#### RULE FAMILY IS BITTEN TUESDAY BY VICIOUS DOG

Cur Turns On Benefactors When Attempt Made To Drive Him Away

RULE, Aug. 14.—Turning on his benefactors, a vicious dog bit Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Sturdivant and their two sons at their home about two and one-half miles from here Tuesday afternoon. The family was brought to Rule for treatment, while the head of the slain dog was sent to Austin for an examination to determine whether it had developed rabies.

According to Sturdivant, a bone had been thrown to the dog, which it had brought upon the porch, and in trying to drive it away, the cur attacked him, with such force that he was driven to the ground. Mrs. Sturdivant and her sons went to his rescue and were attacked in turn. Sturdivant received 15 slashes and wounds, while the other members of the family received numerous slashes before the dog could be slain.

#### DEPOSITS IN 823 TEXAS BANKS ARE INSURED BY FDIC

Number is 89 Percent of All Licensed Institutions In State Figures Show

#### PLAN MISUNDERSTOOD

Insurance Offers Protection To Depositors up to \$5,000 Even Though Bank Fails

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The deposits of more than 823 Texas banks are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, Chairman Leo T. Crowley has announced. This number is more than 89 per cent of all the licensed institutions in the state.

In the nation more than 14,000 banks or over 93 per cent of all the licensed institutions are now insured.

Although deposit insurance is now a permanent part of the nation's banking system people generally do not understand it very well, Mr. Crowley said.

"The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation is just what the name implies," he pointed out. "It is an insurance organization insuring deposits in banks. This protection is paid for by the banks. The insurance offers full protection to individual depositors up to \$5,000. In other words, if an insured bank fails and a person has, say, \$4,800 on deposit the Corporation would pay him in full. Our studies have shown that the \$5,000 maximum fully protects more than 97 per cent of all the depositors in insured banks."

The procedure is simple when an insured bank gets into difficulties and is forced to close its doors, Mr. Crowley explained.

"Just as soon as a receiver is appointed for the bank the Corporation begins to pay depositors the insured amount of their deposits," he said. "All the individual depositor needs to do is to present his pass book or some other evidence of (Continued on Page 5)

#### Wheat Loan Closing Date Is Extended To September 15th

The Government Emergency wheat loans have been extended to September 15th, according to announcement made by Reynolds Wilson, on advice received from the department.

Under the ruling of the department, \$2.00 per acre will be advanced for seed, etc., and the grower will be permitted to sow as much wheat as he had planted in either 1932 or 1933. If no wheat was sown in those years the same loan may be secured for the planting of barley or oats, according to the information received at the local office.

#### PIONEER O'BRIEN CITIZEN CLAIMED BY DEATH AUG. 14

T. G. (Uncle Tom) Carney Is Found Dead in Yard; Was Well-Known Here

Funeral services for T. G. (Tom) Carney, 71, pioneer Haskell county citizen, who passed away Tuesday from a heart ailment at his home in O'Brien, were held in O'Brien this afternoon at 3 o'clock and here in Haskell at 5 o'clock. Services here were held from the graveside, with Rev. I. N. Alvis, Rev. H. R. Whately, Baptist pastor, and Rev. Orion W. Carter, Methodist pastor, officiating. Interment was made in Willow cemetery.

Survivors of Mr. Carney are his wife; two sons, R. T. Carney of Houston, and G. G. Carney, of Snyder; a daughter, Mrs. Maude Lagrone, of San Angelo. Also eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren survive him.

Mr. Carney had been a resident of Haskell county for 46 years, having come to this section from Jonesboro, La., where he was born in 1863. At one time he was in business in Haskell and was well known throughout this section.

According to some of his neighbors, the body of Mr. Carney was found near a small shed in his back yard. He had been missing for a couple of hours, and Mrs. Carney had instituted a search for him, and failing, had notified neighbors, and his body was found lying on a pile of cotton seed.

#### PROPOSITION OF SELLER EXPLAINED IN MEETING TODAY

Approximate Cost and Way of Handling Studied By "City Dads" Thoroughly

#### UTILITIES PRESENT

Representatives of Company Offer Counter Plan For Benefit of Haskell

For the purpose of ascertaining approximate costs of a municipal light plant, Mayor A. F. Thurman and members of the city council will meet with a representative of a Dallas firm tonight (Thursday) and the matter thoroughly discussed. A representative of the West Texas Utilities Co., a corporation which is now serving Haskell, is also expected to be present and to present a counter-proposal.

