Selective Service Registration Begins

Fisher County young men born in 1960 and 1961 will be experiencing their first taste of selective service registration beginning on Monday, July 21, according to local postal

The law requires young men that are U.S. citizens or resident aliens born in 1960 and 1961 to register for the Selective Service by filling out a form at their Post Office.

Young men born in 1960 must register during the week of July 21 while those born in 1961 will register during the week of

Postal Clerks will not answer questions concerning the Selective Service. Those registering will be handed a brochure and if any questions need answering they will be instructed to call the National Selective Service Headquarters at (202) 724-0424.

Rotan Postmaster Charles Thornton indicated early last week that he wished all those who were going to register would do so early in the week of July 21 and July 26. He anticipated some 50 to 75 would register.

Fisher County residents living in the Roby, McCaulley and Sylvester areas can also register at their respective postal offices.

We have a number of working committeess including nominating, membership, service cart, Volunteer Worksheet and Hours, Scrapbook, Social, Telephone, By-Laws and Special Projects. The latter pertains to money raising. "Although organized in

late 1977, we did not function as a unit until January, 1978.

"Currently we have 43 members paying the \$2.00 annual dues. Active members try to give at least eight hours of their time each month to the hospital. Many give much more. Our duties range from passing out juice to patients and delivering mail and papers, to mending blankets, linens, uniforms, etc. The Pink Ladies even lengthened each shower curtain in the hospital to keep the water in the shower instead of on the floor outside the shower.

"We've made receiving blankets, and sometimes purchased them, for the nursery. Some of our more artistic members provide crocheted items and stuffed toys for our gift cart. Many items are donated-others bought at cost or discount. Our expenses are met with proceeds from bake sales and sales from the gift cart. (Incidentally, we are in need of a show case that can be locked--either a donation, or for sale with a "Give-away-price tag"!)

"A number of memorials have been received by the Pink Ladies. These are used to purchase equipment for, or to benefit, the hospital and its patients. None of this is ever used for operation of the auxiliary.

"Donations designated

for a specific purpose are always used for that purpose only. The Pink Ladies have undertaken landscaping of the hospital grounds, and we hope that you have noticed a little improvement. All donations are accepted with a smile and a grateful heart!

"Some special donations are (1) a clock for the east waiting room, Roby Hydro; (2) matching clock for the north waiting room, Citizens State Bank, Roby; (3) the Abilene Reporter News for all patients, Thriftway, Landes Furniture, H.L. Davis Co. and First National Bank of Rotan: (4) the Record-Advance, Kim Pease; (5) paintings throughout the hospital donated, or on loan, by various artists.

"Through our own donations and accomplishments we have purchased a Hare-traction splint for the second ambulance, a "Baby Bird" for the hospital, a Fetel Heart Monitor with two stethescopes, a new hair dryer for the hospital, and provided appropriate plate favors on patients' trays on special days--just to let them know that we care.

"With stamp books we have purchased our own Polaroid camera which we use to take two pictures of each baby born in the hospital--one for the mother and one for our scrapbook.

"Various business establishments have given us flowers and ribbon. We have made arrangements from these to be placed at different areas in the hospital. These, too, are greatly appreciated.

"Babies born in December are sent home in a bright red Christmas stocking--compliments of the Pink Ladies. This year we had a "Welcome Package" for our 1980 New Year's Baby. He picked it up January 18th. However, things do change-there were fourteen new babies reported in three weeks during February!

"We have held blood drives, held a blood pressure clinic, and (through donations) have purchased our own blood pressure machine. We

Powell, Colwell Run **Central Supply Area**

"Central Supply" department sounds simple, but it is a very critical part of the hospital, and very exacting in operation. Here all sterile supplies are stored. The main room is equipped with two sterilizers--one steam and the other ethylene oxide. The steam is used for

rubber goods and plastics. This room also contains a Distiller(Trade name: Ultrapure Stills) for providing the needed distilled water. This machine is powered by electricity.

