

Hospital Board Seeking New Ambulance Funds

The members of the Fisher County Hospital District board of directors heard a plea from Para-Medic Tommy Harbin last Monday night asking that consideration be given to investigating the purchase of a new ambulance.

After a motion by Glen opeland and seconded by Kirmit Terry the board authorized Harbin \$200.00 in expenses and two days in Dallas to look into the cost of a new unit and

The newest vehicle is a 1976 Van type unit, the back-up unit is the old Cadillac ambulance acquired from Weathersbee Funeral Home when Fisher County took over the ambulance service back in 1975. The Cadillac currently has in excess of 89,000 miles. If the board approved the purchase of a new ambulance it would probably elect to keep both of the units now in service

consideration the time that both he and assistant Bob Harbin worked in the local hospital. All salaries for Tommy and Bobby Harbin were charged to the ambulance operation account. Harbin also indicated that he was of the opinion that the ambulance service was being operated as economically as possible :- Fichar County.