Although firmly believing that a municipal plant is needed in Haskell, Mayor Thurman declines to state at this time whether the proposition will be carried on to a final conclusion, owing to the fact that he and the members of the city board wish to give a full hearing to all interested. He does state, however, that the meeting tonight will have a great bearing on the future course of the city administration.

Thurman informed a Free Press representative Wednesday that he believes that a municipal plant would be a great thing for Haskell and that he, personally, entertains hopes of accomplishing two things within the next two years—the installation of a light plant for one and securing of the \$45,000 government loan as another. He points out that there are 84 cities within the United States that do not collect taxes and every one of those cities are the sole owners of municipal plants, and that if Haskell owned its own plant, the benefits would prove of untold good to all citizens in the form of lower taxes and reduced electric rates.

In connection with the securing of the \$45,000 government loan which was recently granted by the government, Thurman states that the money would be used for the extension of Haskell's water supply. Two filtration plants, which would be uniform so far as medication was concerned, would be constructed, another tower, much larger than the present one and with more pressure, would be erected and that a concrete reservoir would be built. Four per cent would be charged Haskell on the loan, with a 20-year time allowed, and \$10,000 of the \$45,000 would be donated Haskell for relief purposes by the government.

#### Appointed Member Advisory Board of Texas Centennial

According to an announcement made by the Texas Centennial Commission Monday, Sam A. Roberts, publisher of the Haskell Free Press, has been appointed to membership on the Texas Centennial Advisory Board for Haskell county. The appointment is made effective at once.

The county advisory board is to work in conjunction with the state board for the purpose of furthering the cause of the Centennial.

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located." 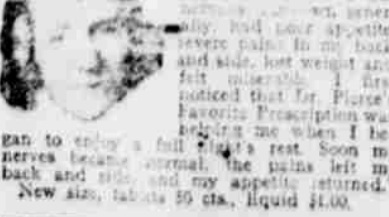

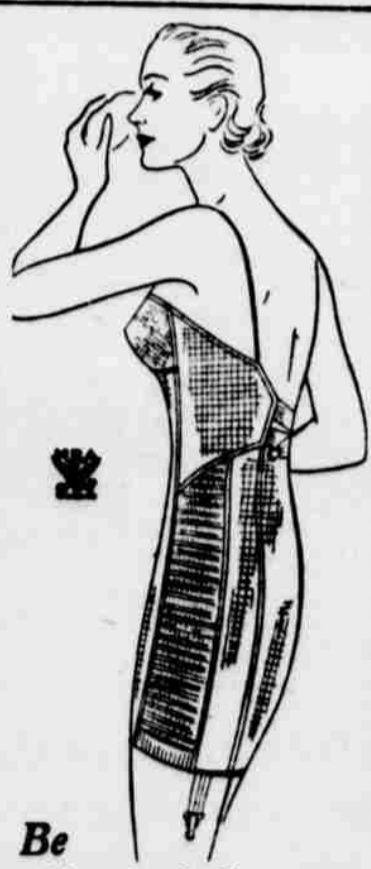

#### Senate Joint Resolution No. 16

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 1. Taxation to be equal and uniform as to Real Estate and to be equal and uniform as to all reasonable classifications of property; and occupation and income taxes; exemptions; limitations upon counties, cities, etc.

"Taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform. All property in this State, whether owned by natural persons or corporations, other than municipal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall be ascertained as may be provided by law. The Legislature may by general laws make reasonable classifications of all property other than real property for the purpose of taxation, and may impose different rates thereon; provided that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform. The persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits shall never be required to pay an occupation tax; Legislature may impose a poll tax, it may also impose occupation taxes, both upon natural persons and upon corporations, other than municipal, doing business in this State. It may also tax incomes of both natural persons and corporations other than municipal, except that provided that Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture, be exempt from taxation, and provided further that the occupation tax levied by any county city or town for any year on persons or corporations pursuing any profession or business, shall not exceed one-half of the tax levied by the State for the same period of such profession or business."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1931. At this election, all voters (having said amendment) shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this State, other than that owned by municipal corporations, shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation, and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose poll tax and occupation tax and income tax and exempting from occupation tax persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural

business and exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family; and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."

Those voters agreeing with proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this State, other than that owned by municipal corporations, shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation, and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose poll tax and occupation tax and income tax and exempting from occupation tax persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits; and exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family; and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."

