Hospital Expecting Big Medicare Computer Bind

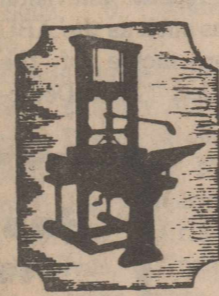
The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board may find themselves in a financial pinch within the next few months, this was the message conveyed to the board by Administrator Jerry Weatherly during their regular meeting last Monday night. Weatherly indicated that the Medicare organization was in the process of converting all hospitals and patients to the computer and would be estimating payments due back to hospitals for services for the next few months.

Weatherly informed hospital board members that the Fisher County Hospital had received \$71,960.00 from Medicare in May but that the June payment dropped to \$30,000.00. "We have 78 medicare claims ready to forward whenever we get the go ahead", said Weatherly. He was in hopes that the

Two Roby Students Attend WTU Energy Science Meeting

Twenty-one outstanding students and teachers from the area served by West Texas Utilities Company attended the 21st Annual Energy Science Symposium at the University of Texas at Austin. The Conference got underway Tuesday, June 2nd and ended Friday, June 5th.

The Symposium was jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas. West Texas Utilities is one of the sponsoring companies.

The 500 selected high school science students and teachers who attended the session were offered the rare opportunity of hearing lectures by some of the nation's outstanding scientists.

The Foundation was formed for the primary purpose of conducting the world's first and largest privately financed research effort in the field of nuclear energy. Currently, the Foundation and University are sponsoring a program in nuclear fusion research aimed at controlling thermonuclear reactions for the production of electric power.

The goal of the Foundation and WTU is not research alone, but to also assist in the advancement of the knowledge of energy science in Texas schools. Of special interest to the sponsors is bringing to students and teachers a

realization of the privileges, responsibilities and opportunities which scientific discoveries in the field of energy presents.

WTU paid all expenses for the 21 students and teachers attending from schools in the area served by the company. Lecturers at the Symposium were chosen from top men in

their field. There are over 1,000 accredited senior high schools in the state of Texas. Roby ISD can be justly proud of its high school for having been chosen as one of the 150 high schools in the state invited to send students and teachers to the Symposium.

Rotan-Roby Sponsors Needed For YES Students

Homes for foreign high school students wanting to come to the United States and learn about middle income American family life are being sought by area representatives of the Youth Exchange Service

Clemente, California. "We want to place one or two students in the Rotan-Roby area and are looking for homes to provide temporary lodging, meals, and love."

The students are carefully screened by the YES home office. "We want only the top class students from other countries in this program." The fam-

ilies are screened by the Jeffreys'. Single Adult homes may also be acceptable to host a student. The students are between 15 and 18 years of age and because of their economic backgrounds in their home countries, these students are potential leaders in the future.

"We don't want them to be guests in your home,"

Jeffreys said, "but want them to become a part of your family during their stay here. We want them to learn about middle American family life so when they return home, and for those who do become national leaders,

they will have had an experience with Americans.

Most of the students come from South America and Europe. YES tries to match as nearly as possible the likes, dislikes, hobbies, interests, and personalities to the same characteristics of the host families.

Recent students from the YES have visited Roby, Amarillo, Graford, Old-

ham, and Hawley. The Jeffreys' were among the first families in Texas to host a student under this program with their student coming from Brazil. Other students currently in Texas are from El Salvador, Mexico, Argentina, and Germany.

This is one of the best educational methods available for children in the

home-whether young or teenage. Participation in the program as a host or hostess also makes teenage children eligible to become exchange students in a foreign country if they are interested.

The exchange program arranges transportation, medical coverage, and arrival and departure dates for the students. For more information on the

program, contact the Jeffreys' at (915) 235-4822, or (915) 235-2991. In order for students to arrive for the fall school term host families need to apply as soon as possible, preferably by June 15. Applications need to be in by October 1, for a student to arrive in December or January.

