

Grade School Stays

The Hobbs School Board members, by a 4-3 vote that was broken by board President Howard Gordon, sounded the death knoll for the Hobbs High School and Junior High during a special meeting of the board conducted last Monday night.

The board's most recent action, overturned an earlier decision by the board to attempt to keep the school (grades Kindergarten through 12) open for the 1980-81 year, despite the low attendance that has hovered around 90 average daily attendance.

Hobbs Superintendent M.B. Maxwell, who currently holds a contract through the 1980-81 school year, said that the board's purpose for the special meeting last Monday night was to discuss personnel. The critical votes were taken at that meeting. The first was a motion to reduce the teaching staff from the current 14½ teachers to 11½ teachers. This motion failed by a vote of 2-3 with one board member abstaining and Board President Howard Gordon registering a no-vote. Voting in favor of reducing the teaching staff to 11½ were: Odell Rains and Mickey Templeton; against the motion were Gary Hyer and Ricky Williams and Jerry Hodges. Gary Nettleton abstained from voting and Gordon registered a no-vote.

The second critical vote was a motion to send the Hobbs Junior High and High School students to either Rotan or Roby and hire the Hobbs Elementary teachers for the 1980-81 year. This motion came back to Board President Howard Gordon deadlocked at 3 for and 3 against. Gordon voted in favor of the motion. Others voting for the motion were Jerry Hodges, Ricky Williams and Gary Hyer. Voting against the motion were Odell Rains, Gary Nettleton and Mickey Templeton.

The decision by the

Hobbs Board to close the high school and junior high was made approximately 24 hours before the full teaching staff was scheduled to be re-hired for the 1980-81 year. The board met last Tuesday night for their regular meeting and one item on the agenda was the rehiring of teachers.

The four already holding contracts through the 1980-81 school year included Superintendent M.B. Maxwell, Principal Orville Anderle, Coach Mickey Early and Coach Cherry Eldredge.

High School teachers that could be faced with finding other teaching positions next year include Mrs. Betsy Griffin, English; Mrs. Mickey Early, business; Al Blain, science; Jan Kincaid, math; and Gary Finley, Vo-Ag.

Elementary teachers that could be at Hobbs for the 1980-81 year, although at this writing (Tuesday afternoon) the board has not officially acted, include Miss Susan Anderson, Kindergarten/first grade; Mrs. Maudie Gober, 2nd grade; Mrs. Neva Phillips, 3rd grade; Mrs. Pullig, 4th grade; Mickey Early, 5th grade; and Fran LeBleu, elementary reading.

Hobbs School Will Close

When Hobbs Elementary re-opens next fall, assuming the board sticks with the latest decision to close the high school and junior high, there will be some 40 to 42 students enrolled. This figure could change when the children of teachers that find employment elsewhere, move to new locations.

Approximately 31 students are directly affected by the closing of the

Hobbs schools. Again, this figure is lessened considerably when students of parents teaching at Hobbs find other schools for employment.

The Hobbs Board will meet at 1:00 p.m. on Thursday, March 21, for the purpose of attempting to "determine how to transport students to either Rotan or Roby", according to the Superin-

tendent.

One of the two schools, Rotan or Roby, will be awarded a contract on the Hobbs high school and

junior high students. This contract will involve funds for transportation from the state and will determine UIL sports eligibility for

students.

The Hobbs students are free to enroll at either Roby or Rotan regardless of which school is awarded

the contract. Sports eligibility could be affected, however, if a student enrolls in the school that does not get the contract.

Committee Sets Goal Of \$25,000 To Furnish New Doctor's Clinic

The members of a special committee, formed for the purpose of raising the needed funds for the furnishing of the new Fisher County Doctor's Clinic, met last week and began the groundwork toward reaching a goal of \$25,000.00.

Committee Co-Chairmen James Springer and J.T. Palmer, with committee members Roger Smith, Ruth Ellis, Mrs. Phil Malouf and Clay Fowler are seeding donations from Fisher County resi-

dents. "This is a most important undertaking" said Springer, "We (the committee members) feel that the success of the new Fisher County Doctor's Clinic will be tied directly to the future success of the Fisher County Hospital. We are all interested in seeing that Fisher County has the best possible medical facilities for its residents. Our main purpose is to assist the Hospital District in raising the needed funds to see that each one in our county

is assured of the best possible medical care--when it is needed", said Springer.

The committee members are seeking donations on a volunteer basis. A special fund has been established at the First National Bank in Rotan and the Citizen's State Bank in Roby. Those interested in making donations can mail them to either of the banks, in care of "Doctor's Clinic Fund" or donations can be mailed or given to any of the

members of the committee.

J.T. Palmer made the comment at the committee organizational meeting that he was in hopes the new clinic could be furnished with small, \$5.00 and \$10.00, donations from county residents.

