Congressman Charles Stenholm will deliver the keynote address at the annual Rotan Chamber of Commerce recognition ceremony honoring the 1980 Outstanding Man and Woman of the Year, according to Ben Reid, Rotan Chamber of Commerce President.

The public is cordially invited to attend this affair. The recognition ceremony will take place at the Rotan School Auditorium beginning at 7:30 p.m. All school age children will be admitted without charge. There will be an admission charge of \$2.00 for adults.

Rotan's Chamber of Commerce will honor Jack

Cadenhead for his years of unselfish service to boys through the baseball and scouting programs and Mavice Yantis for her 38 years of teaching English and Speech in the Rotan School system.

Jack Cadenhead moved to Rotan in 1964 and a year later began working with the Rotan Farm Team. He was associated with the Rotan Little League system for nine years. Serving as an assistant coach for five years and as Head Coach for four years.

The "Rotan Man of the Year" began working as an assistant Scoutmaster in 1967 and six months later was named Scoutmaster, a position he still holds.

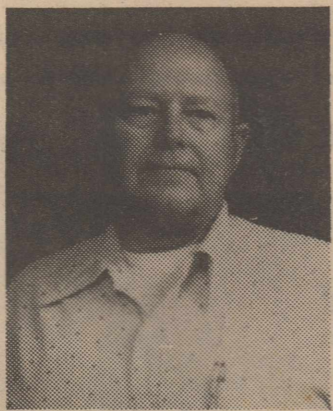
He was recognized in

Scouting circles as the recipient of the Wood Badge, the highest award that can be given a volunteer worker; has completed the Timber Tag, a training course for Scoutmasters and has received both the Scouter Key and Scouter Awards.

Fisher County residents have welcomed the moisture that has fallen over a general area of the county since Tuesday, April 14th.

Rotan Weather Observer Willis Ogden indicated that Rotan had recorded 3.20 inches of moisture between Tuesday, April 14th and Sunday, April 19th.

Recorded moisture for the 6 day wet period included Tuesday, April 14-1.03; Wednesday, April

15-1.18; Thursday, April 16-.57; Friday, April 17-.00; Saturday, April 18-.65 and Sunday, April 19-.77 inches.

Ogden reported a total rainfall for January 1981 of .30; February of 1.55 and March .71. The total for the first quarter being 2.56 inches. The 1.03 inches on April 14th was the first measurable moisture in April bringing the total for the year to 5.76 inches.

"No specific charge has been established for the supper, donations, however, are being accepted", said Hardin.

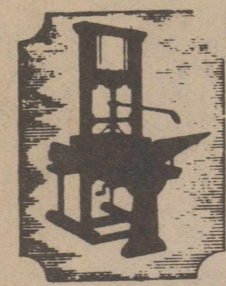
"We are in hopes of a large turnout at this supper, Ted McArthur has been an important part of

Rotan Little League 1981 Registration Is Saturday

The officers of the Rotan Little League organization are scheduling a registration for all boys ages 8 through 12 that plan on participating in the 1981 program on Saturday, April 25th from 9:00 a.m. until noon at the Homestead Savings building, according to President Jim Sheehan.

Boys eligible for the program must be 8 years old before August 1, 1981, but cannot be 13 years old before August 1, 1981. Eight and nine year old boys participate in the Little League Farm Team system while boys age 10, 11 and 12 are eligible for the draft and can compete in the Little League program.

Little League officers are requesting a donation of \$7.50 from each player at the time of registration. This donation is asked to help defray the costs of insurance, administrative costs and a cap for each player. Those registering on Saturday are also asked to provide proof of age in the form of a birth certificate.

All Little League games will be played at 5:30 and 7:30 until school is dismissed for the summer. After school is dismissed games will be played at 6:00 and 8:00 each night. A total of 30 Little League games will be played, consisting of 15 double headers over the eight week season.

The four team managers for the 1981 program include: James Carter for the Pirates; Billy Speck for the Vets; Donnie Gruben for the Yankees and Manuel Yanez for the Rebels. Team coaches are Earnest Reagan for the Pirates; Henry Soliz-Vets; Hoss Carrillo-Yankees and Joe Morrow and John Pearson-Rebels.

