, medical and dental expenses, (2) clerical personnel to assist the new officer, and (3) office space and furniture.

The Commissioners unanimously approved the program. Lawhon pointed out that the new officer would be working with Fisher County juveniles age 10-17, working with the four county high schools concerning truancy, would be available for counseling and may lecture to schools and civic organizations.

Lawhon has tentatively hired Gene Osborn, Jr., a native of Sweetwater, currently working in California to fill the Fisher County Juvenile Officer post.

Both Fisher County Attorney Rudy Hamric and Sheriff Mickey Counts expressed approval of the new position.

Judge Marshal Bennett and Commissioner Jimmy Wright will serve with Nolan County residents on a juvenile assistance board.

In other action last Monday, Commissioners passed a 1980 holiday schedule that would give county personnel 10 holidays in 1980. A holiday schedule will be observed on Good Friday, Memorial

Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Veterans Day, 2 days for Thanksgiving and 2 days for Christmas and New Year's Day.

Judge Bennett informed Commissioners that some attention needed to be given to possibly doing some work on the roof at the Pink Building and that some of the offices in the courthouse needed wall painting. Commissioners were to make a study of the two problem areas and take action in February.

Sheriff Mickey Counts appeared before the Commissioners to discuss three items of concern. First, Counts asked commissioners to give some thought to purchasing a washer and dryer for the jail, so prisoner coveralls, sheets and towels could be washed on the premises instead of being contracted for with National Linen Service. The commissioners discussed the plan and will give it further consideration in February. Secondly, Counts requested

either a Master Charge or Visa card that could be used by the Sheriff's Department personnel that are called out of town on business. The card would be used for lodging whenever personnel are transporting prisoners, etc. The commissioners approved the request.

The third item concerned a request by Sheriff Counts that the commissioners court contribute \$2,900.00 toward the purchase of a mobil phone system for the sheriff's car and deputy's vehicle. Counts told commissioners that the phone system would allow any person near a telephone to contact the Sheriff or Deputy in their vehicle, afterhours or on weekends.

Counts said that the cost of the system would be \$8,560.00. He had received pledges of \$5,660.00 and asked that the commissioners pay the remaining \$2,900.00. Counts indicated that after 5:00 p.m. and on weekends

there is no one to answer the phone at the Sheriff's office. This new mobil phone system would allow residents to call the Sheriff's Office, receive a recording if the office is vacant, directing them to call another telephone number that would put them in touch with either the Sheriff or Deputy in their car.

Commissioners Jay Hendon and Billy Henderson indicated that they had talked with several people in their precinct and had not found a large number in favor of the system. Commissioners Blackie Ford and Jimmy Wright are to discuss the possible purchase with members in their precinct and report back to the court.

Commissioners may call a special meeting in the near future to decide on the mobil phone system.

"I feel that my business experience qualifies me for the job of commissioner and I want to let the people know that if elected, I will serve the interests of all of Fisher County as fairly and honestly as I know how," concluded Cross.


In other action, the board voted to purchase a John Deere 850 tractor for mowing the school grounds.

Voters Will Elect 10 To School Boards

Fisher County voters will be electing 10 county school district residents to vacancies on 4 school boards (Rotan, Roby, Hobbs, and McCaulley) when they go to the polls on Saturday, April 5.

Rotan School District voters will be naming three new board members.

The terms of Bobby Smith, Bobby Gruben and Lawrence Wayne Sparks all expire this year. Smith had already indicated that he will not seek another term. Gruben and Sparks were not contacted to ascertain their intentions. Board terms expiring in 1981 include Dr. Jerry Marshall and Allan Houston. 1982 terms expiring are Leo Long and Ernest Ragan.

Roby voters will be naming two board members in April. The terms of Gayle Morgeson and Latham Burk expire this year. Others serving on the board are John Matthies and Judy Mauldin (1981);

Roy Herron, Leonard Mitchell and Scott Feagan (1982).

McCaulley voters will be naming two new board members. The term of McCaulley Board president Jerry Jeffrey expires this year as does the slot currently being held by Jackie Jeffrey. Other McCaulley board members are David Estes, Gene Tabb and Randy Kelley

(1981) and Marion Reed and Cecil Williams (1982).

