



The peak period of boll weevil emergence from overwintering habitat usually occurs during the last week of May or the first week of June. Overwinterweevil of which uniform ed boll weevils live from 10 small percentage of the planting dates are a part. to 22 days after they overwintered boll weevils uniform planting emerge. When cotton is survive until the second

planted after May 20, it will be the second week in July before 1/3 grown squares are present. Boll weevils cannot deposit eggs that will survive in squares until the squares are 1/3 grown. Research has shown that only a week in July.

The uniform planting date also limits the boll weevil populations to hot spot fields. Those are the fields that are near the most favorable overwintering habitat. Producers are urged to adhere to the dual uniform planting dates. If not, the ole boll weevil may be on the increase.
