



# Rotan Council Votes To Have 7 Hole Course, New Ball Field

## Self Destruction

**THE RAINS CAME:** Boy, did they ever come. We needed the moisture, the tanks needed filling, but we sure didn't need the damage caused by the flash flooding. Terraces were damaged, dams were reported broken, several businesses received water damage and the local gyp mill received some 22 inches of water in some locations around the plaster mill. Officially, according to Weather Observer, Willis Ogden, Rotan received 2.43 inches on Thursday May 15th and 4.00 inches on Friday, May 16th. There were some reports of as much as 8 inches north of town. Roby residents received a good rain, but not anywhere near the 6-8 inches that fell in the Rotan area.

**LIBRARY PROGRAM:** We understand the children will have the opportunity to take part in a "Summer Reading Program" sometime in either June or July at the Rotan Library. More information will come as soon as a date is set. Current library hours are from 2:30 pm until 6:00 pm, Monday through Saturday. Incidentally, Nan Arnett said that over 600 library cards have been issued to area people.

**CONGRATULATIONS:** Our congratulations go to Richie Medrano, freshman Rotan High Student, on being named the new Yellowhammer Mascot for 1980-81. We know he'll carry on the tradition well set by Eddie Thomson and Margie Zambrano.

**GRADUATION:** Three of our four Fisher County Schools graduate this Friday night. Rotan, Roby and Hobbs graduate Friday, McCaulley is next week.

**MEMORIAL DAY CLOSING:** Monday, May 26th is the day to observe Memorial Day. Most Fisher County businesses will be closed. The Newspaper Office will close on Monday and observe the normal noon deadline for news on Tuesday, May 27th. We ask your cooperation in getting news items and ads to the office early.

**NEW AMBULANCE:** Fisher County Para-Medic Tommy Harbin made a plea to the members of the Fisher County Hospital Board for a new ambulance last Monday night. The newest van style ambulance has approximately 70,000 miles and is beginning to give maintenance trouble. The hospital board members are planning on meeting with commissioners in the near future and asking for financial assistance. The anticipated cost of a new vehicle is \$30,000.

**HOBBS GRADUATION:** Hobbs will graduate 14 seniors on Friday, May 25th. It may very well be the last graduating class of Hobbs High School. Several Hobbs students are visiting Rotan and Roby schools to determine where they will attend next year.

**PICKED THIS UP** The following came from the Snyder Daily News: "There's somebody, somewhere, compiling statistics on just about anything you can imagine these days. There efforts bring happiness and dismay, depending on your involvement in the subject matter and the results they produce. Unfortunately, statistics can seldom be accepted at face value.

But, it was somewhat encouraging to yours truly the other day to learn that statistics indicate that we are not likely to commit suicide, no matter how hectic things may get around the office.

A group of Washington and Oregon newspapers quoted a U. S. Department of Health study saying that editors and reporters are not inclined toward self destruction.

No particular reason was given, but the writers on the newspapers that published the report had drawn their own conclusions.

"One might speculate that suicide requires a means and time to think about it. Reporters and editors are short on both", they declared.

In case you are curious, the study indicated that law enforcement officers are most likely among career people to resort to self-destruction. Then come owners and managers of businesses and retail managers, dentists, cooks, mine workers, guards and architects. Somehow, we thought politicians and athletic coaches would be in there somewhere, but they are not.

The members of the Rotan City Council voted to close two holes on the existing 9 hole golf course and voted to turn that portion of the course into a girl's softball field and other recreational facilities. The action came at the regular meeting of the council on May 13th, according to City Secretary Kenneth Vann.

Vann indicated that three individuals met with the council expressing an interest in seeing that the 9-hole course was placed in playable condition and maintained. The group, consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Dycus and Phil Springer, told the council members that some 14 interested individuals had pledged \$100.00 a year in golf course dues providing the city got the course playable and kept it in good condition. The group had also secured some volunteers to assist city personnel in initially getting the course in playable condition. After the group left the meeting, Councilman Dorothy Lomax made a motion, seconded by Councilman J. A. Mc Clain, to cut the course to 7 holes and construct a girl's softball field and other recreational facilities. The motion passed by a 5-0 vote.