The committee's goal of \$25,000.00 will be used for a variety of needed items. The committee is in hopes of securing enough donations to (1) purchase the needed medical furnish-

ings for the new doctor's offices at the clinic, this would include examination tables, scales, etc., (2) purchase the needed office furniture (desks, chairs, etc.) for the new clinic offices and patient's waiting rooms, (3) install a telephone intercom system between the new Fisher County Doctor's Clinic and Fisher County Hospital, and (4) pave a doctor's parking area near the emergency room.

HOME ECONOMICS

To be ready for the canning season, which is just around the corner, there are several things one should do to be sure your pressure canner is in good shape and safe to use.

It should be thoroughly cleaned and free of mineral deposits. The gasket, for those that use rubber gasket, should be free of grease. If it is stretched broken, a new rubber gasket should be ordered from the manufacturer of the pressure canner.

Then if you'd like, bring your pressure canner to one of the testing sites I will offer in April. On April 2, from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m., I will be testing pressure canners in the Courthouse Annex in Roby. Later in the month of April, I will test canners in Rotan, McCaulley, Sylvester, Longworth and Claytonville. Dates and the place of testing will be in future news articles. If you want your pressure canner tested, come to anyone of these and we will test it for you.

Anyone using a pressure canner should be sure it is in good order, otherwise it may not be safe to use. Pressure canners need to bring the internal temperature of the product being canned to 240 degrees F. in order to destroy bacteria spores present in low-acid foods. Low acid foods include vegetables, rhubarb and most fish and poultry.

If the bacteria is not

destroyed, it grows in jars or cans of food in the absence of air. It produces a toxin that causes the deadly botulism poisoning.

If the canner is not airtight, or does not reach 15 pounds pressure and maintain that pressure for a specified length of time, the internal temperature won't be sufficient to kill the bacteria spores that produce botulism poison.

If you have a microwave oven or if you are thinking of buying one, you'll want to attend the microwave shortcourse being offered beginning March 31.

This series of meetings on the microwave is being offered by Fisher County Extension Agent, Alice Ballenger; Roby Homemaking Teacher, Barbara Martin; Rotan Homemaking Teacher, Martha Alexander; and West Texas Utilities Company Electric Living Consultant, Carolyn Schur.

The first in the series will be Monday, March 31, at 7:00 p.m. in the Homemaking department of Rotan High School. This will include advantages, concept, what to look for in buying, what to do with older models and preparing desserts in the microwave.

The second meeting is planned for Monday, April 7, at 7:00 p.m. and will be in the Homemaking department of Roby High School. This program will be on preparing meals in the microwave.

The third is to be April

14, at 7:00 p.m. in the Rotan Homemaking department and cooking vegetables will be demonstrated at this meeting.

Other information to be included in the three meetings will be recipe books available, containers to use in a microwave.

A \$2.00 registration fee will be charged to cover expenses of the food prepared. Participants will sample all food prepared.

It will be necessary to pre-register for these meetings in order that we will know the number of people to plan for. Pre-registration forms can be obtained from West Texas Utilities Company offices in Roby and Rotan, or in the office of the County Extension Agent in the Courthouse in Roby. 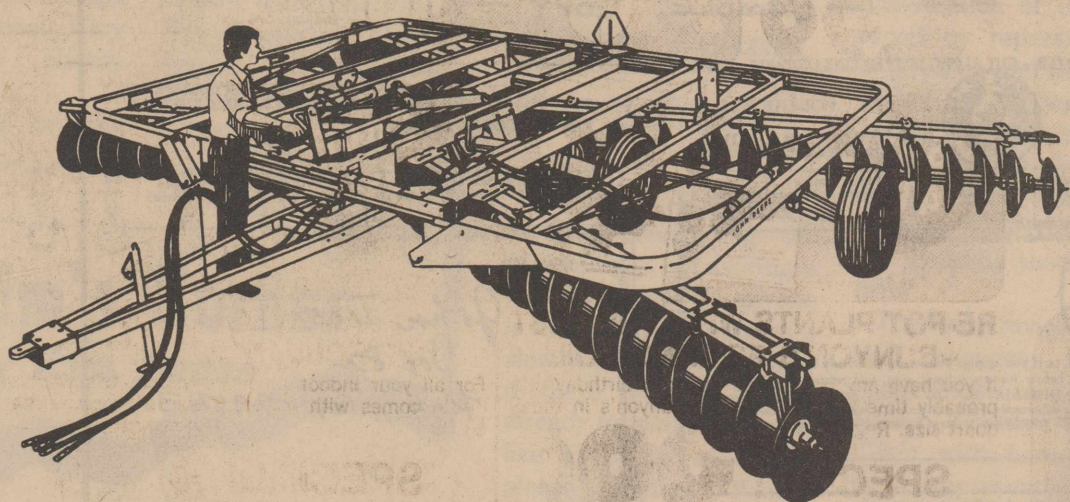

The Academy, founded in 1947 and headquartered in Kansas City, Mo., was instrumental in the establishment of a new primary specialty in family practice in 1969. The new specialty is expected to increase the numbers of family physicians available to serve the public in the future. The Academy's continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.