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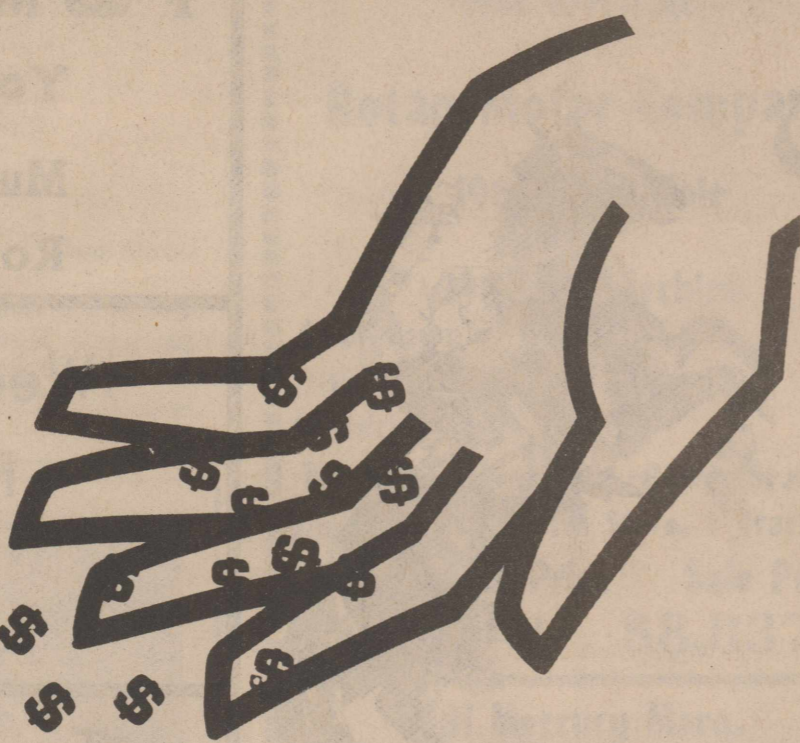
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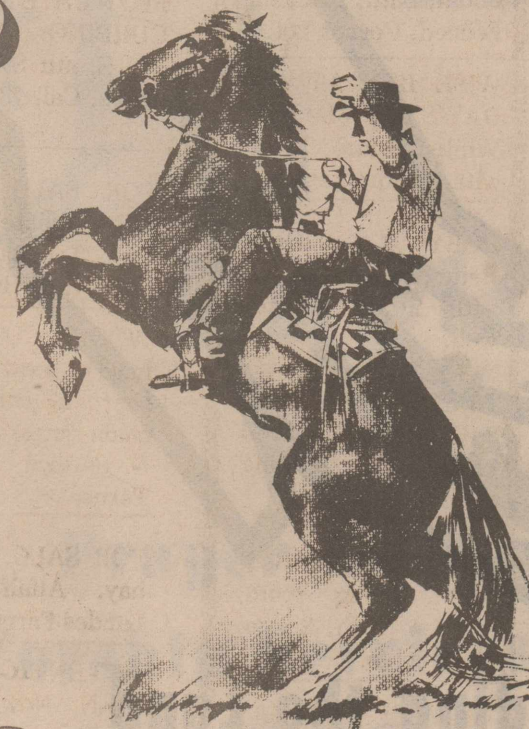

Cattlemen Want Better Beef Education

Do consumers and retailers know all they should about beef? Not according to many Texas cattlemen.

"We need to help consumers become better beef buyers," said Roy G. Wheeler, President of the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas. "And we can also help retailers move more beef through effective education and merchandising programs on the national level."

Conducting these programs will take money, Wheeler acknowledges. That's why his organization has joined with others in the Texas cattle industry to implement a voluntary 24-cent-per-head beef promotion investment program, effective July 1.

Under the new system, all funds collected are to be remitted to the Beef Industry Council of the National Live Stock and Meat Board for use in national programs of research, education and promotion.

During the current year, the Beef Industry Council will spend about 14 percent of its \$2.8 million beef program budget on education and meat merchandising. The purpose of these and other efforts is to increase consumer dollar demand for beef.

Since many consumers' ideas about food are formed early in life, school becomes an ideal place to introduce sound information about beef's role in a daily diet.

The Beef Industry Council is bringing this information to the junior and senior high school level through a three-part beef teaching kit series on cookery, nutrition and cut

selection. Each kit features a narrated filmstrip, teacher's guide, wall charts and student booklets.

But educating students about beef is only part of the picture. Retailers and foodservice operators need information about beef, too.

"Beef-In-A-Bag," for

example, is a current merchandising campaign designed to provide retailers with the information and materials necessary to promote the sale of beef subprimal cuts to consumers, who, by cutting and wrapping the beef themselves, can save from 20 to 50 cents per pound on selected cuts.

During the first two months of the campaign, the Beef Industry Council has distributed more than 100,000 of its "Beef-In-A-Bag" consumer information folders.

Foodservice operators are reached with good information about beef, too. For example, the Beef Industry Council's "Beef Up America" identification and ordering chart is a valuable aid to those who purchase beef for hotels, restaurants and insti-

tutions. As effective as these programs are, they're still not enough. That's why Texas cattlemen like Wheeler are behind the

25-cent beef investment program. Their hope is that the industry can greatly increase its promotion efforts in the years ahead.