Vann indicated that the 7 and 9 holes will be closed. The putting greens for holes 7 and 9 are closest to the Rotan Little League field. City personnel removed a fence on Wednesday, May 14th that separated the golf course from the Little League Field and park area. Vann indicated earlier this week that the backstop would have already been installed had it not been for the rains and high water that hit the city late last week. He anticipated beginning construction of the new field as soon as a weather conditions permitted.

In other action the council passed the first reading of an ordinance closing Sheridan Street from the west line of Florence Avenue to the east right of way of highway 70. This was initiated in order to allow the Rotan Gin to construct an area to handle cotton modules during ginning season. The ordinance passed by a 5-0 vote.

Rotan Police Chief Gene Pack reported that mem-

bers of his force had taken part in 19 arrests; 35 calls for assistance; received 8 prowler complaints; responded to 3 fires; assisted during 4 funerals; picked up 6 animals-destroyed 4 and issued 5 traffic citations during April.

In other business the members of the Rotan City Council heard a second request from Ben Reaid and Perry Thomson concerning financial assistance in constructing a combination Fire Department-Community Building. The two estimated that material, cement and doors for the 39 x 150 structure would cost in the vicinity of \$15,000.00. The council tabled the matter but will probably discuss the issue again in June.

Councilmen named a slate of 5 Rotan City residents as possible members of a Tax Equalization Board and authorized City Secretary Vann to secure 3 permanent members and one alternate from the list of potential board members. Those named included: M. F. Hill, Dick Edwards, Larry Landes, Bobby Yates and Bennie Reaid.

Mayor Lester Sencil reported to the council on the monthly financial status of the Rotan Community Center for April. According to reports the Community Center had an income of \$259.55 with expenses of \$1,124.02 for a net deficit for April of \$864.47. During the report it was decided that the City of Rotan will do all mowing and pay for watering the Community Center lawn during summer months.

Council members approved a hike in fees at the Rotan Swimming Pool for the 1980 season. The admission fees for children through age 11 was increased and remains at 50 cents. Fees for adults were increased from 75 cents to \$1.00, according to Vann. The tentative opening of the pool has been set for Tuesday, June 3rd. Ernest Armstrong has been hired as the pool operator with life guard duties being designated to Dean Harbin. The 1980 operating hours will be from 2:00 pm until 6:00 pm-Tuesday through Sunday. The pool will remain open from 8:00 pm until 10:00 pm on Thursday

nights and closed on Mondays. Season ticket prices for children through age 11 is \$20.00, age 12 and up is \$35.00. Private pool parties are \$30.00


with the groups responsible for lifeguards and operators.

In final action the council discussed the possibility of assisting in constructing a

senior citizen's facility. No action was taken. Council members are not going to act on any financial assistance until formally presented a re-

quest for assistance from the senior citizen's group, according to Vann.

The next meeting of the Rotan City Council will taken place on June 10th.

## Hospital Board Seeking New Ambulance Funds

The members of the Fisher County Hospital District board of directors heard a plea from Para-Medic Tommy Harbin last Monday night asking that consideration be given to investigating the purchase of a new ambulance.

After a motion by Glen Popeland and seconded by Kimit Terry the board authorized Harbin \$200.00 in expenses and two days in Dallas to look into the cost of a new unit and possible purchase of a used module type vehicle. Harbin informed the hospital board members that newest vehicle in the fleet of two ambulances owned by the hospital district has over 70,000

miles and is beginning to need constant maintenance. The newest vehicle is a 1976 Van type unit, the back-up unit is the old Cadillac ambulance acquired from Weathersbee Funeral Home when Fisher County took over the ambulance service back in 1975. The Cadillac currently has in excess of 89,000 miles. If the board approved the purchase of a new ambulance it would probably elect to keep both of the units now in service.

Harbin estimated that a new suburban type vehicle would cost approximately \$24,000; new van vehicle \$25,000 and new modular vehicle approximately \$30,000.