Hobbs voters will name three to school board posts. The terms of Howard Gordon, Mickey Templeton and Ricky Williams all expire this year. Williams replaced James Ratliff who resigned. Other board members are Gary Nettleton and Gary Hyer (1981) and Odell Rains and Jerry Hodges (1982).

Rotan Board Extends, Talks New Contracts

The members of the Rotan School Board extended the contract of Superintendent Tom Harkey through the 1981-82 school year and discussed re-hiring the school principals and athletic director at their meeting last Monday night. The contracts of Neil Wright, Marshall Hill and George Schroyer and Don Mullins' contract will be acted upon at the February meeting.

The board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Gail Webb, a junior high math teacher, and temporarily named Mrs. Grace Thompson to replace Mrs. Webb for the remainder of the school year.

Mrs. Betty Strayhorn and Mrs. Gail Webb presented the board with a plan that would re-structure the secondary math program, however, no action was taken on the presentation. Board members are expected to give final consideration to the presentation at the February meeting. The plan would involve adding an additional fundamental math program to the course of studies at the high school level. "This math program would be the type used by laymen in the working world", according to Superintendent Tom Harkey.

The board set the date of the school trustee election for April 5, with the deadline for filing for

school board positions set at March 6.

Board members were informed of a "bell change" by Harkey that will take place on January 21. Students will report to school at 8:12 a.m. instead of 8:15 a.m. and an additional 2½ minutes will be added to the break between 2nd and 3rd period, giving student a 5 minute break between the end of the 2nd period and start of the 3rd period.

The board was informed of a faculty in-service meeting on February 6. School will dismiss at 2:30 on that day.

Board members will act on the extension of contracts of the three principals and athletic director Don Mullins in February and discuss the re-hiring of all teachers. Teachers will be re-hired in March.

Golf Course

The members of the Rotan City Council are beginning to take a close look at the cost factors involved in operating the city and one of the city services that could very well come under close scrutiny is the golf course.

The Council lightly touched on the subject last Thursday night, and from all indications this item is in for a very close examination.

One of the councilmen said that the golf course "is the most expensive service provided by the City of Rotan, according to the number of people that use the facility".

In the past 10 years, the golf course has not been used to its potential. When Arvin White was alive and active in the Rotan Golf Club, tournaments were held, and interest seemed to be higher than in the past two or three years.

Unless the golfers of the Rotan area unite and convince the Rotan City Council that things are going to get better, with respect to the number of people using the course, the council could close the course down.

I personally appreciate the feelings of the council in this regard. They were elected to run the city as efficiently as possible and the golf course deserves a good long look.

It may be true that the \$7,000 to \$10,000 a year being spent by the city could be better spent on tennis courts, volleyball courts, outdoor basketball courts, picnic tables and park improvements. Especially, if after the councilmen conclude their study, they find that only a handful are using the golf facility.

Either way, I think the councilmen are on the right track. More tax collecting agencies need to begin taking a closer look at how their money is being spent--so taxpayers are assured that they are getting what they pay for.

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salary increases for city employees that amounted to an average of 15 percent across the board. The actual increases ranged from 19 percent for a high to a low of 14 percent for employees. The total salary increases will mean an additional \$14,319.00 for city employees for 1980, bringing the total city payroll up to \$163,391.07.

The council discussed accepting bids on a new police car in the near future. City Secretary Kenneth Vann is to check on full and medium size car availabilities and report back to the council in February.

The council opened bids on the purchase of a new 1/2 ton pickup and accepted the low bid of Rotan Motor Company of \$6,060.00 for a new 1980

1/2 ton vehicle. The only other bidder was F&M Chevrolet for a bid of \$6,135.00.

The council sold a used pickup (1969 Chevrolet) after opening bids submitted by Jan Hendon for \$251.00 and Bennie Read for \$450.00 to the highest bidder.

Rotan Mayor Lester Sescil praised the management of the Rotan Community Center by saying, "They are doing a fine job in keeping costs to a minimum" in the operation of the facility. The expenses for December amounted to \$757.16 while income amounted to \$390.86. Sescil told council members that the building may need some preventative maintenance and suggested that the council study potential repairs as a group prior to the February meeting. Sescil said

that the city may be able to assist with some exterior painting and repair work that will improve the appearance of the building. City Secretary Vann indicated that the council may want to study the possibility of giving the Rotan Community Center a reduced rate on water to encourage watering this summer and also suggested that the council consider allowing the City of Rotan to assist with mowing the Community Center lawn this summer. These plans are to be studied and acted upon in February.