Everything is here for use in the hall rooms. All linens are stored here and used linens returned here for delivery to the laundry. In this room packs are made up for use in surgery. Mrs. Colwell puts up the surgical supplies in

two ways--either paper or cloth. Supplies and instruments put up in cloth wrappers are reautoclaved when not used within thirty days. The paper wrapped supplies are good for one year. The latter is most often used for linens and must be checked regularly. Each autoclaved or to show that it has been done. Each must be numbered and charted in such a way that each pack can be accounted for and be inspected at any time. The autoclaves are checked at least once each month with the steam autoclaves being checked from one to three times per month.

The Supply Room is the responsibility of Mrs. Colwell and Mrs. Powell.

'The official uniform that is worn by the Pink Ladies is purchased by each member. Our name plates are donated by First National Bank of Rotan. Pins and bars are furnished by the hospital, and each bar represents 100 hours of service.

"Not all or our 43 members can be active on the floor. Many of those who cannot do this, make items for the cart. Qualifications of a volunteer include adaptability, a positive attitude, cooperation, cheerfulness, courtesy, dedication, dependability, knowledge, reliability, tolerance, understanding, and a willingness to learn, to follow instructions, and a desire to give time and energy to service.

'Our main purpose is to do service for the patients in Fisher County Hospital."





The following information regarding the status of the Fisher County Hospital was contributed by Perry Hunsaker, Administrator.

Mr. Hunsaker says, "I belive that the District has come a long way during the past three years. Like all of the smaller hospitals there have been many financial problems.

"The first year out here in the new hospital was really tough. There were fewer patients and less business that had been anticipated. This, coupled with lower oil production and reserves than when the District was created in 1974, (lowering amount of money received from taxes), created a loss of several hundred thousands of dollars that had been expected over a two year period.

"The county wide tax re-evaluation helped the District, and a new doctor could be added to the medical staff. He brought additional patients to Fisher County Hospital. With construction of the new clinic this year, I believe the future prospects for the District and health care for the future look good.

"The new clinic has provided space for doctors. Many of their patients had previously been going outside the county for their health

Dr. Carandang **Finds County** To Be Nice Place To Work


Dr. Virgilio Carandang is a native of the Philippines. His father died in 1979, and his mother remains in the native land. He has three brothers and one

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County Nursing Homes Stress "Care"

Fisher County residents Nursing Home". can be proud of three nursing homes in the county to care for those who must have a place where they can receive competent and considerate care. These are Golden Haven Nursing Home in Roby, Fisher County Nursing Home in Rotan, and Leisure Lodge in Rotan. Even with three, there is always a waiting list.

The following information regarding operation of Fisher County and Golden Haven Nursing Homes is given by Mrs. Al Finch.

Al and Theda Finch own these two facilities, having purchased them from the county in open bidding. For the Finch family things have worked out real well. It has become a family enterprise, and they enjoy it.

Theda is administrator of Fisher County Nursing Home. Jim Finch, their son, and his wive are administrators at Golden Haven. Jim and his wife, Greta, attended Administration School at Austin in order to receive their licenses to manage the nursing home. There are five licensed administrators in the two homes. In order to keep the license intact, each administrator must have forty hours of continuing education every two years.

"Requirements for medicare are established by the Department of Human Resources. One specification is that each patient must be checked by a doctor once each sixty days. Our doctors here are wonderful--they will come on call at any hour, day or night. No one doctor is assigned to the nursing homes. Each patient is allowed choice of his or her doctor and pharmacist. This is good for elderly people who have established a feeling of trust and confidence in their physician. We keep in close contact with each patient's doctors by phone and he will come if he thinks it necessary.

"Al of our employees have a special understanding and love for our patients. They realize that they, most of all, need to be loved. They love to see people and that helps them to be reorientated.

"In Fisher County Nursing Home there are seven private patients who pay all of their own way. For the others, Medicaid pays the balance not taken care of by Medicare. There are about ten private patients in Golden Haven.