In making the plea for a new ambulance, Harbin indicated that he was "concerned for patient care". He indicated that at times the newer ambulance had to be operated at high speeds to transport patients to the local hospital and area hospitals.

Harbin indicated that although the ambulance operation reflected a \$17,000 loss last year that this figure did not take into

consideration the time that both he and assistant Bob Harbin worked in the local hospital. All salaries for Tommy and Bobby Harbin were charged to the ambulance operation account. Harbin also indicated that he was of the opinion that the ambulance service was being operated as economically as possible in Fisher County. He cited as case in Runnels County where a contract was just awarded that required the county to purchase two new units as well as subsidize the operation of the ambulance service to the tune of \$62,500.00

### Rotan Board Meets For Policies

The members of the Rotan Independent School Board met in a special meeting last Monday night for the purpose of reviewing board policies currently being prepared and localized for the district.

The members of the board voted several months ago to enter into a contract with the Texas Association of School Boards for the service.

Kathy Williams, representing TASB, reviewed laws governing school boards, state policies and local school board policies to be included in the new service.

### John Walker Named Deputy Sheriff

Assistant Rotan Police Chief John Walker will replace Darrell Dyer as the Fisher County Deputy Sheriff on Monday, May 26th, according to reports.

Dyer is resigning to accept a position with the Upton County Sheriff's Department in Rankin. Walker has been member of the Rotan Police Department for approximately 2 years

### Members Elect New Chamber Directors

The members of the Rotan Chamber of Commerce voted on seven individuals for four spots as directors for two year terms, according to President Ben Reaid.

Those appearing on the ballot included: Larry McClain, Jerry Dycus, Joe Swafford, Garvis Hinson, Joe Granao, Chrys Bennett and Jo Dickson.

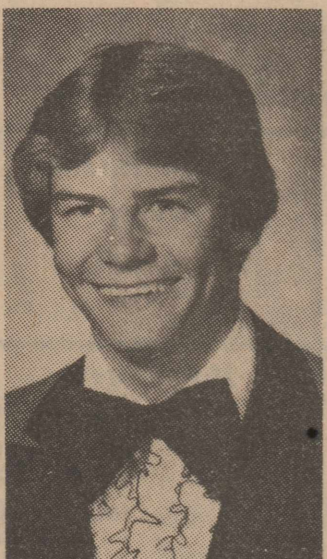

# Hospital Administrator Discusses Finances

Fisher County Hospital Administrator Perry Hunsaker reported to the County Hospital Board last Monday night that the summary of operations of the hospital reflected an \$11,171 loss from operations for the month of April. Hunsaker went on to report that the hospital was operating in the black from operations through the first 4 months by \$38,124.

Operating revenue for April amounted to \$93,654 with the net patient service revenue after the provision for uncollectible accounts amounting to \$88,971. The operating expenses for April

amounted to \$100,143 leaving a loss from operations of \$11,171.

In making his remarks to the board Hunsaker indicated that Dr. V. Carandang had been paid \$6,500.00 by the hospital through the first 4 months of 1980 as the hospital's portion of the \$5,000 personal guarantee to Dr. Carandang. Hunsaker said that Dr. V. Simpao had been paid a total of \$18,000 through April. In concluding his report concerning the doctors, Hunsaker said that approximately one-third of the

\$329,875 operating revenue income through April could be attributed to Dr. Simpao and Dr. Carandang.

Hunsaker concluded his report to the board by saying that patients admitted through April amounted to 427; the first 4 months percent of occupancy was 61.53; and the average patient per day was 18.46. He said that through April of 1980 the emergency room income was up approximately \$1,500 over 1979; x-ray revenue was up some \$6,000 salaries were up some \$10,000 over the same period during 1979 and that laboratory rev-

enue was about the same as in 1979.

In other business the board agreed to include (a) possible changes in board member elections (b) rental or purchase of additional beds and (c) securing bids for the sale of the old clinic office building in Roby.

The next regular meeting of the hospital board is set for June 16th.

WTC will also be offering summer classes at the extension centers in Crosbyton, Rotan, Haskell and Sweetwater. All extension center classes meet during evening hours.