Along with the Independent Cattlemen's Association, the following organizations are supporting the Texas investment program: Texas Farm Bureau,

Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, Texas Cattle Feeders Association and the Live-stock Marketing Association of Texas.

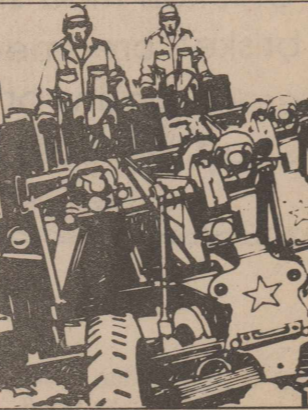

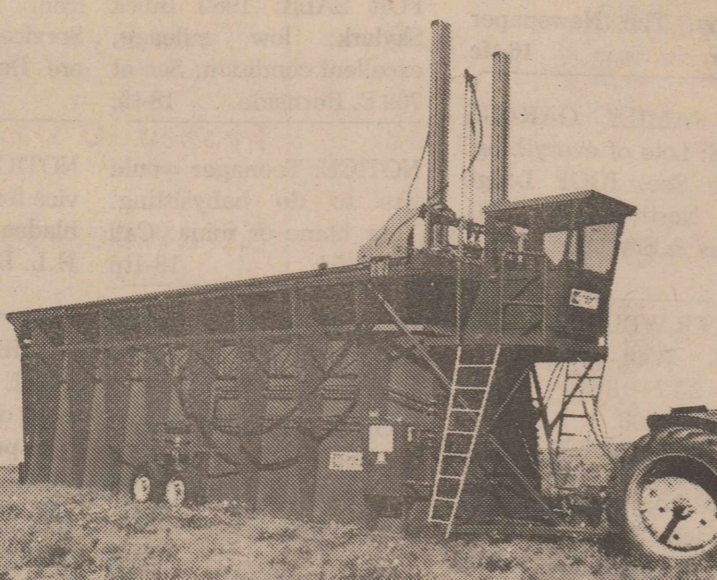

Veteran Benefits Increase

Many veterans and their widows and children will be entitled to increases in their Veterans Administration pension benefits effective June 1, 1981, according to Ed Deaton, Veterans Service Officer for Fisher County.

Those entitled to the increases in benefits are the persons who previously elected to change from one of the older VA pension laws to the new pension law which came into effect January 1, 1979, or who have become entitled to benefits since that date. Persons who continue to receive benefits under one of the older pension laws will not be eligible for any increase in their payments.

Under the new pension law, veterans and others who are on the VA rolls June 1, 1981, will be entitled to an increase of 11.2%, the same percentage of increase that will be applied to Social Security benefit payments. When benefits under Social Security are increased, which now occurs June 1 of each year, the Veterans Administration new pension law veterans, widows and dependent children see their pension payments increase by the same percentage as is applied to the Social Security. A recent announcement indicates that the June 1, 1981 Social Security increase will be 11.2%. Persons in receipt of new

law pension from the VA will receive their increases automatically on the checks to be delivered July 1, 1981. They will not have to apply to the VA for these increases in benefits, as they are automatic. Persons still receiving benefits under one of the older VA laws may change to the new law if it is to their advantage. All such cases should seek competent counseling from their Veterans Service Officer before making any decision concerning the change, since many people would receive less benefits under the new law.

