Gordon Maberry showed his Santa Gertrudis Cross steer to Reserve Champion honors. Gordon's steer was a Santa Gertrudis Hereford Cross

which weighed 1,266 pounds. The steer sold in the premium auction for \$16 a pound and brought \$20,256.00. Gordon is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Maberry of McCaulley.

Shauna Bell won 1st place middleweight Limousin Steer which went on to win Reserve Champion Limousin. Shauna's 1,104

pound Limousin Hereford Cross sold in the premium sale for \$18 a pound and brought a total of \$19,872. Shauna is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Bell of McCaulley.

Lynda Henderson of Rotan showed her light-weight Angus steer to first place honors in stiff competition. This was Lynda's first steer to place in the Houston Livestock Show. Her steer sold for \$3.20 a pound in the premium sale. Lynda's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Billy Henderson. The 920 pound steer brought \$2,900 in the premium sale.

Tony Terry showed his middleweight Angus steer to first place honors. Tony sold his steer in the premium auction for \$3.10 a pound. Tony is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Terry of Roby. The steer weighed 1,000 pounds and brought \$3,100 in the sale.

Fisher County 4-H'ers did exceptionally well throughout the entire show. Ten steers and one lamb from Fisher County made the premium sale. Several other steers placed high but were 1 or 2 places out of the sale.

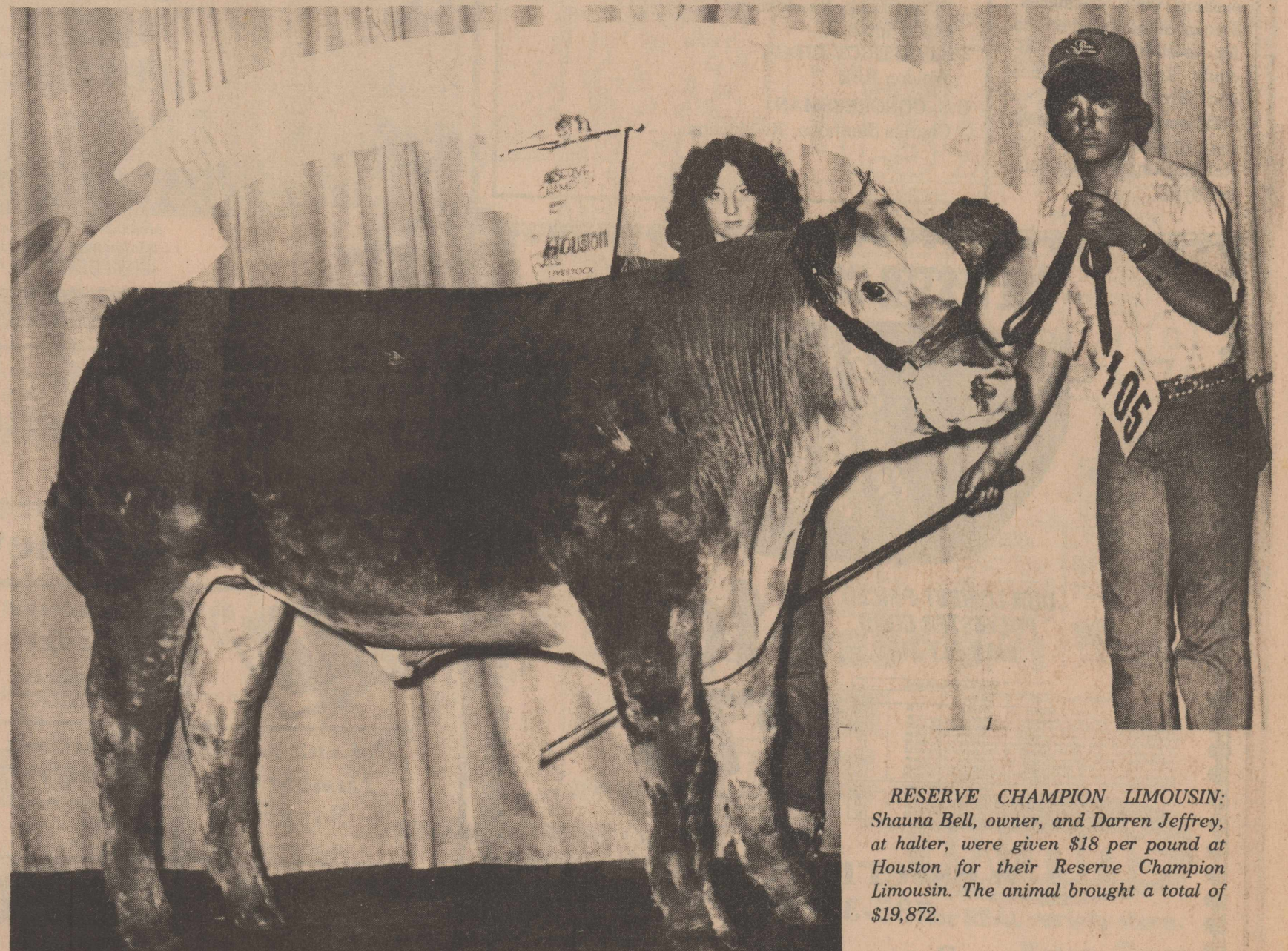
The members will discuss convention plans. All members are urged to attend.



The Census Count

On April 1st, the Bureau of the Census will begin counting the residents of the U.S., Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa and the Trust Territories of the Pacific Islands. All in all, the Bureau expects to total up approximately 222 million people, but the 1980 census will do more than just count citizens. Ever since 1790, when Congress appointed then Secretary of State Thomas Jefferson to direct the first census, the figures have been used to determine population distribution and, hence, the number of seats that each state holds in the House of Representatives. Since the last decade has seen population shifts in a number of states, Congress may face some numerical changes in the next election.