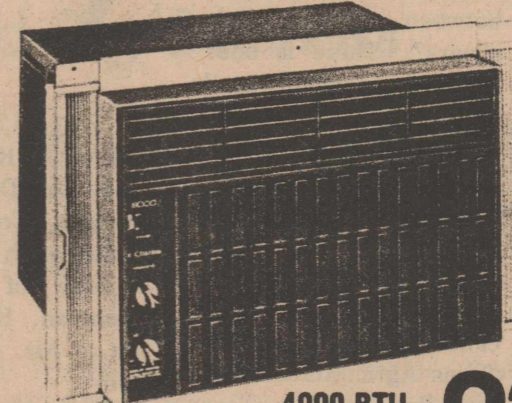

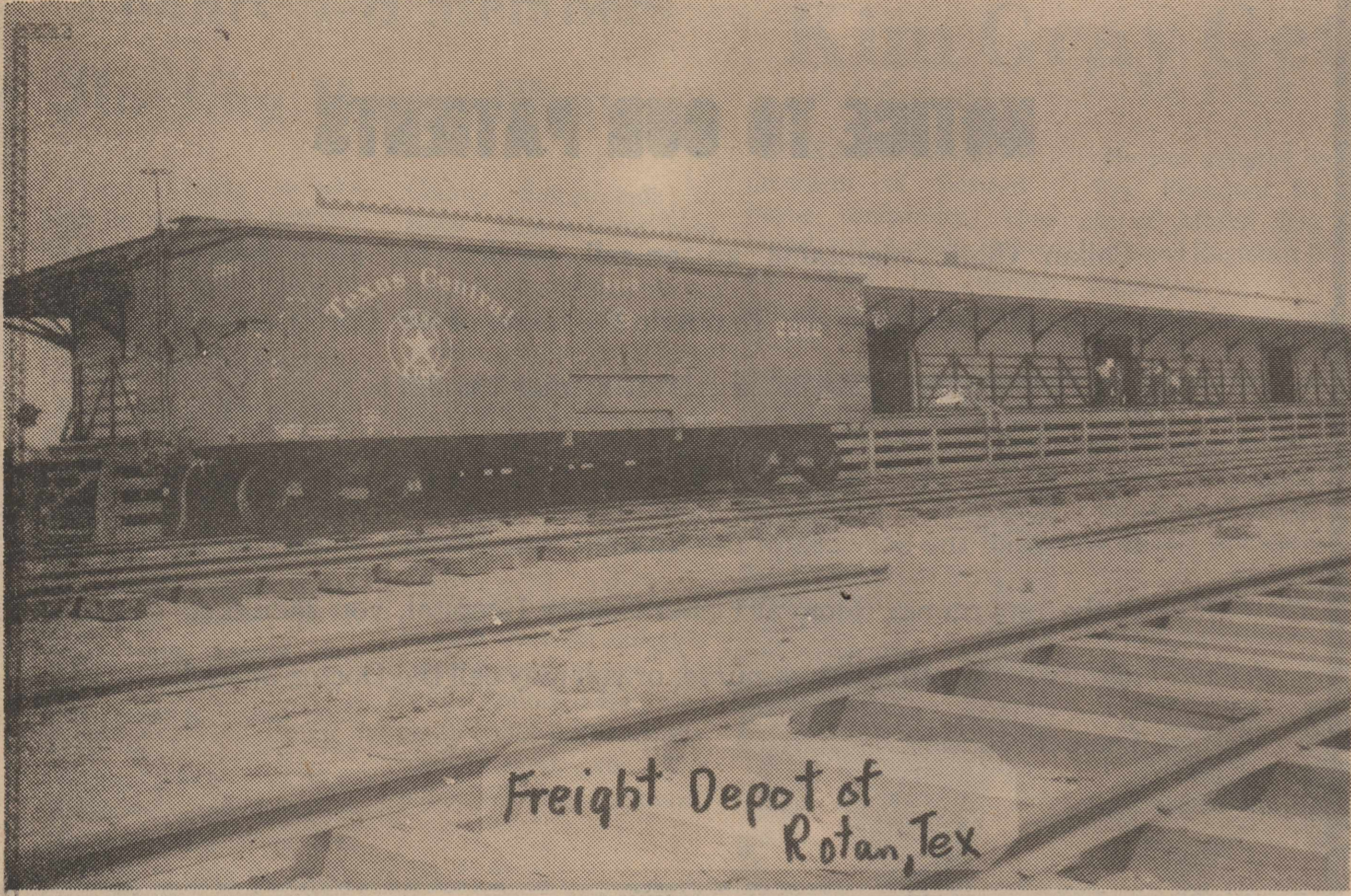

The telephone can be used to: apply for social security payments, apply for Medicare, find out how to change your name or address on social security records, report a change in marital status, report a change in work or earnings, report a lost or stolen check or delayed payment, find out how to replace a lost or missing social security or Medicare card, get help in completing Medicare claims forms, get information about direct deposit of checks, get a benefit estimate, request a statement of earnings record, find out if a particular health facility takes part in Medicare.

