A FARM STORY: This recently appeared in the weekly column written Afton Richards of the Jayton Chronicle. A farmer is a man who wears out three pairs of jeans

trying to grow enough cotton for one pair. A farmer starts every year with nothing, loses everything he grows, and at the end of the year comes

Nobody knows how he does it. He doesn't even know himself. What are farmers made of?

Farmers are made of bent nails, rusty bolts, barbed wire, and bruised knuckles, and are held together with callouses and guts.

Planting time and harvest season, he finished his forty-hour week by Tuesday noon, then painin' from tractor-back, he puts in another seventy-two. He loads his planter with \$2,000 work of seed, fertilizer, herbicide and insecticide. That's one hour's worth. In a normal farm afternoon, one to ten p.m. he'll bury \$15,000 in the ground. Odds are it'll get too wet or too dry--or there'll be hail, wind, early frost, early snow, bugs, brick-bat and bureaucrats.

And if he gets a good crop, he won't meet expenses. Yet, the only lines on a farmers face are from grinnin'.

You look at his unattended chores, unpainted buildings, unsharpened tools, and unmended fences and vou say, "The smartest man in the world would starve trying to do all that.

And you're right, the smartest man would starve. But not the farmer. His wife won't let him.

She has a basic menu. She serves what she has. In good years, that may be six vegetables at one meal. In lean years she jumps from poke salet to black-eyed

The farmer orders a seventeen inch John Deere disc plow, \$5,000. By the time it's delivered it's \$7,000.

He's got a \$50,000 machine needing repair. It's 5:30 p.m. and the implement companies are closed. And he's got five hours of daylight he can't let go to waste.

So he borrows a machine from a neighbor, is moving it down the highway when he's run into a ditch by some joker pullin' a boat.

Yet he remains the world's most stubborn optimist. He believes that the fact he's come this far proves he can go the rest of the way.

He buries last year's disappointments with springtime plowing because his faith is not in himself alone. He'll finish a hard week's worth with a five-mile drive

He plants in hope, cultivates in faith, and ends in deht...then starts over with greater hope and stronger faith. Heaven help the family that depends on a farmer

Heaven help the nation that doesn't have him to support it.

Hospital District Is \$44,000 Loser By Error

The Fisher County Hospital District lost about \$44,00 in anticipated additional oil tax revenue last month due to a mis-calculation on the part of some Fisher County official. The announcement of the loss was made last Monday night at the monthly meeting of the Fisher County Hospital Board of Directors.

A hospital official had been told that the district could expect \$159,000 in additional oil tax revenue based on calculations to determine the 1980-81 tax revenue that could be expected by the hospital district. As it turns out this calculation was in error and instead of the anticipated \$159,000 the hospital district will receive \$115,000. Based on the anticipated revenue of \$159,000 additional funds, the hospital board voted to leave the tax rate the same for 1980-81 as it was for 1979-80. As it turned out there was an error made by someone in the calculations. Hargrove told the board last Monday that the recent raise granted to hospital employees was not granted in anticipation of the \$159,000. The recent room rate increase was designed to offset the raises to hospital person-

In other action the hospital board discussed at length the high electric bills of recent months and autorized Administrator Jerry Weatherly to check into the possibility of installing a different air conditioning system that would reduce electric costs. The electric bill for the month of June amounted to approximately \$8,500 while the July electric bill was \$7,187.90.

Administrator Weatherly informed the board that he had hired Patti Morrow to replace Elaine Field in the hospital bookkeeping department. Elaine Field recently resigned to accept a postion in the Fisher County Tax Assessor-Collector's office.

The board approved a 10 cents per hour raise for Lucy Mendoza, hospital dietary department employee, to correct a miscalculation if figuring basic pay when salary increases were granted

last month. The board members discussed the service of sending Dr. V. Simpao and Dr. V. Carandang to Jayton. Administrator Weatherly was to meet with officials in Jayton to determine if they would be willing to possibly help pay a portion of the guaranteed base pay to the doctors in exchange for their services on a regular basis. This item is expected to be discussed at a future board meeting.

The board established a new sick leave policy for hospital employees. The policy gave all employees and additional 5 days sick leave (total of 10) and makes provisions for employees to take one-half of the unused days as a cash bonus during December of each year.

Weatherly requested that the board give consideration to updating the benefits of the hospital employees' group insurance coverage. This action will be viewed at the

October meeting. In final action the board passed a motion concerning the Fisher County Appraisal District action. Glen Copeland made a motion, seconded by Kirmit Terry, as follows, "We do not wish to confirm participation at this time, we confirm receipt of your letter dated September 9, 1980, and request that the Appraisal District show us in the bill where we have to be a part of the appris-

al district. If we have no alternative why do we have to confirm participation?"". The above motion was passed in reference to the follwoing letter from Kyle Moore, Chairman of the Fisher County Appraisal District. The letter reads. "Please indicate that you have received the Proposed 1981 Budget for the Fisher County Appraisal District. We request your written confirmation of participation in the Program, and urge that you reply as soon as possible'





CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with antitrust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a mo-

tion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the

board of equalization. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalwithin each ization county for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of

amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutionamendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

ballot as follows: constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

The level of damage that can be caused by the yellow pecan aphid is much less than that of the black pecan aphid. Heavy yellow aphid infestation can result in reduced nut quality and a reduced crop the following year but control measures are most often required to eliminate the honeydew which can be a big nuisance.

