USDA removes farm program payments to managers not actively engaged in farming

safety-net payments are issued only to active managers of farms that operate as joint ventures or general partnerships, consistent with the direction and authority provided by Congress in the 2014 Farm Bill. The action, which exempts family farm operations, closes a loophole where individuals who were not actively part of farm management still received payments.

"The federal farm safetynet programs are designed to protect against unanticipated changes in the marketplace for those who actively share in the risk of that farming operation," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "To ensure that help goes to those who genuinely need it, such as America's farm families,

a rule to ensure that farm and limit payments from those not involved on a daily basis in nonfamily farm management."

> Since 1987, the broad definition of "actively engaged" resulted in some general partnerships and joint ventures adding managers to the farming operation, qualifying for more payments, that did not substantially contribute to management. The rule applies to operations seeking more than one farm manager, and requires measureable, documented hours and key management activities each year. Some operations of certain sizes and complexity may be allowed up to three qualifying managers under limited conditions. The changes apply to payments for 2016 and subsequent crop years for

Candidates file for election

Monday, Dec. 14 was the last day to file for a place on the ballot for the March 2016 primary election.

There are many contested races on the federal, state and local levels. At present, there are still twelve republicans seeking the office of president, in addition to several democrats who have filed.

We will also be voting on a new U.S. Representative for District 19, since our current representative, Randy Neugebauer, has announced his retirement. Running for this position are nine republicans. In addition, voters will be deciding on Railroad Commissioner, Supreme Court Justices for places 3, 5 and 9, and three judges on the Court of Criminal Appeals.

On the state level, Haskell County voters will help elect a member of the State Board of Education for District 15, our State Senator in District 28 and the State Representative for District 68. All three are unopposed and will appear in the Republican primary.

In Haskell County, there are three contested races, including Haskell County Sheriff, Commissioner Precinct 1 and Commissioner Precinct 2. On the Democratic ticket, incumbent Sheriff Winston Stephens has filed for reelection, while Chris Rogers will appear on the Republican ballot. They will go head to head in the November general election. Commissioner Bill Hester is being challenged by Fritz Buerger for the Pct. 1 position. They are both running on the Republican ticket. Two republicans, Dale Carroll and Scott Langford, as well as democrat Elmer Adams, have filed for the unexpired term of Pct. 2 Commissioner Tiffen Mayfield, who has resigned.

Also filing, but drawing no opponent, are Mike Fouts, District Attorney; Kris Fouts, County Attorney; Connie Benton, Tax assessorcollector; Kenny Thompson, Commissioner Precinct 3; and Kim Bassett, Haskell County Constable Pct. 1.

The primary election for both parties will be held March 1, 2016. If you intend to vote in either the Democratic or Republican primary, you must be registered to vote by Monday, February 1. Early voting runs Feb. 16 through Feb. 26, and will take place at the Haskell County Courthouse.

You may only vote in one primary, either the Republican or Democratic, but not both. In the November general election, all registered voters are eligible to vote, regardless of the primary in which they voted.

If necessary, a Primary Runoff Election will be held May 24, 2016, and the general election is scheduled for November 8,


If the IRS ever questions an item on a taxpayer's return, their records will help explain any item and arrive at the correct tax. Records such as receipts, canceled checks and other documents that support an item of income, deduction or credit appearing on a return must be kept as long as they are relevant under federal tax law. Generally, this will be until the statute of limitation expires for that return. For assessment of tax owed on a timely-filed return, this usually is three years from the due date of the return.

Although the law does not require any special form of records, be sure to keep all receipts, canceled checks or other proof of payment and any other records to support any deductions or credits claimed. Also, for any refunds claimed, a taxpayer's records must show that they