Little League officials have set a work night for Thursday, April 23rd at 6:30 p.m. at the Little League field for all adults. Those participating are asked to bring lawn mowers and garden tools.

The 1981 season opening game is set for Monday night, May 11th with weekly play continuing through Monday, June 29th.

Little League try-outs for boys 10, 11 and 12, that are not currently assigned to a Little League team will be conducted on April 27, 28, 30 and May 1st, according to Sheehan.

Farm team try-outs will be announced at a later date.

Assisting Sheehan in the 1981 are Linda Morrow, Brenda Sheehan, secretary-treasurer and operation of the league for secretary-treasurer and cession stand coordinator.



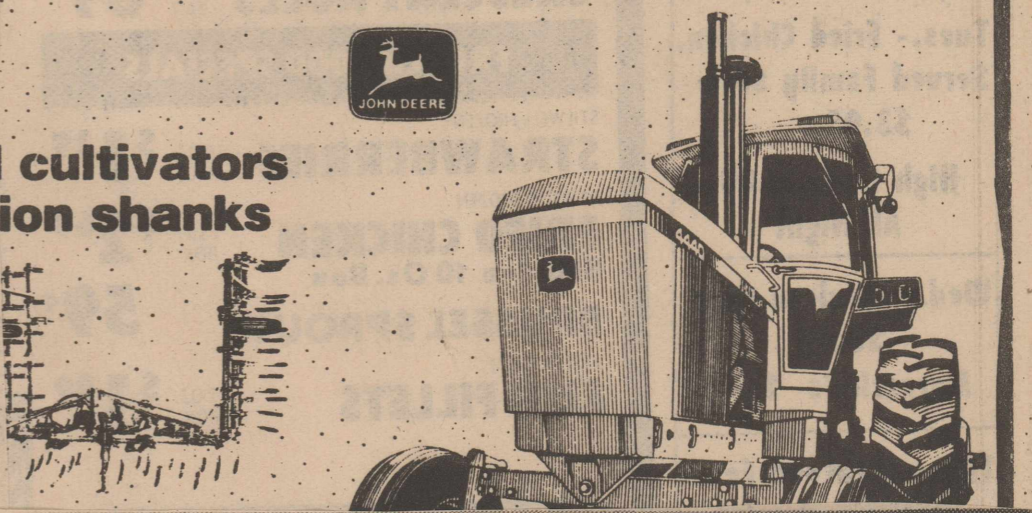

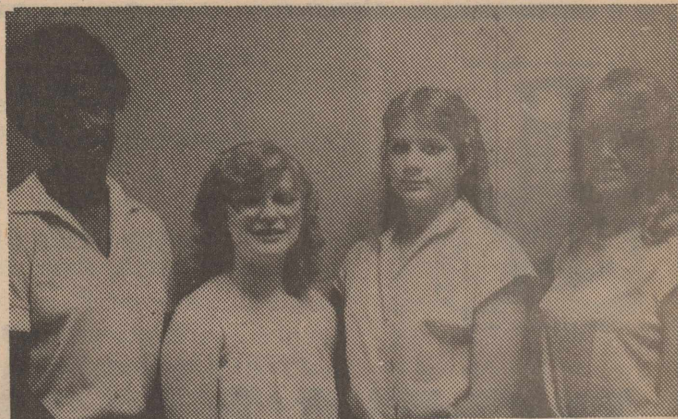

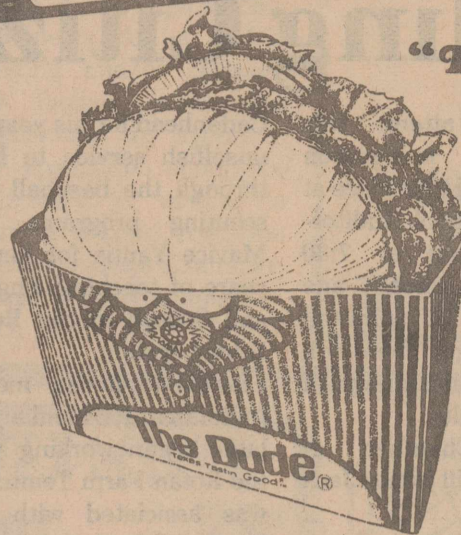
United Cable Television announced the opening of their new Rotan office at 102 Florence Street, north of the Callan Clinic, according to Wayne Jamar, System Manager.