Cygon, DeFend, malathion or Zolone are insecticides that might be used to control either the black or yellow pecan aphids. When using the insecticide be sure to read and follow closely the information given on the





Open Letter To **Hobbs School Patrons**

Due to questions that have been raised concerning Hobbs School, the trustees have put together the following, hoping to clarify the issues.

1. Our tax rate for 1980 has been lowered from \$.67 per \$100 valuation to \$.60 per \$100 valuation on a 100% assessment ratio. This will mean a 10 % decrease in taxes for 1980. We have the lowest tax rate in the county.

2. Oil interests pay 71% of the local tax bill for the school. Local landowners pay approximately 29% of all the taxes collected.

3. Hobbs has only \$25,000 bonded indebtedness unpaid. This is on a 1956 bond series, voted in 1955 to build the main school plant. It will be paid by 1988. All other buildings, including the gym foyer, vocational agriculture building, and bus barn are paid for completely. We do not even owe on any short term loans for buses.

4. Grades 7 through 12 have been contracted to the Roby School for the 1980-81 school year only. This is not a permanent arrangement and can be changed at any

5. Roby was specified in the contract because according to UIL Rules of Eligibility, Hobbs school could not contract their students, grades 7-12 to two districts, as each student's UIL eligibility applies only to the school collecting transportation funds on that student. And the transportation funds can only be designated to one school, according to the Texas Education Agency, Transportation

6. Hobbs granted Rotan School permission to run the Rotan school bus to Scott's corner to pick up the 3 students in grades 7-12 who have transferred to Rotan. This is for the 1980-81 school year only.

7. According to TEA, Transporation Division, all elementary students, grades K-6, who have legally transferred into another school district, must provide their own transportation. This law, which has been in effect and in practice for several years, affects any elementary transfer students that attend Roby also, not only those transferring into Rotan.

8. Roby school buses Hobbs students, grades 7-12, from Hobbs school to Roby and then back to Hobbs again, arriving each evening at 4 p.m.

9. Hobbs has three regular morning and evenig bus routes and one bus that is run only in the evening to deliver to their homes, students, grades 7-12, that come

10. Our school plant is in excellent condition. This summer we closed in and insulated all the windows to conserve energy and save on our cost of utilities. New refrigerated heating and cooling units have been installed also. Paneling was installed inside the classroom windows and all outside trim was repainted.

11. Our classrooms are large and attractive. We believe we have provided a pleasant teaching atmosphere for both teachers and students. Teachers have an unusually well-stocked supply of audio-visual equipment and related materials and teaching equipment and materials.

12. We have a certified librarian, Mrs. Kathleen Hale, who hold library classes for the children daily, introducing students to the best literature, the classics, art, and methods of research. A good library is essential to the complete learning process. We have on hand more than 4,000 volumes falling in every category of the Dewey Decimal System, as well as an excellent collection of audio-visual aids, including filmstrips, many records, and cassettes. Our library is up-dated with new purchases each year.

13. We have 34 children enrolled this year--68% Anglo, 32% Spanish. There are 4 full-time teachers, one ½-day teacher, one librarian, and one teacher's aide on our teaching staff. All teachers are well-qualified and do a very good job. We are proud of them all.

14. Our teaching program encompasses Kindergarten through grade 6. We can provide individualized instruction in a way that teachers who have 30 or 40 in a classroom can only dream of. We have the services of a nurse for health care. A counselor, Pat Hamric, is available for guidance, counseling, testing, consultation with teachers, students and parents. Hobbs has a regular speech therapist available for students with speaking problems. Special education services, including language and learning disabilities, are handled by one of our own staff working with the Tri-County Education Co-op.

15. Any kind of testing is available for any type of problem a student may have through the Tri-County Co-op and the Education Service Center, Reg. 14, the same sources used by other schools in this county. We can provide anything for educational enrichment as well as help with problems of various kinds that any school in the county can-and in most cases, do it better, for we have more time to spend with each student.

16. We also have good discipline in the classroom and our teachers are as concerned with character building and good manners as they are with reading, writing, and arithmetic...

17. Every effort is made to enlarge our childrens' world, to provide the best of all possible teaching environments in order to expose children to what they need in order to become well-rounded, knowledgeable citizens.

18. Our high school graduates have adjusted to college and university life, professional careers, business, home and family, with ease. We number many successful businessmen and women among our graduates--also teachers, doctors, veterinarians, coaches, athletes and ministers. There are several involved in politics and government, from the local level all the way to the federal government in Washington. They have done well through the years.

19. It is not unusual to find elementary schools, grades K-6 or K-8. According to the Public School Directory there were 91 K-8 schools listed for the school year 1979-80. Many of these have been in operation for years, and many ar smaller in enrollment than Hobbs.

20. An invitation is extended to all who would like to visit our school, meet our staff and tour the campus. We will be happy to answer any further questions you may have. We are proud of our school and our community.

21. It is the opinion of the Hobbs ISD trustees that there will be a school here just as long as the patrons want it to continue.


