County Commissioners Approve \$5,500 In Jail Improvements

Fisher County Commissioners, during their regular meeting last Monday morning, voted to spend approximately \$4,000.00 to install a voice communications system in the Fisher County Jail, according to Judge Marshal Bennett. The system is being installed in order to comply with guidelines set by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. Inspector Joe Slater of the Jail Standards Commission conducted an inspection of the jail in May and cited 24 areas of non-compliance. In addition to the authorization to install the voice communications system, commissioners gave Sheriff Mickey Counts the "green light" to proceed

with repairing doors, enclosing plumbing in mesh wire and repairing windows. These compliance items are expected to cost approximately \$1,500.00. Sheriff Counts, questioned about the voice communications system, said "when the system is installed, each inmate will have voice communication with the jailer on duty in the Court House during the day and after duty hours will have communications with the jailer in the Sheriff's living quarters."

In other action last Monday, Fisher County Commissioners discussed a request from the Rotan Library for funds to install a new roof on the library

building. The matter was tabled until the July meeting.

Library In Need Of New Roof

A tremendous number of Rotan and area residents are making use of the services being offered at the Rotan Library, according to a report by Mayor Lester Sescil to the Rotan City Council last Tuesday.

Sescil indicated that a total of 997 membership cards have been issued to area library supporters. In the past 6 months the Rotan Library has checked out a total of 4,539 books which averages 766 per month.

The library is being used by a wide scope of people in all age brackets. Currently there are 21 youngsters enrolled in the summer reading program.

The Rotan Library Board is attempting to raise an estimated \$5,000 to pay for a new roof on the library through donations. Anyone desiring to make a contribution to the Library Roof Fund can do so through the fund at the First National Bank or in person to Mrs Nan Arnett at the Rotan Library.

Two Rotan residents were injured in a tractor accident on a county road near Rough Creek Sand and Gravel plant last Monday afternoon, according to Texas Highway Patrolman Allan Arnwine. Arnwine indicated that

Louie is reported to have a badly bruised pelvic area, multiple scratches and abrasions while Ward received scratches on his head and legs. Preliminary indications were that neither received any broken bones in the accident.

Late last Tuesday afternoon both were in Room #4 at the Fisher County Hospital.

Robert Doyle Resigns Appraisal Board Post

Fisher County Appraisal Board member Robert Doyle submitted his letter of resignation last Monday night thus creating the first vacancy on the board since it was established almost two years ago.

Doyle's resignation was accepted by the board effective Tuesday, June 9th, 1981. During the meeting a procedure was adopted for making board member replacements. Under this new procedure each of the 6 voting units will submit a nominee and from the list of nominees a board member will be chosen by the remaining 4 Appraisal Board Members to fill the vacancy.

Those units with "name submitting power" include - The four county school boards plus the City of Rotan and City of Roby. The two member units without name submitting power include the Rotan Water Authority and the Fisher County Hospital Board.

The four remaining board members, after Doyle's resignation, include: Dick Edwards, Dennis Dooley, Billy Wayne Jeffrey and Kyle Moore.

The replacement for Doyle should be acted upon in July.

In other action the board voted to approve the purchase of \$14,590.00 in computer equipment. This equipment includes a CRT Viewer - Remote display; a keyboard and a printer. The equipment purchase is part of a plan to share computer time with the City of Sweetwater.

The board authorized the payment of Pritchett and Abbott, oil valuation consultants, in two payments of \$15,000.00 - one payment on July 1 and one on October 1.

In final action Chief Appraiser Billie Lou Holcomb presented the board with the May financial statement. The beginning balance was \$30,418.05; May expenses were \$4,846.94; no income for May leaving the ending May balance at \$25,571.11.

Kim's Korner

In the interest of keeping Fisher County farmers abreast of the current Farm Bill, the following information written by Congressman Charles Stenholm, is being carried in this column.

A four-year omnibus Farm Bill has been formally voted out of the House Agriculture Committee that, if passed by this Congress, is in many ways unacceptable to U.S. farmers and ranchers.

I have personally fought many of the proposals in that bill throughout the drafting process and, having failed to revise some of the more unacceptable elements, will introduce an amendment calling for the expiration of the legislation at the end of the 1982 crop year.

The Farm Bill, as approved by the Committee, does not address the current problem facing agriculture and that is profitability in the marketplace. We must have programs that will enable the farmer to receive a reasonable profit on his investments. The question that I have continued to raise is why we should continue the same programs that have placed our farmers in such critical financial conditions. We need to look at alternatives that will address this problem in a more favorable and realistic fashion.

As a farmer, I know and realize that we cannot continue to operate as we have in the past if we are to survive. We cannot produce at an unprofitable level indefinitely. We must have agriculture prices on a paying basis if we are to continue to have a plentiful supply of food and fiber. As a Congressman, I just don't believe that we have done our best for the farmers of this country through this legislation and in calling for the unusual one-year bill I hope that we can at least "cut our losses" to the greatest extent possible.