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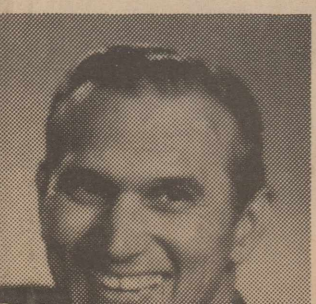

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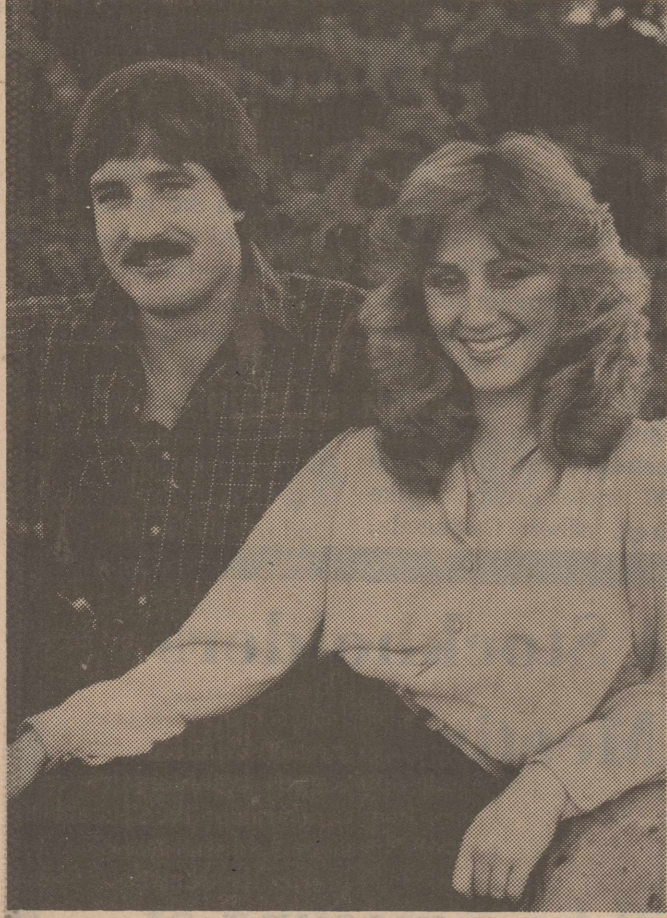

County Hospital Board Re-Elects A. Maberry

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board met in regular session last Monday night and reviewed the 1980 audit with Jerry Krisp, representing Condley & Company, certified Public Accountants in Abilene, Texas.

In his summary, Krisp indicated "Things are better, revenue is up over 1979 and that is after some of the bad debts have been cleaned up."

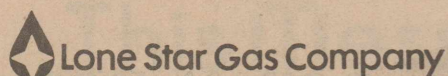

To stay on top of beef production in today's fast-moving and complicated cattle industry, a cow-calf producer must maintain a top-notch cowherd.

Actually, he must start with a good cow herd, use proven sires and select high-performing replacement heifers to take the place of poorer producing producing cows culled from the herd each year.

A producer can improve and upgrade his breeding herd through selection of heifers and selection of parents to be mated. The goal in beef production is to improve the average performance of the offspring through selection of economic traits such as calving interval, birth and weaning weights, cow mothering ability, feedlot and pasture gain, efficiency of gain, yearling weight (feedlot or pasture), weaning and yearling conformation scores, carcass grade, rib-eye area and outside carcass fat thickness. To make rapid and accurate improvement, all information to make maximum selection response should be used. Performance pedigree, individual performance data and visual appraisal are generally used in selection of heifers.

