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Tips Given on Getting Most From Cooling

Consumers can get more from their "beat-thesummer-heat" dollar, says Dr. Jane Berry, a housing and home furnishings specialist.

Dr. Berry is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

She suggests some simple, no-cost steps consumers can take immediately to maximize cooling.

Raise the air conditioner thermostat to the highest comfort level possible. This will reduce energy consumption from three to 10 percent for each degree the thermostat is raised.

When it's excessively hot outdoors, turn the thermostat up even higher to keep from overworking the air conditioner.

sults when a difference of no more than 15 to 20 degrees is maintained between inside and outside temperature. Fans, used either by

themselves or with air conditioning, can enhance summer comfort while saving energy. While a one-ton air

conditioner costs around seven cents an hour to operate, a fan costs less than one cent an hour to run. Fans won't make any change in the room's actual temperature, but the constant breeze they provide will make you

'feel" much cooler. In fact, set the air conditioner at 82 degrees F., use a fan to circulate the air, and experience the same comfort as if the air conditioner were set at 74

Windows and glass areas transmit most of the radiant heat they are exposed to. So, block out heat on those sides of the house that get direct sun exposure. Draw shades or draperies on the east side in the morning and on the west side in the afternoon to reduce the heat load the air conditioner must remove.

First Aid For Heat Victims

Heat Cramps: The person most likely to get heat cramps is someone in good physical shape who overexerts during a heat wave. The victim sweats profusely then doubles up with pain--which can vary from dull pain in the abdomen and tingling sensation in the arms and legs to intense crampy pain in the abdomen, arms and legs. The victim usually is unable too function.

The key to treatment of heat cramps is salt replacement, but don't try salt tables; they will only increase nausea. Get the patient to a shady spot or into a cool room and give him salty liquid. A teaspoon of salt in a quart of lemonade is effective and palatable. Or try one of the flavored, commercial available saline solutions such as Gatorade or Take Five.

Don't massage the muscles to "work out" the cramps; they aren't that kind. The patient will respond promptly to salt replacement.

Anyone who has had heat cramps should rest for at least 12 hours before resuming normal activity; if any further symptoms develop, he should have medical attention immediately.

Heat Exhaustion and Heatstroke: Consider these together because the most important aspect of first aid is telling them apart. Heat exhaustion needs care, but it is not usually life-threatening; heatstroke is rare, but it's definitely life-threatening and you need to go into

cloths soaked in cool water or alcohol. Usually the person feels better promptly, but if he seems fatigued, is elderly, or has a chronic disease, he should see a doctor. In any case, he should take it very easy for 2-3 days, meanwhile salting his food

heavily If the person is obviously feverish, it's probably heatstroke, and minutes count. You must get his temperature started own or he's in real trouble.

Call for an ambulance, then strip off his clothes and start cooling with whatever means you can find. A bath in a tub of cold water and ice is ideal, but a massage with ice cubes or ice packs is more likely to be practicable. Rub the victim's arms and legs with handfuls of ice cubes. Get others to help if possible.

If you can get a rectal temperature reading so the ambulance crew or the doctor at the hospital can tell whether the temperature is dropping. The patient should be rushed to the hospital emergency room as soon as possible, so professionals can take over.

If you're isolated from hospital or professional emergency care, keep in mind that--after starting his temperature down-vou must replace water loss

In both conditions, the victim collapses.

In heat exhaustion the skin is pale, cool, and moist, and the temperature is about normal. But in heatstroke, the person's skin is reddened fiery hot to the touch, and dry; his temperature may be 106 deg. F or more. With either condition the victim will be disoriented at best and probably unconscious, especially with heatstroke.

Early treatment of heat exhaustion is much the same as for cramps; Move the victim to a cool spot and try to get him to drink salty liquid. Also, remove his clothing and cool him off by bathing him with


