The board certified the election returns, raised the meal prices for participants in UIL track to \$3.00 for meals and \$2.00 for

breakfasts.

The board approved the 1980-81 school year federal funds report and accepted the resignation of David Hargrove as grade school principal. Hargrove has been hired as the new Rotan high school principal.

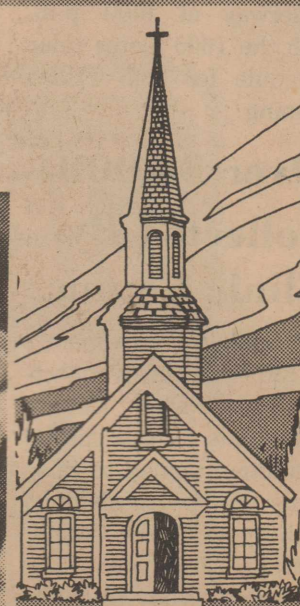

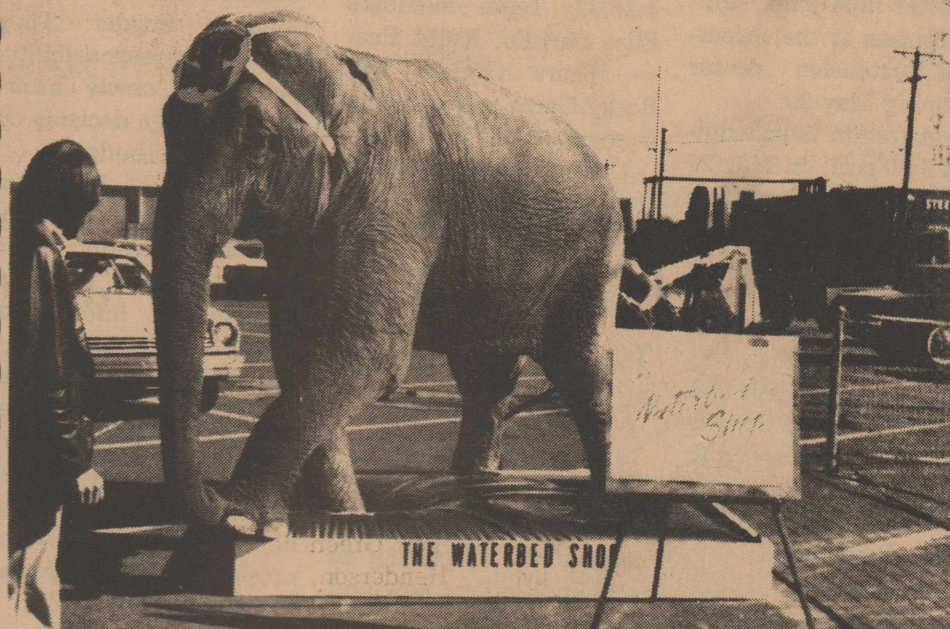

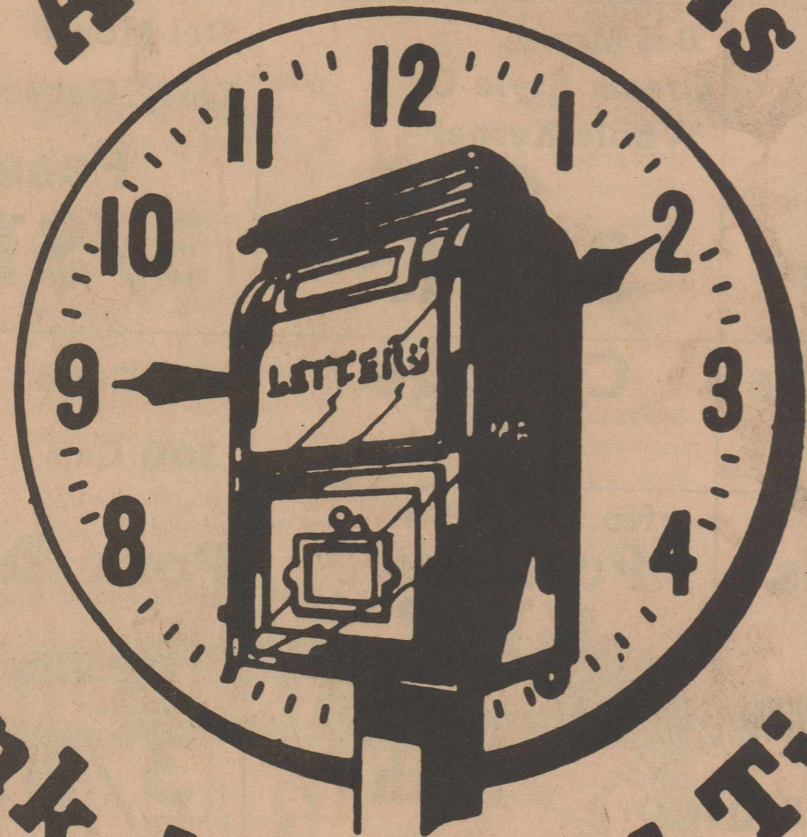

County Crops Committee Sets New Planting Date

The Fisher County Crops Committee met recently and set May 19 and 26 as the dual uniform planting dates for the county. Weevil populations have been light the past 3 years and this is due to management of the boll weevil of which uniform planting dates are a part. The uniform planting

dates are a critical first step in the cotton pest management program. The peak period of boll weevil emergence from overwintering habitat usually occurs during the last week of May or the first week of June. Overwintered boll weevils live from 10 to 22 days after they emerge. When cotton is

planted after May 20, it will be the second week in July before 1/3 grown squares are present. Boll weevils cannot deposit eggs that will survive in squares until the squares are 1/3 grown. Research has shown that only a small percentage of the overwintered boll weevils survive until the second

week in July. The uniform planting date also limits the boll weevil populations to hot spot fields. Those are the fields that are near the most favorable overwintering habitat. Producers are urged to adhere to the dual uniform planting dates. If not, the ole boll weevil may be on the increase.





















W-2 Forms Should Be Given Annual Review

Taxpayers who were hit with an unexpectedly large tax bill or who received a large refund may want to file a new Form W-4 with their employers to adjust the amount of tax withheld from their paychecks, the Internal Revenue Service said.

One of the most frequent cases of insufficient withholding is the two-income family. This is due to the fact that withholding rates are based on the

projected taxes due from each individual wage earner. Working couples find that when they combine their income at the end of the tax year on a joint return, the combined income places them in a higher tax bracket.

On the other hand, taxpayers who pay alimony, have large itemized deductions, or are eligible for tax credits, may find that too much is being

withheld from their pay checks, resulting in an unusually large refund.

To correct for either of these situations, employees should request a new Form W-4, "Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate" from

their employers. If not enough is being withheld, taxpayers may claim fewer allowances or request that the employer withhold an additional amount from each paycheck, or if married, indicate that they wish to be treated as a

single individual for withholding purposes.

If too much is being withheld, additional withholding allowances may be claimed based on payments of alimony, large itemized deductions, and tax credits.