Pedigrees provide family information and generally tell you what an animal should do because of what is known about the parents and their performance. Pedigree information when used alone provides

low accuracy in estimating the breeding value, and is of almost no consequence if we go beyond the parents for information, says Boleman. Individual performance information is a requirement to effectively select beef cattle for genetic progress. No single selection plan fits all breeders and producers, but any profitable selection program

must be based on the ability of an animal to perform in a given environment. Properly measured performance is the best estimate of the animal's breeding value. It should include such traits as growth characteristics, reproductive ability, longevity and the ability to produce acceptable quality meat at a minimal unit cost.

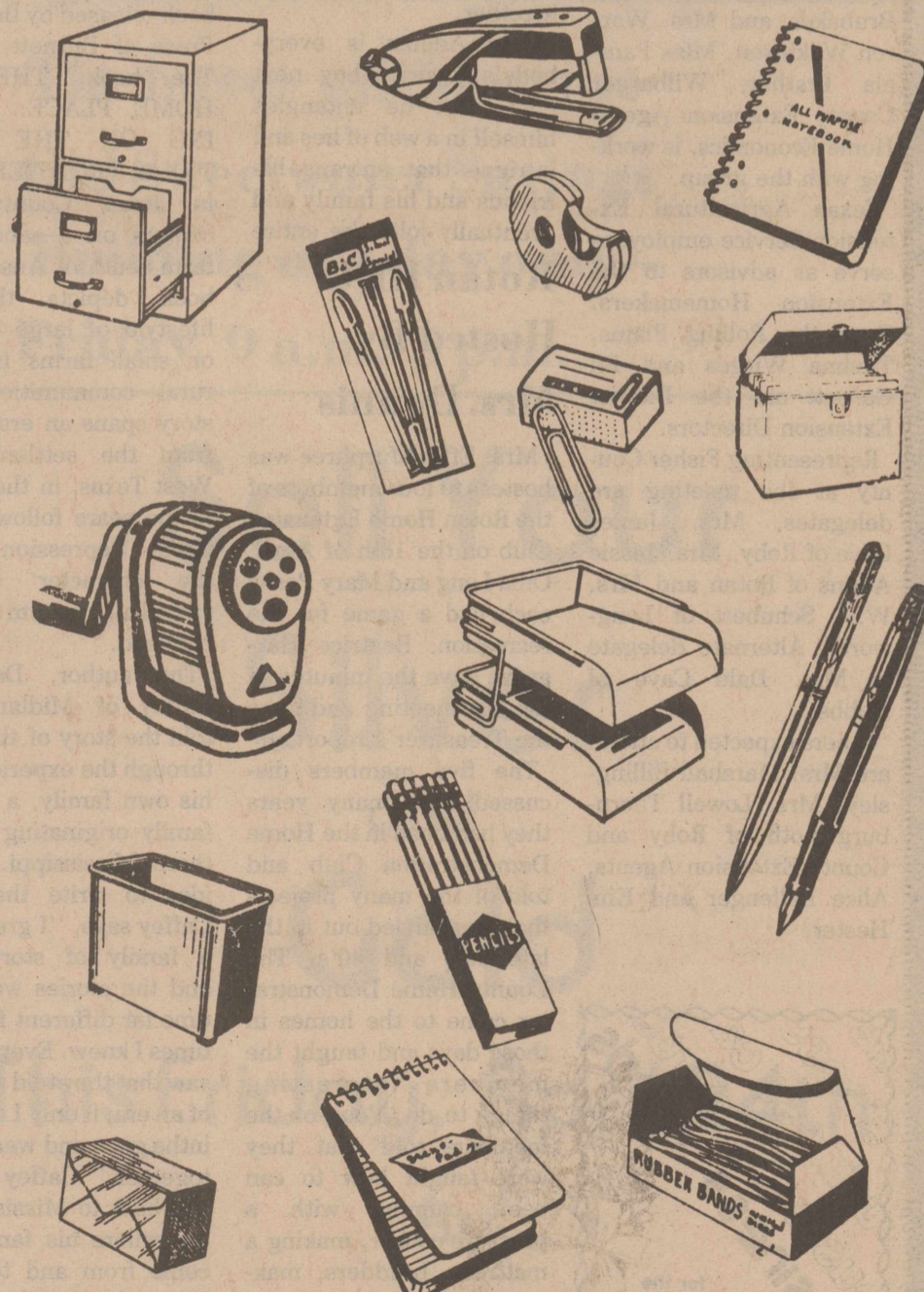

Roby and Rotan. It was moving from a little east of south on a northward path that must have taken it nearly over sweetwater. There was an initial blinding flash (perhaps two) like extensive sheet

lightning, which occurred when it first encountered high resistance in the atmosphere at a height of perhaps 50 miles. It had a flight of short duration, probably about three seconds, before being extin-

guished about 18 miles high.

Some disintegration along the way and especially breakage into several pieces reported near the end indicate that meteorites may have fallen, though the high final height is not favorable.

Some could have fallen before the point of extinction, but larger ones would carry on several miles beyond the final "Burn-out". We would guess they are along the Fisher-Scurry County lines.