In other action the council discussed the future of the Rotan City Golf Course. Some councilmen pointed out that the upkeep of the course was costing far too much in relation to the number of people using the facility. It

is believed that the council will further discuss the golf course and its future in February.

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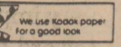
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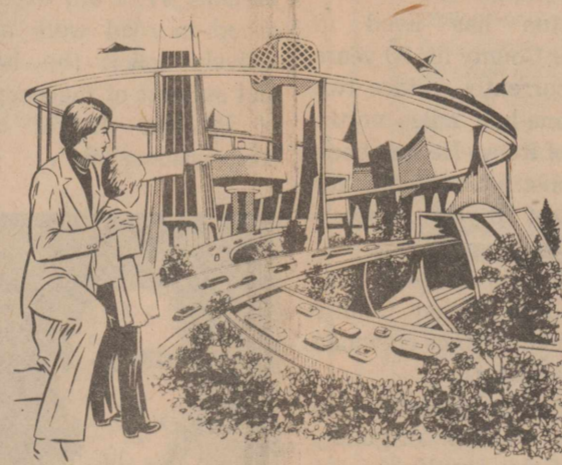

Refreshments were served buffet style.

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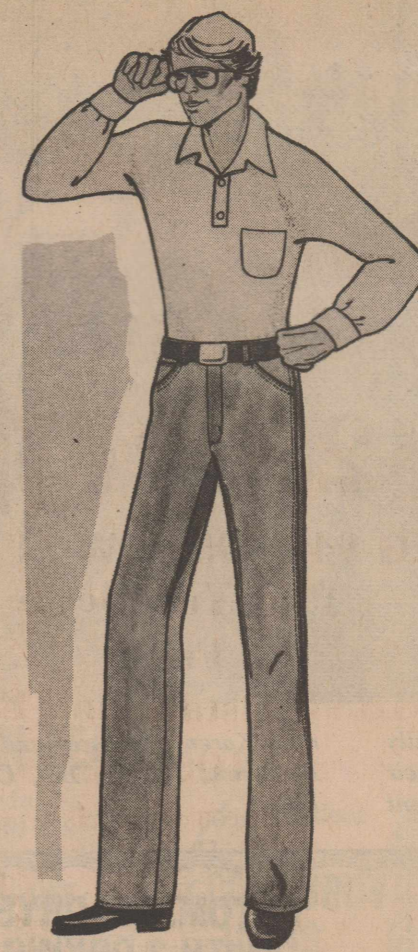
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"Yankees" Find New Home In Roby

Bill and Barbara Brzezinski, new owners of the Silver Spur Restaurant in Roby, had visions of leaving the frigid Northeast and making a new home for their family in the Southwest as long ago as 1976, but it wasn't until last October that the opportunity began to unfold.

Bill and Barbara Brzezinski were both born in Norwich, Connecticut, some 1800 miles from Roby, Texas, as the crow flies, but moved here from Thompson, Conn., a small New England community located in the northeast section of the Constitution State. They are the parents of 6 children, ranging in age from 24 to 6, five of the children are now "transplanted Yankees" living in Texas. The oldest child, Robert, age 24, stayed in Connecticut to fight the terrible winter snows, rapidly increasing inflation of the area, and high cost of living.

The Brzezinskis originally planned to move to Roby, stay about a year, while looking around the area for a permanent home. Bill was a carpenter in Thompson, Conn. and was remodeling the old Silver Spur Motel for his father who lives in California. Once the family arrived in Roby, the opportunity came along to purchase the Silver Spur Restaurant.

Soon after the Brzezinskis began operating the restaurant and meeting

people, it didn't take long for them to make the decision to make Roby their permanent home. "The people here are beautiful, it's because of the people that we have decided to stay and make our home in Roby", said Bill.