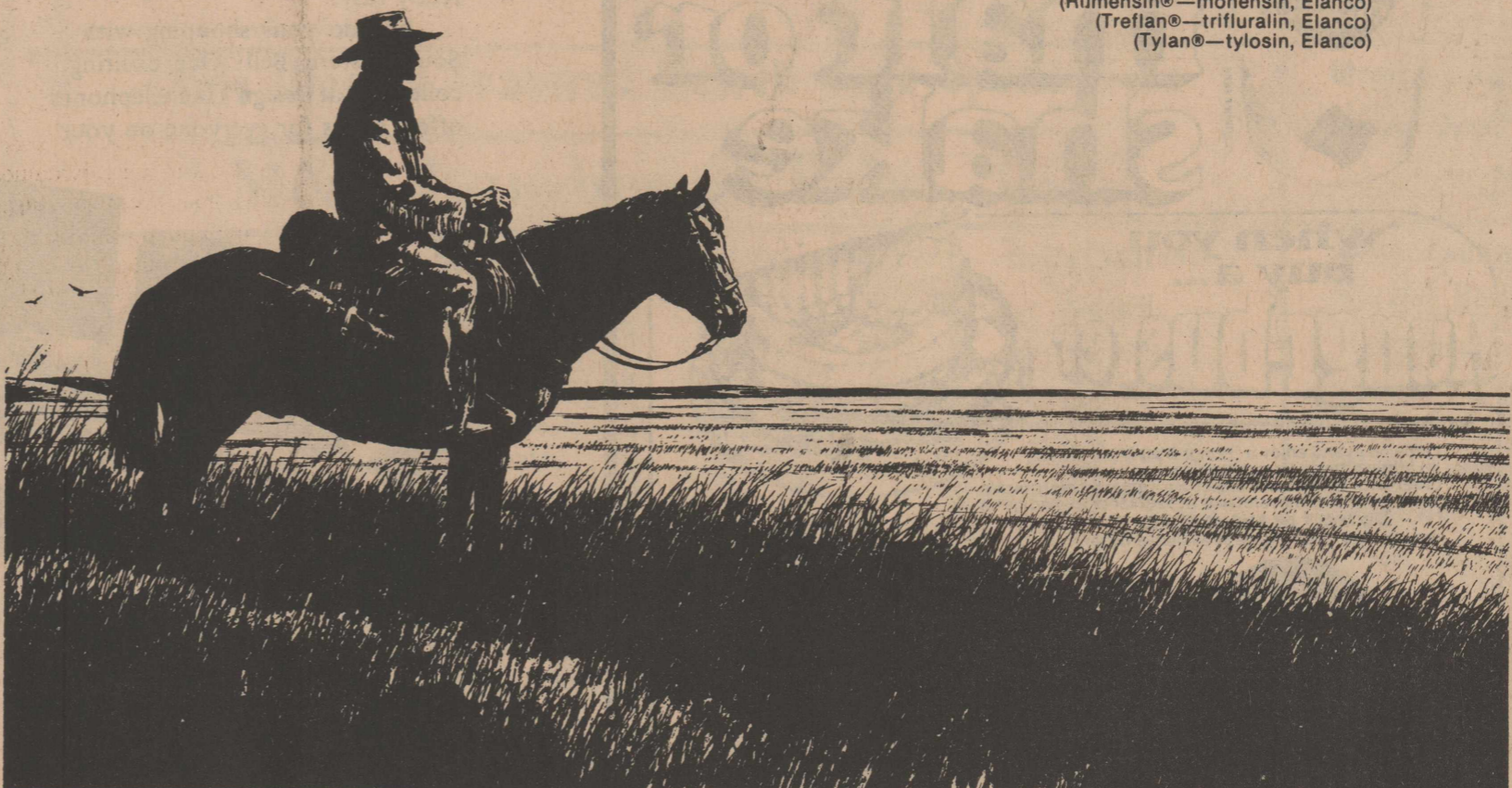

The rains were wonderful. Fisher County farmers and tractors will receive a good workout in the near future planting the old number one cash cropping cotton.

The week of May 26-31 will be the time to spray for pecan nut casebearers. It is too early to tell the exact date yet but when the first larva on nutlets is found it will be time to spray. Be sure to add zinc to your insecticide. Several insecticides are recommended including malathion, zylone and sevin. A second application will probably be needed 5 to 7 days later.

Total cash receipts from Texas animal agricultural products in 1979 are up \$689 million from the previous year. The Extension Service is projecting total cash receipts for meat animals, dairy products, poultry, eggs and livestock products at \$5.3 billion for 1979. This should have an estimated agribusiness impact of more than \$19 billion on the Texas economy.

The excellent beef market is credited for the big jump in cash receipts from livestock.

Cash receipts from crops totaling \$3.9 billion and

\$474 million in agriculturally related income pushed the state's estimated agricultural income past the \$9.6 billion mark, up from \$7.9 billion in 1978.

Based on these figures, Texas still ranks third in the nation, behind California and Iowa, in total agricultural production, but leads other states in sales from marketing cattle and calves, sheep, wool, goats and mohair.

Texas also accounts for 13 percent of the U. S. cattle and calf herd and 16 percent of all beef cows.