I strongly favor a permanent change from the traditional practice of drafting new agricultural legislation in the opening days of a new administration and a new Congress.

The first few weeks of a new Congress and a new administration are very chaotic under the best of conditions and this is certainly no time to be writing legislation of the importance of the 1982 Farm Bill. Congress and its committees need several weeks to organize and to become effective. At the same time, a new administration usually takes several weeks or months to get personnel on board and even longer to determine specific policy goals.

Due to the requirements of the Congressional Budget Act, we find ourselves in the position of writing four-year legislation before any one has a good idea of what direction they want to go.

I believe that by passing a one-year bill this session and a four-year bill next year, Congress can give the legislation the careful consideration it deserves.

Also heavily involved in community activities, Burgess headed the local Red Cross disaster team in providing aid to the people of Graham following a ravaging flood several years ago.

Harkey is a school superintendent and is an organization and beef project leader for the Fisher County Junior Leaders 4-H Club.

Through his efforts, Fisher County 4-H'ers have developed into outstanding leaders and good citizens.

Harkey has been chair-

man of the Fisher County 4-H and Youth Subcommittee and is currently vice chairman of the County Program Building Committee.

Rites Held For Doctor R.T. Wilkerson In Roby

Dr. R.T. Wilkerson, 73, of Roby died at 5:30 a.m. Saturday, June 6, 1981, at Wichita General Hospital in Wichita Falls. Services were at 2 p.m. Tuesday at First United Methodist Church.

The Rev. Loren Gardner, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Rotan Cemetery.

Born Feb. 7, 1908, in Ravia, Okla., he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Wilkerson. After graduating from the University of Texas Medical School in Galveston in 1933, he interned at Santa Rosa Hospital in San Antonio.

He married Eula Kriss Aug. 24, 1935, in Lawton, Okla. They moved in 1936 to Rotan. He entered the U.S. Army in January 1940 and served until November 1945, when he was discharged as a major. He returned to Rotan to practice medicine until 1955, when he bought the Roby Hospital, later named Wilkerson Clinic and Hospital. He operated the clinic and hospital until 1977.

He was a member of the Texas Medical Society, the Colorado Basin Medical Society and the American Hospital Association and was a fellow of the American Academy of Family Practice.

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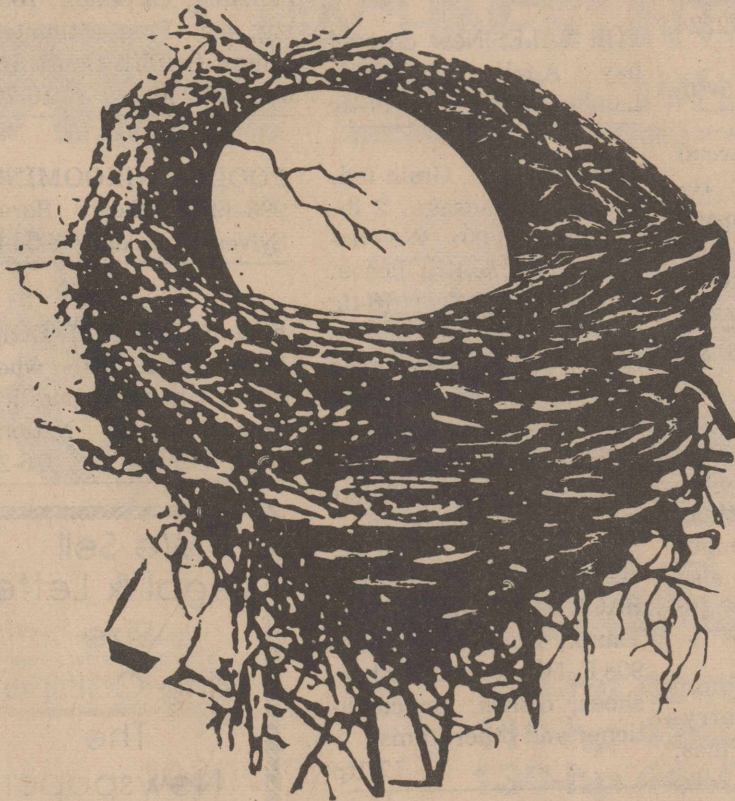

In discussing the Rotan Community Center, J.A. In other action the council accepted an ordinance from Lone Star Gas Company, after the second reading, designating Lone Star Gas as being responsible for all supply lines to meters with consumers being responsible for lines from the meter to residences.

The council granted West Texas Utilities a 5 year contract for street

lighting by renewing the West Texas Franchise Contract as submitted.

