### Senate Joint Resolution No. 13

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 3. Taxes shall be levied and collected by general laws and for public purposes only; and the total amount of revenue which the State shall be authorized to collect during such biennium from taxes, licenses, permits and fees, (except those paid by students to state educational institutions, and except annuities, bonuses and royalties obtained from public lands and other public property) shall not exceed a sum reasonable estimated to equal the product obtained by multiplying the number of the inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50/100 (\$22.50) Dollars; provided however, that the population of the State (in determining the amount of revenue which may be collected from taxes, licenses, permits and fees or expended from the revenue thus obtained) shall be determined by the then last preceding Federal census, to which population shall be added or deducted, as the case may be, for each year that has elapsed since the last preceding Federal census, the average yearly increase or decrease of the population as shown by said Federal census when com-

pared with the Federal census which immediately preceded said last Federal census. Provided, further, that in case of war, riots, or insurrection, or a statewide calamity caused by earthquake, fire, flood or an epidemic which seriously threatens the health of the citizens of this State, the Legislature shall have authority, by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, to suspend for a definite period this constitutional limitation as to the amount of money which may be collected and expended during the biennium.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election each ballot shall have printed the words:

"For the Amendment of Section 3 of Article VIII of the State Constitution providing for the levying and collection of taxes and fixing the maximum amount thereof which can be collected and expended each biennium."  
"Against the Amendment of Section 3 of Article VIII of the State Constitution providing for the levying and collection of taxes and fixing the maximum amount thereof which can be collected and expended each biennium."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against, so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed amendment. A true copy.

### PEDDLER PRICES HIGH

Retail merchants of Birmingham, Alabama, are waging war on irresponsible peddlers and canvassers who are selling inferior wares at high prices, according to reports coming from the merchants' association. In one case cited a peddler was selling a small jar of very ordinary cold cream for 90 cents a jar when an equal quantity of a first class product could be bought in local drug stores at 25 cents. Selling household articles by house-to-house canvass has become a very profitable racket and in most cases the housewife pays an exorbitant price for inferior merchandise through false representations by itinerant salesmen. In almost every instance, the housewife would find upon investigation that she could buy a better product at lower prices from local merchants. When you buy an article from a local merchant you are sure to get good values for your money since the merchant must depend upon good merchandise and fair treatment of his patrons to stay in business. Most of his merchandise is chosen from recognized leaders in their field and no false representations are made in selling you any article for the merchant knows well enough that such tactics would not be profitable in the end since he hopes to keep you among his satisfied customers. On the other hand, the itinerant peddler is here today, gone tomorrow, and is only concerned with today's sales. You have no guarantee and no comeback if the product purchased is not what it was represented to be. Furthermore, the housewife who buys from house-to-house canvassers is doing the home town merchants an injustice. The merchant is a heavy taxpayer contributing his share toward the maintenance of our schools and city, and his prosperity indirectly affects that of every citizen of the town. When you trade with your home merchants you are assured of getting fair and honest treatment, while about the best you can get is the worst of it when you trade with the itinerant peddler.

### WASTE IN ADVERTISING

This is the age of advertising. Business cannot get along without it and the merchant who does the most intelligent advertising is the one who gets most of the business. Yet many merchants waste a large part of the money they think they are paying for advertising and wonder why they do not get results. It is just as important that the merchant keep himself well posted on the important subject of advertising as in the selection of his stock, yet few of them, except the larger stores which are able to maintain an advertising department, consider it worth their while to give any exhaustive study to this phase of their business.

Women do most of the buying and the shrewd advertiser prepares his copy with the idea of catching the eye of the housewife. Now, did you ever see a woman standing in front of a billboard studying the advertising, or reading the advertisements on the movie screen to make up her mind as to what or where to buy? Does she make up her shopping list from theater programs or telephone directories? Not on your life. But she will spend many minutes reading newspaper advertisements to see if any needed article is offered at special bargain prices. Outside of the store itself, the best and almost the only way to attract a prospective customer's attention to what you have to sell is through the newspaper that goes into the home. Other forms of advertising may have a certain value, but the merchant who feels that he cannot spend a great amount of money on advertising will get the best results by confining his advertising to the home newspapers. The store that advertises adequately, intelligently and persistently in its local newspapers will have no occasion to waste money on unprofitable forms of advertising.

No business, no community, state or nation can defy the law of progress by moving backward a generation. House Joint Resolution No. 41

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 5 of Article XI of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

House Joint Resolution No. 42

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 30, Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 30. The duration of all offices not fixed by this Constitution shall never exceed two (2) years, except that the elected officials of a city that has adopted and amended its charter as provided in Section 5 Article XI of the Constitution of Texas may, by amendment to such city's charter, hold office not to exceed four (4) years; provided, that when a Railroad Commission is created by law it shall be composed of three (3) Commissioners who shall be elected by the people at a general election for State officers and their term of office shall be six (6) years; provided, Railroad Commissioners first elected after this Amendment goes into effect shall hold office as follows: One shall serve two (2) years, and one four (4) years and one six (6) years; their terms to be decided by an immediate election after they shall have qualified. And one Railroad Commissioner shall be elected every two (2) years thereafter. In case of vacancy in said office the Governor of the State shall fill said vacancy by appointment until the next General Election.

House Joint Resolution No. 41. Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 5 of Article XI of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: Section 5. Cities having more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this State; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half per cent (2 1/2%) of the taxable property of such city, and no light shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for at least two per cent (2%) thereon; provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed often than every twelve (12) months. Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months;" and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months."
