**ANNIVERSARY:** Rotan Police Chief Gene Pack is beginning his second year as the head of Rotan law enforcement. Pack first joined the force as a patrolman in April of 1979 and was named Police Chief in August of 1979.

**QUEENS WILL REIGN:** Naomi Counts, Senior Queen, and Andrea Callan, Junior Queen, will be riding in Thursday's parade that will kick off the 1980 Fisher County Fair and Rodeo festivities. A total of 15 girls [8 seniors and 7 juniors] will be presented on Saturday night after the grand entry and the 1980 queens will be crowned.

**ROBY COACHES:** The Roby football coaches were busy laying off yard markers at the Roby Field last Saturday morning in preparation for the Friday night scrimmage in Roby against the Rochester Steers. at 6:30 p.m. The field is in good shape, the team looks good and from all indications 1980 should be good year for the Lions.

**RETIRING:** Rotan's John Young, owner of Young's Market, one of the oldest businesses in Fisher County is retiring. He began a close-out sale several weeks ago and plans on closing the store in the very near future.

**SHOOTING SKUNKS:** Rotan Police Department personnel indicated that they will be making a sincere attempt to kill skunks within the city limits of Rotan for the next few weeks and cautioned residents to keep pets in the house during this period. It seems that over 14 skunks were reported in different locations with the City of Rotan recently and police are going to make a stab at eliminating the pesky animals before the problem becomes a big stink.

**NO ONE HURT:** For the first time in two years, no one was hurt in the first Rotan Varsity scrimmage. Picked by Dave Campbell's Football Magazine to finish 4th in the state this year, the Yellowhammers face a tough 8 game district schedule that begins on September 19 with Winters. Rotan travels to Crosbyton on Friday night for the final season scrimmage before the season opener with Roscoe on Friday, September 5.

## Muscular Dystrophy Labor Day Telethon

The Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon has been called "the TV super special of the year". The entertainment spectacular broadcast live from Del Webb's Hotel Sahara in Las Vegas, will be seen this year in the Big Country over KTAB-TV, Channel 32, starting at 8:00 p.m. Sunday, Aug. 31, and ending at 5:30 p.m. Monday, Sept. 1.

The annual 21½ hour marathon to benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA) will again feature comedy, music and dance by some of the biggest names in show business, in addition to reports on the progress being made in the fight against neuromuscular disease. For the eighth consecutive year Ed McMahon will back up Jerry as anchorman.

Telethon '80, the 15th Labor Day Telethon to benefit MDA's research and medical service pro-

grams, will be carried by over 200 stations in the continental U.S., Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Last year's Telethon produced a record pledge total of over \$30 million, and Jerry Lewis predicts that this year's show will do even better. He says, "Our Labor Day Telethon is a love-in. It's an outpouring of concern and generosity unparalleled in any other American fund-raising event. Young and old alike, people join together in a unified effort to help 'my kids'. Their faith and support gives me the confidence to say we will win the fight against muscular dystrophy one day very soon."

KTAB-TV 32 will cut away from the network show for 15 minutes every hour to introduce leading MDA supporters in the community and to present reports on MDA activities in the Big Country.

## DPS Predicts 45 To Die In Auto Wrecks

The Texas Department of Public Safety has urged motorists to be "exceptionally careful" during the long Labor Day weekend because of the increased volume of traffic which can be expected.

Colonel J. Adams, director of the DPS, said "Labor Day, the last holiday of summer, becomes the last holiday period for far too many Texans and many more have their holiday ruined by a traffic accident."

"Our Statistical Services Division of the DPS, has predicted that 45 persons may die during this 78-hour period. In order to provide maximum protection for the driving public we are placing additional Troopers on the highways. Most will be in well-marked, black-and-white units, although unmarked units will be utilized to detect those determined violators

who make the highways unsafe for others." He also said they will be especially watchful for drunken drivers.

Col Adams said we can easily overcome the predictions if motorists comply with the speed limits, use their seat belts, avoid driving while impaired by alcohol or drugs and watch out for the other driver.

Weathersbee completed 7 of 16 passes, had one pass intercepted while


Munday's signal caller completed 4 of 11 and tossed two interceptions.