There is a possibility of some small, black-cruled rocks from the fall being on top of the ground. We urge farmers and ranchers or any one who is outside in this area to keep on the lookout for possible specimens. Predictions cannot be made with precision, but we would guess they would be only a few ounces to a few pounds, always irregular in shape.

Detonations that shook

her house were experienced by Ms. Lisa Beauchamp 12 miles out of Roby (30 miles East of Snyder) near the Hobbs Community. This was a shockwave from the meteorite, traveling faster than sound. We have one other report indirectly from this region and need to hear from any one else who heard or felt this boom.

By all means let us hear from you if by some happy accident you find what you think may be a meteorite. Searching is not economically feasible but some one may just be lucky!

It may be interesting to note that the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal published a story last week on the Aurora Borealis (northern lights) a few days after the glow in the sky was seen over north Fisher County. It is a rarity to see the northern lights this far south. When they are very strong they are red in color with streaks that appear to be spotlight

beams moving about. When they are on the weak side, the basic color is pale green or light blue.

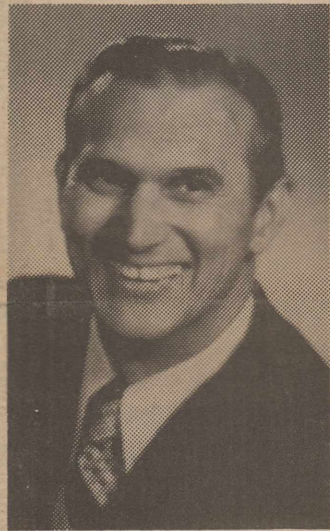
Dr Williams To Speak At Rotan

the darndest drop with the pitch you ever saw and that is all he threw. After the second inning I had to put my handkerchief in my mitt-he was burning me out. All batters were

hitting over or topping the ball and most hit back to the pitcher.

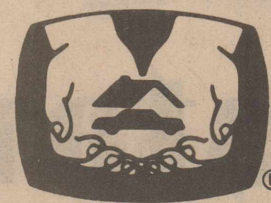
The umpire stood back of the pitcher's mound in those days.

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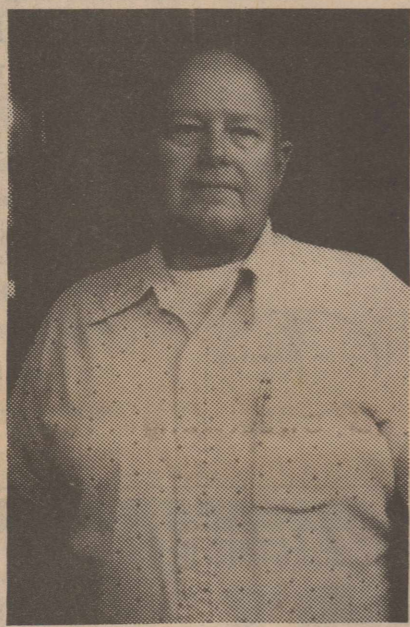