"At the present time it becomes more and more difficult for a nursing home to be administered under the Medicare payment plan. To be eligible, one must be referred by a physician, and must need more critical care than previously. Most that we get need 24 hour care.

"No patient even bathes himself, but each is bathed by an attendant. They also receive personal care-shaves for the men and hair rolled for women, etc. We have a thick book of "do's and don't's" that all must be familiar with.

"There is an ongoing in-service training program for all employees. With a heavy turn over this is even more often than would be necessary otherwise.

"Currently, there are thirty-four patients at Golden Haven and thirtyfive at Fisher County

Both Theda and Al Finch are natives of Fisher County. Their only son, Jim, and his wife, Greta, make this operation a family affair. They all love what they are doing and are dedicated to helping those placed in their care, as are all of the personnel at both of the nursing homes under their administration.

Al Finch, in addition to being Assistant Administrator at Golden Haven Nursing Home, is bookkeeper for both homes.

Jim Finch, Administrator at Golden Haven Nursing Home, is also purchasing agent for Fisher County Nursing Home. He has been here for the past three years.

Greta Finch (Mrs. Jim), Assistant Administrator at Golden Haven, is also Faculty Training Co-ordinator at both homes. In addition to Administrator's Schooling, she is currently enrolled in classes toward an Associate Arts Degree.

Fisher County Has Monthly Meeting Of Medical Staff Team

The medical staff of Fisher County Hospital meets once each month, all doctors on staff attend these meetings. Dr. Bennie LeBleu is presently chairman and presides at these meetings. Also meeting with them are the hospital administrator, the director of nurses, lab technician, and medical records clerk.

He also gives a report on cultures which are from all over the hospital and reports whether or not each area is within the limits for safety. This is for the purpose of seeing that everything is properly clean in order to control infections.

the hospital is discussed at

these meetings. The lab

technician gives a report

on blood transfusions-the

number given and any

reactions to them.

Results of an on-going study is discussed at staff meetings. This relates to such matters as several people entering the hospital with the same infection, or come down with an infection while there. This is to watch for a pattern which might warn of an impending epidemic, or some condition that endangers the health of

Reports are also given on tissue that was sent to the patheologist in Abi-

The purpose of these meetings is for the improvement of total patient care.

Dr. C. Callan is Chairman of the Utilization Review. This is where records of patients are reviewed, and the length of their stay in the hospital determined--based on the doctor's diagnosis. This pertains to medicare patients only.

Roy Roberson Heads Up Multi Faceted Maintenance Department

Maintenance Engineer is a multi-faceted term embracing a multitude of responsibilities. The capable Maintenance Engineer for Fisher County Hospital is Roy Roberson. His work began as soon as the ground work was done for construction of the building. He was on-thejob inspector for the entire building procedure including the plumbing, electrical installations, mechanics, painting and all

other work. Since the hospital has been in operation he has been responsible for all maintenance. Much of the repair and upkeep is done by Roy. He is responsible for seeing that work which must be done by someone specializing in the field is promptly taken care of. He checks everything on a regular schedule to see that equipment is, and remains, in good operating condition.

Included in his responsibilities is care of the airconditioning system. There are four air handling units to keep in operation. Filters must be checked regularly. One large chiler unit cools water for the hospital. This is set to keep the temperature at 45 to 50 degrees at all times, winter and summer. This is essential for the operating room.

There are about 40 to 45 airconditioner ducts for heating and cooling the rooms. There is a heat system built into the ducts so that temperature may be regulated according to the needs of each individual room. The compressors must be checked regularly to be certain that they are operating properly and that vents are

Jack Perkins has been Pharmacy Consultant for two years. His visits to Fisher County Hospital are at least once each week, and sometimes he is here two or three times during one week--oftener if need-

His responsibility includes all medications in all areas of the hospital-to check such things as date, stability, and proper amounts in stock. He also checks controlled drugs to be certain that they are properly locked up, and inventory kept.