#### Senate Joint Resolution No. 2

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 61, which shall read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000), or more, according to the then last preceding Federal census, shall hereafter be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties of this State the Commissioners' Court shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000) according to the then last preceding Federal census, the Commissioners' Court shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis. All fees earned by district, county or precinct officers shall be paid into the County Treasury

where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid to the County Treasury, when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis, such fees may be retained by such officer, or paid into the Treasury of the county as the Commissioners' Court may direct. All Notaries Public, County Surveyors and Public Weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified voters of this State and the next general election to be held on Tuesday, after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas adding Section 61 to Article XVI, abolishing the fee system of compensating all district officers and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether County officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or a salary basis; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court in all counties of this State to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee or a salary basis."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed amendment.

### House Joint Resolution No. 42

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 30, Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 30. The duration of all offices not fixed by this Constitution shall never exceed two (2) years, except that the elected officials of a city that has adopted and amended its Charter as provided in Section 5, Article XI of the Constitution of Texas may, by amendment to such city's charter, hold office not to exceed four (4) years, provided that when a Railroad Commission is created by law it shall be composed of three (3) Commissioners who shall be elected by the people at a general election for State officers, and their term of office shall be six (6) years; provided, Railroad Commissioners first elected after this Amendment goes into effect shall hold office as follows: One shall serve two (2) years, and one four (4) years and one six (6) years; their terms to be decided by lot immediately after they shall have qualified. And one Railroad Commissioner shall be elected every two (2) years thereafter. In case of vacancy in said office the Governor of the State shall fill said vacancy by appointment until the next General Election.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next General elec-

Senate Joint Resolution No. 13

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 3 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to read as follows:

Section 3. Taxes shall be levied by general laws and collected for public purposes only; and the amount of revenue which the State shall be authorized to collect from taxes, permits and fees, (except taxes on public lands and other lands owned by the State) shall not exceed a sum reasonably estimated to equal the amount of the revenue which the State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50/100 (\$22.50) Dollars; and, however, the total amount of such revenue which may be so collected shall be reduced by the amount of any surplus funds or unexpended appropriations remaining at the close of the preceding biennium. The expenditures of the State from funds derived from the sources above referred to shall not exceed during any biennium, the amount equal to the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50/100 (\$22.50) Dollars, provided however, that the population of the State (in determining the amount of revenue which may be collected from taxes, permits and fees or expended from the revenue thus obtained) shall be determined by the last preceding Federal census, which population shall be added or deducted, as the case may be, for each year that has lapsed since the last preceding Federal census, the average yearly increase or decrease of the population as shown by said Federal census when compared with the Federal census which immediately preceded, further Federal census. Provided, further, that in case of war, riots, or other causes which seriously threaten the health of the citizens of this State, the Legislature shall have authority, by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, to suspend for a definite period, the constitutional limitation as to the amount of money which may be collected and expended during the biennium."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the Amendment of Section 3 of Article VIII of the State Constitution providing for the levying and collection of taxes and fixing the maximum amount thereof which can be collected and expended each biennium."

House Joint Resolution No. 14

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That there be added to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas a new section to be numbered Section 2-A and to have five (5) lettered subdivisions and which section shall read as follows:

"Section 2-A. (a) General management and control of the affairs of the County shall hereafter be vested in the Commissioners Court, provided that in the exercise of powers not specifically granted to the Commissioners Court by the Constitution and Amendments thereto, the Court shall be subject to the authority of the Legislature of the State, and the Court shall also be subject to all general laws of the State now in force not in conflict with the provisions of this Amendment until such laws are modified or repealed. (b) All duties heretofore performed by the Clerk of the District Court and the County Clerk shall hereafter be performed by an officer to be known as Record Clerk; all duties heretofore performed by the County Tax Assessor and County Tax Collector shall hereafter be performed by one officer known as Tax Clerk; and in the counties where the sheriff performs the duties of the Tax Collector he may hereafter perform the duties of the Tax Clerk. The Record Clerk and the Tax Clerk shall be elected to hold office for a term of two (2) years and until their successors shall be elected and qualified. The Commissioners Court shall have authority to combine the office of County Treasurer and the office of County Surveyor or to combine either, or both of said offices with any county office. Within the maximum and minimum limits prescribed by the Legislature the Commissioners Court shall have authority to fix the compensation of all county and precinct officers except County Auditor, County Judge and County Commissioners. The Legislature shall fix the compensation of District Judges, District Attorneys, County Judges and the County Commissioners and may provide for a County Auditor and prescribe his duties and fix his compensation and the number and compensation of his assistants. The Commission-

