Under the terms of the Executive order, the Civil Service Commission will certify to the Postmaster General the names of the highest three qualified eligibles, if as many as bert, Hobart Cavanaugh, Grant three are qualified, from which the Postmaster General may select one for nomination by the President. confirmation by the Senate is the nal action.

Applicants will not be required to ssemble in an examination room or scholastic tests, but will be rated on their education and business experience and fitness. The Civil Service Commission will make inquiry among representative local business and profession men and women concerning the experience, ability, and character of each applicant, and the evidence thus se cured will be considered in detemining the ratings to be assigned to the applicants.

The Commission states that pres dential postmasters are not in the classified civil service and that its duties in connection with appoint ments to such positions are to hold examnations and to certify the results to the Postmaster General The Commission is no interested in the political, religious, or fraternal affiliations of any applicant.

Receipt of applications to close on January 30th.



STARTING A BUSINESS

Business failures are due to many causes, including lack of experience, bad management, insufficient capital, ineptitude for business and others.

The most common reason for failure, however, is the starting of a business in a field that cannot reasonably be expected to support it, or in one that is largely overcrowded.

In a pamphlet issued by the Department of Commerce this fact is pointed out and a thorough survey of the prospective field is recommended before embarking upon a new enterprise. It says:

"In planning to enter a new field, the retailer may find by careful analysis, that his prospective market does not reflect such favorable circumstances as a cursory examination appeared to reveal. He may be saved from embarking upon the enterprise, thus preventing subsequent failure and much loss to society of wasted effort and capital.'

The time when anybody could start any kind of a business almost anywhere and make it a success is past, if, in fact, such time ever was. Modern business is highly competitive and requires better training than ever before. While optimism in moderation is a desirable trait, carried to the extreme it has perhaps wrecked more business ventures than any other one mistake.

We take the following from the January issue of the Greeting Card:

"No man has occupied the White House since the Great Emancipator with such tremendous problems facing him as those which confront our President, Franklin Delano Roosevelt. His shoulders must indeed be broad to carry the load which rests upon them.



Skipworth, who is a nephew of the victim by marriage, still maintains that he tried to rescue Melton, after he was awakened by smoke in his bedroom.

"Melton and myself went to bed early, and I was awakened by choking smoke, and tried to reach Herschel's room, but was driven back," he declared at the time of the tragedy to officers, and the story he still maintains as true.

"I ran into the yard and yelled to neighbors about the fire, and then rushed back into the house. when I found that Herschel was not on the outside. He wasn't on his bed, and I couldn't find him, even though I did hear a groan and as if something heavy fell."

Skipworth also claims that he saw a car parked some distance away near the railroad tracks, when he fled from the burning house, and declares that the car was driven away hurriedly, which prevented

his recognizing the occupants. On the day the alleged murder was committed. Melton's wife and baby were in Abilene visiting their son and daughter, students at Abilene Christian College.