Although the new owners didn't have restaurant experience before purchasing the Silver Spur, they made it over the first few months in business just fine. "It would have been very difficult for us to get started without the help of the cook and cook's helper in the beginning", said Bill.

The Silver Spur Restaurant is open from 6 a.m. until 6 p.m. Monday through Thursday. Friday's hours are from 6 a.m. until 9 p.m. On Sunday the restaurant is open from 8:30 until 6 p.m. They are closed on Saturdays.

During the week, plate lunches are served between 11:30 and 1:00. People can choose from two meats featured on the lunch, plus vegetables, salads, rolls, drink and dessert for \$3.50.

The Brzezinskis serve Mexican plate lunches each Wednesday and have plans for the first Friday night Fish Fry this Friday, January 18, between 5 p.m. and 9 p.m. The brand-new fish fry will feature catfish fillets, hush puppies, cole slaw, and french fries. The "all you can eat meal" will sell for

\$4.25.

Sundays are a little special at the Silver Spur. Many families enjoy the "Family Style" dining. Bowls of vegetables, meat and rolls are placed on the tables and families can enjoy "all you can eat" meals for a Sunday price of \$4.25.

"We serve family style or plate lunches every day", said Barbara, "but Sundays seem to be most popular for family style dining".

Bill Brzezinski came to Roby to remodel the old Silver Spur Motel, he's still working on that project. When finished there will be a total of 15 one and two room apartments. He has 8 of the apartments completed at the present time, with four of the occupied.

The Brzezinski children play a big part in the operation of the Silver Spur Restaurant. Debbie, age 22, lives in and works nights in Sweetwater and helps out in the restaurant during peak daytime periods. She was born in Florida, graduated from Tourtellette High School in Thompson, Connecticut and attended college for two years.

The other four children, all students at Roby, take turns helping out in the restaurant after school and on weekends.

Cheryl, age 16, is a Roby junior and is looking forward to participating in the Roby track program this spring. She ran

cross-country competition in Connecticut and was named the "Most Valuable Player" on the girls cross country team. Cheryl was born in California.

Karen, age 14, a Roby freshman, was born in China and also plans to take part in track this spring. She played basketball and softball in Connecticut.

Billy, age 13, a Roby 8th grader, was a cornerback

on the Roby Junior High team this fall. He was born in Norwich, Connecticut.

The youngest, Angelina, age 6, is a first grader, and according to her mother, She's already talking like a Texan, while the rest of us are still talking like Yankees".

None of the children had any trouble adjusting in Roby schools. "A few of the kids were a little ahead in school work and a few

Brucellosis Program Set For Roby

RICHARD SPENCER

Due to late fall moisture conditions Fisher County's small grain fields were established later than normal. Because of this and cooler temperatures, most small grain fields do not have enough growth to reduce weed competition.

Field inspections indicate that weeds are now becoming a problem. Producers should check their fields to determine the kind of weeds and degree of infestation.

Not all wheat fields require spraying as good stands of vigorous wheat shade the ground early and discourage germination. In late-planted fields or those that did not receive moisture until recently, the weeds may not appear until January or February, so fields should be checked carefully. The weeds are easiest to kill while they are in a rosette stage with a diameter approximately the size of a half-dollar. If the weeds are elongated and yellow blossoms have begun to appear, you waited too long. They have already caused a reduction in potential grain yield.

Research on weed competition has been conducted by Dr. Allen F. Wiese at the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland. His studies indicate that one weed per square foot can reduce wheat yields by 10 percent. If a potential yield of 40 bushels per acre is assumed, the yield loss would be about 4 bushels or about \$16.00 at current prices. With an estimated spray cost of \$4.00 this could mean an extra \$12.00 per acre as a result of controlling the weeds.

One-half pound of 2,4-D will control most winter annual broadleaf weeds; however, treacle mustard is more difficult to kill and requires one pound of 2,4-D for effective control when under moisture stress. It is important to fight this week diligently

to prevent its spread.

Falst flax is another new weed showing up in the eastern part of the Panhandle and Rolling Plains. This is a broadleaf weed and can also be controlled by spraying with 2,4-D.