ers Court shall fix the compensation of and determine the number of deputies, assistants and clerical personnel of all precinct officers and county officers except the county auditor. (c) City and county officers and employees may, in addition to their duties as such city and county officers or employees, be required to perform such other similar duties for cities, towns and districts within the county, or for the county, as may be mutually agreed upon and contracted for between the Commissioners Court of said county and the governing board, or boards, of such cities, towns and districts; and the cost of such service shall be provided for in said contracts and paid by such county, cities, towns or districts into the Treasury of the county or city, town or district, as provided for in said contract. All such contracts shall be approved by the Attorney General of this State and such contracts shall not cover a period longer than two (2) years. (d) The Legislature shall have authority, by general law, to provide for complete forms of county government and organizations different from that provided for in this Constitution to become effective in any county when submitted in such manner as may be prescribed by the Legislature to the qualified voters of such county in an election held for such purpose and approved by a majority of the qualified voters voting in said election. Provided, however, that no such law shall impair the right of the Commissioners Court to determine the compensation of county and precinct officers other than the County Auditor, to fix the number of assistants, deputies, and clerical personnel which said officers may employ; nor shall such general law change the present constitutional limitations as to particular and total tax levies for any or all county purposes; nor shall such general law change the present constitutional limitations on counties to incur public debts. (e) In any and all cases where provisions of the Constitution of this State are in conflict with the provisions of this Amendment, the provision of this Amendment (Section 2-A, Article IX) shall control; provided, however, should any county adopt a Home Rule Charter under authority of any provisions of the State Constitution or Amendment thereto, this Amendment shall not be applicable to such county."

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the Amendment of Article IX of the State Constitution by adding Section 2-A thereto, giving the Commissioners Court general management and control of county affairs, and authorizing the Legislature to provide more economical forms of county government and different than as now provided by law."

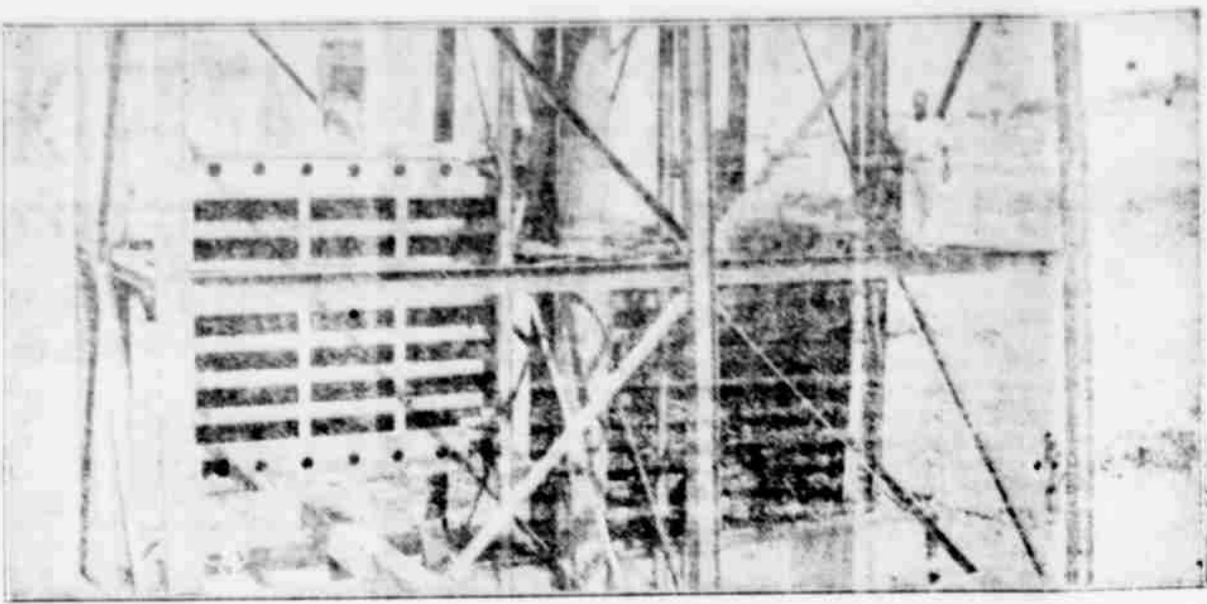
