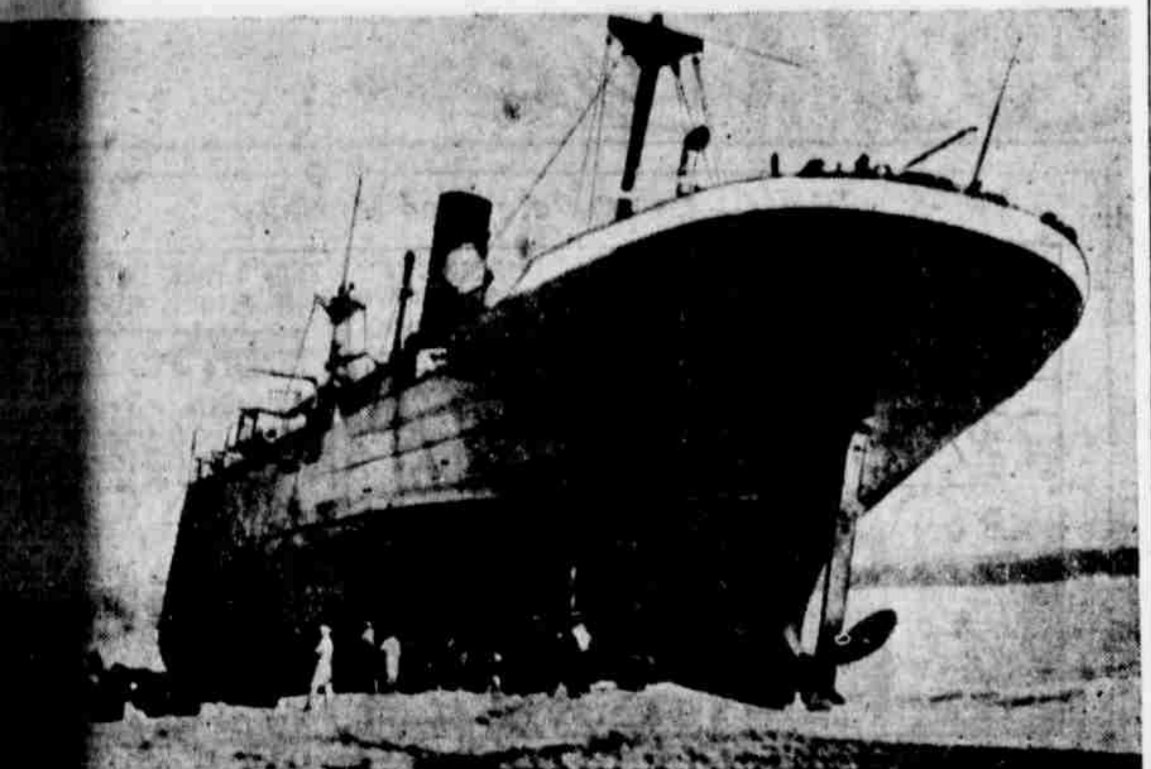






German Liner Lands High and Dry

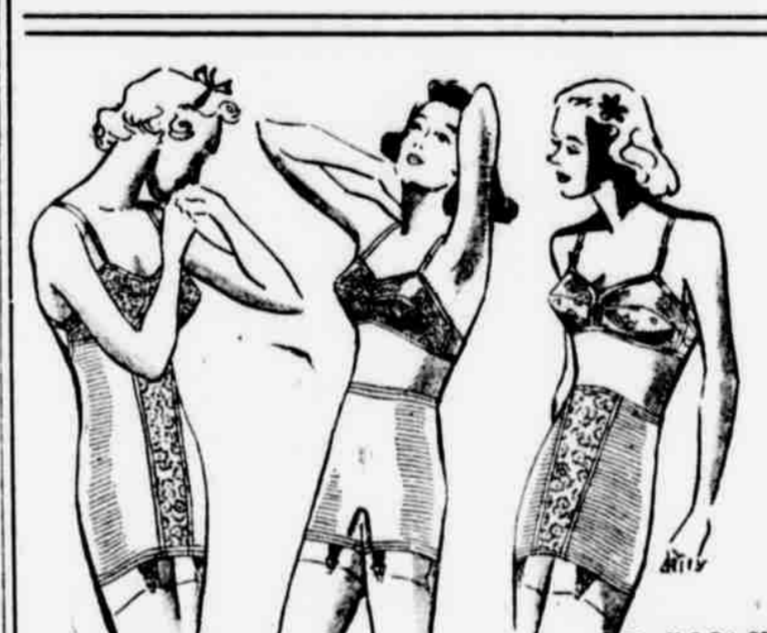