The council members appointed Ben Reaid, Kim Pease and Kaufman Florida to the 1981 Tax Equalization Board with M.T. Hill named to serve as an alternate member.

Police Chief Gene Pack gave his monthly report to the council. He indicated that his department had made 24 arrests, issued 18 citations, assisted in 10 instances for

help, received 7 animal disturbance calls, investigated 1 burglary and assisted at one fire during the month of May. Pack also requested permission to purchase 3 office chairs for the police department office. His request was tabled until July.

Council members discussed the installation of a new water line in the area of 6th street and heard a report by City Secretary Vann indicating that the water loss had risen to 19.7 percent in May after

reaching a low of 1.2 percent in April. Vann indicated that the yearly average was around 16.0 percent.

The council authorized Vann to advertise for bids on the construction of a combination concession stand - rest room at the girl's softball field.

In discussing the Rotan Pool, Vann reported that through the first week of operation the pool had taken in receipts of \$760.60 with concession stand sales amounting to \$295.60.

Vann received permission from the council to authorize workers at the Rotan Cemetery to use a weed killer to edge grave stones and walks. Kennedy Childhood Memories Included In Book On History Of Stonewall CountyA Good Life

My name is Tennie Jane Kennedy Cade. I live with my husband, a Kent Co. native who was raised on the Salt Fork of the Brazos River north of the Double Mountains, E.W. Cade Jr., on our home place south of the Double Mountains. This land was settled by my grandparents, later became my parents' home, and now belongs to us. E.W. and I were united in marriage in Peacock, Texas in the home of Brother North. We have raised our three children here. They are the fifth generation to live in Stonewall County. Our daughters are Susan Cade and Terri Cade and our son is Mike Cade who now has his own home, with his wife, Lisa, southeast of the Double Mountains. However, this is not our family story but some memories from my childhood.

I am the second daughter of Parker and Lota Kennedy. My sister, Betty Jo

Kennedy Helms, and I were born on this place. J.W. (Joda) and Dora Kennedy, Bampa and Bama, are my grandparents. Uncles, Aunts, and Cousins are Jack, Aileen, Jack Harrel, and Virginia Kennedy, Ove, Ruth, and Joe Kennedy, Roger, Inez, Barbara, and Beverly Smith, and Hue and Sally Montgomery. Mary Lou Chester lived with my grandparents. These families, other relatives, neighbors, and friends are a part of my childhood memories.

Family dinners at Bampa and Bama's house, forty-two and domino games, "anti-over" the house, rabbit and prairie dog hunts, riding on the running-board or behind the headlights of the car, Bampa playing fiddle tunes and singing, swinging on the front porch swing, warming by the fireplace, Bama's cinnamon rolls, the "two-holer" toilet, milking the cows,

feeding with a wagon and team, the tank building crew of men, horses, mules, and frisos, eating frog legs, spending the night and telling stories—remember Mary Lou?—and rolling to the middle of the bed, making mud pies, wooden nest eggs, homemade ice cream, washing outside in a washpot and making soap, the men fighting a neighboring pasture fire, get-togethers at the school house and Tabernacle, home dances, riding with Bampa and doctoring worms, a cracked collar bone, round-ups—everybody came—branding, de-horning, marking, castrating, vaccinating, the dope bucket, searing iron, flanking—a man for every job—good horses, good food, work and fun.

Taking castor oil in orange juice, baths in a tub on the table, our wood cook-stove and wood heater, standing at Mama's cabinet stirring cornbread, drinking warm milk, snow

and Daddy throwing a snowball at Mama, going swimming in the water trough and dirt tanks, Daddy and me getting pitched off, how cool it was down in the cellar, playing paper dolls, tasting Snuff, eating watermelons in the field, our dog, Sniff, that Daddy could send after the cows, cool drinks from cisterns, tanks, and wind-mills, giving my Shirley Temple doll a haircut, trading milk to Eugene and Beatrice for her good tortillas, our clothes Mama made—"hand-me-downs" too, riding my tricycle to the mail box and always being behind because my sister had a bicycle, picking cotton, hog killing days, birthday parties, Daddy's mules and our horses I loved!, Shirley Temple curls and pigtails, going with Daddy to trade work-cowboying-horseback-with Smith's, Kennedy's, Branches, and Baugh's—the people, old time cowboys, horses,

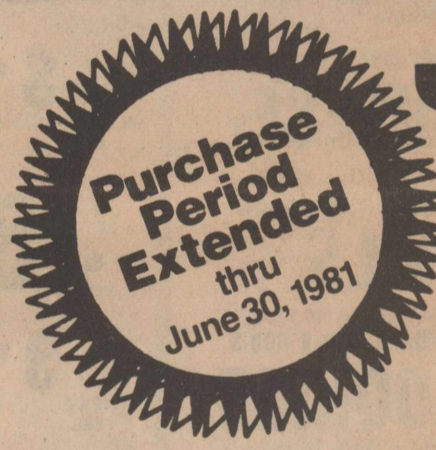
food, and ranch houses are remembered!