The census also helps determine statistics in such areas as work, marriage and divorce and education. Since Federal law requires everyone to answer the census, 270,000 people have been hired to process the questionnaires, which will eventually be merged into some 300,000 pages of statistics. However, the same law also assures that every person's responses are confidential; not even the President has access to an individual's answers.

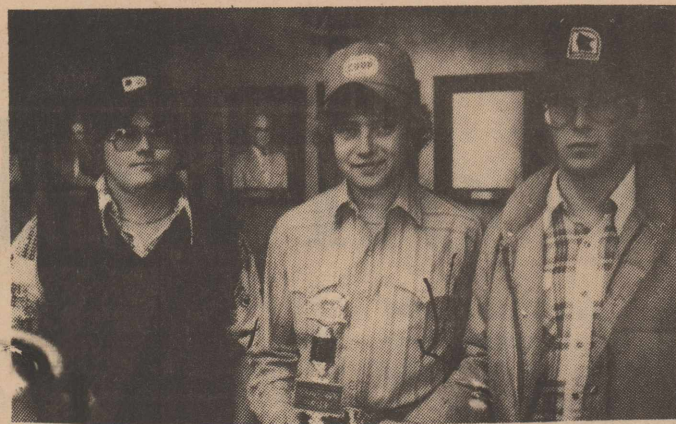

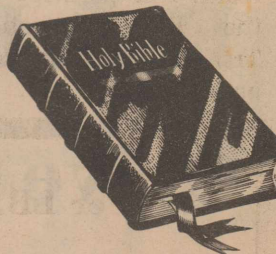

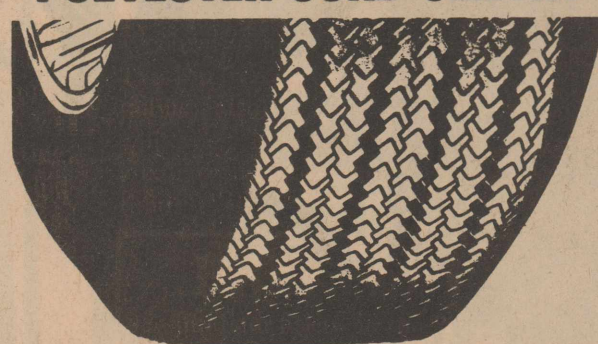

Virginia Green, tax assessor-collector for the McCauley Independent School District, today announced the availability of a new 12-page pamphlet which may help district residents save on their property taxes.

According to Mrs. Green, the pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates, and highlights possible tax savings available to citizens.

The publication was developed by the State Property Tax Board in accordance with the provisions of Senate Bill 621, passed by the Texas Legislature in 1979.

Mrs. Green noted that homeowners are eligible for a \$5,000 school homestead exemption, and that certain disabled persons and those age 65 or older may qualify for additional exemptions from the value of their property.

Also, farmers and ranchers have the option of having their agricultural land taxed at its productive rather than market value.

To qualify for exemptions and deductive valuation, however, application must be made to the school tax office before the district's rendition period ends on April 1.

4-H Guys Win Houston Calves

Alan Kiker, of Rotan, Jeff Upshaw and Terry Lee Coker of Roby, wrestled their calves over the finish line at the February 24 Matinee performance of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo to earn \$400 calf purchase certificates. The certificates will enable them to purchase beef or dairy heifers which they will feed and groom during the coming year. At next year's Livestock Show they will return with their calves to compete in special show ring competition.

The rough and tumble calf scramble takes place at each of the 15 Rodeo performances. Twelve calves and 24 youngsters are turned loose. Each contestant who manages to halter a calf and drag it across the finish line receives a purchase certificate donated by Houston-area businesses and individuals.

While the viewing public sees only the scramble and judging events, the heart of the Calf Scramble program is the knowledge the scramble winners gain in the intervening year. Closely supervised by a Vocational Agricultural Teacher or County Extension Agent, each youth keeps accurate records and performs other obligations designed to underscore the responsibilities involved in raising a calf.

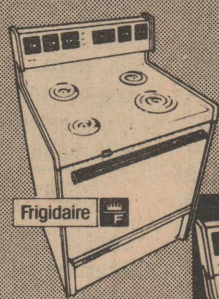
The Calf Scramble is only one example of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo's commitment to the youth of Texas, and the benefits of this one event alone are considerable. Many heifers purchased with these certificates form the basis for future cattle herds. Since the calf scramble program

ruary 22 through March 2, draws first-rate professional cowboys who compete for one of rodeo's richest purses and features top names in entertainment.

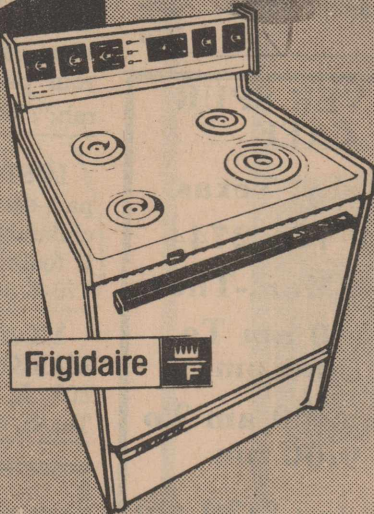
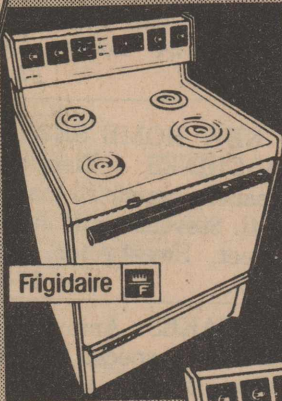