A drug system was set up after intensive study. Sometimes the Consultant can help secure unusual medications that are difficult to get, or that are rarely needed.

Mr. Perkins graduated from the University of Houston in 1971. His education in this field was acquired through a five year degree program. He worked in M.D. Anderson Hospital in Houston, was a retail Pharmacist in Big Lake, and Pharmacist at Roby. There is automatic change over from one drum to the next when the pressure guage gets down to fifty pounds. When five are depleted a red light comes on. At this comes on, Roy



Harbin Brothers Head Full Time Hospital Para-Medics

Fisher County is fortunate to have the services of three Paramedics. Two of these, Tommy Harbin and Bobby Harbin are full time employees of Fisher County Hospital District; and the third, Jimmy Hayes of Roby works part time, especially on weekends and nights.

Tommy Harbin is Director of Emergency Medical Services, and Bobby is his co-worker. Each has received about one thousand hours of specialized training in emergency situations and emergency medicine.

In the seventeen county area comprising West Texas Central Texas Council of Governments, there are only about twenty paramedics. This includes Sweetwater, Brownwood and Abilene. According to Mr. Harbin, we have the best staffed medical service in the area--one of the few in Texas with only paramedics on staff. He adds, "I have two of the best anywhere around with me-they are really good".

The Harbins are on call 24 hours each day, seven days a week. This amounts to six to eight hours in the hospital, and the rest on ambulance call. They handle emergencies both inside and out of the hospital. Tommy Harbin reflected, "One can't keep, up that pace for many years--jumping up and running a lot at night. But those are emergencies. Much of the time things are on schedule. We both really like this work. If it ever gets to where we don't it will be time for us to get out of it. We are here because we really want to be here"

Before entering this work Bobby Harbin was a professor at Howard Junior College, Tommy Harbin was an ordained minister of the Church of Christ. He feels called to do what he is now doing.

Mr. Tommy Harbin continued, "We run this ambulance service as the Board of Directors tell us to, and one reason it is good is because the Board works closely with us.

"Our one wish is that our people here would use the ambulance service more. It is paid for with tax money and is available to them. Sometimes emergency patients are brought in by car, or even in the back of a pickup--often they would be much better off in the ambulance.

"And sometimes people, with the best of intentions, pick up accident victims to get them in to a doctor. An untrained person should never move an accident victim.

"We carry special equipment for use in emergencies. We carry drugs, oxygen and things like that. The only thing needed now is heart monitors and a fibulator, but they are very expensive and we can't afford it."

Tommy Harbin has been with the Fisher County Hospital for four years. His wife Virginia is now teaching pre-school and kindergarten in Abilene. Most of her pupils are three and four years of age. She drives back and forth to school. They have two children in high school, Dean and Deanne.

Joe Randel **Heads Local** Lab Area

Joe Randel, Chief Lab Technologist, has been with Fisher County Hospital since May, 1980. He came to Rotan from Knox County Hospital.

Joe holds an Associate of Science Degree from Western University, Wichita Falls; MLT (Medical Lab Technician); ASCP (American Society of Clinical Pathologists); and is registered as a Clinical Lab Technician with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. A two year program of specialized training is required, one of which is actual work in Labs.

Cathy Staments, also a medical technician, is part time assistant, and Mary Grace Martinez is Lab Aide. They do the work for the Doctor's Clinic as well as for the hospital.

Routine work involves analytical tests on blood, urine, and feces. They check for blood sugar, blood counts, blood chemistries, etc. The few that cannot be read here are sent to a clinical pathologist in Abilene. They also do bacteriology which can help in diagnosis in some instances. Also, premarital serology examinations can be done in this Lab.

Joe is on twenty-four hour call. Most often this is when a patient suffering a heart attack is brought in. The work here involves blood chemistry checks an EKG. He alternated every third week-end with Barbara Hardin for X-Ray work.

Joe says that the facilities here are good for a community of this size.