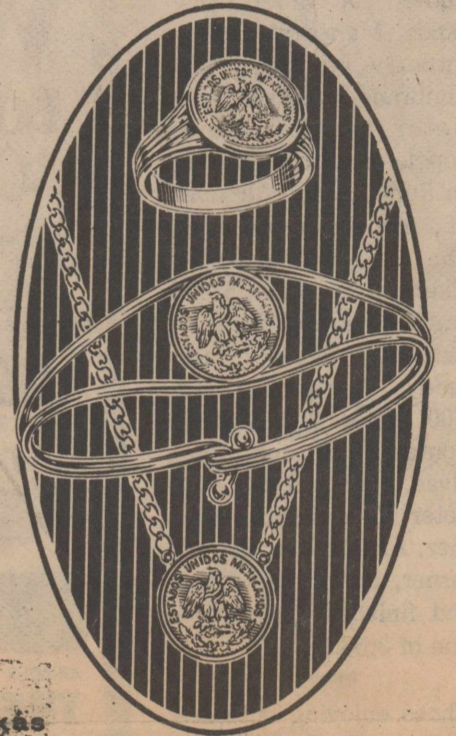

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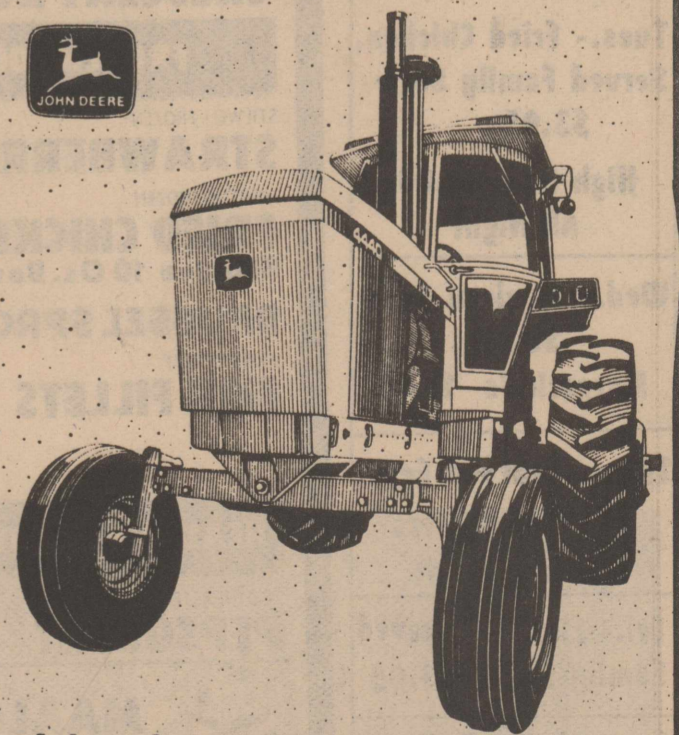

City of Rotan, 201 West Snyder, Rotan, Texas 79546 has applied to the Texas Department of Water Resources for an amendment to Permit No. 11256 to install a new treatment facility with new effluent quality limitations appropriate for oxidation pond systems. The exist-

ing permit authorizes the disposal by irrigation of 300,000 gallons per day of treated domestic sewage effluent. The facility will consist of a facultative lagoon followed by three stabilization ponds having a total capacity of 36.4 acre-feet, which will serve as holding lagoons for the effluent prior to its use for irrigation of cultivated land adjacent to the facility site. The authorized volume of effluent will be reduced to 152,000 gallons

per day average. The plant is located approximately 1/2 mile southeast of the city limits of Rotan and 300 feet south of State Highway 70 in Fisher County, Texas. The irrigated tract is in the drainage area of the Clear Fork Brazos River in the Brazos River Basin. LEGAL AUTHORITY: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code, as amended, and Chapter 25 of the Rules of the Texas Department of Water

Resources. No public hearing will be held on this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application has requested a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address, and phone number of the person making the request; and (2) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the re-

quester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the waste discharge permit decision, or that a public hearing would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is

received within 45 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.