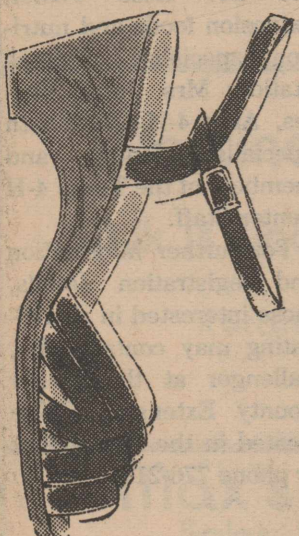

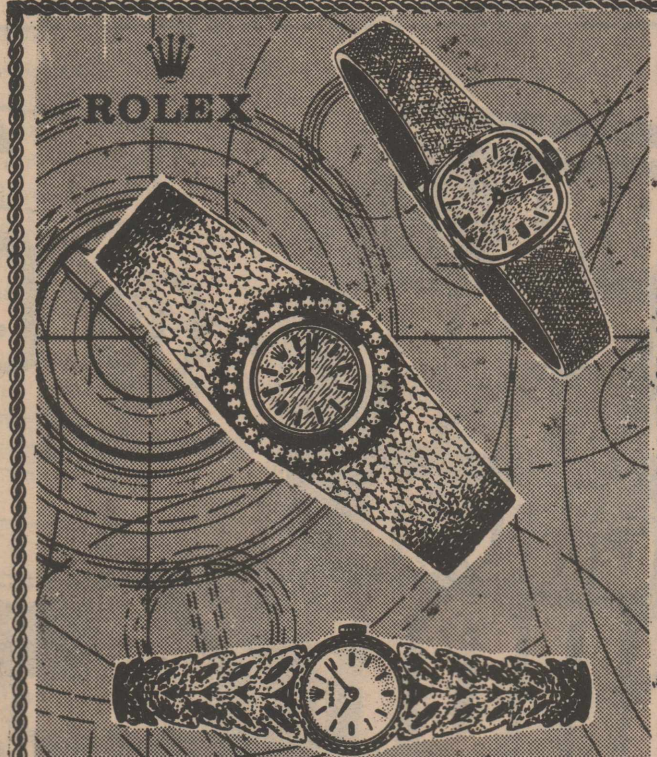

Many peach trees, because of the drought and hail damage, are in poor condition. These peach trees must be protected from borers to prevent excessive damage and to get them in good condition for fruit production.

In Fisher County there are three borers, two moths and a beetle, which attack peach trees and can directly or indirectly destroy them. The moths are the peachtree borer and the lesser peachtree borer and the beetle is the shothole borer.

The peachtree borer and the lesser peachtree borer feed on the cambium and inner bark. The peachtree borer feeds at or below the soil line and the lesser peachtree borer feeds above the ground line in the trunk and limbs. Peachtree borer moths are active from late May through September and the lesser peachtree borer moths are active from February through September.

Peachtree borers complete a generation each year while a high percentage of lesser peachtree borers complete two generations annually.

The damage caused by the peachtree borer often goes unnoticed because the larvae confines their feeding activity to the lower tree trunk near the soil line. Gum mixed with frass, excreted material, can be found around the base of infested trees. Peachtree borer larvae are capable of girdling the trunk resulting in the tree's death. Even if the tree is not girdled it will be devitalized and more susceptible to damage by other insects and diseases.

Lesser peachtree borers often attack trees that have been damaged by peachtree borers. Trees that are in good condition are not frequently attacked by lesser peachtree borers. Insecticide applied for other insect pests also help prevent attack from the lesser peachtree borer. Gum and frass exudes from holes in the trunk and limbs caused by the lesser peachtree borer.

Shothole borers only attack peach trees that are in very poor condition. The small beetles, which are

1/10 inch long, tunnel into the bark making small holes. Several small holes are often observed in a group. Under the bark the beetles construct tunnels 1 to 2 inches long which run parallel to the grain of the wood. Galleries radiating

from these tunnels are made by the developing shothole borer larvae that hatched from eggs deposited along the central gallery.

Damage caused by the shothole borer and the lesser peachtree borer is

best controlled by keeping trees in healthy growing condition. Pruning out weakened or dead limbs also aids in their control.

Lorsband 4E is only available to the commercial grower for control of

peachtree borers. It is sold only in five gallon cans. Paradichlorobenzene crystals (PDB) and Rhodoin can be used by the individual who has a few trees. Treatment with Lorsban should be made during August or September

and PDB should be applied between October 20 and November 15 when the soil is dry and the soil temperature is 55 deg. F. or above. To avoid damage to the tree PDB should be applied according to the directions given on the

label. Lindane is also available to control of the peachtree borer. The material can be used anytime but it would be most effective if applied in August or Sept. It is to be applied only to the trunk not to the foliage or

fruit. Control of the peachtree borer can greatly lengthen the life of peach trees and result in a stronger tree which can better resist attack from the lesser peachtree borer and the shothole borer.