Joe and wife Deann Randel are expecting their first child--momentarily. Joe is hoping for a boy--Deann will settle for either a boy or a girl--just so that it is healthy!

P.S. It's a girl--Arrived 5:30 A.m. July 10, named Layla Beth Randel.

Upjohn Health Care **Services Aid County**

Upjohn Health Care Services of Abilene serves a special need in Fisher County as in the surrounding area. Their purpose is to assist as needed in any medical situation requiring basic health care personnel. They perform a service to hospitals, but also to individuals who may have difficulty in finding competent help when needed.

Their group can send someone to serve as a companion for one not needing to stay along, a person who is qualified for an invalid or convalescent not needing professional medical care, or an RN if that is what is needed.

One does not have to be ill to benefit from the services of Upjohn. Say, for example, that a mother is going home from the hospital with newly born triplets. She may need some assistance taking care of them for a few days. Help is available.

The services of this establishment have been of help at Fisher County Hospital. If the staff is short handed for any reason--a nurse quits, is ill, or on vacation, Upjohn will send the help needed until the emergency shortage is alleviated. They have furnished nurses for routine duties, and furnished a Nurses Supervisor on one occasion.

Some private nursing needs have been filled in Rotan. Capable persons will be sent to care for a mentally retarded person who is better off at home, or to help with rehabilitation.

All employees are carefully screened and persons needing their help may be confident that each employee is the best that can be found. For those coming from other places of work, only the best are employeed. The standards are high. All employees are bonded and insured.

All employees are paid through Upjohn and all of the records and paper work is done by them. This is good for the client as it relieves them of much record keeping and tedium It is also convenient for the nurses as they are paid through the office and

records are all in one place. Another plus for nurses is that this company pays more than is usually paid by a hospital. Also, the employee can choose days and hours that is best for

Like the Harbin brothers, Jimmy is enthusiastic about the work of this group. He is on call at all times, helps on weekends and emergencies, and any time that he is needed. He works for Midwest Electric Coop, but they are cooperative with the program and allow him to go when called. Emergencies with which they work are in the hospital as well as out.

Jimmy says, "the paramedic works strictly through the doctors. They must have many skills, and about one-fourth of the training deals with respiratory techniques. The old ambulance which was first taken over by the county is kept in Roby unless I am out of town, then it is parked at the hospital.

"I feel good to be a part of this medical program because it is gratifying to be able to help people. But work in this field demands total dedication, and none better than Tommy and Bobby Harbin could be found anywhere. Both are so dedicated-they make it their life.

"There is a constant need for study to keep up with new techniques. Our area is so fortunate to have the equipment and the personnel that we have





Heroic-brave, noble and fearless--epitomizing men of great courage and noble deeds, is larger than life. Genre-a style or type-represents every day life and manners in a realistic way. Our "Tapestry of Service" is a continuing an dalways enlarging sketch of Health Care in Fisher County and those who administer that

Nothing in life is an entity unto itself. Our new Doctors Clinic is no exception, nor is Fisher County Hospital. These are only the latest threads woven into our "Tapestry of Service". Nor can any small part of the tapestry be viewed with genuine understanding without an appreciation and view of what has gone before.

The warp (threads fixed

in the loom upon which our tapestry is woven) represents the heroic motif personified by the pioneering doctors of Fisher County. It is strong--made of courage and stamina. Those like the late Dr. J.D. Davis who came to Roby in rest of his life. He arrived with \$2.00 in his pocket, and set up practice as the first doctor in Fisher County. In an interview given by Doc Davis in 1826, he stated that a doctor in those days had to do daily labor during slack times in order to make a living. There were not too many people, and not much sickness. Most of his patients were from broken bones, rattle snake bites, or the arrival of new babies. At one time he had an epidemic of measles--100 cases--because a cowboy with measles attended a dance where the entire population had gathered from miles around. One of his daughters told this writer that her father lost few patients other than apendectomies--about 50 percent of those died. Most often he was never paid for his services. One of Doc Davis' sidelines to supplement his income was breaking broncs for the ranchers. He represents the very first picture