These memories are special-good times, happy times, a good life! They were hard times too but I'm grateful, Daddy and

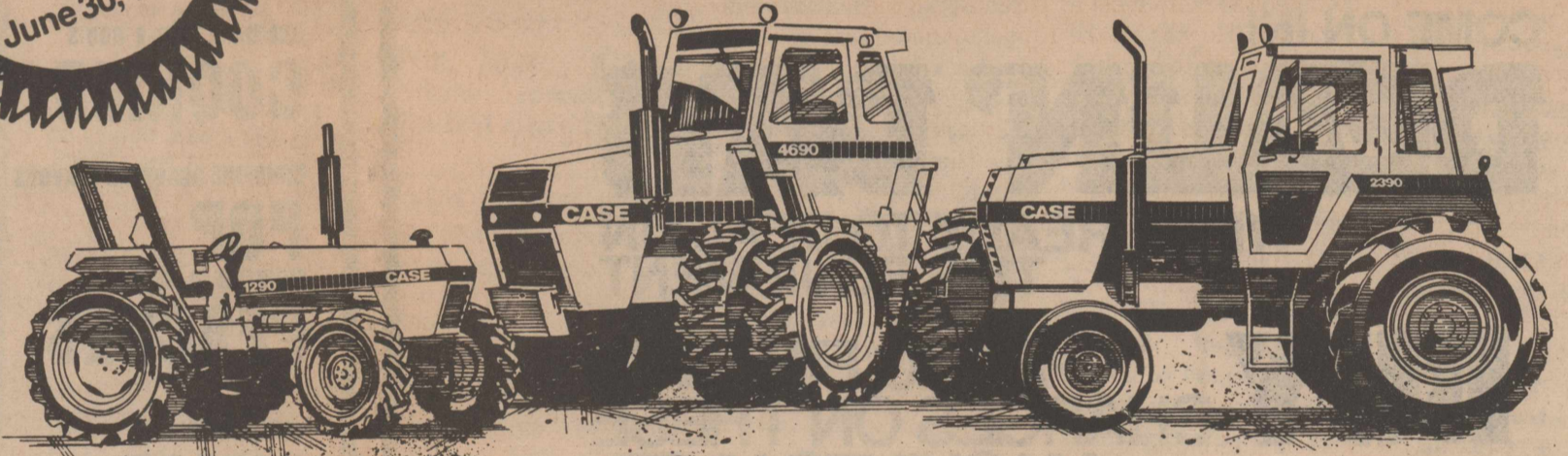

vials, the forms, and information. This program is designed to aid all peoples, with particular

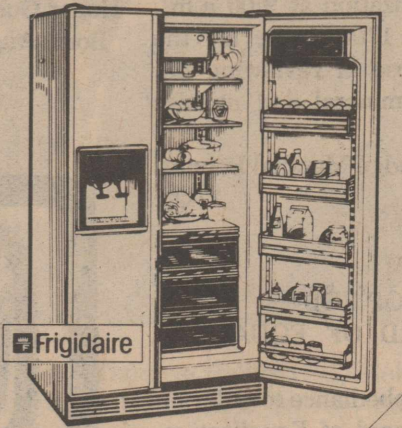

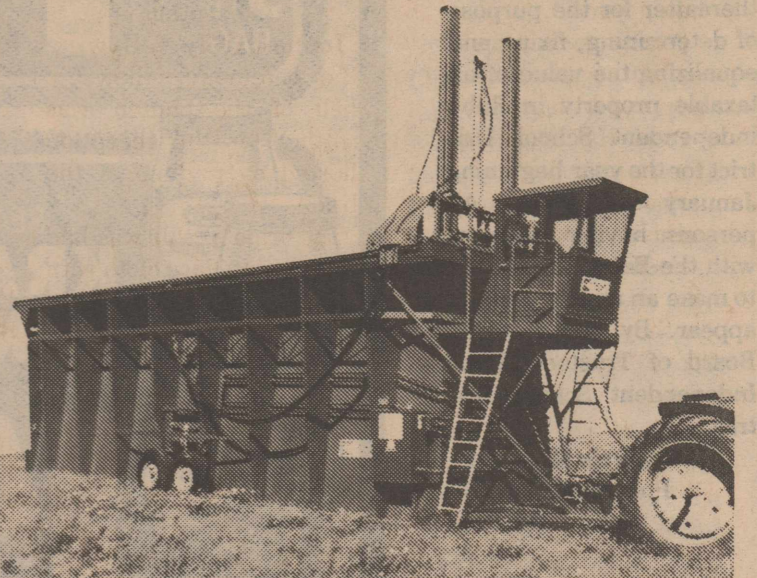
