FORMER SUSPECT IN FROME MURDER IS CHARGED HERE

Burglary of a local blacksmith shop was frustrated Friday night, with consequent charges filed against two men as an indirect result of the threatening storm in this area on that date.

Shortly before midnight Friday, residents living in the vicinity south of the square had gathered at the home of T. T. Fancher when clouds threatened approach of a "cyclone".

The pursued man when overtaken flashed a light and cautioned the men not to come closer, threatening to shoot, but was taken into custody by the group and carried to the county jail.

The second man eluded his followers, and caught a passing freight train near the south outskirts of town. Sheriff Kemp and City Marshal Britton in the county officer's car drove to Stamford ahead of the freight and apprehended the second suspect when he alighted from the train.

Burglary charges were filed against the two men Saturday, signed by a member of the sheriff's department.

One of the men charged, Raymond McAdams, alias H. C. Collins, was recently released by Fisher county officers after he had

The Racket Strikes Again

In all probability another young life has been sacrificed to organized crime in the kidnaping of James Cash, Jr., the Florida lad for whom an eager nation awaits. Just as long as heavy ransoms are paid will children be snatched from their cribs or lured from play as the agency of extortion from parents who can pay the bill.

No baser criminals live than those who conceive the plots and carried out such abductions as those of Baby Lindbergh, the Mattson child,

young Levine and the Cash boy. Seven cases in all have been spread across the front pages of newspapers the past few years and in most instances the child victims have been cruelly slain. Each time the prey has been killed those who carried out the deed have made crude efforts to completely hide the disposition of those young bodies.

You can't keep parents, their hearts filled with the last glowing memory of a smiling face, from paying ransom and delivering it just as quickly as satisfactory contact can be made with abductors. Even in the face of those brutal killings that prove the money paid in vain, others raise cash and deliver it through mysterious channels in the slim hope that their child might be restored alive.

Just as long as ransom is paid these young lives will be sacrificed to the most cruel of all criminals. When kidnapers are denied their loot the victim becomes valueless as an instrument of extortion. Then and only then will the problem be solved, but it will take lots of thinking to reach a satisfactory national understanding on which any hope of freedom from this scourge might rest.
