Study Course Revised

Trustees have approved a revision of the course of study and the pastor. Local leaders in the teaching schedule in the intermechurch predict a much larger in- diate grades and in the high school,

For a number of years the course of study outlined by the State Department of Education has called for the teaching of eight to ten various subjects in each of the intermediate grades. The teaching schedule allowed thirty minutes Modernistic Salon actual class time per day in each of these subjects. The new plan calls for a combination and coordination of subjects in such way as to reduce the number of daily classes to five. These will run through periods of one hour each. In addition there will be a twenty minute period each day for home room activities. Classes will do all study in each subject under the direct supervision of the structor.

Several changes will be made in the course of study offered in the high school. Requirements for graduation have been changed to some extent and students are given more latitude in selection of courses. GOOBER CAKE

If you live in Ol' Virginy you don't need to be told what a Goober Cake is. But if you're a native of the north or the far west, you'll be interested in adding this bit of information to your knowledge of food things—Goobers are nothing more or less than peanut—or goober—cake is made from crunchy, salted peanuts with the little red husks left on. It's an inexpensive cake that rates high with the children. They are wilting and glad to eat it as is. But I think most of us would enjoy it more when it's covered with a luscious creamy caramel icing and as a further recommendation let me add that this inexpensive Salted Peanut Cake can be made with sour milk. Here is the recipe— Salted Peanut Cake

oup shortening 1% cups cake flour

1% cups all-purpose flour

1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. salt
1 cup sour milk or buttermilk
1 cup coarsely ground salted
peanuts (with brown hulls
left on)

Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, and cream thoroughly. Blend in well beaten egg. Sift flour once before measuring. Sift flour, soda and salt together and add to creamed mixture alternately with the sour milk or buttermilk. Blend in ground peanuts. Pour into well greased and floured 8-inch square pan. Bake 45 minutes in a moderate oven, 350° F.

time to avoid making icing too runny to handle.

Question: What kind of sugar is best for cakes, cane or beet sugar? Answer: Either beet or cane sugar may be used with equally good results. The principal thing is to see that the sugar is finely granulated. A coarse sugar will never give you as fine a

Sometimes when I'm making a cake, the batter seems to sort of separate and get curdled-looking. Will this have any bad effect on the cake? If your batter separates in this way, the cake will not have as fine a texture. If you see the slightest tendency toward separating, quickly add more of your flour mixture. Don't add too much liquid at a time. In adding the flour and liquid, stir in some of the flour first, then add a little liquid, and so on alternately, being careful to add some of the flour last.

Just what does it mean by "folding in" the agg white?

Just what does it mean by "folding in" the egg whites? Why don't you stir them in or blend them in? Folding is a different motion from stirring, and blending is not quite definite enough. When we "fold" the fluffy beaten egg whites into a cake batter we drop them onto the batter, then cut down through the batter with the edge of a spoon, turn it and bring it up alongside of the bowl and fold some of the batter over the egg whites; then turn the spoon and cut down again, etc. Continue this very gently until the fluffy air-laden egg whites are completely distributed through the batter. The correct and complete name for this process is to "cut and fold."



> The system also took another forward step last year by adopting the unit system in the 5th, 6th and 7th grades as recommended in the new curricula by the State Deartment of Education, being the first in this section to adopt this plan. It has proved very satisfac-tory and will be used hereafter. J. L. Beard, deputy state superintendent, highly complimented this work at Weinert when he visited the schools last spring.

To continue the increase in enrollment for the current year, the Lake Creek school district has contracted their grade school students to Weinert. In order to provide a wider selection of courses from which the students may choose, the following courses are being added: Commercial arithmetic, commercial law, commercial geography, Texas history and the second year of vocational agriculture.

The curriculum of the Weinert High School is one of the best to be found in this part of the state. The superintendent and school board have worked os the theory that students who are not fortunate enough to go to college after finishing their high school work should be given an opportunity to avail themselves with information and skills that would prepare them for their life's work. With this in view they have added vocational agriculture, home economics, typing, shorthand, bookkeeping, business arithmetic, junior business, commercial geography and commercial law.

"In the first stage of rabies," Dr. Cox states, "the disposition of the dog changes entirely. A happy, playful dog becomes dejected, creeps away and hides. An ordinarily vicious dog may become friendly. If he licks his master's hand, he may spread rabies through cuts and abrasions on the skin. The dog may be mean at times, and at other times appar-

According to Dr. Cox the phrase 'mad dog" is associated with the second stage of rabies. This is the Bureau. irritable period in which the dog becomes restless, sometimes running away and returning hours after, worn out from fighting other dogs. Rabies may be suspected, especially if the dog was not formerly in the habit of leaving home. Because of irritation the dog may snap at everything it approaches and will run amuck in crowds, often biting people. The dog's bark changes to a throaty howl in this, the most dangerous