"Tapestry of Service". Dr. Frank Keifer came to Roby prior to 1890. He doubled as both doctor and minister. The doctor in those days had to be a walking pharmacy and supplies of medicines were always carried in a little medicine bag with pockets arranged for that purpose. Dr. Keifer's medicine bag--replete with pills and ready to go--is now in possession of Mrs. Connie Tutt. Another picutre-portraying both the heroic and genre--was woven into

Surgical Hall Is Critical **Hospital Area**

Continuing on tour from Central Supply, explained by Mrs. Nettie Powell, Mrs. Rena Colwell takes up as guide for an educational tour of special rooms and equipment.

The Surgical Hall is off limits to visitors. In this hall there is a lounge for nurses, and a lounge for doctors. A critical area is the operating room which an authorized visitor may view only from the door-when it is not in use. The O.R. is well equipped with a table which tilts to all positions, even a slant to the side; good lights which can be adjusted to all directions for localized spots; and heart monitors which are in use at all times during surgery. The ceiling is equipped for piped in anesthetic gasses. oxygen, air and suction. A C.R.N.A. is present all through the surgery.

Within the operating room there is storage for a good supply of sterile supplies, and many sutures. Two lap sets, such as needed for an appendectomy, are kept here. The room is equipped with a steam sterilizer, but there is also a little Flash Sterilizer that is for use if a doctor should drop an instrument that is the only one of its kind in the room. With the Flash Sterilizer it can again be used in a few seconds.

There is an extra Board which can be used if the surgery patient is asleep, and heavy, and can't move himself. It is a roller board, and a great help.

One of the newer innovations is a frame for a person suffering from a broken limb who must be taken out of traction to go into surgery. On this, the natient can be moved from the bed to the stretcher, and again, onto the operating table. This is a great pain saving bid of equipment.

No person ever walks into the room where surgery is performed wearing street shoes. And mops used in this area are never used on any other

There are two Isolation Rooms, with a front entry, wash basins, and the like. These have cardiac monitors, and can be used for patients who do not require Intensive Care-and it is less expensive. The hall also contains four double rooms especialy for the use of Medicare and Medicaid patients as they are less expensive than private rooms. However, these may be placed in private on recommendation of their doctors. In these rooms there are two TVs and a bath.

Nothing infectious is placed in the North Hall. Any infectious patient is placed in the East Wing.

There are waiting rooms located in convenient places on the wings. These, in case of emergency, can be converted to patient

ance that equipment is there for use by the doctor and nurse which is adequate for any emergencies. Surgeons on staff are Dr. C.M. Callan, Dr. Bennie LeBleu, and Dr. Jerry Edwards who comes from Sweetwater each Wednesday.

The Cysto Room in the surgical hall is a place where minor surgery can be done if the operating room is in use. It has an automatic up and down table, and is used especially for urinary examinations etc. There is a bath room there, and a closet for extra surgery packs.

One of the newest machines is for Band Aid Liigations which is a relatively new fad. Here is an Insufflator, and Laparoscopic equipment.

This room is also provided with ceiling hose air, oxygen, etc.

In the recovery room, where all patients are placed following surgery, are wall suctions, wall air, and oxygen. Most patients are put on oxygen here. There is a PTR Resusutator for use if a patient should stop breathing. All of the rooms in this department are one the two-way intercom connecting the lab, delivery room, O.R. X-ray and recovery room. It is used most often in the O.R., but here it may be necessary to call for more blood, or assistance.

Mrs. Colwell usually recovers the patient. If there is more than one patient it may be done by an RN, LVN, or one of the Paramedics.

The entire hospital is equipped with an auxiliary power system which is indicated in the rooms by red plugs, and outlets. This for use in case of a rooms, one single, and the power failure. It is auto- other with two beds. All matic in the Recovery have TVs. Room, but if needed in other rooms they must switch plugs manually.