Wild oats, cheatgrass and rescue grass, which

act as winter annual weeds in wheat, are becoming more prevalent in the wheat-growing area, especially where wheat is grown continuously. There are no labelled chemicals for control of chatgrass and rescue grass, so the only available treatment is

to use summer fallow or crop rotation to control infestations. Heavy infestations of wild oats should also be controlled with crop rotation and winter-fallow. However, herbicides are available which will control the wild oats when they are applied

according to label recommendations. Research and demonstration work has shown that both pre and post applications of wild oat herbicides are an economical practice.

A hearing for the new Texas Brucellosis Program

will be held Tuesday, February 5, at 9:00 a.m., at the County Courthouse in San Angelo. The plan for Texas was developed by producers. The idea is to eventually establish a Class A Area in the state and to control movement of cattle between the Class

A area and the remainder of the state. The Class A area would be enlarged with an active cleanup program at its junction with the remainder of the state. Further information on the program can be obtained from my office.

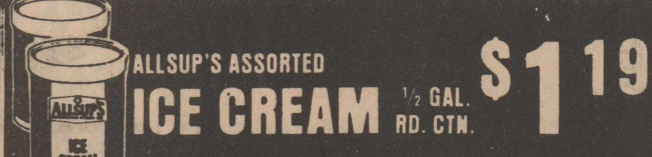
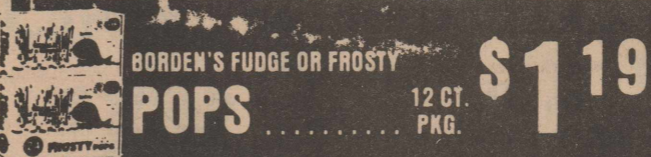

Energy Assistance Plan Available

During 1980 the Community Center in Sweetwater is offering Energy Assistance to the elderly and low income citizens who are experiencing above normal fuel and electric bills. This program has been announced in the newspapers in Nolan and Fisher county and those falling within the eligibility categories have been encouraged to apply.

However, recently it has been brought to light that many people did not see the articles in the newspaper and therefore more publicity is being undertaken.

Gary Spaulding is the Energy Coordinator for the Community Center in

Sweetwater for Nolan, Fisher, Scurry and Mitchell Counties. Since November he has established and organized a central Energy Assistance Office in Sweetwater, and also set up Participant Intake centers in Fisher, Scurry and Mitchell Counties.

In Fisher County, Judge Marshal Bennett and Kenneth Vann, Rotan City Secretary, have assisted him in helping to make the energy crisis assistance program available to the citizens. Bennett has been active and instrumental from the beginning of this program and has assisted in processing the applications from Fisher County. Vann has opened the

Rotan City Hall for use two Saturdays each month to receive applications in Fisher County.

The Energy Crisis Assistance Program budget for the nation was approved by congress in October and the specific funds allocated to each state was sent to Community Service Administration and then to local agencies here in Texas and other states. The primary purpose of these funds is to assist the elderly and low income families who are experiencing a crisis related to the increased cost of fuel and electric bills.

This program is not intended to be a form of supplementary income

to provide monthly funds for the participants nor is it the purpose of merely paying regular monthly gas and electric bills, but it is to assist an eligible household through a crisis period which is directly related to the increased cost of energy.

The amount of funds provided to any eligible household will depend on what is sufficient to assist that household through the crisis period and may not exceed \$400.00 total. Of this \$400.00 up to \$50.00 may be used for food, warm clothing, blankets, space heaters, or

temporary shelter if these items are needed by the household. The amount of funds needed by any particular household is determined by reviewing the fuel and electric bills along with the overall need of that household.

When appearing to apply for this assistance participants are requested to take (1) proof of income from all sources, (2) proper identification, and (3) their most recently paid fuel and electric bill. After a decision is made, the applicant will be notified by mail concerning their application's approval.

In Fisher County, Mrs. Viola Benson has been

appointed as the Int Certification worker in charge of this program. Benson teaches 5th grade in Sweetwater and is a resident of Fisher County. She will receive applicants Saturdays each month at the Rotan City Hall.

Anyone wishing to apply for this assistance may do so on Saturday, January 26, 1980 between 9 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. or Gary Spaulding in Sweetwater at 235-8455 extension 14. For more information call Rotan City 735-2251 or Judge Marshal Bennett at 776- in Roby.