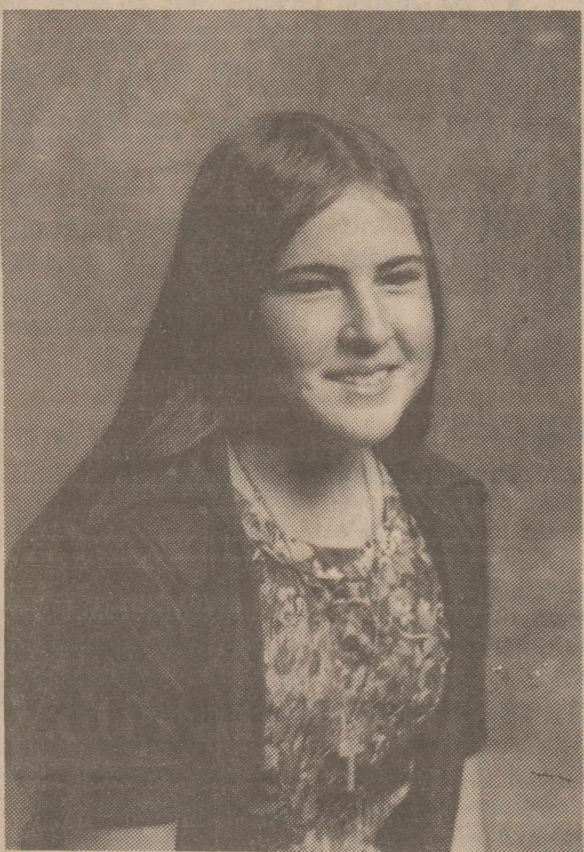

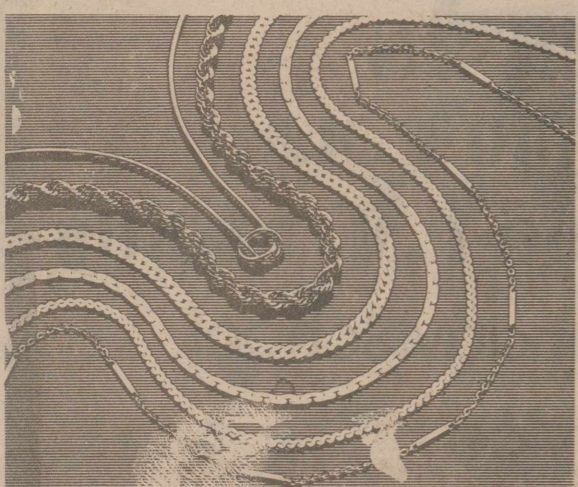

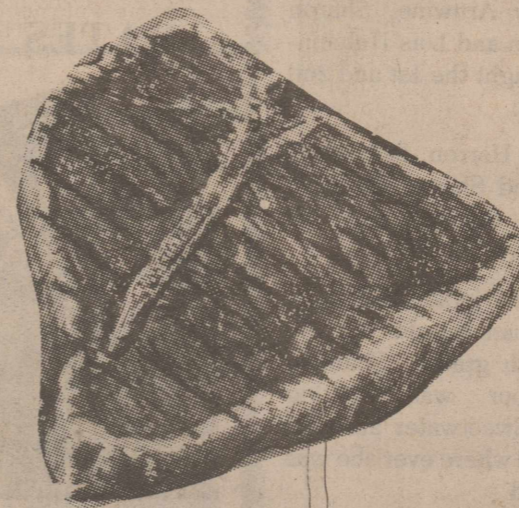

Causes Listed For Scorched And Burned Foliage

Scorching can be caused by one or all of the following:

Drying winds - During periods of high dry winds, moisture is removed from foliage faster than the roots can supply it. The result is scorched or withered foliage. Only protection from the wind can help in such cases.

High light intensity - Some plants cannot stand the bright sun of mid-summer in Texas. This is particularly true of trees and shrubs not adapted to the local environmental conditions such as most hollies, magnolia, dogwood, azalea, and maple, all of which prefer an acid soil with excellent drainage. In other words, don't move East Texas plants to West Texas, nor should you attempt to grow West Texas desert plants in the acid soils of East Texas. Use native or adapted plants.

Insufficient soil moisture - The watering job must be done thoroughly in dry seasons. Merely to sprinkle the ground around a plant until the surface is wet is inadequate. It is ordinarily helpful to build a circular dike of soil around a shrub or tree, creating a basin which can be filled with water 3 or 4 inches deep.

Excessive commercial fertilizer - Inexperienced gardeners often apply too much commercial fertilizer, which results in foliage scorching and death of the plants. A simple rule to follow is that a broadcast application of 500 pounds per acre, which a farmer would think of as a fairly heavy application of a high analysis fertilizer, converts to a little over a pound per 100 square feet. To go much above this rate at any one application incurs the risk of injuring the plants. Where excessive fertilizer has been applied, water the ground abundantly until the ex-

cess has been leached away from the root zone.

Fertilizers containing herbicides - Herbicides are chemicals used to kill undesirable weeds and grass. Some fertilizers have herbicides mixed with them and if such a

mixture is used too close to trees, shrubs or flowers, leaf scorching and death of plants may result.

Gas injury - Caused by the accumulation of commercial gas in the soil from leaking mains, etc. Gas

companies are equipped to test for such leaks and they should be consulted. Injuries from gas are ordinarily found only in

trees along curbs and parking. A valued tree that has been injured by gas often may be saved by pumping compressed air

into the soil around the roots to flush out the gas, followed by fertilization and heavy watering. Dying limbs should be removed.

Paved surfaces which restrict water absorption may lead to low soil moisture. Scorching may follow.

