Valley Student To Spend The Summer in Japan

Amy Stark, a sophomore at Valley High School, is a 1997 recipient of the Japanese Exchange Program Scholarship sponsored by Future Homemakers of America, Inc. (FHA/HERO) and Youth For Understanding. Twenty FHA/HERO members were chosen to spend six weeks in Japan, each living with a Japanese family.

FHA/HERO and Youth For Understanding sponsor this partnership program because they share compatible goals. Both organizations encourage individual and group involvement in helping achieve global cooperation and harmony.

Funded by the Kikkoman Corporation of Japan, this program began in 1979. To date 337 FHA/HERO members have received scholarships.

This year nearly 100 FHA/HERO members applied for the scholarships, which are valued at more than \$4,000 each. The process involved an extensive application, recommendations, screening and an interview. Applicants were judged on leadership qualities, openness to new experiences and ideas and their degree of involvement in FHA/HERO projects.

Miss Stark and the other winners will attend a three-day orientation session June 20-22 at Stanford University in Palo Alto, California, and then fly directly to Japan.

"I feel so honored to have received this scholarship. My mother once lived in Japan, so this has a special significance to me."

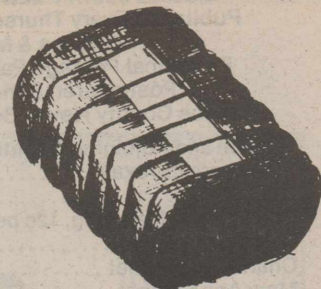
She is the daughter of Randy and Linda Stark of Quitaque. Her chapter adviser is Kathy Taylor.

Cotton's reputation has the potential to become tainted as a result of an alarming increase in lint contamination in recent crops, according to the Cotton Board. Contamination has increased so much that mills are searching for ways to find some other entity in the cotton marketing chain to share in the cost of claims filed against them by customers.

"The problem is that prevention is best done in the fields and gins," says Dr. William F. Lalor, vice president of Agricultural Research at Cotton Incorporated. "It is very difficult to prevent the problem in a modern mill opening room."

Therefore, producers and ginners must give serious thought to how they can prevent plastics and non-cotton fibrous material from contaminating their cotton.

Remembering The Reason For Memorial Day

Carmella LaSpada, the woman behind the national "tie a yellow ribbon" campaign during the Iranian hostage crisis of 1979-81, has a new mission: She's urging every American to take a minute at 3:00 p.m. EDT each Memorial Day to remember those who died in wars (or conflicts or acts of terrorism) since the country's beginnings in 1776.

"Americans under 30 don't know anything about war," LaSpada said. "One minute is the only time this country will be united for an important purpose—showing respect. The Netherlands does it. Israel does it. So does Turkey. The U. S. should do it too."

To initiate her effort, Congressional leaders will light a candle at the Capitol in Washington, D. C. at 3:00 p.m. EDT. Assisted by Medal of Honor winners, governors will do the same at numerous state capitals around the country.

LaSpada's organization, No Greater Love, has provided the District of Columbia and the 50 states with displays for the candles to be used.
