

### ALLIES STILL BELITTLE OUR HELP IN WAR

It is just about 18 years since the World War ended but our late beloved allies have not yet given up the attempt to prove that we really weren't nearly as much help to them as we supposed at the time David Lloyd George, who was prime minister of England when we went into the war, is still writing memours, and his most recent volume includes some sharp criticism of Gen. John J. Pershing. General Pershing has been criticized by allied statesmen before now. He wasn't quite the sort of thing they were looking for; he had a hard, square jaw and a mouth that could look like a slit in a sheet of armor plate. When they all rallied 'round and began telling him how to run his part of the war, he had a remarkable faculty for listening quietly and then saying "No" in a rock-ribbed, eternal sort of way.

Lloyd George's complaint is the same old one that Pershing was as stubborn as a Missouri mule about the idea of keeping American troops under American command, and that, because of this fact it took the United States altogether too to make its presence felt on the firing line. The Lloyd George idea had the beauty of simplicity. It was to feed American troops right into the British army, by companies and batallions. There would be no American army, as such; instead, there would be a vast number of separate units brigaded into the war-torn British divisions. As fast as our boys got to France, they could be put to work. The best mark on Pershing's record is the fact that he said No" to this little scheme, and said it often. The British high command had spent two mortal years butting its head into a stone wall. At the very moment when it was asking Pershing to turn his American boys over to its tender mercies, it was wasting 400,000 lives in the mud-mired Passchendaele offensive-a strategic gem from which Brit-

ish historians are still criticizing the high command in the bitterest terms. Lloyd George himself did not quite trust the British high command. He held British troops in England in such numbers that Earl Haig's partisans blame him for the German breakthrough of March, 1918; held them there because he was sick of seeing the flower of the British army wasted in vain, uninspired attacks that were foredoomed to failure. And yet Lloyd George now car criticize Pershing for feeling precisely the same

We owe this lan ern-jawed general of ours great debt of gratitude. He stood like a rock against unbelieveable pressure. He held out for the idea that if American boys had to fight on a foreign battlefield they would at least go in under American direction, fighting for American objectives. If he is to be critcized, it has got to be for some reason other than

### THIS IS DIPLOMACY

For several centuries, and perhaps much longer, before the World War diplomats wrote and rebeived their dispatches, hinking they were very secret, but in very many cases other countries had their paid spies within the inner circles of various powers so that they would be kept informed of international developments.

A case in point was the situation in the imperial Russion Embassy in London just before the World War. In May, 1914, England and Russia were preparing a naval agreement. A Berlin newspaper commented rather guardedly upon the "rumor" of such an agreement, which was a threat to German security in the Ballic and North Sea.

When this publication was called to the attention of the foreign ministers of Great Britain and Russia neither admitted it. Sir Edward Gray avoided a question in the House of Commons without answering. The Russian Foreign Minis er, Sazonoff, became morally indignant and declared that the convention existed "only in the imagination" of the newspaper "and in the moon." So, did the statesmen seek to hide their plans.

The joke in the little episode lies in the fact that while all this was going on a secretary named Siebert in the Russian Embassy at London was copying all of the communications and sending them the German Foreign Office in Berlin, which, by the way, had inspired the little piece in the Berlin newspaper. Therefore, despite denials and avoidances the German diplomats were fully informed secretly of the moves made by the Russian and British diplomats.

As the fac's of war and diplomacy come to the light, usually a generation after the events we are about convinced that he only people who are kept n ignorance are those most vitally affected by the maneuvers of the diploma's, namely, the men who will have to fight when their schemes go wrong and the many children who will have to suffer when

Tony lives in Brooklyn, N. Y. He likes Brooklyn because there you can get a swell swordfish steak in a restaurant, without having to go out charge of the office. and catch it yourself. Tony is plenty sick of sword-fishing. There are enough dictators around waving swords nowadays without having the fish do it, too. And like a dictator, a swordfish can drag you into trouble faster than almost anything else on earth or in the water. At least, that was Tony's experience.

Tony says he never did want to go on that swordfishing trip in the first place. He had just arrived in Avalon on Catalina island, off the coast of California, and he didn't know any more about deep-sea fishing than the mayor of Timbucktoo knows about the North Pole. But his friend, Tom Martin talked him into it, and on the morning of August 17, 1931, they set out in a power boat for San Clemente island, about thirtyfive miles away.

### Then Tony Got His First Strike.

When they reached the north side of San Clemente, Tom showed Tony how to bait his hook and how to handle his line. Then they began cruising and looking for swordfish. Tony says they cruised for two hours before they saw one, and it was a half hour after that before Tony got his first strike.

"That strike," says Tony, "almost yanked me clear out of the boat. There was a tremendous tug on the line, and I caught my balance just in time. Behind me I could hear Tom yelling instructions and I began reeling in my line. I reeled in until another violent jerk told me that the fish was diving for the bottom, and then, still following Tom's instructions, I let the line reel out again.

"By this time my hands were raw and blistered, and I was panting from the exertion. When the line was almost all out, Tom shouted to me to reel in again, and slowly, laboriously, I began hauling that swordfish back to the surface. I must have had him almost to the top when suddenly the line went slack again. A second later I heard a hellish roar and the water burst apart close to the boat. The swordfish shot out of the water like a bombshell and fell back again with a loud splash. Then it was off again, in a series of mad plunges, taking most of the line with it.

"Tom yelled: 'It's a beauty.' And it was. It was every bit of eleven feet long, and it must have weighed close to four hundred pounds. And just then, the fish turned suddenly in the water and charged straight for the boat!'

Tom yelled to Tony to haul in the line, and Tony forgot about the reel and began hauling it in hand-over-hand. In the excitement of the moment he didn't notice that the line had become tangled around his foot. That swordfish was taking all his attention. At the last moment it veered, missing the boat by a fraction of an inch, and then Tony felt a tug at his entangled foot. He was knocked clean off his pins, and before he realized what had happened he was in the water, choking and gasping for air, being dragged along at the end of the line.

## Overboard Among the Sharks.

Says he: "In vain I tried to untangle the line around my foot-and in vain I tried to break the strong cord. Down-down I was dragged by that diving fish, and I thought my lungs would burst before it shot to the top again. And then, while I was still fighting for air, I became aware of an even deadlier menace. Sharks! A number of them, swimming nearby, dim, ghostly shapes in the water."