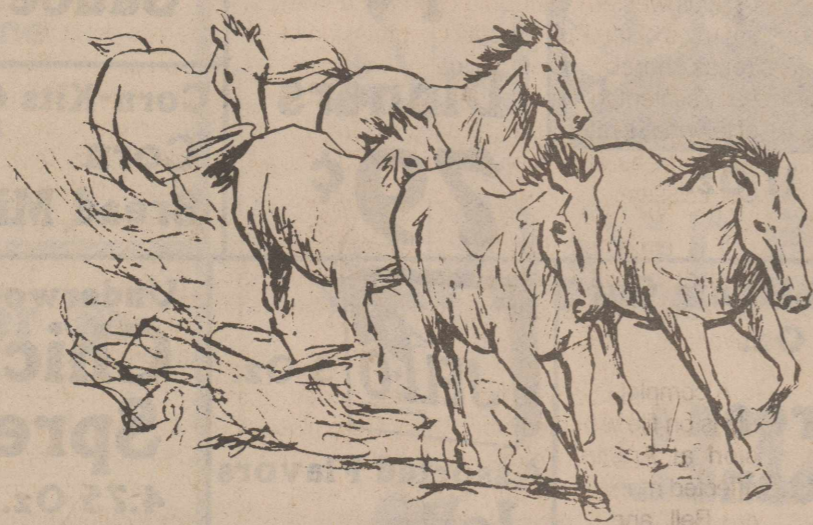

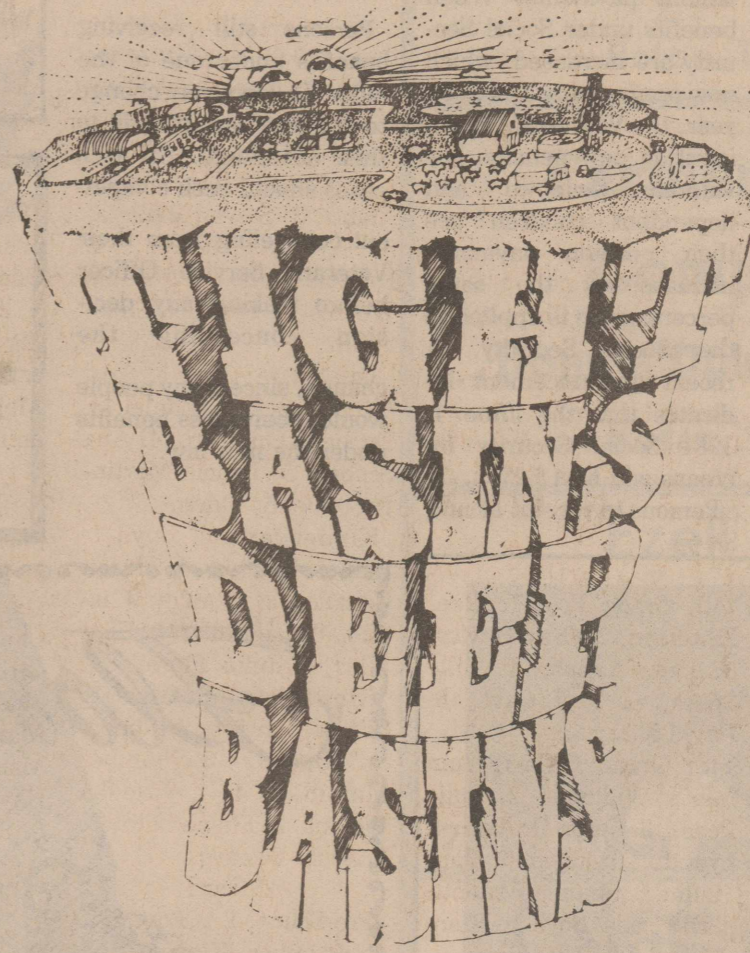

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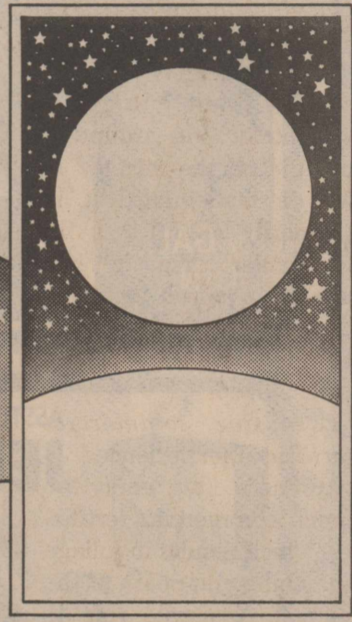