Cash receipts from cattle and calves exceeded \$4 billion in 1979, representing more than 40 percent of the state's total agricultural sales. The Panhandle region accounted for almost \$1 billion in cash receipts from cattle and calves while the South Plains was second with nearly a half billion dollars.

During 1979, cattle feeding in Texas represented 18 percent of the U. S. total, and cattle slaughter accounted for 16 percent of the nation's total.

Cash receipts from milk totaled \$450 million last year, second to beef in Texas' animal industry. Northeast Texas boasted \$120 million in milk sales while North Central Texas

came in second with \$81 million.

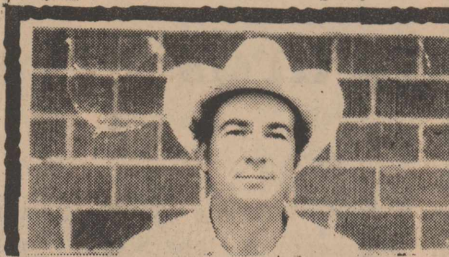
Texas leads the United States in sheep, wool, goats and mohair production. Cash receipts from sheep production ranked sixth in the state last year at \$65 million while mohair added another \$44 million.

West Central Texas led the state in sheep production with \$38 million in total receipts followed by Far West Texas with \$22 million.

Despite the jump in total cash receipts from agriculture in Texas last year

compared to 1978, net farm income increased only moderately due to increased production costs. Recent high rates of inflation and the subsequent high level of interest rates suggest that

the squeeze between costs and sales receipts will be even more severe in 1980. As a result, producers are expected to be more selective in purchasing replacement stock and major machinery items.



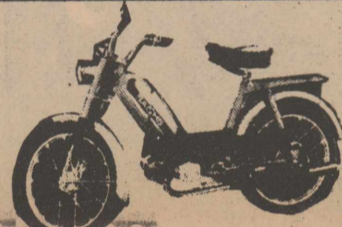