The anesthesia Supplies Room is where anesthetics and

medications are kept. The medications are double locked--in a cabinet, and also the room door.

The O.B. Department is conveniently located near the Surgery Department. Here is a closet for storage of surgical supplies, everything sterile. Water and blankets are warmed for use, if needed, after surgery. There are facilities for laundering soiled linens before sending them out to the laundry.

Adjacent is the Labor Room. There is only one, but two can be cared for easily here at one time-and often are.

There are two types of fetus scopes here. One was bought by the Pink Ladies. Fetal heart tones are always checked when the patient comes in. There is a TV in this room to help pass the time.

When the patient is ready, the table she is on is rolled into the delivery room, where it is converted for this use. The table provides space for convenient storage of supply packs and other things needed there, all ready for use in O.B.

In this room is a warmed Incubator in which the new born baby is placed as soon as possible. It is plugged in when the room is set up. There are outlets for oxygen, suction, etc. A little Baby Emergency Kit is at hand for use if needed. Also, a little Resusitator for baby if required. The intercom system keeps those working in this room in touch with the Nurses Station, Lab, etc.

A new born baby is automatically weighed and eyes treated. In the O.B. Department there is room for three partients--two

Doctors scrub and wear surgical clothing the same as for surgery.

Nurses and surgeons working in O.R. Rena Colwell and Nettie

Powell are the Surgical Nurses. Nettie is Scrub Nurse and Rena assists in O.R. The place for the doctors to scrub has automatic water control and standard or foot pump for soap. Nettie works only until noon because she is

on 24 hour call. Rena Colwell makes certain that all medical needs are in good supply, also checks the hall supplies, and checks to be sure all equipment is working properly. She puts up all sterile solutions for the floor and for surgery with the exception of I.V.s.

A routine job is keeping track of when surgery is scheduled, and that the anesthetist is called. Rena's responsibiliteis also include knowing that there is an ample supply of surgical linens on hand. Linens are a problem--Rena mends the surgical linens in her spare time (when does she have that?). The surgeons use little in the way of disposable linens which are very expensive, easily wasted, and the doctor's don't really like them.

Record Keeping is no small responsibility in this department. Mrs. Colwell keeps all autoclave records, recorded monthly; all of the hours which every RN spends in surgery and in the O.B. room; and all of this is added up for the year. Two books are kept for surgery, and one for the Delivery Room. Records show what was done and by whom-doctor, anesthetist, nurses--and any unusual hap-

Mrs. Colwell also keeps the sponge count, needle count, and sees that the Lab gets specimens--and that this is all recorded. A monthly report is given to the Board.

Rena Colwell says that she does Nothing Else except work in the hall when needed--usually on weekends. She doesn't mind being on call and up nights on emergency. If she can help people, she wouldn't have it any other

Oil Tax Money Expected To Increase Locally

Preliminary projections from representatives of the appraisal firm of Pritchett and Abbott of Fort Worth, indicate that the Fisher County County Hospital District and Fisher County Commissioners Court will have some \$267,000 in additional funds to spend after taxes are collected beginning in October 1980.

This information was discussed last Monday morning at the regular meeting of the Fisher County Commissioners Court. It is expected that the Hospital District could receive \$119,000 while increases to Fisher County could reach as high as \$148,000.

The primary reason for the increase is due to the locked-in price of oil as of January 1, 1980. At that time oil was selling for \$15.00 a barrel. During 1980 the oil price escallated to \$28.00 and peaked at \$32.00 a barrel. The computations for taxing purposes were based on \$15.00 a barrel of oil. Fisher County Judge Marshal Bennett informed commissioners and Fisher County Hospital Administrator Perry Hunsaker that he felt the slightly more than a quarter of a million dollar increase was just a one shot deal.

Fisher County Commissioners will meet with Pritchett and Abbott representatives and representatives of the major oil companies with substantial holdings in Fisher County for the annual equalization tax meeting on Thursday, July 24. In other action, there
